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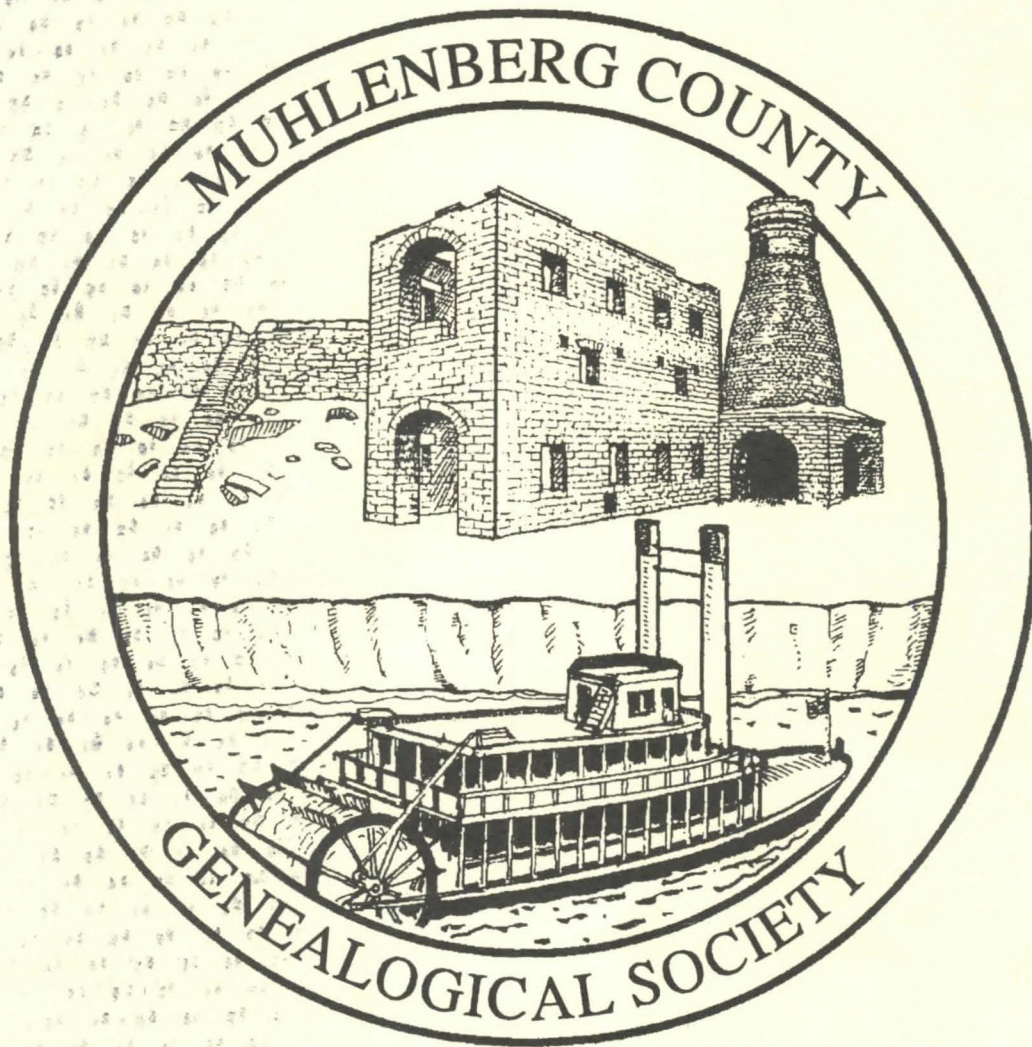

## How Do I Find Great Grandma's Birth and Death Dates?

The date of birth and death begin and end a chapter on an individual life. Genealogists of all types spend a great deal of time and money tracking these dates. The availability of recorded evidence of these dates is always a prime concern for any person interested in genealogy. The task of anyone looking for birth and death information in Kentucky, becomes easier once the available sources of information become familiar. When an ancestor's life began and ended will determine the type of record available for potential research.

The grave marker is the first record which comes to mind, particularly for the typical beginning genealogist. Grave markers often record the date of birth and death and may record additional relationships. Other family members may be buried near-by giving clues for further research. Indexed books of the transcribed grave markers may make research easier. The information may seem logical and accurate and the researcher may be tempted to end the search here.

However, as valuable as the information from grave markers may be, the researcher should be wary of using the information in isolation. A grave marker placed at a grave shortly after the death may be accurate, but one placed years later may reflect the memory of the relative placing the stone. The mourning relatives may faithfully record the birth on the stone as his deceased family member always relayed it. However, before birth certificates, people could easily claim their birth as a specific date but in reality be older or younger. Often even the person himself was unsure of the exact date.

The recording of birth and death certificates in Kentucky began in January 1911. Indexes are available for births and deaths recorded in Kentucky in both book and microfiche format. Both sources were based upon the original certificates but were transcribed separately. For this reason, both sources might be consulted. There are major differences in the interpretation of individual names from the original in the two formats. Also, names seem to be included in one source but not the other in some cases. Neither source seems to be complete nor necessarily more accurate. However, the indexes do contain names, dates, places, certificate numbers, the age at death for deaths, and the mother's maiden name for births.

The Internet also allows the search for the individual vital record in Kentucky. Browsing is harder since the exact name must be typed in, but the beauty of at-home work cannot be denied. Use your World Wide Web browser to search Kentucky vital records at

<http://ukcc.uky.edu/~vitalrec/> by following their directions. The KY GenWeb project should also be consulted for listings of some individual county cemetery transcriptions.

The birth and death indexes in microfiche or book format and the Internet provide a good starting point for research. However, the certificate itself will provide even more information. These can be obtained by writing Vital Statistics, 275 East Main, Frankfort, KY 40612. Microfilmed copies of death certificates 1911-1946 are available at the Kentucky Library in Bowling Green, KY and at the Owensboro Public Library in Owensboro, KY.

Some vital statistics information is available prior to 1911 from another source. The "Sutton Law" was first introduced into the Kentucky state legislature in 1850, and was finally approved January 9, 1852 (*Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky*, 1851/1852, Chapter 393, pp. 359-360). The law provided for the recording of births, deaths, and marriages in what are usually called KY Vital Statistics 1852-1910. The recording of marriages was in addition to that recorded by the County Court Clerk's offices. The registration law was repealed in 1862 due to financial pressures due to the Civil War. Even though counties varied in their compliance to the law, most have records through the 1850's and at least 1860, and some for a few later years prior to 1911.

These KY Vital Statistics were recorded by clergymen, physicians, and midwives but usually not at the time of the event. Apparently, these were often recorded in a single batch by law before January 10 of each year. The accuracy of the record depends on the diligence of the record keeping of the person who recorded the event. There are inaccuracies, but the amount of information recorded makes them an extremely valuable tool.

The type of information recorded by the KY Vital Statistics for births, deaths, and marriages is extremely valuable for research of the individual and the family. Births record the date and place, name of individual, name of father (or owner in case of a slave), maiden name of mother, residence of parents, sex, color, and condition at births. Deaths record date, place, name, age, sex, color, marital status, cause of death, name of parents, occupation, residence, and place of birth. Marriages record the names of the couple, birth place, ages, and whether it is a first, second, etc. marriage. [This is often more information than is available from the county marriage books for the time period.]

These KY Vital Statistics are arranged more or less alphabetically by county. The original books have been microfilmed and have been grouped by type of record. The births, deaths, and marriages for all years are grouped together. The years are arranged chronologically and labeled as to year at the beginning of each section. There will usually be one or two pages for each type of event per year. Names on the pages are handwritten and not in alphabetical order. However, the layout makes them easy to scan. Even though for each county there will be less than 10 years available for the entire time period 1852-1910, the records are well worth the time for the Kentucky researcher.

KY Vital Statistics are available at the Kentucky Library in Bowling Green for counties in the Warren County area. The Bowling Green LDS Family History Center has the entire set of microfilm on site for the state. Researchers not willing to travel to Bowling Green can order these through any branch LDS Family History Center.

Another source of information for births and deaths is the Social Security Death Benefit Index. This is useful only for people who have died since 1964. It gives birth, death, death place, place where benefits were sent, social security number, and place where the social security number was issued. The index arranges the names alphabetically but only lists the first name and not the middle name of the individual. Names are accessed by typing in the name of the individual. The index is available commercially through several companies, at various sites on the Internet, and on the Family Search computer system at any LDS Family History Center.

Records associated with the military are another source which provide exact dates. Pension application files, based on Federal service before World War I can be obtained from the National Archives and Records Administration, 7<sup>th</sup> and Pennsylvania Avenue NW, Washington, DC 20408. Pension applications usually contain information on not only the soldier's military service but information of a personal nature. The file often contains not only his birth and death dates, but information about spouses and children as well.

A source which has become available fairly recently are the World War I Draft Registrations. Young men between the ages of 18 and 31 in 1917 were required to register with their county draft boards. These registrants were born between 13 September 1873 and 12 September 1900. Usually registration occurred in the county of residence, but occasionally in the county where they were employed. Cards were filled out on each registrant containing physical description, birth date, residence, name and address of next of kin, and birth place of those who registered the first year of registration. The cards were signed by the registrant. Even though young men may have lied on their year of birth, to appear older or younger, the day and month would usually still be correct.

The cards have been microfilmed and are available for most states. These may be obtained from the National Archives through their microfilm rental program and from the Family History Library in Salt Lake by rental through your local LDS Family History Center.

Court records, although not intended to yield vital information, often given information about deaths and births. Wills are written, then probated, usually in the next court held after the death. Suits brought by family members to contest wills will often list the exact death date. Guardian records will yield information about minor children. Wills, county court minutes, deed records, and circuit court records should all be searched for possible information concerning vital information. Marriage records also often record ages or include consents which imply age ranges.



In Kentucky, tax lists are available for most counties from the time that the individual county was first organized. Men paid a poll tax when they turned 21 whether they owned property or not. This information can be used to estimate birth dates sometimes more accurately than census records. They should also not be ignored for their value in determining relationships based on property ownership. Tax lists are available from the Kentucky State Archives and through any LDS Family History Center.

Finally, although possibly the least accurate of all the records listed, census records do record ages which can be used for estimating birth years. Post-1850 census records record the ages of all family members by name. However, never use just a single census to estimate an age. Collection of all census records available for an individual will often reveal differences from year to year, requiring a judgement of the correct estimate. Pre-1850 census records can also be used to narrow down the ages of individuals once relationships are determined. Even though individuals are only listed in categories and not by name, age ranges within less than 10 years can often be determined in conjunction with marriage records and other sources. The Kentucky Library along with many other major libraries have complete sets of Kentucky census records. These can also be obtained through the National Archives and through LDS Family History Centers.

Even though exact birth and death information cannot always be obtained for your ancestor, the search of all these records will often yield surprising results. You may only be able to narrow down your ancestor's life span, but in the search, you come to know the details making up his life. The specific dates of birth and death, though important, have been supplemented in the search by more details of his life.

PERSI, the Periodical Source Index, is an index of genealogical articles. The index is organized both alphabetically by surname and by locality. PERSI is available on microfiche at your local LDS Family History Center or many libraries with genealogy collections.

*Many Muhlenberg County families have ties to Logan County, Kentucky. This is the beginning of a series of articles which will include information from counties surrounding Muhlenberg County which may contain useful information on Muhlenberg County families.*

*Mortality schedules supplement the regular population censuses by recording the deaths of all persons who died within the county during the past year. They are particularly useful when used with the population schedules to determine the household of the deceased individual. The 1870 Mortality Schedule records every person who died in the year ending 1 Jun 1870. The following mortality schedule is available on microfilm in many libraries, Family History Centers, and also at the Kentucky Dept for Libraries and Archives in Frankfort, KY.*

*The information is presented in the following format: Number of Family as given in the 2<sup>nd</sup> column of Schedule 1; Name of every person who died during the year ending June 1, 1870, whose place of abode at the time of death was in this family; Age last birth-date. If under one year, give months as fractions; Sex—Male (M), Female (F); Color—White (W), Black (B), Mulatto (M), Chinese (Ch), Indian (I); Married (M) or Widowed (W); Place of Birth, naming the State or Territory of the U. S., or the country, if of foreign birth; Father of foreign birth; Mother of foreign birth; The Month in which the person died; Profession, Occupation, or Trade; Disease or Cause of Death.*

**Brown, John**, Private (Wagoner), B Co., 16 Sep 1861 at Camp George D. Prentice (Greenville), KY. Jan-Apr 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. Apr-Aug 1862 sick at Bowling Green, KY. Jul-Aug 1862 discharge furlough. Requested disability discharge due to typhoid on 16 June 1862, but not approved. **Brown, Sherrod W.**, Private, H Co., 23 yrs, 28 Sep 1861 at South Carrollton, KY. 30 Jun-18 Aug 1862 in General Hospital Nashville, TN due to typhoid. Captured 29 Sep 1863 near Albany, KY (on march from Glasgow, KY to Knoxville, TN) and paroled at Overton Co., TN on 10 Oct 1863 by Colonel **John M. Hughs**, 25<sup>th</sup> TN Infantry (CSA). Lost Smith carbine, 2 blankets, great coat, horse, saddle, and all equipment. Reported to Camp Chase, OH on 15 Oct 1863. Exchanged 20 Nov 1863 and reported to regiment 24 Nov 1863. Discharged 14 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Brown, William H.**, Private, D Co., 18 yrs, 14 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Jan-Feb 1862 sick at home in KY. Wounded (slightly) at battle of Shiloh (Shiloh, TN) on 7 Apr 1862. No further entries.

**Browning, Duran O.**, Private, K Co., 14 Oct 1861 at South Carrollton, KY. Transferred to H Co. on 1 Jan 1862. Jan-May 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. Discharged 30 May 1862 at Nashville, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to pulmonary infection and diarrhea. At discharge was 5 ft 10 in, light complexion, blue eyes, sandy hair, farmer and born in Muhlenberg Co., KY. [Final resting place at Cumberland Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Sacramento, KY.]

**Browning, Wiley**, Private, H Co., 22 yrs, 4 Oct 1861 at South Carrollton, KY. Discharged 24 Apr 1862 at Shiloh, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to blindness and bad hearing. Soldier was in good health at enlistment, but already blind in left eye and had slightly bad hearing which has increased. At discharge was 5 ft ? in, dark complexion, blue eyes, sandy hair, farmer and born in Muhlenberg Co., KY. Annotation of died 12 May 1862 at Benton Barracks, MO of chronic diarrhea as a result of typhoid.

**Browning, William**, Private, H Co., 22 yrs, 28 Sep 1861 at South Carrollton, KY. May-Jun 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. Discharged 10 Jul 1862 in Nashville, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to chronic diarrhea and phthisis (tuberculosis). At discharge was 5 ft 8 in, dark complexion, dark eyes, dark hair, farmer and born in Muhlenberg Co., KY.

**Bruce, Wing K.**, Private, K Co., 19 yrs, 3 Jan 1862 at Calhoun, KY. Deserted 17 Apr 1862 at Corinth, MS. Returned in confinement awaiting court-martial 20 Mar 1863. Restored to duty 17 Oct 1863 by order of Major General **Burnside** with loss of pay to date. Discharged 14 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Bryant, George**, Private C Co., 19 yrs, 10 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Jan-Aug 1862 sick at Nashville, TN due to typhoid. Deserted 10 Apr 1863 at Bowling Green, KY. Found at residence in Butler Co., KY and returned to regiment 23 Aug 1863. Restored to duty 1 Sep 1863 with loss of pay to date. Discharged 16 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Bryant, John M.**, Private, D Co., 20 yrs, 14 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Jan-Jun 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. Jul-Aug 1863 detached service with Pioneer Corps at Bowling Green, KY and Knoxville, TN. Captured 29 Sep 1863 near Albany, KY (on march from Glasgow, KY to Knoxville, TN) and paroled at Overton Co., TN on 10 Oct 1863 by Colonel **John M. Hughs**, 25<sup>th</sup> TN Infantry (CSA). Lost Smith carbine, 2 blankets, great coat, horse, saddle, and all equipment. Reported to Camp Chase, OH on 15 Oct 1863. Exchanged 20 Nov 1863 and returned to regiment on 24 Nov 1863. Discharged 16 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Bryles, John B. (H.)**, Private D Co., 19 yrs, 10 Oct 1861 at Earles, KY. Died 12 Dec 1861 at Regimental Hospital Calhoun, KY of pneumonia. (Transfer orders to K Co. received 13 Dec 1861.)

**Buchanan, George W.**, Private K Co., 20 yrs, 10 Oct 1861 at Earles, KY. Died 31 Jan or 9 Feb 1862 at Calhoun, KY of pneumonia.

**Buchanan, Riley**, Private, F Co., 18 yrs, 27 Oct 1861 at Rochester, KY. Jul 1863 *due* government for loss of Smith carbine through carelessness. Discharged 14 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Buck, Jackson W.**, Corporal, F Co., 36 yrs, 14 Oct 1861 at Rochester, KY. Died 15 May 1862 at Regimental Hospital Iuka, MS of typhoid.

**Bullock, John J.**, Private, E Co., 30 Aug 1862 at Brownsville, KY and mustered in 4 Nov 1862 at Nashville, TN. Discharged 22 Jul 1865 at Louisville, KY. At enlistment was 5 ft 6 in, light complexion, dark eyes, dark hair, farmer and born in Edmonson Co., KY.

**Bunch, Leonidas**, Sergeant, D Co., 22 yrs, 14 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Detailed as recruiter at Rochester, KY on 3 Mar 1864. Arrived Kemper Barracks Rochester, KY on 11 Mar 1864. Discharged 16 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Burden, Alfred D.**, Private, E Co., 35 yrs, 10 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Transferred to C Co. 1 Jan 1862. Discharge 31 Dec 1862 at Nashville, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to loss of vision in left eye and impairment of right eye due to measles. At discharge was 5 ft 8 in, dark complexion, blue eyes, dark hair, farmer and born Butler Co., KY.

**Burden, John T.**, Private, E Co., 20 yrs, 10 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Transferred to C Co., 1 Jan 1862. Mar 1862 sent to General Hospital Evansville, IN. Died 27 May 1862 at Evansville, IN of typhoid. Buried 27 May 1862 at Oak Hill Cemetery Soldiers Section.

**Burns, Henry**, Private, D Co., 19 yrs, 14 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. May-Jun 1862 sick at Hamburg, TN. Sep-Oct 1862 AWOL. Jul-Aug 1864 sick at 23<sup>rd</sup> Army Corps Hospital Marietta, GA. Discharged 16 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Burns, John**, Corporal, D Co., 22 yrs, 14 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Sep-Oct 1862 AWOL. Discharged 16 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY. Record contains a series of letters concerning Corporal **Burns'** incarceration at the Federal Prison at Frankfort, KY. The first is a petition generated by Major **Mottley** (Regimental commander at end of war) on 6 Nov 1865 with signatures from citizens of Butler Co., KY for the release of **Burns** from the Frankfort Penitentiary. Colonel **Pierce B. Hawkins** (original regimental commander) endorsed the petition on 20 Nov 1865 and sent it to Mr. **John H. Ward** at Bowling Green, KY. Also a letter from Captain **Oliver P. Johnson** (G Co.) to Mr. **Ward** dated 19 Jan 1866. Mr. **Ward**, in turn, sent the petition and a letter dated 10 Jan 1866 from the officers of the 11<sup>th</sup> KY Infantry Regiment to Major General **Palmer** at Frankfort, KY. Petition stated that Corporal **Burns** was sentenced to 10 years in prison, along with Private **William J. Orange** for crimes committed while in the service. Petition stated that **Burns** was innocent and that **Orange** committed the crimes unbeknownst to **Burns**. No further records mentioned.

**Burris, Samuel (or Lemuel)**, Private, F Co., 22 yrs, 19 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Jan-Jun 1862 sick at Columbia, TN. Died 12 Jun 1862 at Columbia, TN of typhoid.

**Burris, William A.**, Private, A Co., 12 Dec 1861 at Calhoun, KY. Jan-Feb 1862 sick at Columbia, TN. Mar-Apr 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. 30 Apr-31 Aug 1862 discharge furlough Rochester, KY. Wounded (slightly) at the battle of Kennesaw Mountain (Marietta, GA) on 27 Jun 1864. Discharged 17 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Butler, Alfred**, Private, C Co., 17 Sep 1861 at Rochester, KY. Died 10 Mar 1863 at Regimental Hospital Bowling Green, KY of pneumonia.

**Butram, James W.**, Private, E co., 18 yrs, 18 Sep 1861 at Brownsville, KY. Jan-Apr 1862 sick at Nashville, TN. May-Jun 1862 discharge furlough in KY. Discharged 27 Nov 1862 at Nashville, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to phthisis (tuberculosis). At discharge was 16 yrs (said 18 yrs at enlistment), 5 ft 7 in, dark complexion, brown eyes, black hair, farmer, and born in Edmonson Co., KY.

**Butram, Oliver G.**, Private, G Co., 18 yrs, 15 Sep 1861 at Camp Caloway (Hartford), KY. Deserted 19 Jan 1862 at Calhoun, KY and returned to regiment 1 Mar 1863. Accidentally shot in hand 1 Apr 1863. Deserted 25 Sep 1863 at Glasgow, KY with horse, equipment, carbine, and accouterments. Rejoined from desertion 3 Apr 1864 at Lexington, KY. Restored to duty on 11 Jul 1864 with loss of pay to date. Discharged 17 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY. A letter from Captain **Cox** dated 25 Dec 1864, requested a copy of order reinstating to duty due to paymaster with holding final pay until confirmation of reinstatement.

**Calvert, Porter H.**, Private, K Co., 40 yrs, 10 Oct 1861 at Earles, KY. Jan-Feb 1862 sick at Calhoun, KY. 16 Feb 1862 sent to General Hospital Evansville, IN. 1 Apr 1862 detailed as nurse at General Hospital Evansville, IN. Transferred to Gothic Hospital Paducah, KY on 30 Jun 1862. Returned to regiment on 31 Aug 1862. Requested to be commissioned as a Chaplain on 27 Mar 1863. Colonel **Love** forwarded request to headquarters on 29 Aug 1863. Approved 1 Oct 1863 and commissioned as Chaplain (vic **Lewis P. Arnold**, resigned) on 18 Oct 1863 at Knoxville, TN. Discharged 17 Dec 1864 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Campbell, Alexander**, Private, I Co., 28 yrs, 20 Sep 1861 at Camp Caloway (Hartford), KY. Promoted to Corporal on 31 Dec 1861. Killed (by a horse) 11 Sep 1863 at Bowling Green, KY.

**Campbell, James N.**, Sergeant, K Co., 27 yrs, 10 Oct 1861 at Earles, KY. Died 2 Apr 1862 at Nashville, TN of pneumonia from typhoid.

**Campfield, Ira**, Private, I Co., 18 yrs, 16 Oct 1861 at Camp Caloway (Hartford), KY. Jan-Feb sick at Nashville, TN. Wounded (severely) at battle of Shiloh, (Shiloh, TN) on 7 Apr 1862. Discharged 11 Aug 1862 at Nashville, TN due to disability. Discharge certificate states disability due to atrophy of right shoulder from gun shot wound. At discharge was 5 ft 11 in, light hair, blue eyes, light complexion, farmer and born in Muhlenberg Co., KY.

## What Was the Maiden Name of Mrs. Nancy Welborn, Wife of Robert Welborn?

**Robert Welborn** married **Nancy Tolbert** in Muhlenberg County, KY 17 Sep 1816.<sup>1</sup> Various sources over the years have listed without documentation that **Nancy's** maiden name was **Rice**<sup>2</sup> or even **Wickliffe**<sup>3</sup>. This article will attempt outline the available evidence supporting that **Nancy Tolbert Welborn's** maiden name was **Rice**.

**Robert Welborn** first appeared in the Muhlenberg County, KY records when he married **Nancy Tolbert** 17 Sep 1816.<sup>4</sup> **Robert** did not appear in the Muhlenberg County, KY tax lists until 1817. During that year, he was taxed for 100 acres on Clifty Creek surveyed for **B. Tolbert** and entered under the name of **J. R. Tolbert**.<sup>5</sup> No deed or grant could be located showing how he acquired the property.

A search of marriage records prior to 1816 in Muhlenberg County, revealed a marriage for **Nancy Rice** to **John R. Tolbert** in December 1810.<sup>6</sup> **John R. Tolbert** appeared in the Muhlenberg

County, Kentucky tax lists in 1811 with 100 acres on Clifty Creek surveyed for **B. Tolbert**.<sup>7</sup> He continued to appear in the tax lists through 1813 with the Clifty Creek property.<sup>8</sup>

**John Robert Tolbert** wrote his will 17 December 1813 naming his two infant sons, **Alney M.** and **Oliver V. Tolbert**. His wife, **Nancy**, was named administrator. The will was probated in the April, 1814 Muhlenberg County Court.<sup>9</sup> At that time, **Nancy** appeared in court, renounced the will, refused the duties of administrator, and claimed her dower on his property.<sup>10</sup> **Nancy Tolbert** appeared with 100 acres on Clifty Creek during both 1815<sup>11</sup> and 1816. On the 1816 list, the property was identified as being entered under the name of **J. R. Tolbert**.<sup>12</sup> **Nancy Tolbert** did not appear in the tax lists in Muhlenberg County after 1816.

Various records throughout **Nancy Welborn's** life gave evidence of her birth year. Her gravemarker next to her husband, **Robert**, in Hazel Creek Cemetery in Muhlenberg County, Kentucky listed her as being born 16 Jan 1793.<sup>13</sup> **Nancy** was listed as age 56 in the 1850 Muhlenberg County, Kentucky census<sup>14</sup> and age 65 in 1860.<sup>15</sup>

At first glance, **Nancy's** maiden name might be assumed to be **Tolbert**. She was a **Tolbert** when she married **Robert Welborn**.<sup>16</sup> In addition, the land which **Robert Welborn** was taxed for first

in 1816, was surveyed for **B. Tolbert**.<sup>17</sup> The B. Tolbert could easily be constructed as **Benjamin Tolbert**, who appeared in the early Muhlenberg County tax lists with property on Clifty Creek.<sup>18</sup> He had been the **Welborn**'s pastor<sup>19</sup> at Hazel Creek Baptist Church from 1798 through 1834.<sup>20</sup> He and his children would most certainly have been known to the **Welborns**.

However, no deed could be found transferring the 100 acres on Clifty Creek to **Robert Welborn**. One might suspect that the property came to **Robert Welborn** not as deed of gift from his father-in-law, but through property that was owned by his wife at her marriage. But without a deed for **Robert Welborn** selling the property showing the metes and bounds of the 100 acres, it was difficult to identify this piece of property out of the several hundred acres on Clifty Creek owned by **Robert Welborn** throughout his life.<sup>21</sup> Thus, the marriage nor the property by itself, holds the clue for the maiden name of **Nancy**.

The **Nancy Rice** who married **John Tolbert** in December of 1810<sup>22</sup> was certainly a young widow when he died in late 1813. However, his will did name her as administrator listing his two minor sons. The will directed that his unproductive property be sold and the rest left to his sons and to his wife during her widowhood.<sup>23</sup> **John R. Tolbert** had been taxed for 100 acres on Clifty Creek the year he died.<sup>24</sup> When **Nancy** successfully contested the will, she was able to acquire her dower out of his land.<sup>25</sup> Because she was such a young widow this would assure her some property with her likely remarriage. She acted for her minor sons' interest in the property.

The **Nancy Tolbert** appearing in the 1815<sup>26</sup> and 1816<sup>27</sup> Muhlenberg County, KY tax list appeared to be the widow of **John R. Tolbert**, with the acreage, watercourse, and description by survey matching that of **John R. Tolbert's**. Her disappearance out of the tax list in 1817, the year following the marriage of **Nancy Tolbert** to **Robert Welborn**<sup>28</sup> would make sense if she were that **Nancy Tolbert**. When **Robert Welborn** was taxed for 100 acres on Clifty Creek surveyed for **B. Tolbert** and entered under the name **J. R. Tolbert**, there was even more weight for the argument that **Nancy Tolbert** was the widow of **John R. Tolbert**.<sup>29</sup>

One piece of evidence makes the above argument suspect. **Nancy, Robert Welborn's** wife, appeared from most records to have been born somewhere between 1793<sup>30</sup> and 1795.<sup>31</sup> If this is true, **Nancy** would have been between 21 and 23 when **Robert Welborn** married her. If she was the same woman who married **John R. Tolbert** in 1810, she would have been between 15 and 17 when they married. At his death in 1813, she would have been under 21 years old. Even though a few months later she may have turned 21, it would seem unlikely that even a 21 year-old widow would have been named administrator of her husband's estate.

However, in conclusion, the land seems to point to the idea that the **Nancy Tolbert** who married **Robert Welborn** was the same **Nancy Rice** who had married **John R. Tolbert**. Even though **Nancy's** young age at the time of **John R. Tolbert's** will does cast some doubt that the two **Nancys** are the same women, the land seems to be a stronger argument for their being the same women. **Nancy's** age also suggests that she probably had not been married prior to her marriage to **John R. Tolbert**. This would suggest that **Nancy's** maiden name was **Rice**.
