

Chat With Chair

The past academic year has been filled with change for the University. Changes within the institution have lead to a number of changes within the Department. To illustrate, the "New Levels" document approved by the Board of Regents provided the basis for three significant pieces of work in the Department.

First, members of the faculty representing each specialization developed comprehensive plans for a "senior assessment" process to be implemented Fall 1996. This will provide a benchmark in the assessment of concepts and understandings we believe each graduating major should have attained. It provides another way to look at the curriculum for each program through the measurement of those skills and concepts students possess at graduation.

The second faculty activity involved an analysis of the ways new technologies are utilized in the education of our students. The analysis provides a basis for even greater development of new technologies in the instruction of our students. The computer laboratory and expanding use of new software programs are being complemented by the addition of multimedia packages that will allow the faculty to also utilize compact discs in the classroom.

Third, faculty members in each program developed a "quality assurance" statement which spells out the qualities we believe our graduates possess. This provides the prospective employer with the assurance that students meet basic standards. This parallels the earlier quality assurance program implemented in the teacher education programs here at Western Kentucky University.

The Department of Consumer and Family Sciences at Western is striving to provide leadership for our students as well as within the University Community as we implement these new levels defined by the President for the Institution. The face of education is changing rapidly and it is our responsibility to provide our students with the best education possible.

Faculty Awards and Recognition

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
