The following article was submitted by Betsy Ann Tracy and is an outstanding example of what our Barren County young people can do to make a difference.

My Barren County 4-H Gold Award Community Service Project "Clean Up and Restoration of the Abandoned Bush Cemetery"

"In 1998, I began making plans to work on my 4-H Gold project. First, I made a list of five community components to survey: Government, Business, Environment/Safety, Citizenship, an Culture/Heritage. After interviewing various individuals by letter and by phone, I completed individual work in each of the above areas. The 4-H Gold Award centers around leading a group of 4-Hers to plan and complete a community service project. Therefore, upon the suggestion of Debbie Sherfey, one of my Etoile 4-H leaders and with the cooperation of my club members and leaders, I chose to clean up and restore an abandoned cemetery.

"Becky Tracy, my mother and 4-H leader, and I began our search for information and suggestions. After considering several nearby cemeteries, Margie Gentry informed us about one of the oldest in Barren County. To our surprise, the Bush cemetery was located on a few acres of land my parents had recently purchased in November, 1998. Upon inspection, we discovered the cemetery was not only abandoned, but almost destroyed by 61 small, but tall trees, growing in a circle, directly over the graves, and rooting up the monuments. Evidently, land owners had been cultivating the land surrounding the cemetery. Also, it was not protected by a fence to prevent cattle from entering the area and causing further damage. Of four monuments found, only one was barely standing. One was turned over and covered by dirt. In addition, rocks and debris had been thrown into the circle of graves over the years. Even though the job was going to take a lot of work, we decided we wanted to restore it even if we could not get everything finished this year.

"After noticing a recent newspaper article, written by Sandi Gorin on behalf of the South Central Kentucky Historical and Genealogical Society, which requested help with their cemetery project, we called her and received lots of information. The Historical Society is trying to locate and mark the 562 cemeteries listed in the 1992 Barren County Cemetery book. In addition, they are trying to locate other cemeteries which are not listed in the book. She wanted to come over to help, but could not due to a prior commitment. However, she has ordered a Bush cemetery sign which will say sponsored by the Etoile 4-H Club. She also helped us with the genealogy of the family buried in the Bush cemetery.

"We also contacted Bob and Patty Borders of Borders Monument in Glasgow. Bob agreed to come out to the cemetery to demonstrate how to clean and repair old monuments. In addition, we invited nearby neighbors and descendants to attend our work day.

"Early on the day of our project, we sprayed the cemetery area for insects and got everything ready: water, bleach, and brushes to clean the stones, flour to sprinkle on and read the stones, gloves, rakes, hoes, buckets, tree and bush pruning shears, refreshments, etc. My daddy brought his tractor, wagon and chainsaw. We took pictures before, during, and after the cleanup.

"To date, twenty people have assisted with the cleanup: Etoile 4-H Club members – Betsy Ann Tracy (Project Leader), Amanda Sherfey (President), Tara Sherfey, Jaren Howard, Derek Wood, Joey Wilson, Cody Greer. 4-H Leaders: Becky Tracy, Debbie Sherfey, Karen Wood, Cindy Wilson, Peggy Greer, Bob Borders (Borders' Monument) and neighbors: Florence Watson, Hazel Wheeler, Opal Chambers, Betty Thomerson, Tyler Thomerson. Family – James W. Tracy, James C. Tracy.

"My father cut down 61 trees and plans to cut the rest and leave two. The volunteers picked up a wagon load of rocks and debris, as well as pulled the cut trees into two large piles near the site. After raking the area and prodding around with sticks, we found all of the foot stone markers and all of the pieces of the monuments. We did not anticipate the tree stumps and the sunk in graves. Mr.

Borders volunteered to mark the graves and move the stones back out of the way so my father could haul in and level the area. Then, Mr. Borders will move the stones back into place and assist us with cleaning and repairing the stones. I wish I could say this project is totally completed, but this cemetery needed major overhaul due to many years of neglect. After the land is leveled and the stones are repaired, we have contacted another neighbor, Ann Chambers, who may assist us with finding a way to landscape the cemetery so that it will require little maintenance. Also, we would appreciate any assistance from any of the descendants of the Bush family with the landscape and a fence to protect it.

"Genealogy information regarding the Bush Cemetery includes: Location – approximately ten miles south on Road 249/Roseville Road/James Tracy farm. There are four gravesites – left to right:

James T. Bush (1858 – 1883) Ish S. Bush "Father" (1870-1898) George P. Bush (1834-1904) Nancy J. Bush (1838-1916)

Ancestors and descendants include:

George Bush (from Virginia) married Delilah Philbert (various spellings). They had twin brothers: Josiah and Hezekiah Bush. Josiah Bush (born 25 Dec 1804, died 20 May 1863) married Jane Ann Button on 16 January 1837 in Barren County and had eight children: George P, William T, Carthagan (female), Leutitia, Josiah, Jr., Thomas A, Elizabeth E, Delia (possibly named after grandmother above, Delilah). The father, Josiah Bush and one of his sons, Thomas A. Bush (18 Sept 1845 – 26 Jan 1863) were both buried in the other Bush Cemetery listed in the cemetery book with a Wm. G. Nunn (8 Sept 1818 – 1 May 1890) and unmarked graves of Neddie Elmore and wife on the old Elmore farm near Roseville. I don't know if the Nunn or Elmores are related to Josiah and Thomas Bush buried there.

One of Josia's son, George P. Bush is buried in "our" cemetery. He married Nancy J. Smith (not in Barren County). Nancy was white, a resident of Roseville and died near Roseville. (Barren County, KY Vital Statistics). (She was the daughter of James D. Smith (died Jan. 1866), who married Barbara Morehead January 1816 in Barren County. Nancy J. Smith was listed as a beneficiary in her father's will. George P. and Nancy J. Smith had two children to die: Josiah T (0-10 years old) and America J (died as an infant) 15 Oct 1859, age 10 months. They also had four other children: Lucy E (born 10 Aug 1856?), James T. (1858-1883), Susan M. and Ishmael S.

"Our current Barren County 4-H Council President, Jackie Mansfield Nuckols' great-grandfather was Ishmael S Bush who married Alice Osborne. Her parents were Foster Ozborne and Charlotte Greer. They had ten children (none known to me except for Ish S. Bush). Alize Ozborne later remarried Goebel Renfro's father, Joe, and is buried at Mount Pleasant. Ish. S. Bush is buried at Glasgow Municipal; she married Clem Borders. They had Nelda Jean Borders and Robert Borders. Jean Borders married Earl Mansfield and had Jackie and another unknown child. Jackie married Rickey Nuckols and have one son, Ben. Ish S. Bush and Clem Borders' son, Robert Borders married Nell and had two sons, Jimmy Ray and Charles Borders.

"Other possible relatives (not of Ish S. Bush who married Clem Borders), but maybe of the James T., Ish S. (Father), George P. Bush or Nancy J. (Smith) Bush or their earlier ancestors are: Sammy Spann's wife, Burnell (Bush) and her sister, Mrs. R. H. Austin's wife.

"I would personally like to thank the Etoile 4-H Club, Sandi Gorin, Bob & Patty Borders, my neighbors, family and descendants of the Bush family.

A Sketch of the Life of Simeon Buford

Simeon Buford was the sixth son and the tenth and last child of John and Judith Early Beauford. He was born on December 19, 1756 in Culpeper County, Virginia, and died in July 1835 in Barren County, Kentucky. In 1777, Simeon married Margaret Kirtley, daughter of William Kirtley of Culpeper County. By this time Simeon had served two years in the Revolutionary War Army. In the summer of 1775 Simeon, age 18, enlisted as a minuteman in the Company commanded by his old brother Captain Abraham Buford, one of five Culpeper County companies in the regiment of Colonel Stevens. Simeon accompanied the regiment toward Williamsburg where the Culpeper men joined the forces commanded by Colonel Woodford. The Americans set out to force the Royal Governor, the Lord of Dunmore to flee Virginia for his ships offshore. In engagements against Dunmore's troops, Simeon served at Hampton, Burrell's Ferry and Jamestown. On December 9, 1775, at the Battle of Great Bridge the Americans, including the Culpeper companies, routed Dunmore's redcoats and Tories and caused the Governor to escape to the British ship "Roebuck". Simeon returned to Culpeper County a few days before Christmas in 1775 having served on active duty five months. In the fall of 1776, he served for three months under Captain William McClanahan, and in the fall of 1777, he served three months in Captain William Chapman's company which was ordered north. Upon reaching Frederick, Maryland, the company was ordered back to Virginia. This ended eleven months of active service as a private in the Revolutionary War for Simeon Buford.

Simeon returned to Culpeper County married and his first child John was born there on July 29, 1778. His second son, William, was born August 22, 1781 while Simeon was serving under General Lafayette in the campaign that led to the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, October 19, 1781.

In 1781, from March until the surrender in October, Simeon served first as an Ensign (2nd Lt.) in Captain Elijah Kirtley's Company under General Lafayette. For two months Simeon served as Quartermaster for Lafayette before returning to his company. When Captain Kirtley became ill in July 1781, Simeon was commission Captain of the Company and commanded it to the end of the Yorktown campaign. Simeon wrote that he "was under Lafayette the whole time he was combatting Cornwallis."

After the war, Simeon applied for his Revolutionary War land warrants which were granted in Barren County, Kentucky on Beaver Creek. He received 300 acres and kept the land until February 1834 when he sold the land to his daughter, Mary and his son-in-law, Henry Crutcher; Simeon died the following year. Simeon had moved from Culpeper County, Virginia to Kentucky in 1789 with his wife and four children. He settled at Smoking Spring near Glasgow, Kentucky on his Revolutionary War land grant. Six of his ten children were born in Barren County. He later represented Barren and Warren counties in the Kentucky Legislature from 1801-1803.

Simeon Buford made application for a Revolutionary War pension on March 26, 1833, at which time he was seventy-six years of age and residing in Barren County, Kentucky. On July 17, 1833, he sent in an amended application in which he stated that "he desires the department may indulge him with a speedy examination of his claim for he is desirous that himself may have the satisfaction of hearing that it is not finally rejected by that government which he assisted in sustaining in its infancy." On October 18, 1833, Secretary of War Lewis Cass signed his "Revolutionary Claim" for a pension for life, back-dated to March 4, 1831, the original date of the pension law. His pension was allowed for eleven months actual service as a private, and eight months service as an ensign. (His four months as Captain were disallowed for pay purposes.) His name is borne on the pension roll of 1835, with a pension from 1831 "for six months or more service Continental Line."

Simeon Buford, continued:

Simeon and his wife, Margaret Kirtley were buried at Beaver Creek, on his homestead about four miles west of Glasgow, Kentucky off Highway 68-80W. Papers on his Revolutionary War service and his pension applications are in the National Archives. Simeon was the grandfather of three Civil War generals: Napoleon and John Buford for the Uniion, and Abraham Buford for the Confederate Army.

Children of Simeon and Margaret Kirtley Buford were:

- 1. John, born 29 June 1778; died 1847 Rock Island, IL. Father of Napoleon and John Buford, Union generals in the Civil War.
- 2. William, born August 22, 1781; died September 18, 1848. Father of Abraham, Confederate General in the Civil War.
- 3. Judith, born April 4, 1784; married [Elijah] Rogers, Glasgow, Kentucky.
- 4. Simeon, Jr. born May 18, 1787; died February 9, 1857.
- 5. Sarah, born July 1, 1790; married John H. Baker. No children.
- 6. Mary, born August 12, 1792; married Henry Crutcher, Glasgow, Kentucky. She and her husband were guardians of two children of her brother, Elijah: Robert and Margaret Buford. She died June 30, 1868.
- 7. Elizabeth, born December 8, 1794; married (1) John T. Chambers; married (2) George Trabue. She died August 30, 1869.
- 8. Elijah, born June 9, 1797; died September 7, 1836, Mississippi County, Arkansas Territory. Elijah's son, Haywood, was placed under the guardianship of Joel Depp of Glasgow.
- 9. George Washington, born April 22, 1800; died August 20, 1870, Glasgow, Kentucky.
- 10. Thomas, born February 21, 1803; died August 22, 1866, Mobile, Alabama.

(Note: Found in Warren County Deed Book A, page 126. Robt. And Ann Todd, his wife, of Fayette County, Kentucky to Simeon Buford of Woodford County KY, 2000 pounds for 1200 acres on Beaver Creek, a branch of the Barren River, part of a survey of 1666 2/3 acres granted to said Todd by patent dated August 20, 1786. Witnessed by Thos. Bodley and recorded 10 July 1798.)

Letter from Oren Beatty

The Society received a pleasant letter from Oren Beatty through his son, David A. Beatty in reference the article recently run on Ritter's Mill. He says in part: "About 1934 there was a lawsuit in Glasgow regarding the will of Fisburn Ritter. George Ritter was accused of influencing his uncle, "Fish" Ritter, to change his will to George's benefit. In the will George was to receive Ritter's Mill rather than Fish's son (whose name is not recalled). Supposedly, George convinced Fishborn that his son was not capable of running the mill. Fish's son won the suit and had the will set aside." David added that his father, Oren, had recently moved back to Glasgow and set up a practice of medicine in the Yancy Building on the Square and since he did not have a full schedule of patients at that time, he was able to slip out and attend parts of the trial now and then. He also noted that George Ritter was the grandfather of the late Virginia Ritter Thomerson of Glasgow who was a long time member of this historical society.

Brother James & Sister Sarah Kentucky Born and Texas Bound

Two extremely sturdy children were born to **James W. GOODNIGHT and Nancy DUFF**, residents of Warren and Barren Counties. James W. was born 26 May 1809 in VA. He married a Scotch Canadian, Nancy DUFF, daughter of John DUFF & Mary WHITNEY or Wheatley, in Barren County, KY. The marriage bond, issued in Barren County, KY is dated the 11th day of May 1833 for Nancy Duff and James Goodnight is signed by James Goodnight and Wesley Duff, Nancy's brother. Nancy, a few years older than James, was born 1 Jun 1803 in VA. James and Nancy Goodnight's children:

James Wesley GOODNIGHT, Born 25 Aug 1835 in Warren County, KY. Sarah Elizabeth Edmon GOODNIGHT, Born 10 Jun 1838 in KY.

James W. Goodnight's premature death on 9 Jan 1839 in Barren County, KY was a sad occurance. He died before his 30th birthday, and before he could see his children grown. James left Nancy with two small children to raise and neighbors, friends and family took over to see that the children would be cared for. Barren County Court Records, Order Book No. 7- Monday 20 Jan 1845, Page 261, show that "On the motion of John Dodd, ordered that he be appointed guardian of James Wesley Goodnight and Sarah Elizabeth Goodnight, children of James Goodnight, deceased. Bond \$150, with Edmund Duff his security".



Young J. W. and Sarah Goodnight soon grew up in Kentucky, found their mates and married in Kentucky, and started their own families in Kentucky.



"Brother" James Wesley GOODNIGHT was born first the 25 Aug 1835 in Warren County, KY. James was raised by family friend, John Dodd. He was a farmer in Kentucky working the land he inherited from his mother and father. He married Olivah Frances LANDRUM, daughter of William LANDRUM & Elizabeth HERNDON, 25 Apr 1858 in Barren County, KY. A few years younger than J. W., Olivah was born 20 May 1840 in KY.

Oliviah and James Wesley married in the home of her father, William Landrum in the County of Barren, KY and in the presence of friends and neighbors, James Settle and John Hutson. William B. Edmunds presiding on the wedding ceremony that day.

It is hard to say why, exactly, J.W. and Olivah decided to pull up and move to Texas. So much was happening to their families; J.W.'s mother Nancy Duff Goodnight had died 5 Nov 1870; Olivah's father, William Landrum, died in 1870; Olivah's older sister and brother-in-law, Elizabeth Jane Landrum and James Dodd Settle, died and left two teenage boys with them; J. W.'s only sister, Sarah Elizabeth, was already settled in faraway Texas, but left a widow with four young children; and another sister and brother-in-law of Olivah's, Lucetta C. Landrum and Theophilus Edwin Button, had moved to Collin County, TX in 1870.

[NOTE—The Statute requires the names of at least two Winesees to he incented.

John Wesley Goodnight and his wife, Olivah Frances (Landrum) sold off their Kentucky holdings and headed to Texas by covered wagon in September of 1871. They brought with them 5 children of their own and two orphaned nephews, John Settle (age 16) and Chris Settle (age 14). I think one child stayed in KY for awhile, joining them later, and 5 more were born after arriving in Texas.

Dear Mrs. McMurry:

I read your letter in The McKinney Examiner of March 30, 1967, saying that your husban's grandmother was Sarah Goodnight, whose brother and descendants have in the Prosper community for about 100 years.

Probably I know some of the people that you have in mind. I will have to start a long way back. My father Mr. John Settle, and his brother Chris Settle, ages 16 and 14 years old came from near nocky Hill Kentucky to Texas, in September 1871, in a covered wagon, with their Uncle & Aunt Mr. Wesley Goodnight.

Olivah & J.W.'s Family Bible was the source for some of this family information. The Bible was in the possession of Narissa Alice Goodnight Sterling, handed down to her daughter, Anna Sterling Dawson. The Family Register in the bible lists the following children born to this Methodist couple: Nancy E. GOODNIGHT born KY, James William GOODNIGHT (Will) born KY, Sarah J. GOODNIGHT (Sally) born KY, Mary E. GOODNIGHT (Mollie) born KY, George E. GOODNIGHT (son died 7 days after birth), John C. GOODNIGHT born KY, George A. GOODNIGHT (daughter) born TX, July Catherine GOODNIGHT (Kate) born TX, Narissa Alice GOODNIGHT born TX, Issac Thomas GOODNIGHT (Tom) born TX, and Charles H. GOODNIGHT born TX.

J.W. settled on School Land just east of present day Prosper in north west Collin County, very near the Denton County line. Good neighbors, good friends, J. W. and Olivah participated often in local community affairs. Collin County Probate Records, Box 3, 1885, listed James W. Goodnight as an appraiser, along with T. E. Button (J.W.'s brother in law) for the Estate of S. M. C. Boggs who died intestate in Collin County on 28 June 1885.

Obituary item in "The Democrat", McKinney, TX newspaper, August 22, 1895: "J. W. Goodnight, aged 63 years, died Aug. 17, of paralysis". He died at his home west of Prosper in Collin County, TX, and is buried in Walnut Grove Cemetery just east of Prosper. Three years later Olivah died 21 May 1898 in Collin County, TX. and is also buried in Walnut Grove Cemetery. She died leaving three children still at home.



"Sister" Sarah Elizabeth Edmon GOODNIGHT. Born 10 Jun 1838 in KY. She married William Robert McMURRY, son of William McMURRY & Elizabeth TULLY OR TALLEY, 24 Apr 1856 in Barren County, KY. William Robert, much more mature than Sarah, was born 8 Jan 1826 in KY.

The 1860 Census of Warren County, KY, Dwelling #735, lists William McMurry 32 yrs, Sarah E. wife 22 yrs, George P. child 2 years. William Robert and Sarah decided to move westward. Before heading off toward Texas, Sarah sold her part of inherited land to her brother, James Wesley Goodnight, as we can see from the following transcription:


This indenture of bargain & sale made and entered into this 29th day of May 1860 between W. R. McMurry & Sarah E. McMurry, his wife, of the county of Warren & State of Kentucky of the first part, And James W. Goodnight of the county of Barren & State aforesaid of the other part witneseth that for in consideration of a deed for land of this date made to me by the said Goodnight & wife of the second part Estated at four hundred dollars the said McMurry & wife of the first part hath this day bargained sold

by these presents doth bargain & sell & convey unto the said Goodnight all their rights title & interest in unto a certain tract or parcel of land which was deeded by Chilton Duff to Nancy Goodnight, mother of said Sarah E. McMurry lying in the county & state of aforesaid on the waters of Bever Creek containing one hundred & twelve & a half acres Bounded as follows viz?. Beginning on a chestnut tree running thence NS O E 172 poles to a popular thence SE O E 118 poles to a stone thence S 30 W 172 poles to another stone & dogwood thence N 60 W118 poles to the Beginning. To have & to hold unto the said Goodnight his heirs & asigns the aforesaid Interest in to said land its opputinances the said Interest being an undivided one half of said land which was conveyed to the said Sarah E. McMurry & Jas W. Goodnight by their mother Nancy Goodnight and the said McMurry & wife of the first part for themselves their heirs, executors & administrators doth & will forever warrent & defend by these presents against the claims of all other persons. Where of the said party of the first part hath hereunto set their hands & seals this day & date first written. William R. McMurry (seal)

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William Robert McMurry, wife Sarah and three children traveled first to Harrison County, TX about 1866 and lived there a very


short while. Then in 1867 they moved to Dallas County. About 1869 William Robert purchased land of approximately 160 acres, NE of Carrollton and SE of Hebron, near the corner of Collin, Denton and Dallas Counties.

Sarah Elizabeth and William Robert had four children; the first child, George Pleasant McMURRY, was born 25 July 1858 in KY; William Edmond McMURRY born 7 Sept 1860 in KY; Nancy Elizabeth McMURRY was born 10 May 1862 in KY; and Luther Haden McMURRY born 1 Nov 1868 in TX.

Just short of seven years as a Texan, William Robert McMurry developed tuberculosis and died April 30, 1871 in Collin County, TX. He is buried in Baccus Cemetery, Collin Co, TX.. Sarah married again to E. Adkins, 18 Sept 1875 in Denton, TX. Sarah Elizabeth died 4 Feb 1908 in Hebron, TX at the home of her son, George Pleasant McMurry and is buried nearby in Furneaux Cemetery, Hebron, TX.

Kentucky Family Backgrounds

Paternal Grandparents of "Brother" James and "Sister" Sarah: Isaac Goodnight & Elizabeth McMurry

Isaac GOODNIGHT born 1 Jan 1782 in Harlans Station, Ky the son of Michael Goodnight & Mary Landers. He was a Sadler and Tanner by trade, a Mason of Bowling Green Lodge No. 73, and member of Rocky Springs Baptist Church. Isaac married Elizabeth MCMURRY, his first wife on 25 Aug 1805 in Lincoln County, KY. Elizabeth was the daughter of Thomas MCMURRY & Catherine ROBINSON, Born 23 Apr 1787 in Mercer County, KY.

Isaac and Elizabeth Goodnight had the following children: Catherine GOODNIGHT; James W. GOODNIGHT (father of James & Sarah); Abraham GOODNIGHT; Mary (Polly) GOODNIGHT; Christina GOODNIGHT; Thomas McMurry GOODNIGHT; Elizabeth GOODNIGHT; Sarah B. GOODNIGHT; Nancy R. GOODNIGHT; and Rachel A. GOODNIGHT.

Elizabeth died 29 Sep 1827 in Warren County, KY, and is buried in Goodnight Cemetery, Warren County, KY. Isaac died 13 Oct 1869 in Warren Co. KY at a ripe old age after marrying four wives and fathering at least 15 known children in his lifetime. He was buried 14 Oct 1869 in Masonic Burial, in the Family Plot Near Old Rocky Hill, KY, near three of his wives, other family members, and slaves.

Maternal Grandparents of "Brother" James and "Sister" Sarah: John Duff & Mary Whitney

John DUFF born 10 Sep 1763 in Fauquier or Richmond County, VA., died 1850 in Old Rocky Hill, Barren Co, KY. John Duff married Mary WHITNEY or Wheatley, 7 Jan 1788 in Faquier County, VA. Mary died 1844 in Old Rocky Hill, Barren Co, KY. They had the following children: Fielding DUFF, Austin DUFF, Hubbard DUFF, Edmund DUFF, Wesley DUFF, Rhoda DUFF, Chilton DUFF, Nancy DUFF (mother of J. W. and Sarah), Cassie DUFF, Pamelia DUFF, and Sally N. DUFF.

"John Duff came of Scotch lineage, whether descended from brave Macduff, Thane of fife, who in the battle of Dunsiwane engaged in deadly combat with Macbeth, when the latter cried, "Lay on Macduff, and damn'd be him that first cries hold, enough," we do not know, however, he was as brave and noble in nature. He was generous and kind, a good industrious farmer, a sensible man, a good husband, father, neighbor, friend and citizen, temperate, hospitable, frugal. In size he was large, and his heart was in proportion to his body."

At the age of 12, John Duff enlisted in the Virginia Line B as a private, to fight in the Revolutionary War. After the war he married Elizabeth Whitney or Wheatley and they moved the family to KY in 1798 settling near Old Rocky Hill, Barren County, KY. Neighbors in the Old Rocky Hill, KY, community were George Settle, William Settle, Henry Carter, James Dodd, and Issac Goodnight.

This will conclude the letters of Lena as provided by Clorine Lawson. There are many more interesting stories and we would like to thank Clorine for her contributions! Spelling and punctuation as shown in the original.

Our City Boarder F. W. Jenkins - page 16. "There was a young man came down from the city of Louisville Ky he sold dry goods in the Village and boarded at our house. He had never lived in the country he didn't know one thing about country life. He didn't Know which Side of a cow to milk on but he liked the farm very much. He wanted to learn all about the farm. He brought the first bycycle to the farm I ever saw. It sure was a nice one. He couldn't ride it in the county, only when it was dry and dusty he had two brothers that came down during the summer and Staved a month. They learned quite a bit about the country. All of them could play the organ and Sing. We would all Sing. Sister had accordian and brother had a good harmonica. We had a good time and a lot of fun with our music."

Going to Grandfathers (Caleb Norman and Sarah Bushong Norman) - Page 17. "My granparents my father's parents was verry old grandfather was a retired farmer. They had a house Keeper but when She went away for the night, my Sister and I would take turns in Staying with them at night. My father didn't want them to stay alone, as they were old and feble, my Sister was Seeing a boy friend my parents did not like so well. She would see him at girl friends houses. So one night she wanted to go to grandfathers. It was my time to go. She Said she would go and I Knew why she wanted to go. She was planning on seeing him at grandfathers. When my mother said I could go too that made her peaved and she started in a run. It was almost dark so I crit out if you don't stop and wait for me I will tell mother everything about your boy friend. She stoped and waited alright."

Now it was Winter again - Page 20. "We had a verry bad winter for the south. We couldn't horse back ride much. We went to quite a few parties and tea suppers peach suppers and singings close around and in the Village. Sister had boy friends to take her to the social and I had some too. But I realy was glad when spring came again and the highways was good once more."

Sisters School mate Sweetheart - Page 21. "My sister school mate sweetheart came home from the west early in the spring. My sister was expecting him home. He had stayed and proved up his claim and sold it for a good price. When he would come to see sister he would bring another bay along for me. We would take a big trip to church somewhere on Sundays. These were horse and buggy days. We would go horse back when we didn't go far away. Before I go any further I think I will tell you my sister boy friends name. It was Thomas Jones."

Planning to Marry - Page 21. "Well it wasn't many months untill I found out that they was planning to get married. The wedding day was set for September the sixth. There was eight couples of us to go with them to the minister's home. We would come back to our home for four o'clock dinner. There was quite a few guests at our house too. All the couples would stay all night at our home or close at a

neighbors. Next morning we left for the grooms home for the reception or what people called them days in fair. We had a nice time and a good dinner. There was quite a few guests there. Well sister would stay and brother would lead her horse back home. We was all riding horse-back. My brother had a nice bay horse of his own. My father had a black horse he was a fox trotter if you pulled the bridle one way. He would fox trot. Pull it the other way he would pace. His name was Bob. My sister always rode him. She always got first choice, I had to ride Kate or Mollie or Gypsie. So I said I would ride Gypsie. When we went to leave Widow Jones I told my brother to put my saddle on Bob as sister wouldn't be going back and he could lead Gypsie back. Every one came out to see us leave. I kissed my sister and her husband good-bye. Her husband had a brother Bob Jones. When Bob led my horse up for me I leaped on him and Said. I guess Bob belongs to me now. Not thinking how it sounded. Every one was laughing before I thought how it sounded. They thought I ment Bob Jones and I was meaning the horse Bob. Well he was blushing and so was I. Everybody waved good-bye to us and we started home. We had not gone far till a lump came up in my throat. The closer I got to home the biger the lump got. The boy that was with me wanted to know what was wrong with me. I said why he said you won't talk. I told him there was a lump in my throat. I finally went to crying when he went to talking to me. He said Oh I see what is wrong now. He said don't be like that she will be back. You might have something to shed tears for if he was taking her west. Well, when I got home I had a big cry and mother didn't feel so good either. But I tried to make the best of it."

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PORT ARTHUR SALT WORKS - TRADING POST IN WILDERNESS

By Wordney White. (Taken most likely from a Glasgow Newspaper)

A letter from Barren County, Ky., to Waverly, Mo. (Exact Wording) This was from Willie Brunt to "Cousin" Sue Wright.

Port Oliver, Barren County, Kentucky. August 6, 1869.

Dear Cousin Sue:

How are you these hot days? Smothering like a hen like I am I guess. Take good care of yourself and family the best you can till I come home.

I am still working at the Salt Works part of the time as well as working on the farm also. I like it very well for a man has to work anywhere he is at.

Well I don't know much to write for news is few and far between. A large bunch of men went fishing yesterday. They had panels made of wood about 12 feet long like a slat fence. They fastened 10 of these together with brush tied to the bottom to drag. They called this thing a rack. And every man furnished his own panel of the rack. They stretched it across the river with ropes attached and pulled by men on the banks, and then the fishing started.

They pulled this rack for about one-half mile with boys poking under the logs and rocks with sticks running the fish out.

I was down at the sand-bar when they landed and they drew the ends of the rack together in a circle and started passing the end round and round, making the circle smaller and smaller, and when the circle was about 20 feet across the fun started. The men and boys climbed over inside and caught the fish and man, man, you never saw the like. Tom Lewis, Ben Pullium and Jim Stark had an awful time trying to catch them. There was a Jack 5 feet long, with teeth like a Bull Dog, and

would bit like one. There was a turtle as big as a biscuit board and nobody wanted him so they gave him to Black Sam Stark and that nigger was tickled to death. He cut the turtle's head off and threw it across his shoulder and "lit a rag" for home. I spent Sunday with Mr. Jewell's folks and had a fine time eating water melons and then had all the hard cider I could drink at Uncle Ben's that night.

I saw something funny the other night. Some men floated a barrel of whiskey from above Pageville down to Port Oliver for Mr. Hick Bishop. They said it was made by Cricket Carver. I tasted of it, (about a quart), and man it would make a cat climb a tree backwards. Bishop paid 30 cents a gallon for that whiskey and wanted to charge us 50 cents a gallon for it, the stingy hog. That is making money too fast I think for I only get 60 cents a day for my work and Old Man Erwin works me pretty hard.

Another article by Mr. White:

Outstanding among the pioneer buildings of Barren County was the Holman Hotel, which was located on Buck Creek, about 2 miles west of Rocky Hill (Finney). The first settlement was made at this place in 1809 by Joseph Holman, who built a large residence, and a sulphur springs nearby attracted so much attention and travelers stopping here became so numerous that in 1839 an addition was built to the residence making it an 18 room building and it was then called a hotel.

The Holman Hotel was not on the Stovall Road, which was the main highway from the north to the south and crossed Barren River at Port Oliver, but a good dirt road was maintained from the hotel to the Stovall Road at Rocky Hill.

Holman Hotel Became Famous. So noted that the resort became that in the Forties an Fifties the rich planters from the so much came in their fine carriages, drawn by two and sometimes four fine bay horses, with a negro driver and spent weeks at a time. They came to drink the sulphur water and eat the good meals consisting of ham and turkey, which were usually preceded by a drink of Buck Creek corn whiskey, made by A. M. Lawrence, the pioneer distiller of Buck Creek.

Pierced Quilts in Jail. Mr. Lawrence had a daughter, Miss Nancy, known later as "Aunt Nan" who sold whiskey on Buck Creek for 50 years. Aside from her affinity for selling liquor "Aunt Nan" was rated as a good woman, she had many admirable traits of character, was kind and neighborly, but she would sell liquor.

The records show that she served at least a dozen terms in the Glasgow jail for violating the liquor laws, however, it is thought that some of these sentences were unjust, as many believe that some men caught with whiskey would swear that they bought it from "Aunt Nan".

It was not necessary for her to sell whiskey to obtain a livelihood, as her husband, Harmon Bishop, owned a very good farm and besides he, having served as a Bugler in the Union Army during the Civil War, drew a pension, so we see that with "Aunt Nan" selling liquor was a hobby, rather than a necessity.

"Aunt Nan" utilizing her time while service sentences in the Glasgow jail, piecing quilts, and at the end of her career she had nine complete quilts.

Mr. Arland W. Benningfield, 2196 Janyln Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40299-1718 has donated an impressive photograph of Timothy C. Jackson (10 October 1873 – 22 Mar 1900). Mr. Benningfield provided the following information:

Timothy is buried in the Bethlehem Cemetery in Monroe County, Kentucky. He was the son of Jonathan Jackson and Judith Bell Chism. He married Lela Powell in 1889, 8th Broadway, Louisville, Kentucky. Timothy Elizabeth was born of this union 30 July 1900 at Boyds Creek, Barren County, Kentucky.

"When mother and father married he took her to Mt. Harmon in Monroe County, Ky. That is where they lived. When he died he had not been out of the army but a short time. They were married after his discharge from the army. My mother and father were courting when he entered the army. He served his army time in Cuba." (Tim Land, daughter).

Spanish American War Veterans, Timothy C. Jackson, Ky. Vol. U. S. Army, Company G. 3rd Reg. Inf. Timothy C. Jackson. Rank: Wagoner. Mustered in: 5/24/1898 – Mustered Out: 5/16/1899. Listing Home Address: Glasgow, KY.

"While on a trip to her father's grave Tim E. pointed out to the family her father's place of death. We were leaving Glasgow, there set a large house with a long walk way. I remember it being a frame house. It had a rout iron fence across the front. Tim explained, her parents had been to a barn raising and he had worked on the barn roof in the rain. On their way home, (Lela's parents Boy'd Cr.) he became ill with a high fever and stopped at his aunt's home, mentioned above. There he died of pneumonia.

"Aunt Tim, affectionately I remember her with warm stories of her childhood in the Boyds Creek and Temple Hill area. She married Delma Land and lived much of her life in Taylor Co. Ky. Tim's d/b 30 July1800; d/d 5/5/1995. Tim E. explained, when I started tos chool, I attended school in Glasgow. I wore the best of clothes. Mother explained, "I want youto remember this is being paid for by money your father left you."

"Pageville, Barren County, Ky. Feb. 8th, 1875. Mr. Editor: As you have no correspondent from this neighborhood, I will take the privilege of reporting a couple of weddings. The first was an elopement. Mr. Wm. Wood and Miss Lucy Harrison left for Tennessee on the 30th January, and reached Lafayette on the 31th, where the happy pair were made one. They returned the next day, and were most agreeably surprised to find a double reception awaiting them — one by the groom's mother, the other by the parents of the bride. Our good friend, Daniel Devasher went with them and found him a partner as they passed through Allen county, but unfortunately had to take her back to Papa. The balance of the party say she got out of the notion before they got there, but Daniel says licenses cost too much in Tennessee. On Sunday, February 7th, at the residence of the bride's father, Mr. Alex Devasher, Mr. Alonzo Whitney was married to Miss Ludie Devasher, Rev. G. W. Gillock officiating. The groom is a true Kentucky gentleman of the first grade, and just what is required to make a woman happy; the bride is one of old Barren's loveliest daughters, and on that occasion the expression showing a due appreciation of the solemn pledge she was making combined with a natural sweet face, gave her an appearance lovely beyond description. May their lives be long and happy, and their fondest dreams now be changed into living reality." (Glasgow Weekly Times, Feb. 18, 1875).

"Mrs. Joe Gill died Monday night of measles. Her husband left her sometime ago and she was in destitute circumstances. With the proper attention and care she doubtless would have lived. Mr. Gill lives in Nashville." (Glasgow Weekly Times, April 8, 1896).

"Mr. Frank T. Royse died at his home Saturday night, near Sulphur Well. He had been drinking Monday and Tuesday, and Tuesday evening, Dick Davis who lives near Knob Lick, heard a noise and going in that direction he found Mr. Royse in an unconscious condition. He took him to his house and summoned assistance, and Wednesday morning Mr. Royse was removed to his home. The doctors pronounced that he had taken morphine and he remained in an unconscious condition until death claimed him. He didn't take the morphine with a suicidal intention as it is supposed, as he was in the habit of using the drug. He was a man of high standing and of a good family. He leaves a wife and six children." (Glasgow WeeklyTimes, May 13, 1896.)

December 23, 1897, Glasgow Daily Times. S H Waller and King & Smith were granted distiller's license for one year. H. T. Bowles qualified as guardian for John E. Bowles, with J. M. Moore as surety. Rev. J. L. Kilgore was granted license to perform the rites of marriage. "At a dance at Black's Ferry, Monroe county, last Friday night, Tom Chapman was stabbed in the side and dangerously wounded by T. Stephens. Both parties belonged to prominent families and the affair is much regretted. The wound is regarded as dangerous, but not necessarily fatal. No arrests have been made."

"Mr. Julius Goff, Hiseville, has the champion chicken tale of the season. Several weeks ago Mr. Goff had a hen which began laying in a keg. It was pretty warm, comfortable sort of a location, and when the hen was off duty, a cat got into the habit of curling up in the nest, in which the same nest egg was always left. In about three weeks, out popped a chicken from the egg, hatched by the cat. If anyone can beat this let him come down with the evidence, as Mr. Goff stands ready to do." (Undated Glasgow Times." "While burning brush a few days ago, Mr. J. W. Duval burnt his fine mustache so badly that he had to part with it entirely. A few days after this, while attending a sale, he saw himself in a looking-glass and did not know who he was. He will vouch for the truth of this." (Glasgow Times, 28 Dec. 1897.)

January 1, 1900, Glasgow Times. Beckton, KY. "Beckton is being lit up and awakened by the hilarious Roman candle and boisterous fire-cracker. A regular Christmas jubilee is in progress. To-morrow, we have our big rabbit-hunt; egg flips and big dinners will be served. Hunters should remember that game always appears in pairs to a man with too much flip. No dog can point a single bird for a man who has had too much flip, so do not blame the dog if you have to shoot twice for every bird."
