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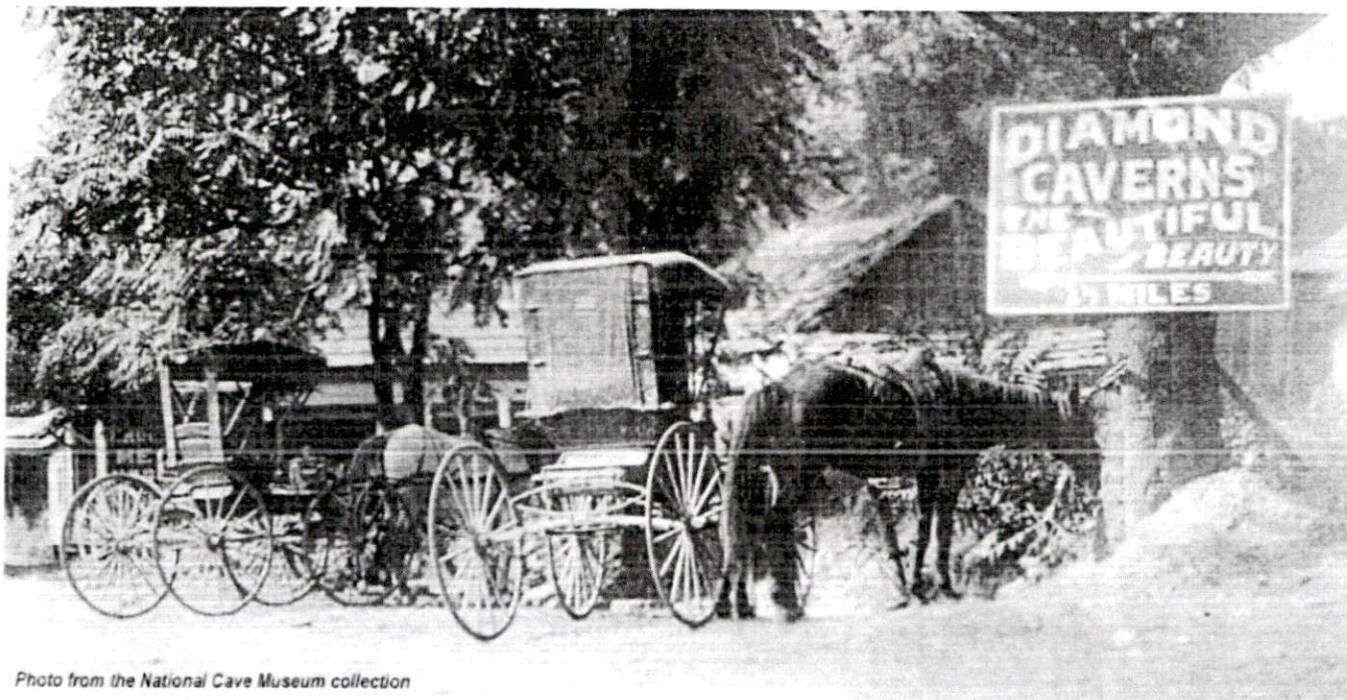

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### ON THE COVER

"In 1811 storm clouds of war were gathering over unresolved territorial issues from the Revolutionary War. A junction of several stagecoach roads in south central Kentucky was intersected by a road that led eight miles away to Flatt's Cave. The British embargo of American ports led to a shortage and inflated price of saltpeter. The dry sediments in Flatt's Cave, soon named 'Mammoth Cave' were a valued source of saltpeter (potassium nitrate), necessary for the production of gunpowder.

One and a half miles north of the road junction, named Three Forks, saltpeter was also being mined in Short Cave and nearby Long Cave, on the west side of a long deep sinkhole valley. Underneath this valley, and undiscovered at this time, was a beautiful cave that later became known as Diamond Caverns.

"By 1859, Three Forks was a sleepy village with 75 inhabitants. It was universally known as Bell's Tavern for the town's famous hotel, and was the departure point for the eight mile trip to Mammoth Cave. Most people of means stayed at Bell's Tavern, revered for its world famous attraction. One and a half miles north of Bells's Tavern, very near the road to Mammoth Cave, a slave of landowner Jesssie Coats discovered a pit in the rocky bottom of the valley on July 14, 1859. Lowered on a rope into the cave, this first visitor thought sparkling calcite formations resembled diamonds, and the name for the cave was born.

"The next day, a survey team entered the cave, descending rope ladders to assess the new discovery. Steps were built into the Rotunda and beyond, and a building was constructed to protect the entrance. The cave has remained remarkably pristine because of the conservation efforts that occurred immediately after the cave was discovered.

"A newspaper article in the Louisville Daily Courier from August 19, 1859 describes the discovery and early history of the cave, referring to it as 'Richardson Cave', named for one of the original explorers. After a month of work developing the cave for tours, on August 19, 1859 the Kenedy Bridal Party was the first to enjoy the newly opened show cave. Except for short periods during the Civil War, the cave has been shown as an attraction for over 147 years.

"In 1854 the Louisville and Nashville Railroad reached Three Forks. A branch line was laid to the nearby town of Glasgow. Thereafter, the town was named Glasgow Junction, and much more recently, Park City."

Moyer Enterprises purchased the Diamond Caverns Resort in 1982 with ownership later transferred to an investor group as a private membership resort. In 1993, Ronald C. Eken and his Corporation purchased it and a nearby campground named Cedar Hills. Also purchased at this time was an adjacent 18 hole golf course called Park Place. Diamond Caverns is presently owned by Gary and Susan Berdeaux, Larry and Mayo McCarty, Roger and Carol McClure, Stanley and Kay Sides, and Gordon and Judy Smith. ### WHO WAS ANN ALEXANDER LEWIS?

We'll get a personal look at Ann from her obituary written January 16, 1835. This appeared in the Christian Advocate and Journal (New York, NY) and is supposedly written by her husband, Thomas Dickson. My thanks to Chris Thornsberry, a descendant, who provided information.

"Departed this life, in great peace, on the 1<sup>st</sup> inst., Mrs. Ann A. Davison, consort of T. D. Davison. She was born April 11, 1787, and was the daughter of Capt. Fielding Lewis, of Fairfax County, Va. She lost her mother, when young, and was taken and partly raised by her grandmother, who was one of the excellent of the earth., viz. Mrs. F. Lewis, of Fredericksburg, Va., and sister of Gen. George Washington, long since gone to the haven of eternal rest, who imbued her tender mind with useful lessons of morality and religion. She however afterward yielded to the temptations of a vain and faltering world in a circle of gaudy fashions, worldly pleasures, and amusements. She was united in wedlock in 1808 to him who is left to mourn the loss of an affectionate companion, with two sons to feel and mourn the loss of a kind and tender mother. She was diligent in housewifery, "laying her hands to the spindle and distaff." Her life was practical comment on the 31<sup>st</sup> chapter of Proverbs, beginning in the 10<sup>th</sup> verse. In the year 1810 she gave in a satisfactory experience of religion to the Baptist Church, was baptized, and joined that people. She continued in full fellowship with the aforesaid Church, which imagines a doubtful experience, as to the new birth, the surest and safest sign of an inward change – Blessed be God, she did not rest satisfied with this kind of imaginary religion. She earnest sought a deeper work of grace in her heart in the silent grove. God heard and answered to the great joy of her heart – at which time she made the woods around her ring with loud shouts and acclamations of praise to God and the Lamb. From that time till her death she uniformly bore testimony that religion was not imaginary, no, nor a doubtful something, but a living principle in the soul. Her companion, having experienced the life of God in his soul, in the year 1821 united with the M. E. Church, she some after followed his example.

"The deceased died of cancer in her left breast. She was confined to her bed nearly four months – during which time she often suffered excruciating pains, particularly after applying corrosive medicines. She was highly favored, however, with the consolation of the Holy Ghost, which caused her cup to overflow, so that she would clap her hands and rejoice aloud, and when speechless smiled several times as heaven presented its glories to her enraptured vision, beckoning her to come. It is therefore with mingled feelings of sorrow and joy that her companion records her death. He mourns her departure, but rejoices that her sufferings are at an end, and that she is gone to endless happiness to sing and shout the hallelujahs of heaven to Him who loved her, and washed her in his own blood, to whom be glory, now, and forever more. Amen. T. D." Glasgow, Ky. Nov. 15."

In looking at Ann's family tree we can get a better idea of her background.

Ann was born April 11, 1787 in Fairfax County, VA as noted, the daughter of Fielding Lewis, Jr. and Nancy Ann Alexander. Her mother died about 1788 in Fairfax County when Ann was only one year old. Her father, Captain Fielding Lewis, Jr was born 14 February 1751 in Fredericksburg, Fredericksburg, VA and died July 5, 1803 in Fairfax County, VA. Their children included: Elizabeth Alexander Lewis (1772-1836), Fielding Augustine Lewis (1774-1775), Charles Alexander Lewis (1775-1829), George Warner Lewis (1777-1794), Dr. John Augustine Lewis (1778-1842), Robert Alexander



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Lewis (1782-1842), John Washington Lewis (1785-1814), Nancy Ann Lewis (1787-1835), Catherine Dade Lewis (1790-1852) and Lucinda Elizabeth Lewis (1793-1827).

Captain Fielding Lewis, Jr. was the son of Colonel Fielding Lewis, Sr. and Elizabeth Washington. He was a Revolutionary War soldier.

Elizabeth Washington was born June 20, 1722 in Popes Creek, Westmoreland, Virginia and died March 31, 1797 in Culpeper, Culpeper, VA. She and Col. Fielding Lewis were married May 7, 1750 in Fredericksburg, VA. Their children included: Capt. Fielding Lewis, Jr., Augustine Lewis, Warner Lewis, Maj. George Washington Lewis, Mary Lewis, Charles Lewis, Samuel Lewis, Elizabeth Lewis, Maj. Lawrence Lewis, Robert Lewis and Howell Lewis.

Elizabeth Washington was the daughter of Capt. Lawrence Augustine Washington, Jr. and Mary Ann Ball. Her father was born in 1695 in Bridges Creek, Westmoreland, VA; died April 12, 1743 at King George, King George, VA. His second wife was Mary Ann Ball (1708-1789) and by her had: Lt. General President George Eskridge Washington (1732-1799), Elizabeth, Samuel Washington (1734-1781), John Augustine Washington (1736-1787) and Colonel Charles Washington (1738-1799).

Ann Alexander Lewis married Thomas Davison January 29, 1808 in Glasgow, KY. He was born in 1784 and died in 1854. They had: a son born 1804 -, Mariah Davison (1810-1833), Herndon Davison (1812-1869), Washington Davison (1818-1835) and William Davison (1818-1865). Thomas Davison was born April 11, 1784 in County Antrim(?), Ireland; his parents are unknown.

Ann's family line is authenticated by the George Washington Foundation and the DAR.

Ann and Thomas are buried at the Davison Cemetery in Barren County. Her stone is not listed at the cemetery but was found in 2015 by Georgette Lee of Glasgow. Ann is also known as Nancy Ann Alexander Davison.





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### SHERIFF'S SALE FOR TAXES IN 1890

### THE HALLOWED MURRAY PICNIC GROUNDS

Article from the *Glasgow Daily Times*, November 14, 1965 and re-told in UrbanLegendsofBarrenCo.

“The hallowed Murray Picnic grounds were located about 4 miles out of town, a skip and a hop of the Bowling Green Road, near the trestle bridge of the Glasgow Branch RR, and quite near the historic Creek’s (Staples, Denton, Crenshaw, etc.) mill. The Murry Picnic grounds were a traditional affair that the children never forgot, that brings a smile and a warm glow to the eyes of the elders of today (1965). When ‘Old Reb,’ J. A. Murray, got through making his last stand for the Lost Cause, he buried his bitterness and came to Glasgow to ‘brighten the corner where he was,’ especially as far as the town’s children were concerned. Having none of his own, he became a spare daddy to them all.



“Each summer, whenever the mood struck him, he gave picnics for everybody’s children, at his own expense. A small fee sufficed for those who wanted to pay. First, ‘through the grapevine,’ the word spread that a Murray picnic would be held at a certain date and time. On the momentous date, he secured a wagonette from the livery stable, circled every street and gathered up the wee ones from their homes, no matter how humble, with music to herald his approach, so they would be ready and waiting. The older ones gathered on a corner of the Square.

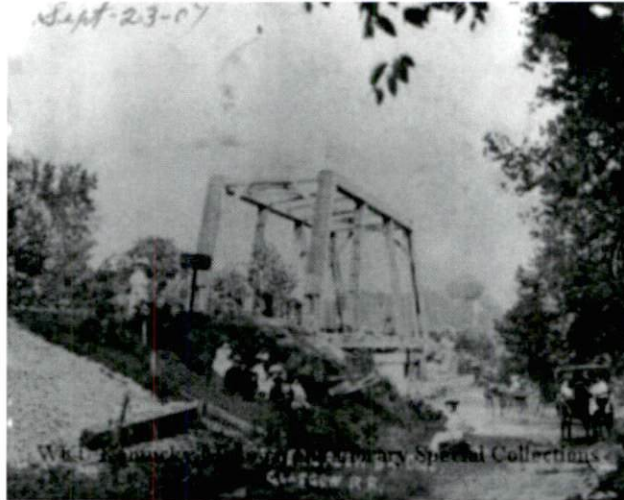

“Then, there was the grand march to the depot of the Glasgow RR for those large enough to look out for themselves, while the small fry road in the wagonette, load after load until they were all there. They were loaded in freight cars, for safekeeping, which ‘Old Reb’ personally locked from the outside. And it should be noted that there was never an accident or a child injured – although at time there were as many as the freight cars, loaded to standing room only.

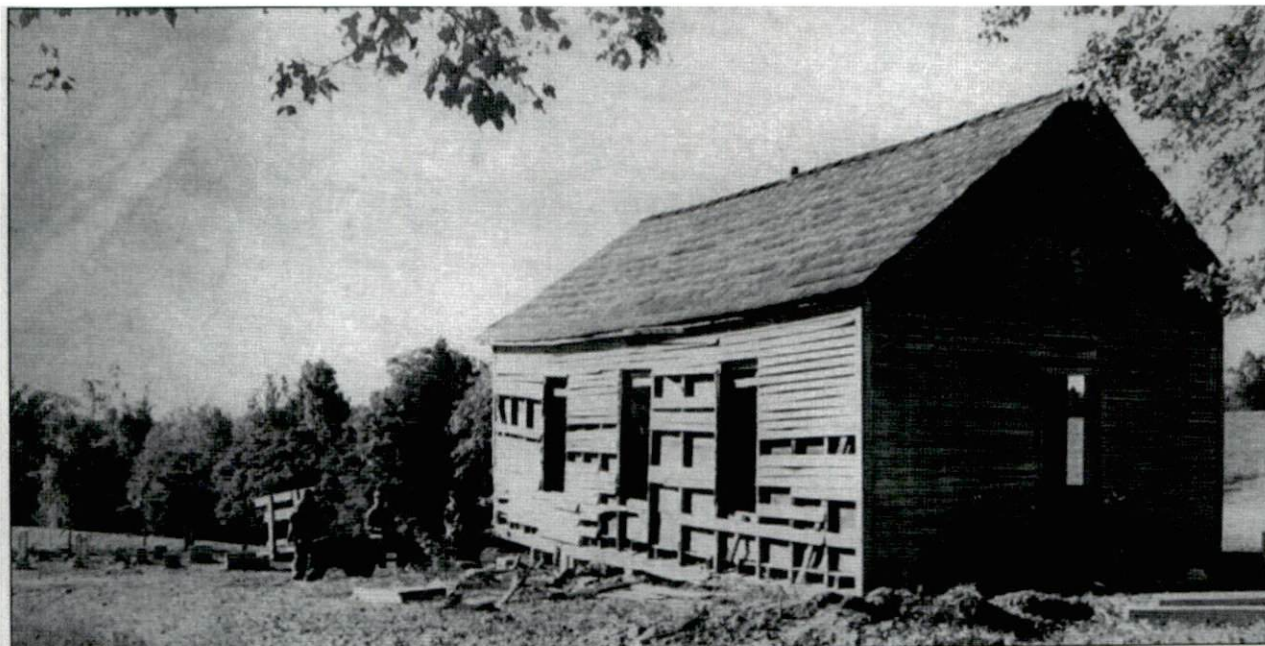
“With smoke belching, bells clanging and whistles shrilling, the little train was off to the hallowed grounds. Once there, the day was spent in games, contests with prizes, culminating with plenty of food washed down with ‘pink lemonade made in the shade.’

“Succeeding generations with all the advantages progress has brought them, have lost the way to this ‘Never-Never Land,’ perhaps because there was no Pied Piper go lead them. Few would know how to start to find their way to what remains of it.”

### THE LOST CHURCH

Barren County has lost another of its historical landmarks. This was an old African-American church named Slaytonfield - also called Statonfield. The photo here is taken from "Images of America, Barren County" by Nancy Richey and the Kentucky Library. published 2010 by Arcadia Press. She notes:

"LOST CHURCH. The Slaytonfield or Statonfield Baptist Church in Bewleytown is almost lost to time and the elements. The African American church is located near the Barren River Lake area and was constituted by freed slaves after the Civil War on land donated to them by Elijah Slayton. Nearby is a cemetery where African American Civil War soldier Daniel Whitney is buried. (Photo courtesy Martha Harrison.)"

### A LOOK AT NOBOB, KENTUCKY

Many tales abound about the naming of Nobob, a little village located on KY 839, 10 ½ miles east of Glasgow. The most common story involved one Robert (Bob) Todd, a hunter for a party of Virginia military land grant surveyors. They had made camp near the site of the future settlement. According to tradition, Todd failed to remain to camp one night, and for days his companions searched for him only to return each night to report "No Bob!"

The following brief history was given by the late Ruby Smith, former President of the historical society:

"The little village is located on Nobob Creek. Families moving into the camp site area made it a community center from the earliest days. A powder mill was built on the creek during the War of 1812.

"About 1845, D. B. Ritter built a tub wheel mill on Nobob Creek; two of the logs from the dam are still in the creek. A post office was established there on April 8, 1854 with Newberry M. Wilson, postmaster. Another postmaster included Mrs. Estella Smith who served from April 18, 1922 until the post office was closed on November 14, 1936. Mail service was then a Summer Shade rural route which extended into Barren County.

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The Courts home was operated for many years as a stage stand and tavern. According to Franklin Gorin, Nobob had two stores, one doctor, one blacksmith shop, one wagon maker, one steam saw and grist mill, one carding factory, one tobacco warehouse and one saddle and harness shop. The population as given by Gorin was 75."

Little Hope Baptist Church Minutes, Barren County, 1870-1898, 1903-1922. This manuscript was originally copied by the late Kenneth H. Lee. This church, formed in 1842, is close to the Edmonson County line and its members came from both counties. Not every meeting was shown; apparently there were scattered minutes or Mr. Lee was abstracting for names and events. Unlike many church minute books, this one is more detailed in the people who joined, left, were excluded or died. There are several membership lists and an entire section on obituaries of the members which show much information. Approximately 1800 names in the full-name index. Some information is given about the church before the minutes begin, the Little Hope Cemetery and Little Hope School. 49 pages. \$15.00 printed or \$7.00 as an e-book.



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Daniel Curd Early Barren County Surveys, 1799. Daniel Curd was our first County Surveyor and his actual surveys have been long missing. This book contains images of the original surveys with the plat maps. In 1799 our county was just formed and there were 240 surveys entered. 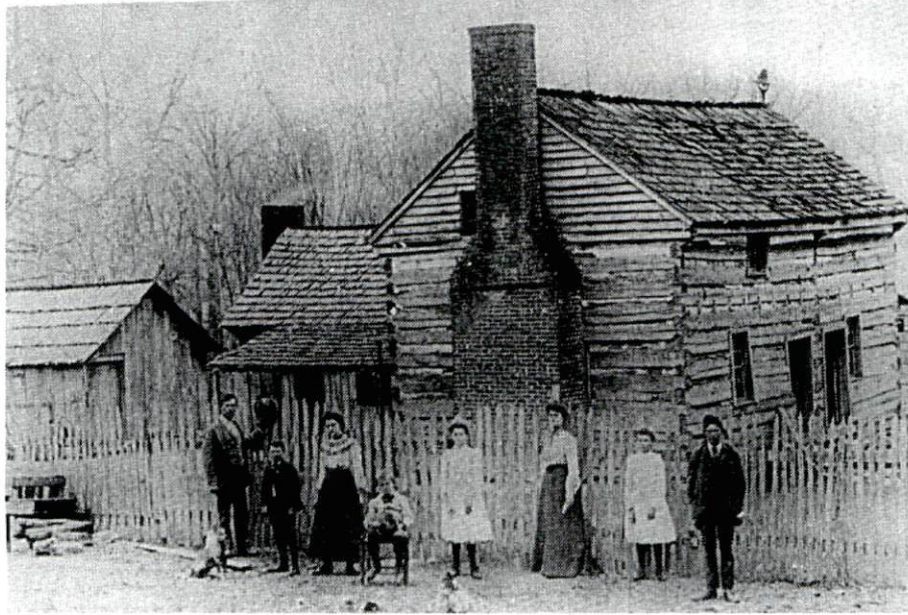

*Typical Single Pen Pioneer Log Home*



“When our first settlers arrived in Barren County, they built their houses of logs. At first these houses were single-pen structures built with the length of logs that could be cut from the trees they found nearby. These were not long enough for large houses and, besides, the settlers needed quick shelter that they could build quickly using the limited help available to them. Not long afterward, when the settlers could find time from their arduous duties of producing food and clothing, they would build another single-pen log house beside the first one, each one with a front door and loft where the family slept. The two houses would be separated by a dogtrot which was sometimes covered but had open sides. Later they would probably enclose the dogtrot making a breezeway or large central hall which would have its own front door. Therefore, some – a few are still visible in the county – would have three front doors. Many of these houses were later covered with clapboards and some respectable houses today have long sections that have been incorporated in larger, more elaborate houses.”

### *OLD RECORD BOOK IS STORY OF OLD TIMES*

*From an undated Glasgow newspaper.*

“A vividly interesting relic of the past which had been lost many years, but was recently located is an old surveyors notebook, dating back to 1840, kept by John S. Gee, one of the early settlers around the head of Nobob Creek. The book has been preserved by the great-grandson, Newton A. Pedigo, of Summer Shade, who showed it to Clayton C. Simmons



to assist him in his historical records of that section of the county from which this account is taken.

“Penned with a goose quill, the lettering is so exact and perfect that it seems incredible that it was done by hand. Tradition says that he was of aristocratic English stock and possessed of a much better education than the average pioneer of his day. Habitually dignified and impressive, it is said that his constant reserve made him difficult to approach and he formed but few intimate friends.

“Besides early surveying records the book contains several pages of rules for ‘laying off new lands’ and forms to all type of legal warrants from disciplining a ‘tipping house’ to ‘apprehending criminals,’ such as would come under the jurisdiction of a magistrate of that day, in which capacity he also served. Most interesting in his brief autobiography, also included in the book, which gives a description of the often-tragic, always perilous long travels made by the early pioneers into Kentucky. Without change, we reproduce in his own style of writing

“I was bred and born in the State of Virginia and County of Lunenburg, on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of Jany, 1777 I was born. On the 28<sup>th</sup> day of Oct, 1795, I left Virginia and started to Kentucky in Company with 3 families (Viz) Mr. John Dixon’s, Curtis Hardy’s and my Fathers, we traveled on very well till we came to the Allegany Mountains, which was the 18<sup>th</sup> day of November following, the weather and roads being so bad we made a conclusion to leave our waggons and pack what plunder we had over the Mountains in the River (Monongalale) and left in care of Mr. John Hagn some that were sick, with the waggons, etc., and accordingly on the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of Dec. ensuing we all got to the River (except one of Mr. Dixon’s little negroes which died at said Hagans.) The river being so cold and the weather so cold we concluded to stay here till early in the spring, and in the course of the winter my Father had a little negro died. We made between four and five hundred pounds weight of sugar. On the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1796 we set sail down the river and landed at one Mr. Brooks’ just above Limestone on the bank of the Ohio River in Kentucky on the 30<sup>th</sup> of said month (March) Thomas Hardy, son of Curtis Hardy, died at this place. Thence we went on to Madison county. We landed or got there on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of April ensuing and rented a plantation of one Mr. John Denham, 1797. Rented a plantation of Mr. Philip Turner and made a crop in Madison county.

“1798 on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of Feby, I started to Green County and made a crop on head right Tract of land of my Fathers on Glovers Creek waters of Big Barren River. I bought 200 acres of land on the East Fork of said Barren River (head right also) and on June following I returned to my Fathers in Madison, and on Tuesday the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June ensuing I was married to Susaneh Tuder. Thence I moved on the 27<sup>th</sup> day of Sept. to my crop on Glovers Creek thence to my place on the East fork on the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of Jany. 1799. Thence to Cumberland on a plantation of my Fathers the 14<sup>th</sup> day of Feby. 1800 I bought me a place in said County of Cumberland and mov’d to it in Oct ensuing. Thence to Barren County the 20<sup>th</sup> day of Nov. 1805.”



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“Mr. Simmons reminded that there are two Glovers Creeks in Barren County. The one referred to appears that in the southern part of the county which flows into Big Barren River some four or five miles west of Fountain Run.

“Those listed in his book for whom he surveyed lands included Hezekiah Jackson, Thomas Lincoln (the Thomas Lincoln who was claimed by some historians as possibly being the father of Abraham Lincoln, but such claims have never been proven), Joshua Embree, Orsborne Bland, Mose Kirkpatrick, Jesse Roberts, Jessie Hill, Moses Davis, John Bedford, Ephraim Dicken, Jessie Gee, John S. Gee, Abraham Engart, Benjamin Halsil, Charnall Glassrock and T. Nevils.

“Of still more interest are the names of those who acted as chain bearers in making the surveys for they were probably picked from among those already settled in this locality. They were John Jackson, Joseph Matthews, Robert Matthews, John Smith, Warren Bland, William Kirkpatrick, Thomas Ray, John Story, Archibald Roberts, Joshia Davis, Charles Simmons, John Engart, Josiah Black, Matthew Teamhorn, T. Sconce, D. Watson, William Sprouls, Alexander Sprouls, Lemuel Jones, John Engart, Jr., Isaac Robberds, Peter Stephens, T. Halsil, B. Halsil, H. Oneal and M. Biggerstaff.

“In his own history it is interesting to note that before he got married he came down and started his crop, for without a crop, in those days the pioneers had little likelihood of pulling thru the winter. Romance waited while the crops got underway.”

WILLIAM C. MORRISON

“WILLIAM C. MORRISON: This gentleman is the efficient collector of Ozark County, Mo., a position he has held since 1889, and from 1887 to 1888 he discharged the duties of the county assessor. He owes his nativity to the Blue Grass State, his birth occurring in Barren County, June 10, 1842, his parents, Joseph S. and Nancy J. (Low) Morrison, being also natives of that state. The paternal grandfather, Steptoe Morrison, was a native of the Palmetto State, but was an early emigrant to Barren County, Ky., and later to Arkansas, in which State he spent his last days. Solomon Low, the maternal grandfather, was a Virginia(n), and became a pioneer settler of Barren County, Ky., Joseph S. Morrison was born in 1826 or 1827, and when the Civil War came up he enlisted in the Fifth Kentucky Cavalry, and being a skilled blacksmith, he was made chief of the blacksmith corps of his regiment. He served from July 1863, until his death which occurred at Nashville,

Tenn., in 1863, having proved himself a brave, faithful and conscientious soldier. He was a Master Mason, was a stanch Republican in politics, and was a man of unblemished reputation. His widow died in Barren County, Ky., in 1886, having become the mother of eight children: William C.; Sarah E.; who died at the age of fifteen years; John, who also died young; Abigail resides in Barren County, Ky. and is the wife of R? Rinick; Martha A. became the wife of John T. Fords, and died in Barren County, in 1892; Solomon M. is a resident of Metcalf County, Ky., and the other two children died in infancy. William C. Morrison passed the early years of his life in Kentucky, and at the age of nineteen years became a soldier of the Civil War, and served from May until October, then he was honorably discharged. He was married in Kentucky to Miss J. Arnyx [Amyx], a daughter of Preston Arnyx, and a sister of Judge Arnyx. Mr. Morrison came to Ozark County, Mo., in December, 1870, and located about four miles above the mouth of Pine Creek, on a farm, and after making several changes he came to the fine farm of 500 acres on which he now lives and turned his attention to farming and stocktrading, to which he has devoted his attention up to the present time. In the conduct of his affairs he is decidedly progressive in his views, is thrifty, pushing and industrious, and as a natural result is in possession of a fair share of this world’s goods. He has always been a pronounced Republican, has always taken a deep interest in the political affairs of his section, is a patron of education, and he and his wife are active members of the Christian Church. He is in every particular a self-made man, for he began life for himself with no means whatever, and is one of the intelligent and well-to-do citizens of the county. He is a member of Robert Burns Lodge No. 496, of the A.F.&A.M., at Gainesville. The children born to himself and wife are as follows: Marcella F. is the wife of Paul Patrick; Cornelia F. is the wife of George B. Hunt; U. H. is engaged in tilling the soil on a farm near his father; Joseph P., is a farmer of the county; Nancy B., Aroon P., Aurora B., and Izora, at home.”

Note: William C. Morrison died January 2, 1920 in Ozark. .
