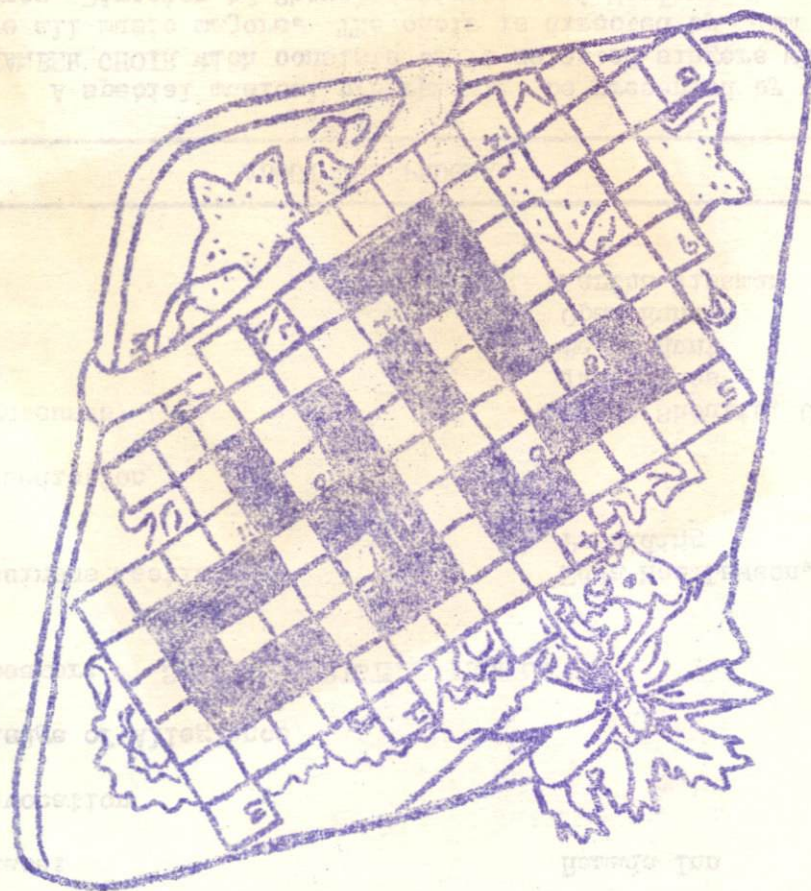

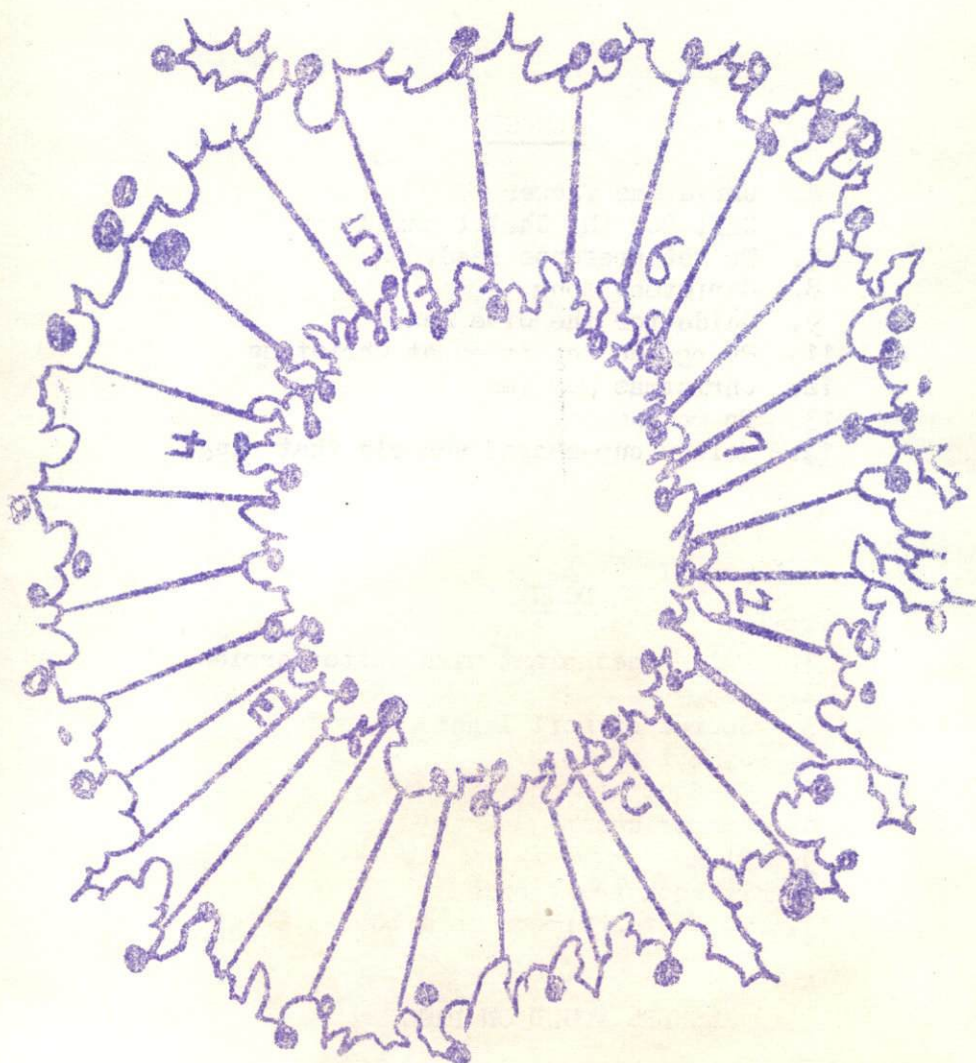

SPARKLING CHRISTMAS PUNCH

- 2 10-ounce package frozen sweetened strawberries
- 1 6-ounce can frozen lemonade concentrate
- 1 4/5-quart bottle rose¹ wine, chilled
- 2 28-ounce bottles ginger ale, chilled
- 1 28-ounce bottle club soda, chilled
- 2 trays ice cubes
- 1/2 cup sugar
- orange slices for garnish

ABOUT 10 MINUTES BEFORE SERVING:

In covered blender container with blender at high speed, blend strawberries and undiluted lemonade concentrate until well blended. Pour strawberry mixture into a chilled large punch bowl. Add wine and remaining ingredients except orange slices; stir punch until sugar is completely dissolved. Garnish punch with orange slices. Makes 18 cups or thirty-six $\frac{1}{2}$ -cup servings.

MEMBERSHIP: As your newly appointed Membership Chairwoman, I extend the opportunity to each member to sponsor two . . plus . . plus during our 1976 Bicentennial.

How? Submit name, address, firm, occupation and telephone to me.

You know we ALL can talk ABWA to prospective members but their names must be approved by the membership committee before you ask them to be a member. New members must meet the eligibility requirements of ABWA. The national By-Laws Article VI, Section 1. Membership in this Association shall be by invitation only and shall be for life, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws. It shall be limited to women who are gainfully employed in business at the time they accept membership and who are of good moral character. Membership shall include women owning or operating their own businesses, women in professions, women in the employ of any state or federal government or unit thereof including a municipality or county, or other public corporation, women employed by educational institutions, whether public or private, and women employed by charitable or religious institutions.

We must enroll ten members to complete #12 toward the Standard of Achievement.

TORCHBEARER-FRIENDSHIP-EXPANSION: The National Association has approved for a new chapter here in Bowling Green.

MERRY CHRISTMAS AND HAPPY NEW YEAR

E G G N O G R I N G

- 1 package (3 oz.) Jell-O, Lemon Flavor
- 1 cup boiling water
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cold water
- $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon rum extract (optional)
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup canned eggnog
- 1 can (11 oz.) mandarin orange sections
- 1 can (8 oz.) pear halves *
- 1 package (3 oz.) Jell-O, Cherry or Raspberry
- 1 cup boiling water
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups pecans (optional)

1. Dissolve lemon flavor gelatin in 1 cup boiling water. Add $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cold water and extract. Measure $\frac{3}{4}$ cup gelatin, add eggnog.
2. Pour into a 6-cup ring mold. Chill until set but not firm, about 25 minutes. Drain fruits, measuring syrup. Add water to syrup to make $\frac{3}{4}$ cup. Dice the pears.
3. Dissolve cherry gelatin in 1 cup boiling water, add measured liquid and the remaining lemon gelatin. Chill until thickened. Add pears and spoon into mold over eggnog-gelatin mixture.
4. Arrange oranges in gelatin near edge of mold, pressing down lightly. Chill until firm, about 4 hours. **Unmold. Garnish with maraschino cherries, if desired. For an attractive addition fill center with $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups pecans. Makes $5\frac{1}{2}$ cups or 10 servings.

*Or use $\frac{1}{2}$ cup seeded halved green grapes.

**To unmold, dip mold just to the rim in warm water. Loosen gelatin at edge of mold with fingertips. Shake gently, place moistened plate over mold and invert. Lift off mold.
