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# Nous realized SYMPOSIUM

"All Our Egos In One Basket: It's Not What You Say; It's How You Say It" was the title of the Symposium presented by Barbara Trombley, consumer consultant for the American Heritage Dictionary Division of Houghton Mifflin Co. Miss Trombley spoke on the importance of communication through language, stressing it as woman's most important tool in working towards equality.

"Women have been taught," she said, "that obscure communication is our function in life,

that we are somehow meant to be tactful rather than honest, retiring rather than forthright, evasive rather than detailed and explicit."

In communicating, it is necessary to understand the other person's frame of reference, she emphasized. "If I try to explain to my mother that I find fulfillment in having a career, I need to keep in mind that to her fulfillment means being in the home. If one discusses profamity with a Sioux Indian, one must understand there are no vulgar slang terms in that language."

One of the basic blocks to communication for most women is their lack of self confidence and their constant fear of being ridiculed.

"The financial realities of our age, the need for self-fullfillment through involvement in the wider world have brought men and women together in business."

From the reception on Friday evening, through the Saturday morning Workshops, the Luncheon Saturday at noon, the Saturday evening Banquet, the Sunday morning Worship services, and concluding with a Sunday morning Breakfast all members who had the opportunity to attend had an enjoyable weekend in the South!
