This is not a matter of great consequence, but curiosity has led me to write this letter.

The Longhunter, Vol XIII, No 2 (Summer 1990) carried "Gleanings from Henrietta Benton Johnson's Scrapbook." One of these newspaper clippings (# 146, p 57) related the death of one A J Newton and stated that he died at the home of James Thacker with whom he lived.

Vol I of your books on Fairview Cemetery (p 37) shows that Andrew Jackson Newton died 12 Nov 1897 and that his wife was Elizabeth P Ragland. I am a Ragland descendant and have some genealogical connection with a Newton family. Silas Lee Newton married Lucinda Wilkins Thacker. Lucinda was a daughter of Prudence Ann Narcissa Kelley (my g grdmother) and her 1st husband, Dillingham Dougan Thacker (a brother of my g grdfather, Alfred Payne Thacker. I am descended from Prudence's 2nd marriage, to Alfred. James Thacker, who married Keziah Durrett, was a son of Dillingham and a brother of Lucinda.


My Ragland line goes back through Robert Wentworth Ragland/Sinai Cox. I have what I believe to be a fairly comprehensive record of Robert Ragland's descendants, but there were many other Raglands in Warren Co and I do not know their relationship, if any.

Robert petitioned the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Ky to legitimize his 6 living "illegitimate children by Sina Taylor." "Chap 757-An Act for the benefit of Eleanor F Ragland, Martha C Ragland, Nancy Ragland, Andrew J Ragland and Sarah M Ragland," under date of 23 Feb 1835, confirmed their Ragland name, legitimated them and made them "capable of inheritance in law and in equity, to all the lands and tenements, goods and chattels, rights and credits of said Robert W Ragland, in as full and ample a manner as if they had been severally born in lawful wedlock." Robert and Sinai did not marry subsequently. In his will, Robert described her as "the woman living with me, Senia Taylor," and she signed her will as "Sina Taylor," although she was listed in the 1850 census as "Sinai Ragland." 4. 1. Although the 1860, 1870, and 1880 Warren Co census reports list James as a farmer, Hugh M Thacker (HMT) said that he was a Bowling Green policeman for many years. The 1900 census shows him living at 429 Church St, B G, with his daughter, Mary, and a couple of boarders. I have a copy of a letter which James and "Kizzie" wrote to his uncle, the Rev John Durham, in Sep 1858. The original is in the "John G Durham Collection" at Western Kentucky University.
2. From tombstone.
3. The Rev Durham's "Day Book for 1854" contains the following entry for Monday, 30 Oct, relating to proceedings at Drake's Creek Church: "...Kizziah Derritt professed hope in Christ...received by experience, sister K Derritt and by letter, A P Thacker, Prudence N Thacker, and Lucina W Thacker. Evening, 4 o'clock. Baptized sister K Derritt..."
4. Buried in the Durrett Cemetery: Henry, b 10 Aug 1800, d 22 Jun 1849; Sarah, b 24 Jul 1814, d 31 Dec 1890; and William Durrett, presumably Henry's brother, who also died on 22 Jun 1849, probably from cholera (see Dillingham D Thacker/Prudence A N Kelley family sheet, ¶ 2.)
5. HMT told me there was another daughter, "Bob," who scandalized some of her contemporaries by marrying "old Hesperin." I have been unable to find any record of a Bob or Roberta Thacker or Hesperin. There were two Hespens in B G in the 1900 census, both German immigrants and both bakers. Frederick Hesperin, 70, and his wife, Cathrin, 64, were boarding with Gustavas Bardmaker, a Belgian immigrant and a butcher, at 308 Main St. Christopher Hesperin, 64, and his wife, Sophia, 65, with 2 daughters, a son-in-law, and a grandson, were living at 324 Main St. Warren Co Burial Permits, 1877-1913 reveals that Fred Hesperin, 70, b Hanover, Germany, d 17 Jul 1904, and was buried, Louisville. Mrs Chris Hesperin, according to the same source, who was married and 73, died 10 Feb 1908 and was buried, Fairview Cemetery. Chris, 73, is shown in the 1910 Warren Co census with his daughter, Ella Hesperin, 35. He was born 31 May 1836, died 5 Jul 1914.
6. No record of marriage has been found for any of these daughters. Apparently, James and Keziah had no grandchildren.

Dear Cousin Pat,

I was pleased to receive your letter of 24 Nov and the accompanying Haden genealogy information. On the day that you wrote, I was in hospital for surgery on my left leg and knee. The cast will be removed on 9 Jan, and I will be using crutches for 3 months thereafter.

Presently, I am using a walker. Am confined to the house and, even here, have limited mobility. However, I am tired of lying around reading, so I resolved to write to you even though it is a bit awkward.

It appears that you and I are 6th cousins once removed. You and my children are 7th cousins.

Information on our Haden family is confusing and contradictory. As far as the children of Anthony Haden-Margaret Douglas are concerned, your list is close to that shown in an article by Charles Hughes Hamlin, Haden of Va and Ky, in "Ky Ancestors," Vol 4, No 6, p 25, Jul 1969. He states "we have proof of at least 8 children whose names are as follows: John, Joseph, William, Elizabeth Rea, Rachel, Zachariah, Ann, Ruth." (He has Elizabeth Rea as one person.)

I have subscribed for several years to the Heydon-Haydon-Hyden Families quarterly, and I have reviewed all issues of The Hayden Family Quarterly which was published about 1930. I have read accounts that there was a daughter, Jane, who married a Mr Hunley. Also, that Anthony-Margaret had two sons, Thomas and James, who were born before they came to America. Daniel Singleton of Dallas, a distant cousin of my wife, claims descent through Thomas and his son, Ezekiel.


As for John Moseley Haden, the Hamlin article cited above lists John as a son of John Haden and Jane Moseley. He states that this had been "fully proven," and I have no reason to doubt this.

However, the reason I showed John Moseley as a son of Wm Haden was based upon the writing of Geo D Blakey in Men Whom I Remember, Logan Co, Ky, pp 74-75, Logan Co Gen Soc. He wrote that Capt Wm Haden, Rev War veteran and grdson of Anthony, settled in Logan early in the 19th century. He names Wm's children and their spouses. The only mistake I have caught is his statement that Sam'l T m a Miss Harris (he married a Miss Hughes.) He wrote that Wm had a son, John, who m a Miss Jackson. I used this information to compile a family group sheet for Wm-- assuming that John was John Moseley and that Miss Jackson was Margaret Caldwell Jackson, sister of my g grdfather, Francis Winchester Jackson, Sr. (The Jackson records show that Margaret m John Moseley Haden.) Also, the fact that Wm had a son of that name is indicated by his will in Will Book B, p 343, Logan Co, 4 Jan 1821, which divides property among his children & grdchildren, including "..... Jno M Haden's children." Could there have been two John Moseley Hadens?

Re my father's middle name. He was named for a friend--no Manning blood.

As for my family group sheets, I have compiled several hundred many of which relate to families in Warren, Logan, and allen counties. I am constantly revising and updating them. When I am able to get out of the house, I will reproduce my summaries for the various families and you can determine which sheets would be of interest.

A HISTORY
OF
Lynchburg's Pioneer Quakers
AND
Their Meeting House

"The Quakers put us to shame. We have not appreciated them, nor honored them as we should. They have been the salt of the earth."

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they marked the ebb of the ocean tide on a stick stuck in the water near the bank! In reaching the head waters of the Roanoke River they had skirted the boundary of the present countries of Campbell and Bedford, passing where Altavista now stands.

The Piedmont of Virginia was a source of boundless wonder and admiration to these first explorers as they trudged across its hills and up its water courses. It was a lovely land of rolling hills covered with pine, oak and chestnut. With its backdrop of the Blue Ridge and the graceful, towering Peaks of Otter silhouetted against vivid sunsets, at times it seemed the original from which a Japanese print had been made. Here and there the virgin forest was broken by wide meadows, or "old fields", where the Indians had burnt off the land to provide pasture for the great herds of buffalo, elk, deer and other wild game. Often the hunters path was but a buffalo trail penetrating dense thickets in which could be heard the cries of wild turkeys, birds, and smaller game of every description. Food was plentiful. On the sloping hillsides they found wild berries, fruits and nuts, and the streams and rivers were filled with fish. Never before had they met with such a wide variety of wild shrubs and flowers which seemed to cover the ground like a carpet. This was a hunter's paradise — the land of the Future! No wonder they took notice of particularly rich farming tracts and made notes of possible sites for towns and cities. Such a land could not for long remain unknown and unclaimed.

However, the white settlers did not pour into this region as quickly as might be expected. When the scouts who preceded the Hat Creek colony in 1742 went over this ground they could find only one aged white man. He was the only one of his kind in a radius of forty-five miles. The region was inhabited by Indians who disputed its possession and offered combat with the whites from the very first. Some were of the Sapon nation but most of these red men were of the Tuscaroras tribe and were commonly known as Monocans. They were a tall, handsome, warlike people, ready to defend their hunting grounds. Their totem, or emblem, was three arrows — that weapon with which they tried to stop the white invaders. Some of these Indians were jealous of the first white traders and also feared the arming of the interior tribes with guns bought from the Europeans. They proved threatening at times, and no doubt they caused many anxious moments in the first crude cabins that dotted the wilderness of Bedford County. As late as 1758 they were to prove so troublesome to the Quakers at Goose Creek (near Bedford) that the settlement had to be abandoned for two years before being reclaimed. When Lynch founded his ferry in 1757, a small tribe of them were still living a few miles away.¹⁸

Most of the Indians of this section seemed friendly, but there was one glaring exception. These were the Ocaneechi, whose village was on an island in the Roanoke River (at Clarksville). These Indians were a fierce

blood-thirsty, treacherous tribe. Lederer thoroughly distrusted them, and they were the ones who had frightened Wood and Bland. Their threatening presence did more than all else to hinder the advance of the white man into the hinterland²⁰ for the great "Trading Path", as it was called, crossed their island, and no white man could enter this region without their knowledge. Everywhere their scouts kept close tab on the comings and goings of the white invaders.

Each year the bloody Iroquois from the North used to go south through the Piedmont by their trail which passed near Charlottesvile, Lynchburg and Danville. About 1718 Governor Spotswood induced them to use another route, which act added to the sense of security of the pioneers. Another Indian trail led through the Blue Ridge into Goose Creek Valley, and near Montvale is one of the Indian burial mounds.²¹ It was into this forbidden Paradise, of which no portion is more beautiful than that in which Lynchburg is built, that our South River Quakers came. They came unarmed, by covered wagon and ox cart, trusting in kindness and their own unexcelled bravery to protect them from the savages. First they came in small groups, one or two families at a time, finally they poured in — not in a continuous stream but in waves. Some came direct from England and the European Continent, others stopped over for a time in Barbadoes Island in the West Indies. Among the latter were the Moormans, the Clarks, the Candlers, and some of the Terrells. These first families were known as "the native stock" when later multitudes passed through Campbell County lingering a short time en route to the deeper South and far West.

The South River Colony of Quakers (so called because it lay South of the James) was the third group to form a settlement in what is now Campbell County. They were preceded by a colony of Presbyterians at Hat Creek in 1742 and another mixed group at New London about 1750²². These groups saw and knew very little of each other for, though they were separated by but a few miles, the impassable forest trails kept them from intermingling. Perhaps this was just as well for they had little in common, particularly the fighting Presbyterians and the peace-loving Quakers. Quaker and Presbyterian had known each other on the other side of the world and somehow had found it difficult to get along so different were their views of life. They both, however, had the same purpose in mind in coming to the wilderness; both groups were seeking a refuge, "some semblance of that City of God" on earth where they could worship Him in their own way and without molestation from outsiders.

The family of Charles Lynch, the senior, was the first to enter the area now occupied by Lynchburg and its environs. As an Irish Catholic²³ lad of fifteen, Charles had run away from his home and arranged with a captain to board an outgoing ship. Some weeks later he found himself in America. This was about 1720. For the sum of his Atlantic passage he was apprenticed to the wealthy Quaker planter, Captain Christopher

were most probably persuaded to change their minds by the difficulties attending those who did not enlist in the Army.

As usual with the outbreak of hostilities the Quakers were placed in a doubtful position. They were made the subject of criticism and suspicion, but more than this they encountered real difficulties. The stand of the law on their position in the War of 1812 is uncertain, but so far as I can determine the law enacted before the outbreak of the Revolution, thirty-six years before, had not been repealed and they were exempt from fighting.⁸¹ This is hard to explain in light of the fact that in old records there are accounts of Friends who were stopped by the Sheriffs of both Bedford and Campbell counties and fined for not attending drill, for exemption included military drill.

In 1812, John Talbot, deputy Sheriff of Campbell County, took from Elias Fisher "one watch worth \$40.00" in lieu of money for muster fines. He also deprived the following men of sums of money for the same purpose: Jonathan Johnson, \$1.50; Thomas Robinson, \$6.75; James Candler, \$6.00. This is not a complete list of those fined. In Bedford County in 1814 deputy Sheriff, Thomas Claytor took from Josiah Bailey one pair of saddle bags valued at \$4.00, and from Stephen Butler, Jr., a counting reel worth \$2.00, and so on. There are perhaps fifteen or twenty names of Quakers who were penalized thus. It may have been that the deputy Sheriffs were ignorant of the laws excusing Quakers, or the Clerk of the Meeting may have been at fault in not furnishing the Sheriffs with accurate or complete lists of members of the Society who were within the ages of military service. At any rate South River Meeting sent "the following account of Friends suffering from muster fines" up to the Quarterly Meeting, and allowances were made to those who had lost personal property through loyalty to their sect. These allowances were paid by the "Meetings for Sufferings" which had first been established in Philadelphia in 1756 for the purpose of extending relief to those on the frontier who might suffer from Indians or other enemies.⁸²

It has been established as a fact that the County Court House at Rustburg was burned during this period. The origin of the fire was very mysterious, it appeared to be the work of an incendiary and suspicion was leveled in the direction of all British sympathizers or anti-war men. The circumstances were such that might easily have led to a local reign of terror.⁸³ With these conditions existing we are not surprised to learn that many were turned out of the Meeting for going to war. Among those disowned for military services were John Johnson, Jr., Charles Lynch, James Candler and Johnson Candler.

While the war dragged on those left behind at home were far from having a dull time. They were living in a great age. In their daily paper, *The Lynchburg Press*, they read the news from the front that vied with Indian affairs in the West for attention. They also read of Napoleon Bonaparte's

dethronement, his exile to Elba, the restoration of the Bourbons, and Andrew Jackson's great victory at New Orleans. The world was turning a corner and they were there to see it.⁸⁴

In the first year of the conflict Christopher Anthony and Elias Fisher went to the West on a preaching tour. During 1813 and 1814 the congregation was to be torn, and many heart-breaking "Farewells" said. Families that had come to the wilderness together and as neighbors had shared mutual joys and sorrows were now to be separated. Many had inter-married, and many a mother who went to the adjoining farm to tell her neighbor's son goodbye also saw her daughter for the last time. Covered wagons and ox carts piled high with household goods and followed by the family cow, began to disappear down the New London Road headed toward Cumberland Gap and the Wilderness Road. The Westward migration had begun in earnest.

In 1813 a large group went to Ohio where some of the Easleys, the Timberlakes, the Johnsons, the Terrells, the Butterworths, the Moormans and the Stantons had moved in 1804-1806. In 1814 Christopher Anthony, Sr., who was a pillar of the church at South River and who had no doubt visited some of his former neighbors during his trip to the West the year before, decided to leave. With him went his two unmarried daughters and a young man (Davis) who was soon to be his son-in-law. Love had not often led to more dangerous paths than those that traversed the mountains to the new Ohio wilderness. This group settled at Cincinnati. Three years later (1817) they were followed by other Fishers, the Stantons and the Butlers. Thomas Clark Moorman and his family were the first of all these new westerners. He set out when the State of Ohio was a primeval wilderness and it was he who blazed the trail for those others who would follow him.

The old Meeting was fast failing. The strong influences that had brought it to such a pass had begun in 1800. These influences would eventually lead to the abandonment of the Meeting House and the complete disappearance of Friends from this section. The war and loss of members would be among these influences, but the slavery question was the most potent. It was a most disturbing issue and as it would later almost split the Union, so at an earlier date it drove the Quakers out of Piedmont Virginia. The Quakers were the first Christians to purge themselves of the stain of human bondage. During the earlier years of their sojourn in this country the Quakers bought and sold slaves with apparently as little hesitation as their neighbors. When George Fox visited the Barbadoes in 1671 he was struck with the inconsistency of slave holding and Christian principles. He spoke against the practice and as early as 1676, in Barbadoes, they passed a law to discourage it.

The first official protest of any religious body against the slave trade was made by the Quakers at Germantown, Pa., in 1688. They objected to the "traffic in the bodies of men" and the treating and selling "men as

that time unmarried. In the West he became an evangelist, known far and wide for his eloquence and power as a speaker. He died August 13, 1830. He disowned his eldest daughter, Sarah, because she married Henry Davis "who departed from the faith". However, he must have forgiven her, for at his death he left her valuable real estate in the heart of the City of Cincinnati.⁴

MOORMAN

The Moormans of South River Meeting trace their descent from Zachariah Moorman, who was born in Isle of Wight, England, in 1620. While yet in his teens he enlisted in the army and became a captain under Oliver Cromwell. He followed Cromwell through the Irish campaign, and after the conquest of that island, remained for a time near Belfast. While here he met and married the daughter of William Candler who was a lieutenant, also with Cromwell. Zachariah later returned to his birthplace and one family historian says, "Being a sympathizer with Charles I, he became an enemy of Cromwell, for having the King beheaded, and was exiled from the British Isles". However, I find that the dates do not tally in this instance, as Cromwell had died in 1658 and the Moormans did not leave England until the early part of 1669. The other explanation of his exodus from England is more probable, that is, he was fleeing from persecution as a Quaker. At any rate, in 1669 he and his children, Thomas, Charles and Sally Anne (wife of Micajah Clark), set sail on the ship "Glasgow" from the port of Southampton and a few weeks later dropped anchor at the Island of Barbadoes in the West Indies. There is no record of his wife having been with him, it may be that she had died before this time. The Moormans were attended on this voyage by the entire family of Michael Clark, in which there were six sons, and also by David Terrell. Early the next year Zachariah Moorman, his three children and his son-in-law, joined the emigrants who stopped at the Island enroute to South Carolina. This group landed near Charleston and established the first permanent colony in that State. The Moormans and Michael Clark did not remain in South Carolina but moved on that same year to Virginia and settled in Nansemond County. Thomas, the son of Zachariah, was a vestryman in the Episcopal Church in 1671. Charles, the other son, lived in Louisa County near "Green Spring" where he had settled in 1704. He married Elizabeth Reynolds. They were both devout Quakers, although they owned slaves. Charles was a Justice of the Peace and with his son, Thomas, was an overseer of the Society of Friends. Charles died in 1756. He had five children by Elizabeth Reynolds. The first was Thomas (1705-1765) who married Rachel Clark. They lived in Louisa County near Green Spring, but a few years before he died, he and his family moved to Bedford County, where he held large tracts of land. Records at Bedford show that he first bought land in that County, July 17, 1762. His will is dated July 22, 1765;

it was probated in November of the following year.⁵ The second child of Charles and Elizabeth was Judith, who married John Douglas. The third child, Charles, married Mary Adams; the fourth child, Achilles, married Elizabeth Adams and lived in Bedford County. The second son of Rachel and Thomas Moorman, Micajah (1735) married Susannah Chiles and lived on land upon which part of Lynchburg now stands. He was one of the trustees of the City. Micajah (1735-1806) raised his own eleven children, as well as his sister Elizabeth's sons, Moorman and Christopher Johnson, after her death. These two nephews afterwards married Micajah's two daughters.⁶ The eldest son, Zachariah, in 1763 settled five miles south of Lynch's Ferry on the James. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Henery Terrell of Caroline County in 1755. His second wife was Elizabeth Johnson. Many of the Moormans were disowned by the Society for holding slaves and "marrying out of unity". Thomas Clark Moorman, with almost his whole family started migration to the West when he set out in 1755 for the Ohio Wilderness. Many Quakers followed him later.⁷

DOUGLAS

John Douglas came over from Scotland and settled in Orange County where he lived and died. He married Judith Moorman. His son Achilles was born, February 22, 1752. Achilles Douglas was one of the leading men of the South River Meeting and no one can read the records without being impressed with the frequent occurrence of his name, both as clerk and participator in the activities of the Society. John Douglas' will devises to his son, Achilles, 800 acres of land, part of which was known as Lynch's tract, also one-half the profits from a mill, certain personal property and a negro boy. Achilles married Elizabeth Terrell, daughter of Micajah and Sarah Lynch Terrell, in 1779. His father-in-law was a Quaker minister. He moved to the "Montview" section of Campbell County where he resided the remainder of his life. He was named in 1791 as one of the two trustees of South River Meeting.⁸ He bought and sold considerable land and was frequently a member of the grand jury and road commissions, in which capacity only a free-holder could act. In 1783 he freed all his slaves by manumission as the record in Rustburg bears witness. He further proved his devotion to the Quaker Society by going with Joshua Brown, a minister to the South in 1778. While in South Carolina they were arrested and required to take the oath of allegiance and give a bond of 10,000 pounds before leaving the province. They refused to do this on account of religious scruples and were held for six months in nominal custody and were finally released by an Act of the General Assembly.⁹ The children of Achilles and Elizabeth Terrell Douglas were: Sarah, Judith, Mildred, Deborah, Elizabeth, John Lynch and Achilles Moorman. Judith married Jonathan Johnson who owned

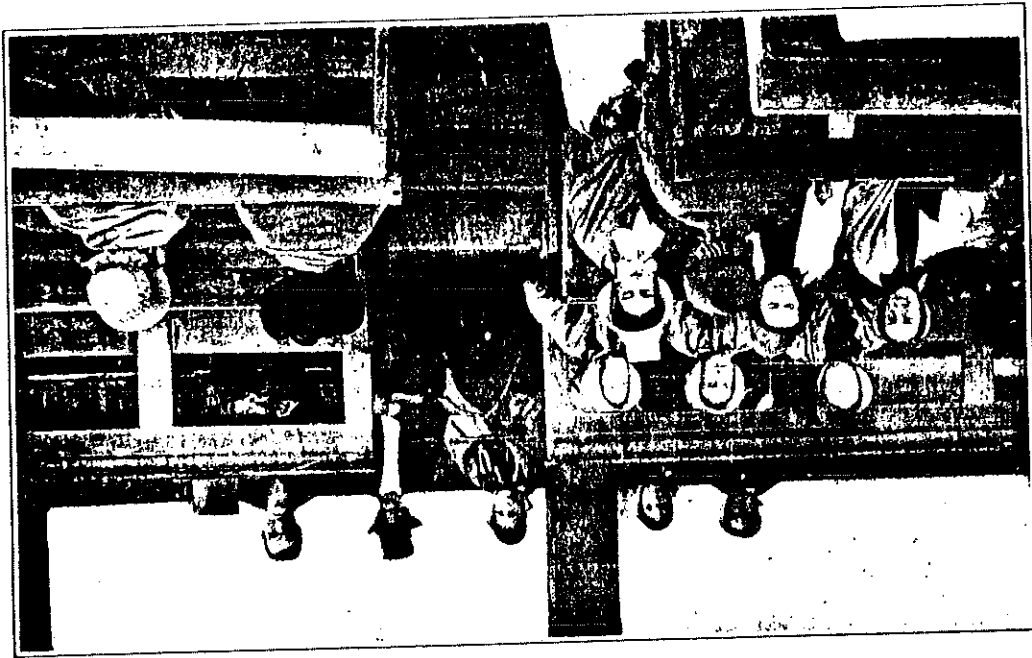

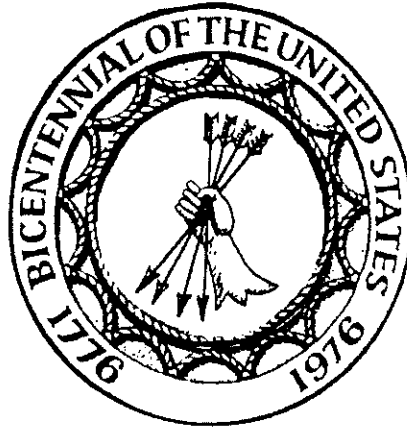

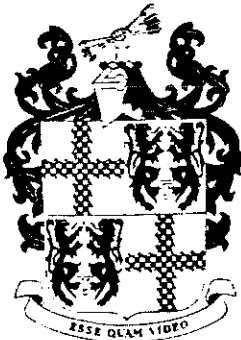

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MOORMAN

THE FAMILY NAME AND ARMS

The contemporary spelling of the family surname is that of Moorman, but Morman, Moreman, and Mooreman are to be found in old records. The variance, of course, being due to the fact that spelling was once phonetical. Families with the surname Moormann and Moormans are to be found, but common connections have not been investigated.

The Oxford English Dictionary gives two meanings for the noun "moorman." The first being: "one who lives on a moor." Doubtless the surname was taken from some ancestor having a connection with a moor in England, where the family originated. A Dictionary of English and Welsh Surnames by Charles Wareing Bardsley (2nd ed. London, 1901) mentions a Johannes Morman in the year 1379, which is the first appearance of the name. Geographical locations bearing the family surname are Moormans Mill, Campbell county, Moormans, Pittsylvania county, and Moorman River, Albemarle county, all in Virginia.

Burke's General Armoury gives the Moorman Arms as being: "Or, a cross engrailed chequy gules and argent" and the Crest as: "a hand holding four arrows points downward." These are the only arms for Moorman given, which may be described to those not familiar with heraldic terms as: a gold shield with a red and silver checkered cross having curved indentations.

The right to use this coat of arms, as is the case with all, was granted in perpetuity to all direct male descendants of the name, that is, bearing the grantee's surname. The direct line has not been traced, but evidence enough of the grant is contained in an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia dated October, 1786, in which Micajah Moorman (1735-1809) is referred to as a "gentlemen," a legal term used in English law, under which the Assembly was acting, as denoting a free land owner entitled to the use of a coat of arms, in contrast to a "yeoman," being, indeed, a free land owner, but non-armigerous. For a more detailed explanation of these terms see: Encyclopaedia Britannica, under each heading. It is most probable, however, that the grant was made to Zachariah Moorman, the emigrant, during his service in the English army, since we find a Thomas Moorman, doubtless a member of the same branch of the family, on the Isle of Wight in 1725, referred to as a "yeoman" in a law suit. (J.L. Whitehead, The Undercliff of the Isle of Wight, pp. 32-39). J.J. Moorman of Salem, Virginia on October 31st, 1881 wrote to Alanson Moorman, Esq. of Valley Station, Ky. in part: "I procured a certified copy of the heraldry of the family when in England and I gave the original to my son Charles P. Moorman of Louisville, Ky." (from a letter of Mrs. Russell Lewis, 665 East North 20th St., Abilene, Texas to Brother Ambrose dated August 3rd, 1965 -- also from a printed copy of the full letter of the above J.J. Moorman.) A search of the records of The College of Arms, London, England indicates that the record of the grant of the Moorman Arms has been lost, perhaps during one of the fires.

The writer has in his possession four seals. One attached and three that were attached to legal documents of members of the Moorman family in Virginia into which are impressed the Moorman coat-of-arms. These seals were detached by a kind courtly clerk.

THE MOTTO

The family motto, in Latin is: *Esse quam video*, or more precisely *Esse quam videri*, or in English *To be that I see*, or *To be that I seem*, respectfully. The first seems to be that preferred by the Ohio Moormans. The second seems to be the original family motto.

QUARTERING WITH CARROLL

Henry T. Moorman (d. 1887), being a direct male descendant, was therefor entitled to the use of the Moorman arms, and after his marriage to Minervia S. Carroll, co-heiress with her sister, Hannah, to the Carroll arms, was further entitled to marshal the arms of his father-in-law with his own. Burke's General Armoury gives the Carroll arms as: "Ar, two lions combatant gu supporting a sword proper hilt and pommel or" that is a gold shield with two red lions in rampant stance, supporting a sword in its proper colors with a gold hilt and pommel. The male issue of this Carroll-Moorman marriage and its descendants of the name may use according to heraldic law the Moorman and Carroll arms quartered. The heraldic bearings of William Carroll Moorman, his son, Charles Carroll Moorman, and of his sons and grandsons of the name are therefore: Quarterly - 1st and 4th: or, a cross engrailed chequy gules and argent for MOORMAN and 2nd and 3rd: Argent, two lions combatant gules supporting a sword proper, hilt and pommel or, for CARROLL.

Since the inheritance of the Carroll Arms, four generations of descendants of this marriage have bore the name of Carroll with that of Moorman. The name Carroll being assumed, as it has been said, by an agreement made in view of the will of John Carroll, who left a sum for the education of William Carroll Moorman with the condition the name of his family be used by him and his male descendants, as mentioned in a letter of his aunt, Hannah, to his mother, dated September 4th, 1868. The will of John Carroll, however, has not been found as yet.

THOMAS MOORMAN OF THE BONA NOVA

In the Records of the Virginia Company of London, of which there is a manuscript in the Library of Congress is recorded under date of July 7th, 1620: "Thomas Moreman signified in his Peticon that hee went to Virginia in a Ship called the Bona Noua in the yeare 1619 in the Companies service therin hee still remayneth vnder the Comaund of Captaine Mathewe. Butt for so much as hee hath now satisfied the Company the charge they have been att in placeinge him there as their Tennant, hee desyreth his freedome and withall that proporcon of Land as is vsually allotted to others in the like kinde w^{ch} the request the Courte thought verie reasonalbe and did

GEN. I and II - THE MOORMAN EMIGRANTS, 1620 - 1704:

Zachariah Moorman, the founder of the family in America, was born in 1620 on the Isle of Wight, Hampshire, England, where a branch of the family had lived since at least the early part of the sixteenth century. In 1639, at the age of nineteen, he joined the English army and advanced to the rank of captain, in which capacity he served under Oliver Cromwell through the Irish campaign, and after the conquest, remained for a time near Belfast, where he married Ann Candler, the daughter of William Candler, who served under Cromwell as a lieutenant. On returning to his birthplace he soon found himself forced to disagree with Cromwell's policies of government and resigned his commission.

About the time he left the army he and his family disassociated themselves with the Church of England and became members of the newly founded Religious Society of Friends, commonly called, Quakers, just then taking root in England, under the leadership of George Fox (1624-1691).

Between 1661 and 1697 over 13,000 of the members of this denomination were jailed in England, 198 transported as slaves and 338 died in prisons. These persecutions were under such pretexts as refusing to pay tithes, to swear or remove the hat; for preaching in public places or traveling on the Sabbath. Under such conditions Zachariah, perhaps his wife, although she is not mentioned in colonial records, and his children, Charles, Thomas, and Sally Ann, sailed from Southampton, in 1669, on the "Glasgow" and a few weeks later dropped anchor at the Island of Barbados in the West Indies. The Moormans were attended on this voyage by the entire family of Michael Clark, whose son, Micajah, married Sally Ann. Early the next year Zachariah, his three children and son-in-law, joined the emigrants who stopped at the island enroute to South Carolina. This group landed near Charleston and established the first permanent colony in that State. The Moormans and the Clarks, however, did not remain, but moved on that same year to Virginia, and settled in Nansemond county. (Douglas Summers Brown: A Hist. of Lynchburg's Pioneer Quakers and Their Meeting House).

Thomas one of Zachariah's sons, a vestryman of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent county, was living with his wife, Elizabeth, and three children in that county in 1671. (ibi. and Chas. O. Paullin, The Moorman Family of Virginia. in Wm. and Mary Quarterly 2 ser. vol. 12, pp. 177-180).

Zachariah's other son, Charles, married Elizabeth, daughter of Christopher Reynolds, in 1704. (The Compendium of American Genealogy, vol. IV, p. 218). They had five children, Thomas, Judith, who married John Douglass, Charles, who married first Mary Adams and second, Mary Venable, and had as their granddaughter the wife of Robert L. Jefferson, grandnephew of Thomas Jefferson, Achilles married Elizabeth Adams, and Anne, who married Thomas Martin (Paullin).

In 1735 Charles patented three tracts of land in Louisa county and 400 acres in Albemarle county at the junction of Mechum and Moorman Rivers, from which circumstance the latter is so named. La-

ter he secured a second tract in the same locality, but it is doubtful if he ever saw it. (R.H. Early, Campbell Chronicles and Family Sketches, J.P. Bell co., Lynchburg, Va. 1927 p. 461). A considerable number of Quakers had purchased land and established meetings at Cedar Creek not far from the Louisa boundary line in Hanover county and at Golansville in Caroline county, sometimes called the Caroline Meeting. Charles and his son, Thomas, were chosen overseers of the Caroline Meeting on September 10th, 1744. (Paullin and William Wade Hinshaw, The Encyclopaedia of American Quaker Genealogy, vol. VI). Charles, also served as Justice of the Peace. (Brown).

To his son Charles, Jr., Charles gave use of his 330 acres on both sides of Hushons Creek and on the 420 acres where he made his home he raised in addition to horses and stock pigs, such products which made him and his family self-sufficient.

In February of 1754, Charles was charged by the Friends to make a mission to their members living in the mountains in order to inquire as to whether they desired to continue with their own meetings there or make other arrangements. On this journey he took his son, Thomas (Hinshaw VI).

Charles died at his home in Louisa county in May of 1757. (Probate Rec. Will Bk. I pp. 35-36). His wife, Elizabeth, born in 1688, survived him by eight years dying in 1763. Nothing remains of the meeting house and its cemetery at Camp Creek, but the site now in the field of a farm is known. (Probate Rec. Will Bk. I p. 68).

GEN. III THOMAS MOORMAN, 1705 - 1766:

About 1729 Charles' oldest child, Thomas, married Rachel Clark, the daughter of Christopher Clark and their children were: Mary born in 1730, Rachel, who married Stephan Goggin and had Parmela, who was the wife of Samuel Clemens, who had John M. Clemens, the father of Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain), Zachariah, born in 1732, who married Elizabeth Terrell, Micajah born June 28th, 1735, Elizabeth (1738-1740), Charles, Mildred born in 1742, Pleasant born in 1745, Aggothy who married a Johnson, Clark Terrell (d. 1814) married Rachel Harris, and Cilley. (Brown, Paullin, and Hinshaw VI).

In 1754 Rachel, Thomas' wife, inherited 400 acres in Hanover county from her father. (Early). About 1746 the family moved from Louisa to Caroline county and became members of the Golansville Meeting. In 1765 Thomas resigned as an overseer, his brother Charles being chosen in his place, bought 200 acres of land on Tomahawk creek and began to move there in February of that year, arriving on March 9th. He and his family bore the following certificate: "Thomas and Rachel Moorman having removed from under our care and within the verge of your Meeting, requested a recommendation to you. After due care we do not find but that he has settled his worldly affairs to satisfaction and they have always been esteemed as orderly persons and held in good unity among us." (Paullin, Hinshaw VI, and Early).

Towards the end of his life, Thomas moved his family to Bedford, which later became Campbell, county, becoming members of the south River Meeting, near Lynch's Ferry, later Lynchburg, founded by

John Lynch, whose mother, Sarah (Clark) Lynch, was a sister of Thomas' wife, Rachel. She organized the group which built the first log meeting house in 1757, which was replaced in 1798 by the small ivy-covered, steep-gabled stone building now known to tourists as the Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church. The South River Meeting flourished until the nineteenth century, when many of the Friends yielded to pressure and, joining in the wars of the period were "turned out of meeting."

The sentiments of Sarah Lynch Terrell, a leader in the antislavery movement, forcibly set down just before her death in 1773, were read at these meetings as "The Last Sayings of Sarah Terrell," and led to the passing of strong abolition resolutions. Thomas' brother, Charles, was a leading figure in this movement, as will be mentioned later on, since it was his benevolent intentions, which caused the General Assembly to pass an act on December 12th, 1787, which carried them out. (Paullin, William Walter Hening, Statutes at Large (Va.) Vol. XII, pp. 613-616, and Virginia: American Guide Series, Oxford Univ. Press, N.Y.).

Thomas' will is dated July 2nd, 1765 (Probate Rec. Will Bk. 1, p. 32) and on the following November 10th, 1766, the Friends recorded: "Thomas Moorman, a worthy member died." On June 6th, the next year, his death having been reported to the Seneca Meeting of Friends, a memorial of his life was read. On August 25th, 1768, Rachel, his widow, married William Ballard of Cedar Creek Monthly Meeting. She died on June 10th, 1792 at the age of eighty-two years. (Hinshaw VI and Brown).

GEN. IV - MICAJAH MOORMAN, 1735 - 1806:

Micajah, the third child of Thomas and Rachel, was one of the first members of the family to purchase land in what is now Campbell county. As early as 1757 he owned 394 acres on the north side and 250 acres on the south side of the James River, near the present city of Lynchburg. (Early) Later he purchased 970 acres on Ivy Creek and a large tract on Molleys Creek. (Paullin)

On October 13th, 1754 he married in a public meeting of the Cedar Creek Monthly Meetings, Susannah Chiles the daughter of Manoa of Caroline County. (Hinshaw VI) She was born in 1738 (Paullin) Their children were as follows: Thomas, born December 11th, 1755, Chiles (1758-1768), Elizabeth, born in 1760 who married Moorman Johnson, Rachel born in 1763 who married James Johnson, Milley born in 1765 who married Christopher Johnson, Charles born in 1767 married Elizabeth Johnson, Rhoda born in 1771 married first John Johnson, Jr. and second Micajah Johnson, Susannah born in 1771? married Samuel Johnson, Dasha born in 1773 married Joseph Stratton, Nancy born in 1775 married John Paxon, and Molly born in 1782 married first Pleasant Moorman and second John C. Moorman. (Hinshaw VI).

In April of 1757, the General Assembly established several new ferries the first being "from the land of Edward Lynch at the mouth of the Black-Water creek, to the land of Micajah Moorman," and the price was set at "for a man three pence and for a horse the same."

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Daniel, and his sisters being named Nancy, Louise, Elizabeth, Ann and Margaret, and there was another, unnamed, who died in infancy. From their names it seems likely that this family was related to the Richmond county-King George county family. The next article relates to Daniel French of King George county and states that he was the first of his family in Virginia, that he married the widow of Sir Francis Dade, that she was the mother of Townsend Dade, and that Daniel French had two children, Margaret who married James Strother, and Daniel French, of "Rose Hill" and "Claremont" in Fairfax county. This article also states that the first named Daniel French's will, dated March 3, 1734, is recorded in King George county, and that he died October 8, 1734. This date does not agree with the date of the death of Daniel French, the father of Margaret and Daniel, as given in the William and Mary College Quarterly and in the book on the Strother Family by Thomas McAdory Owen, both of which have been previously alluded to, and in both of which Daniel French, of King George is said to have died in 1736. The fact that his will was proved in 1736 also indicates that he died in 1736.

The "Times-Dispatch" article is also not in agreement with Thomas McAdory Owen with regard to the name of the wife of Daniel French of King George county. The "Times-Dispatch" says that he married the widow of Sir Thomas Dade and that she was the mother of Townsend Dade and also of Daniel French's two children, while Thomas McAdory Owen says that he married Margaret Pratt, daughter of John Pratt, of King George. It is noted that John Pratt was one of those who appeared with her when she dissented from her husband's will (See King George county Order Book, No. 2, p. 74). Of course, Margaret Pratt may have been a widow when Daniel French married her, or she may have been Daniel's second wife, and Daniel French, of Fairfax, may have been the half-brother of Townsend Dade. Daniel French, of Fairfax, in his will calls Townsend Dade his brother-in-law, which would indicate that Townsend Dade married either a sister of Daniel French or a sister of Penelope Manley, Daniel French's wife. In the will of Henry Fitzhugh, of King George county, dated June 25, 1782, proved June 5, 1783 (King George, W. B. 2, p. 44), Henry Fitzhugh speaks of a daughter Susanna Dade and son-in-law Townsend Dade, indicating that Townsend Dade was married to a Miss Fitzhugh in 1782. The will of Daniel French, of "Rose Hill," who alluded to Townsend Dade as his brother-in-law, was written in 1771. The Dades are mentioned frequently in the St. Paul Register, 1716-1793. It is quite possible that Townsend Dade may have been Daniel's half-brother and have married Penelope's sister, but it seems a bit puzzling, and if one takes what Mrs. Keys wrote about the Moore Family as an example,⁷⁰ newspaper genealogy is not always accurate. The third "Times-Dispatch" article deals with the family of William French, who was born in Ireland, April 29, 1725, and who had a wife named Winifred.

Torrence⁷² does not list a single will recorded in Virginia prior to 1800 under the name of "William French," and neither has this search revealed any.

Nowhere has a trace of Angelina French or of Jeremiah Moore been found in this study of the French family prior to 1800, but additional study may bring something to light, and there still remain other parts of Colonial Virginia and of the Carolinas to be searched.

THE MOORMAN FAMILY OF VIRGINIA

This family originated in England, its name appearing there as early as the fourteenth century. The usual spelling is Moorman, but sometimes Moorman, Moreman, or Mooreman; the meaning of the word is obvious, "man of the moor." The motto of the family found on its coat of arms is "Esse quam video"—To be, rather than to seem to be. One branch of the family was living on the Isle of Wight, Hampshire, England, at least as early as the sixteenth century. In 1725 Thomas Moorman of that island, yeoman, won a suit over the tithes of Bonchurch, which he had refused to pay (J. L. Whitehead, *The Undercliff of the Isle of Wight*, pp. 32-39). In 1670 Zachariah Moorman,¹ a Quaker, emigrated from the Isle of Wight to Nansemond County, Virginia, where members of that peculiar sect early found a refuge. There came with him his three children, Charles,² Thomas,² and Sally Ann.² In 1686 when Thomas' name makes its appearance in Virginia records, he was living with his wife Elizabeth in New Kent County, probably at Green Springs, about thirty miles above Jamestown, where there was a Quaker settlement. In that year his daughter Mary³ and three years later his son Andrew³ were baptized in St. Peter's Church, Episcopalian, New Kent County. In 1690 a third child, Charles³ was born at Green Springs.

In the first half of the eighteenth century a considerable number of Quakers purchased lands in what is now Louisa and Caroline counties and established meetings at Cedar Creek (not far from the Louisa boundary line) in Hanover County and at Golansville in Caroline County, sometimes called the Caroline Meeting. Among the most influential of these Quakers was Charles Moorman³ of Louisa County, who married Elizabeth Reynolds. She bore him five children, Thomas,⁴ (1708-1766), Judith⁴ (Douglas), Ann⁴ (Martin), Achilles⁴ and Charles⁴. The family purchased considerable land in Albemarle County on and near Moorman's River, a stream named for Thomas. About 1730 Thomas married Rachel Clark (d. 1792), daughter of Christopher Clark, a prosperous tobacco planter and before he joined the Friends, a captain in the colonial army. About 1746 he moved to Caroline County and became a member of the Golansville Meeting, and shortly before he died to Bedford (later Campbell) County, becoming a member of the South River Meeting, near Lynch's Ferry (later Lynchburg). In 1762 he purchased 200 acres in this region, on Tomahawk Creek.

Thomas and Rachel had thirteen children, four of whom married into the Johnson family. The Moormans and Johnsons must hold one of the young people were greatly restricted in choice of helpmeets by reason of the Quaker rule of disowning members who married outside of the church. In 1772 Ann Moorman was disowned, in quaint Quaker phrase, "for marrying out from among us by a hiring priest" (paid preacher), and about the same time Zachariah⁵ (1732-1789), son of Thomas, suffered the same penalty for the same misdemeanor. Among other families with whom the Moormans intermarried were those of Clark, Lynch, Chiles, Butterworth, Ballard, and Douglas. Thomas's daughter Rachel married Stephen Goggin, M. Clemens,⁷ was the father of Samuel L. Clemens; Parmela's son, John Thomas's granddaughter Rachel,⁶ daughter of his son Zachariah,⁵ married Benjamin Butterworth, whose son Benjamin,⁷ a Quaker lawyer of Cincinnati, Ohio, was a member of Congress, 1879-1883, and 1885-1891, and commissioner of patents, 1896-1898.

The American Revolution seems to have strengthened the anti-slavery views of the Quakers and especially those held by some of the Moormans.

On May 28, 1778, by deeds of manumission, Charles Moorman⁴ (m. Mary Adams), brother of Thomas, provided for the freedom of this thirty-three slaves—those of age immediately and those under age on becoming of age. These deeds were confirmed in his will dated September 2, 1778, in which his executors were particularly instructed to make application to the General Assembly for an act legalizing the "freedom hereby intended." The following is a copy of one of these deeds, all of which, with the exception of the name of the slave, were alike:

"I, Charles Moorman, from mature consideration and the conviction of my own mind, being fully persuaded that freedom is the natural right of all mankind, and that no law, moral or divine, has given me a right to property in the persons of any of my fellow creatures, and being desirous to fulfil the injunction of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, by doing to others as I would be done by, do therefore declare that having under my care a negro man named Jack aged fifty years, I do for myself, my heirs, executors, and administrators hereby release unto him, the said Jack, all my right, interest, claim, or pretension of claim whatsoever to his person or any estate he may acquire, without any interruption from me or any person claiming for, by, from, or under me. In witness I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 28 day of 5th mo. 1778" (Office Clerk of Court, Campbell County, Virginia, Deed Book, no. 2, pp. 418-19).

On December 12, 1787, the General Assembly passed an act (12 Hening 613-16) carrying into effect Charles's benevolent intentions. Since some of his slaves had been sold by his children and were in the possession of new owners in South Carolina and Georgia, Christopher Johnson, one of the executors, was put to great expense, traveling upwards of ten thousand miles in executing the will. With a view to obtaining the freedom of one such slave, Milley, the executors brought suit in the Superior Court of South Carolina, losing the suit (1 Bay 232-35; 2 Call 297). The possession of thirty-three slaves indicates that Charles was relatively a large slaveholder, since an estimate shows that more than 96 per cent of Virginia slaveholders at this time owned fewer than thirty-three slaves. Elizabeth,⁵ the daughter of his son Robert,⁶ married Robert L. Jefferson, grandnephew of Thomas Jefferson.

Micajah Moorman⁵ (1735-1806), third child of Thomas, seems to have been the first Moorman to purchase land in what is now Campbell County. As early as 1757 he owned 644 acres, on both sides of the James, near the present city of Lynchburg. Later he purchased 970 acres on Ivy Creek and a large tract on Molleys Creek. In 1782 Achilles and Charles Moorman bought 3030 acres on Seneca River. The first meeting attended by the Moormans in Bedford (or Campbell) County was the South River Meeting, a few miles south of Lynch's Ferry. Later some of them attended Seneca Meeting farther southward near Seneca River and Molleys Creek. In 1786 Micajah was one of the ten "gentlemen, trustees" who founded Lynchburg (12 Hening 398). In 1806 Governor William H. Cabell appointed Achilles Moorman tobacco inspector at Lynch's tobacco warehouse, Lynchburg. In 1754 Micajah married Susannah Chiles (b. 1738) of Caroline County, by whom he had thirteen children, five marrying Johnsons. He also freed his slaves. In 1844 when his son Thomas,⁶ then living in Ohio, inherited some property from his father-in-law, John Hope of Hanover County, he gave instructions that if the inheritance included any slaves they were to be freed. Pinched by restricted means, resulting partly from the manumitting of slaves, some of the younger Moormans, not fully sharing the conscientious scruples of their elders, felt that the property might have been disposed of with greater consideration for their pecuniary interests. Descendants of some of the Moorman slaves bearing the name "Moorman" are still living in Campbell County.

In 1806 when Micajah Moorman made his will, he, his eldest son Thomas (1755-1845), and other members of his family were living on or near Molleys Creek near the central part of Campbell County. He was interested in Ohio lands and had already purchased 300 acres in southwestern Ohio. It was about this time that his sons Thomas and John Hope made a trip to Ohio to see these and other unoccupied lands with a view to settling there. They traveled on horseback, guided through the woods where there were no roads by a pocket compass. From Point Pleasant, W. Va., they "went up the Ohio River six miles to Cousin Pamela Clemens and rested there two nights and a day" (Tyler's Quarterly, post, p. 87). Near Chillicothe they visited Gen. Nathaniel Massie, founder of that town, and a relative of the Johnsons, thence went on to the Little Miami River, and finally to Cincinnati.

In 1775 Thomas had married Apharacia Hope (1751-1851) of Caroline County and she had borne him eight children, six of whom married John-sons. In 1807 Thomas with his wife and six of his children emigrated to Ohio. After spending several months near Leesburg, Highland County, they in the spring of 1809 settled near Jamestown, Greene County, where Thomas had purchased 1000 acres, lying in the Virginia Military Reserve, of Col. John Watts of Lynchburg. He acted until Watts's death as his agent for selling lands. Thomas chose not the most fertile lands, but those most rolling whose hills and springs would serve to remind him of his former home in the Virginia piedmont. In 1812 the Moormans established Seneca Meeting, near Jamestown, doubtless named for their meeting in Campbell County. Apharacia, a tiny woman, looking all the smaller beside "Big Tommy," her husband, died by injury from a needle at the age of ninety-nine years and nine months. Many of her descendants are living in Greene County and in Iowa and other western states.

For the most part the Moormans have been farmers or planters. When they have adopted a profession it has usually been that of physician. Four of the grandsons of Thomas,⁶ sons of Charles Terrell Moorman⁷ (m. Matilda Watson, 1816), Micajah F.⁸, Jesse W.⁸, Charles T.⁸ and Eli W.⁸ were doctors, the last three in Iowa. John J. Moorman, who for many years was the resident physician at the White Sulphur Springs, published in 1847 the Virginia Springs and in 1869 the Virginia White Sulphur Springs. Both publications were several times revised. Late in life their author was a medical professor in the Washington University, Baltimore. Four Moormans have been members of the Virginia House of Delegates: Achilles, 1798-1803, 1808-1809, from Campbell County; John J., 1833-1835, from Rockingham County; Samuel P. R., 1855-1856, and G. L., 1877-1880, from Bedford County. Robert Moorman⁸ (son of Robert,⁵ who was the son of Charles⁴) of Newberry, South Carolina, was a state senator, in that state, 1850-1855.

Notwithstanding their peace principles the Moormans have been well represented in our wars. Achilles, Charles, and Robert were in the Revolution. Six Greene County (Ohio) members of the family were in the War of 1812. In the Civil War there were Moormans on both sides, but, since they were a Southern family, chiefly on the Southern side. Several Moormans rendered noteworthy service in the Confederate army. Two sons of Elizabeth Moorman⁷ were killed. S. L. Moorman of the Lynchburg Home Guard was seriously wounded on May 5, 1862. Private Christopher Moorman particularly distinguished himself. Marcellus N. Moorman of Lynchburg organized the Beauregard Rifles, later Moorman's Battery, and fought valiantly throughout the war. He was a major on the staff of Stonewall Jackson and was riding beside the general when he was killed (Ackerly and Parker, post, p. 255). In addition to Marcellus N., the index to the Official Records, Army (vol. 130) mentions the following Moormans as Confederate officers, Major S. M., Capt. John B., Capt. Robert B., Capt. George, Capt. George T., and Capt. W. M.

The Virginia Moormans emigrated not only to Ohio, but to North Carolina (about 1750), South Carolina, Kentucky (Breckinridge and other counties), and other states. Many descendants of the family are now found in Missouri and Iowa. One of the Kentucky Moormans, Henry D., who served in both the Spanish-American and World war, was a representative in Congress, 1927-1929; another, Charles H., is judge of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals, 6th Circuit; and a third, Lewis Jefferson, is one of the leading Oklahoma physicians.

In this necessarily brief sketch which touches only the "high spots" one does not forget the useful lives of many inconspicuous Moormans, lived often under the privations and hardships of frontier conditions. The Moormans are a typical American family of the middle class, especially typical in their restless movement westward, lured on by the hope of bettering their fortunes.

MORTON FAMILY OF HENRICO, PRINCE EDWARD AND BRUNSWICK COUNTIES, VIRGINIA

This family of patriots has been long neglected by historians as well as by those who should be in possession of its magnificent achievements in establishing the nation.

With a view of eliciting further interest in the family heritage and adding to the membership rolls of our many patriotic societies, the following data concerning the Morton Family is respectfully submitted:

John Morton

The records of Henrico Co. Va. (Book I (1677-1692) p. 225 archives) show that John Morton married Joane Hughes, widow, in 1682.

In 1700 John Morton transferred 200 acres of land in Chickahominy Swamp to William Randolph, being 1 moiety or one half of the tract he bought of John Woodson, "where I now live." (D B 1697-1704 p. 192 Henrico 1700), also vol. 4 p. 1961 val. papers 1698.

In 1720 John Randolph of York Co. Va. transferred to Thomas Moreton, Joseph Moreton and John Moreton of Henrico planters 436 acres for 32 lbs, on South Side of white oak swamp to be divided as follows: Thomas Moreton 212 acres next to Chickahominy swamp; Joseph Moreton 112 acres next adjoining and the remaining 112 acres to John Moreton, which descended to him from his deceased Father William Randolph—(Valentine rec. vol. 3 p. 1375). In will of Capt. William Randolph, 1713—(Val. papers vol. 3, p. 1368-9), sons John and Richard are given all 3 tracts bought of John Woodson, Sam Knibbs and John Morton estimated at 900 acres on Chickahominy; son Richard the upper part and son John the lower part. In this deed William Randolph Joseph Royal Jr. and Henry Wood signs lease and release (B1719-1724 p. 36 1720).

This John Woodson is son of John Woodson who died in 1684.—Woodson's history says his wife was unknown, but he married Sarah the widow of John Brown. In 1677 (Henrico Co. rec. 1677-1692) John Woodson presented account of estate belonging to orphans of John Brown deceased, wife of said Woodson and mother of said orphans and with consent of said John this his wife Sarah Woodson shall have in her care the estate belonging to said orphans, (Abel Gower and John Clark securities.) Jeremiah Brown being of age in 1684. Temperance Batte wife of Thomas Batte (in 1688) and Solomon Knibbs (in 1704) son of Sam Knibbs all asked for, and got their portion of the late John Brown estate.

In 1681 John Woodson married orphan of Samuel Tucker (probably Mary) (p. 155). Samuel Tuckers widow married John Pleasants. Her maiden name was Jane Larcom. She died 1708. John Pleasants died 1698—(Val. papers vol. 2 p. 1078). (& W&M Q. vol. 11 p. 51).

In 1698 (Rec. 1697-1704 p. 97) John Woodson Sr. of Henrico Co. for 2000 lbs. of tobacco transferred lands to John Morton—(details not legible). John Morton had at least 3 sons as will appear from land transfers later on as follows:

Andrew Moorman, baptized November 4, 1689. Charles Moorman, son of Elizabeth (Macajah) and Thomas Moorman; was born in New Kent County, Va., 1688, and his will is recorded in Louisa Co., May 24, 1757. (Louisa Bk. 1, page 35). He married Elizabeth Reynolds, daughter of Christopher Reynolds, who was born in 1690, and whose will was recorded May 11, 1765. (Louisa W.B. 1, p. 68) They settled in Green Springs, Va., where he was Justice of the Peace. They were Quakers, but owned slaves. Charles Moorman and his eldest son, Thomas, were overseers of the Friends; they had extensive possessions on the Moorman River, named in their honor. (Colonial Virginians, by C. J. F. Barnhill, p. 126) It is said that Charles Moorman was 15 years of age when he married the 13-year old Elizabeth, who was 15 when their son Thomas was born (Colonial Virginians, by C. J. T. Barnhill).

- Charles Moorman, son of Elizabeth (Reynolds) and Charles Moorman, born 1715 in Louisa County. His will was recorded there on Oct. 12, 1778. (Bk. 2, pp. 432 etc.) He was a devout Quaker, but was dropped from Meeting for "marrying out of unity, and by a priest" ca. 1736. Mary Adams, daughter of Mourning (Lewis?) and Robert Adams, who died after 1778. Robert Adams served as an officer in the Revolution, from Bedford County, Va. (Gwathmey, p. 3)
- In Campbell Co., Va., there are 28 interesting documents signed by Charles Moorman freeing his 28 slaves: "I, Charles Moorman, of Louisa Co., Va., from mature consideration and the conviction of my own mind being fully persuaded that freedom is the natural right of all mankind, and that no law, moral or divine, has given me a right to or property in the person of any of my fellow creatures and being desirous in fulfilling the injunction of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, by doing to others as I would be done by, do therefore declare that having under my care a negro man named JACK, aged about fifty years, I do for myself and heirs, Executors and Administrators, hereby release unto him, the said JACK, all my right, interest, claim or pretention of claim whatsoever to his person claiming for by from or under me. In writing I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 28th day of 5th month 1778. Signed Charles Moorman". (Campbell Co. Court Records, D. B. 11, p. 418)

MOORMAN of VIRGINIA

The Moorman family is purely Saxon, of English extraction. The name is derived from the Moors-as the prairies of that country are called - that is Man of the Moors, or Moorman, taken from the derivation of English names by the highest authority. The derivation of most names is from a place or occupation. A certified copy of the heraldry of this family may be obtained from the Royal Heraldic Office in London. The motto of the Coat of Arms of the Moorman family is "Esse Quam Ridero", which, translated, means "To be, not seem to be". The name on the Coat of Arms is spelled as it is today, Moorman. (Chronicles of Campbell County, Va., by Ruth M. Early; also from London research).

Zachariah Moorman, the American immigrant of this name, was born in Isle of Wight, England, in 1620. At the age of 19 he joined the British Army and became a Captain in Cromwell's Army in the invasion of Ireland, where he lived for a few years, and, in 1646, married Mary Candler, the daughter of William Candler, a Lieutenant in Cromwell's Army, who had been granted estates in Ireland. Zachariah Moorman returned to Isle of Wight, England, but being a sympathizer of Charles II, became an enemy of Cromwell. In the spring of 1669, Zachariah Moorman with his children and son-in-law, Micajah Clark, embarked at Southampton, England, in the ship Glasgow, and sailed to the Barbadoes Islands in the West Indies. Early in the next spring (1670) they joined the immigrants who sailed for South Carolina, landing near the site of Charleston, where the first permanent colony was being formed.

The Pension Records, War Dept., Revolutionary War, Richmond, Va., shows that "Charles Moorman, a Captain in Washington's Army, died in Bedford Co., Va., 15 miles from Lynchburg, Va., from the effects of a wound received at the Battle of Guilford Court House", which was fought March 15, 1781. Charles⁴ Moorman, b. 1715, d. before 10-12-1778, m. Mary Adams. It is this Charles Moorman whose date of death coincides with the Revolution, and his father-in-law, Robert Adams, served in the Revolution as an officer from Bedford Co. (Gwathmay, p. 3)

Charles Moorman, Achilles Moorman, Zachariah Moorman, William Moorman furnished supplies during the Revolution - listed August 7, 1783. (Campbell Co. Commissioner's Report) Achilles Moorman furnished supplies during the Revolution - listed Sept. 8 to Nov. 30, 1781; Bedford County Commissioner's Report.

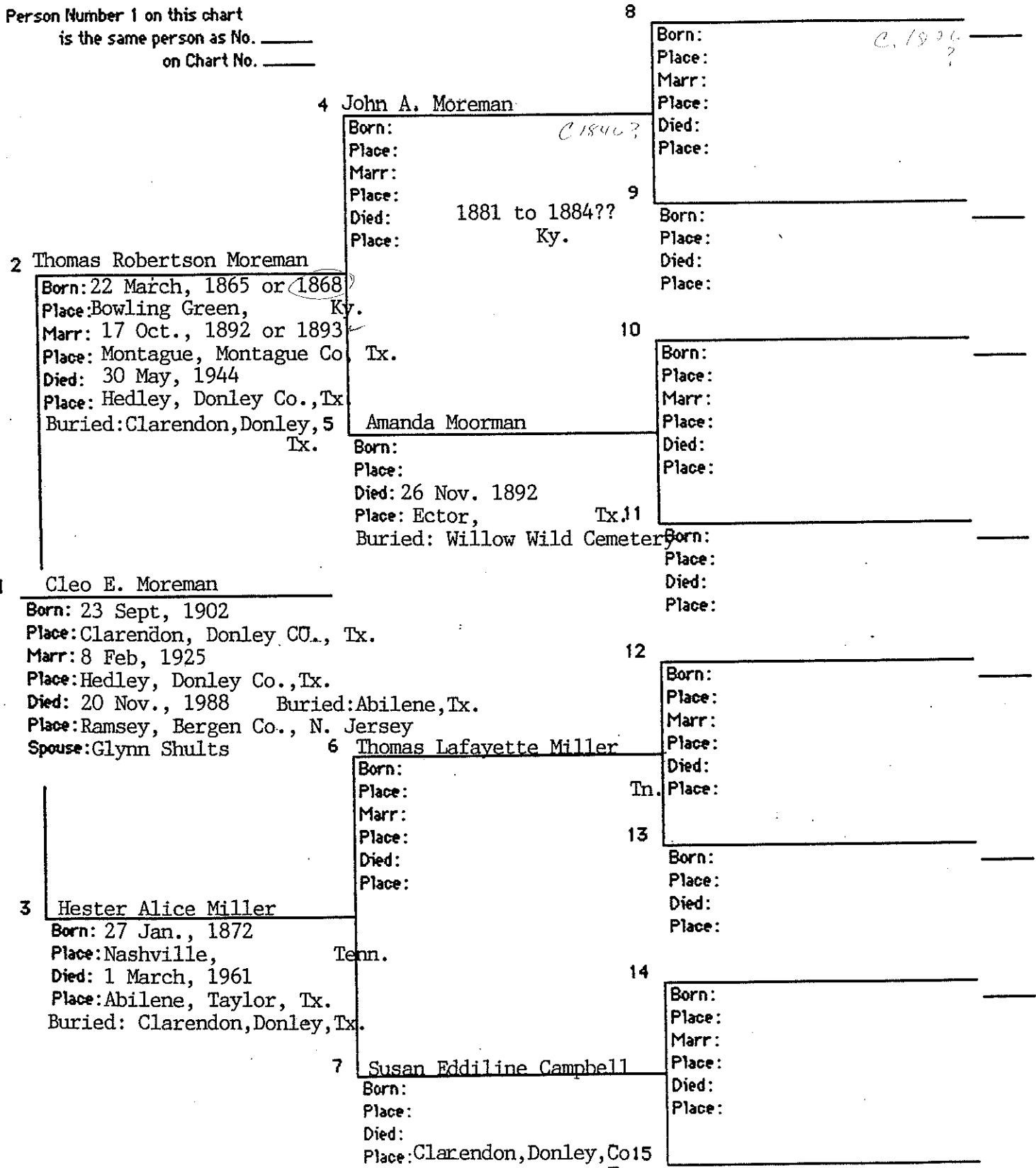
Three Charles³ Moorman's (son and nephews of Charles⁴ Moorman) lived during the Revolution, but their dates of death do not coincide with that of Charles Moorman who died from effect of wounds received at Guilford Court House - such as (b. 1747 - d. 1804) (b. 173 - d. 1798); (b. 1746, d. 1803, son of Charles⁴ Moorman).

In the name of God amen. I, John Moorman of Warren County Kentucky, being in a low state of health but of sound mind and disposing memory and knowing that its appointed unto all men once to die and after death to judgment.

Item 1: I will and bequeath unto my beloved wife Nancy Moorman the following slaves towit: Geoge Senr, David, Dick, George Jr, Sarah, Suky, and a negro boy named Jefferson. All my stock of horses, cattle, sheep and hogs, household & kitchen furniture during her natural like but if she should marry she is only to have one third of the above property. Also the tract of land I now live on I will to my wife during her natural life or widowhood.

Item 2: I will and bequeath unto my daughter Jane one negro girl by the name of Patsy and Harriet and if the said negro girl Harriet as she is afflicted should in six years die my said daughter is to receive in lieu of her, two hundred dollars, also at the death of her mother I will to my said daughter my negro woman Sarah also my riding mare Fan, her saddle and bridle, a good bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever.

Item 3: I will and bequeath unto my son John R Moorman one negro boy by the name of Ambrose together with the stock he has received from me, a bed and furniture now in his possession, also about \$300 in money paid him, also a horse, saddle and bridle heretofore furnished him.

Item 4: I will and bequeath to my son Thomas Moorman one negro boy by the name of Chalres also a horse saddle and birdle that he has now in his possession a good bed and furniture also at his mother's death I give and bequeath to him my negro man George Jr. to him and his heirs forever.

Item 5: I will and bequeath to my son James Moorman a negro girl by the name of Mary a horse saddle and bridle a good bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever.

Item 6: I will and bequeath unto Ann Elizabeth Moorman two negro girls by name Judah and Lucrecy a horse saddle and bridge a good bed and furniutre to her and her heirs forever.

Item 7: I will and bequeath unto my son Lewis Moorman one negro by name of Nathan a horse saddle and bridle, a good bed and furniture and the tract of land whereon I now live after his mother's death unless she sould marry and in that case as soon as she shall marry he shall have possession of all except dhis mother's dower in said land and has the privilege of building on and improving the same to his and his heirs forer.

Item 8: My will and desire is that my executors hereafter named shall sell for the best price they can obtain on two years credit all my other lands and the money equally divided between my sons John R Moorman, Thomas Moorman and James Moorman.

Item 9: My wish is thatt all my just debts be paid out of the money now due me and that the ballance be for the benefit of my wife.

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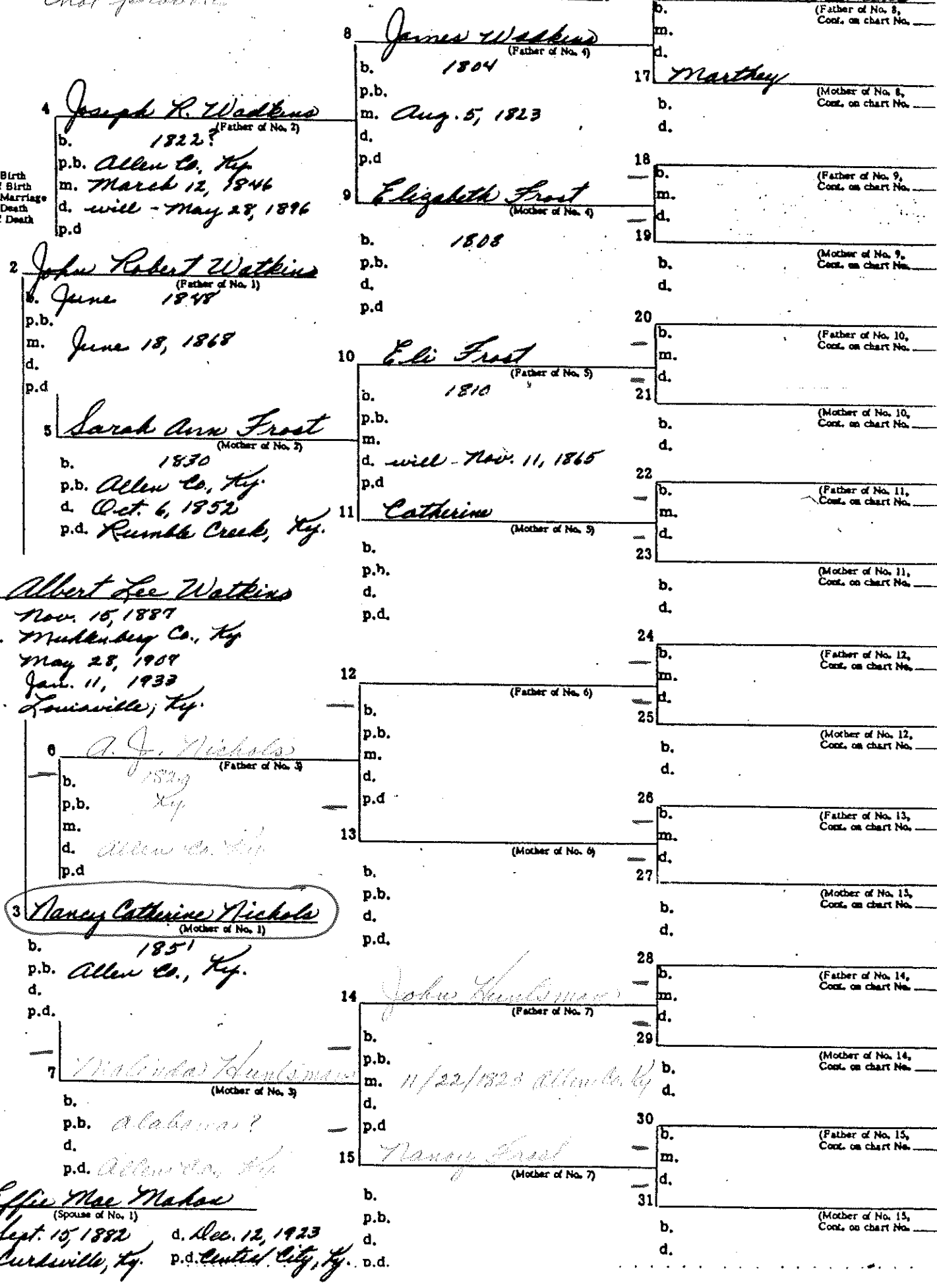

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NOTES ON THE GRIDER FAMILY COMPILED BY LAURA CHAPEZE OWEN

The Griders were Swiss and emigrated from Switzerland in 1716. (See Ruppel's History of Lancaster County, Pa., page 116.) The name was spelled in Switzerland "Kreuzer". They came over on the Princess and landed at Philadelphia. The William Penn Company gave them land in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, where they settled. Many persons of the same name live there today. One branch of the family were Moravians who by their faith were non-combatants and adhered to the Commandment, "Thou shalt not kill". For this belief they were imprisoned and sorely taxed for refusing to fight during the Revolution. Another branch of the family believed to serve God one must defend his country. From this branch we are descended. My grandfather, Col Henry Grider, made out our genealogy and on the Grider side he wrote that we were Swiss for I have seen it with my own eyes but these papers have been lost many years.

Henry Grider, Sr., (my great grandfather) entered the Revolutionary War at the age of 17 years and was in his first engagement at the mouth of the Big Kanawah, where the strife lasted from the rising to the setting of the sun. He was in the Battle of Blue Lick and served in the campaigns of Wayne, McIntosh, Scott and Clark (see "Year Book of the Sons of the Revolution for 1895"). He was a private in the company of Captain Benjamin Harrison, Gen. Lewis' Regiment of State ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ (Virginia) Troops in 1774. In 1778 he was Sergeant in the Company of Captain Craven, Lieutenant Colonel George Trout, Virginia State Troops. Mr. Warner Lewis Underwood said that Captain Henry Grider was the finest specimen of a man he ever saw. He was tall, standing six feet, two inches, in his stocking feet, and weighed 210 pounds. He was almost a giant in strength. He was well educated for his day and was a most entertaining talker.

Henry Grider, Sr. went to Culpepper County, Virginia, to live after the Revolution and married Elizabeth Smith of that County whose family were of excellent social position in Virginia. She was a sister of Mr. Jesse Smith of Danville, Kentucky, who was the father of Dr. Joseph Smith and Mrs. Gill. Another brother, Abram Smith of Mercer County, Kentucky, was the father of Mrs. Joanna McCann and Mrs. Dudley Bowman.

The oldest daughter of Captain Henry Grider, Sr., and Elizabeth Smith Grider, was Anna, named for her mother's sister Ann Smith, who married Ambrose Barlow of Culpepper County, Virginia. Anna Grider first married a Mr. Mitchell. Her son, Albert Mitchell, was the great grandfather of Louise Carson Drake. Her second husband was Mr. Boone and she had several Boone children. My mother, Rachel Ann Grider Chapeze, always called her "Aunt Boone" and was named for her.

Friday, Feb. 9th, 1874, at the Warehead House, Bowling Green, where we were boarding at the time.

Judge Loving Grider died in Kansas City, Mo., at 12:30 A. M., Wednesday Morning, Sept. 29th, 1897. His body was brought to the home of his birth, Bowling Green, Ky., and was buried on Saturday, Oct. 1st, with Masonic Honors, in Fair View Cemetery.

Col. Ben C. Grider was a graduate of the old Transylvania College, Lexington, Ky. He studied law in the office of his father Hon. Henry Grider, and Judge Wm. V. Loving, who were then partners, the firm being known as "Grider & Loving." Some years afterward, when Col. Henry Grider went into politics, and was elected to Congress, he withdrew from the firm, Judge Loving moved to Louisville, after the war. Altho devoted to his profession, in which he was eminently successful he took an active interest in politics, and his eloquent and fearless voice was often heard over the State. One of the news papers of the State paid him this tribute: "At the commencement of the stormy times of 1860-61, he was the unquestioned head of the Bar in Southern Kentucky, and the most towering figure of the younger politicians. He had fixed upon himself the admiring gaze and the earnest affection of his fellow citizens everywhere." He was a man of indomitable will and unquailing courage. All who knew him, testified to his rare legal attainments, and his remarkable capabilities. He was a profound thinker, an accurate logician and a powerful orator. I never knew anyone of stronger affections or more generous impulses. Shortly after the battle of Manassas, he determined to enter the Army, with the soldiers of the Union. At Columbus, Ky., (Adair Co.) he organized the 9th Regiment and was Chosen its Colonel. Date of his commission, Nov. 11th, 1861, signed by Gov. B. Magoffin. His Regiment was assigned 3rd Division, (Crittendens) Left Wing, 14th Army Corps, First Brigade. He led his regiment thru many hotly contested fields. At the battle of Shilo he was at the head of his men, and had a horse killed under him. After the battle at Stone River, and when he had been commissioned a Brigadier General, he resigned his Commission, and returned to Bowling Green, Ky., and resumed the practice of his profession in which he was successfully engaged at the time of his death, age 46.

In September we sent our two boys (our only children at the time) to the University of Nashville, Tenn. We were living on our farm near Bowling Green, and as Mr. Grider's professional duties kept him away from home, it was not only lonely, but unsafe for us to be left alone, so we posted it out, and boarded at the Warehead House, where Mr. Grider died, after a short illness of congestion of the vital organs, Friday night, Feb. 9th, 1872, and was buried in Fair View Cemetery. He was a member of the Methodist Church, a Mason and an Odd Fellow. Mr. Grider was nearly six feet tall, very erect, hair light and his eyes a peculiar blending of gray and blue. His forehead was very high and broad.

Judge Loving Grider, (son of Col. B. C. Grider) who died in Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 29th, 1897, was really named for Judge William Voltair Loving, and his name is so written in the family bible. When a baby he was called the "Little Judge". As he grew older the adjective was dropped, and he was called by everyone "Judge". When he was 15 or 16 years old he was baptized by Bishop G. U. Dudley in the Episcopal Church, Bowling Green, and having never been called by any other name than Judge, he refused to give it up, and was so baptized. He attended for a short time the University of Nashville, but his health not being good, he came home and went to the local college, Afterwards he entered the college at Georgetown, Ky., where he later graduated. He attended the Lebanon, Tenn. Law School, where he graduated with distinction. Judge Casuthers, the Chancellor of the Law School, said of him that he had the finest legal mind he had ever taught. In Oct 1883 he left Kentucky for the West, and located at Wellington, Summer County, Kansas, and soon became one of the leading lawyers of that section. He was Prosecuting Attorney for the County, and was Delegate at Large from the State to the Chicago Convention when Grover Cleveland received his second nomination for the Presidency. In 1890 he was the Democratic candidate for Congress from the 3rd District of Kansas, and altho it was a hopeless race, the district being largely Republican, he made a great campaign. In 1892 Judge Grider went to Kansas City, Mo., and entered upon the practice of his profession with success, and at the time of his death was recognized as occupying a high rank among the many able lawyers in that city. "He was an advocate of power, and an orator with no superior at this bar." He possessed the grace of an orator to an extent allowed by Fortune to very few men, and his oratory was not only polished, but commanding and impressive. Pages could be filled with such extracts from "The Kansas City Bar Monthly." He was a member of the Bar Association, A Mason, a Son of the Revolution, and a loving and affectionate son to his mother.

Capt. Henry Grider, Sr., died in Warren County, Ky., in 1844, in the 88th year of his age, at the residence of his son, Mr. John Grider. Capt. Grider was a native of Lancaster County, Pa. He was born May 9th, 1755, and moved with his father's family about the year 1770 to Virginia, where he lived till 1781, when came to Kentucky, and settled at Fisher's Station, near where Danville is now situated. Here he lived till 1799, when he moved to Warren County, where he died. He was married in August 1782 to Miss Elizabeth Smith, (Betty) a sister of the venerable Mr. Jesse Smith, of Danville, who survives him. Having united their destinies to climb the hill of life together, they traveled harmoniously, hand in hand, on its declining steep, until the silver cord being broken, they will soon sleep together at its base. Capt. Grider's was a long, laborious, eventful and perilous life. He seemed born for the times in which he lived. Of a noble and commanding stature, and firm and athletic frame, he was peculiarly fitted to encounter those eventful scenes thru which it was his destiny and glory to pass. One had but to see him to feel that he was in the presence of a noble order of his species. And even in the ruin which age had stamped upon him, he still seemed the venerable monument of the manly forms and noble souls of a past and gone generation; he often stood forth a soldier to battle for his country. He was in his first engagement when about 19 years old, at the mouth of the Big Kanawha, in 1774, where the battle strife lasted from the 'rising till the setting sun.' He was in the battle of the Blue Licks, where he received an injury from which he never recovered. He served in the various and eventful campaigns of Wayne, Harmer, McIntosh, Scott and Clark. And even in the last war, tho exempted by age and the injury received in the service of his country, he again rallied with his countrymen around her standard, and served in Hopkins Campaign. He was no sunshine soldier; he loved his country in gloom or glory, and altho a Christian and prepared to depart and be at rest, still his soul seemed to linger and dwell upon the country he loved and fought to acquire and defend; the flame of his patriotism was bright to the last. In the social relations of life he was a kind husband, father and friend. He was a man of high quick and generous sensibilities; reared in the school of adversity and in times of peril, he was devoid of the feelings of selfishness, ever ready to defend, protect and relieve the distressed and unfortunate. Every appeal met a generous response in his bosom. Lastly, he was a Christian, and the personification of honesty and uprightness. Upwards of 50 years ago he joined the Presbyterian Church, under the ministry of the Rev. Rice, at Cane Run, near Danville, of which he remained a member till the formation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, which he joined and remained a member till he died. For some years previous to his death he had been deprived of his sight, but in the main, was cheerful and social. His was an illness of some weeks, but conscious of his approaching dissolution, and happy under the hopes and consolations of a glorious immortality, death had no terrors for him. Like a Christian and Philosopher, he gave a parting word of consola-

tion and advice to the partner of his bosom and companion of his many toilsome years; then his soul to its flight to the Paradise of God! Reader: May your life and mind be as honest, upright and useful, and your death as triumphant and happy as that of the subject of this notice.
