DESCRIPTION

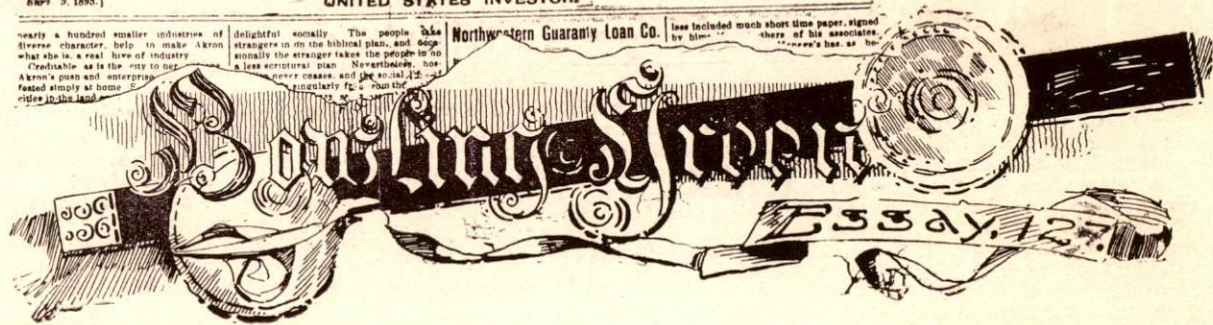
BOWLING GREEN, the county Seat of Warren County, is the Metropolis of the Green River Country. Situated on the main line of the Louisville and Nashville Road, 114 miles south of Louisville and 72 miles north of Nashville. It is also at the head of navigation on Barren River. Two hundred miles from Evansville, with which it has water communication throughout the year, and with the entire Mississippi Valley and its twenty thousand miles of inland water.

What a thing is not is sometimes as significant as what it is; so, in enumerating the "merits" of Bowling Green, I would say, first, that it is not "a place of peculiar location," except as regards its beauty. It is not "a place of unusually rapid growth," though its population has increased 50 per cent during the last ten years.

It is not "a place in which an unusually large amount of capital is employed in any particular industry." Its "undeveloped resources" have not "long escaped attention," nor are they "peculiar," being the same resources possessed by hundreds of southern towns, and its "historical associations" will never tempt the pen of poet, novelist, or historian.

Yet, in spite of these negative statements, I propose to show that it is "a desirable place of residence," that it affords "opportunities for investments," and, by the way, it does possess the "unique interest" and "special distinction" of being one southern town that has never been on a "boom."

Bowling Green is about 600 feet above the sea level. A range of low hills, or "knobs," in Kentucky parlance, surrounds it. From the summit of two of these knobs, one on the eastern, the other on the western border of the city, one has a view of landscapes so exquisite as to compel admiration even from travelers familiar with the rarest scenery of the Old World. "More beautiful than anything I ever saw in Europe," I once heard a traveler say, as he looked at river, valley, field, forest, vineyard, and tree-embowered town glorified by the radiance of a summer sunset. Others have likened the scenery to that of the Holy Land, especially around Jerusalem; and celebrated artists have drawn inspiration from its river views, which are like the palisades of the Hudson on a small scale.

The rolling character of the country gives many fine building sites, and there many houses, some only modest cottages, located on commanding ground, that a millionaire might covet for his prospective palace home. Suburban lots of rare beauty are to be had at moderate prices. The town was built around a square, in the middle of which once stood the court house, the county clerk's office, and the market house. This was in the days so graphically described by James Lane Allen, in his sketches of old Kentucky life. Now all is changed. A park takes the place of the old court house, clerk's office and market house. Electric lights and a street railway give it the air of a city.

The town is situated on the main line of the Louisville & Nashville railroad, and the Memphis branch starts from this point. It has semi-weekly steam packet line connecting it with Evansville the year round. There are 120 miles of macadamized roads in the county, eight of these starting out from Bowling Green in as many different directions.

Bowling Green Essay--Continued.

Delightful as it is locally, it is even more delightful socially. The people take strangers in on the biblical plan, and occasionally the stranger takes the people in on a less scriptural plan. Nevertheless, hospitality never ceases, and the social life of the place is singularly free from the foolish pride, exclusiveness and caste feeling of ante bellum days, which still prevail in so many southern towns. One does not need to bear about him, like the hero of Herrick's quaint verses, "a rowle of parchment charged with the arms of all his ancestors." His own merits are what society here demands of every man, and not the merits of his grandfathers.

Moreover, no woman is ostracized because she works for her living, and the number of self-supporting women in the place is unusually large. The tone of society is such that a young man of dissipated habits is under a ban, no matter what may be the size of his income or the social standing of his family. It follows, of course, that the morals of the young men are notably high.

The Prayer of Agur, "Give me neither poverty nor riches" seems to have been granted to the most of the people of Bowling Green. The wealthiest man in the county pays taxes on but \$86,000 worth of property. "Plain living" is thus a necessity, and "high thinking" follows from choice. A course of lectures every winter, the XV Club and the Calendar Club, both composed of men, and devoted to the discussion of literary topics, and a Ladies Literary Club are indications of the culture of the people.

Hundreds of people have been drawn to Bowling Green because of her educational facilities. The graded schools are the best in the state. Potter College, for girls, is known all over the South, and **Ogden College, an endowed institution, offers a collegiate education free to young men.**

If one would know the agricultural resources of this place, he must visit Warren County's annual fair. Here may be seen all the fruits and vegetables of this latitude, grown to a perfection and size that makes them rival the famous products of California. There are no canning factories, and immense quantities of fruits and vegetables are shipped northward every year. For the culture of the strawberry this region is unexcelled.

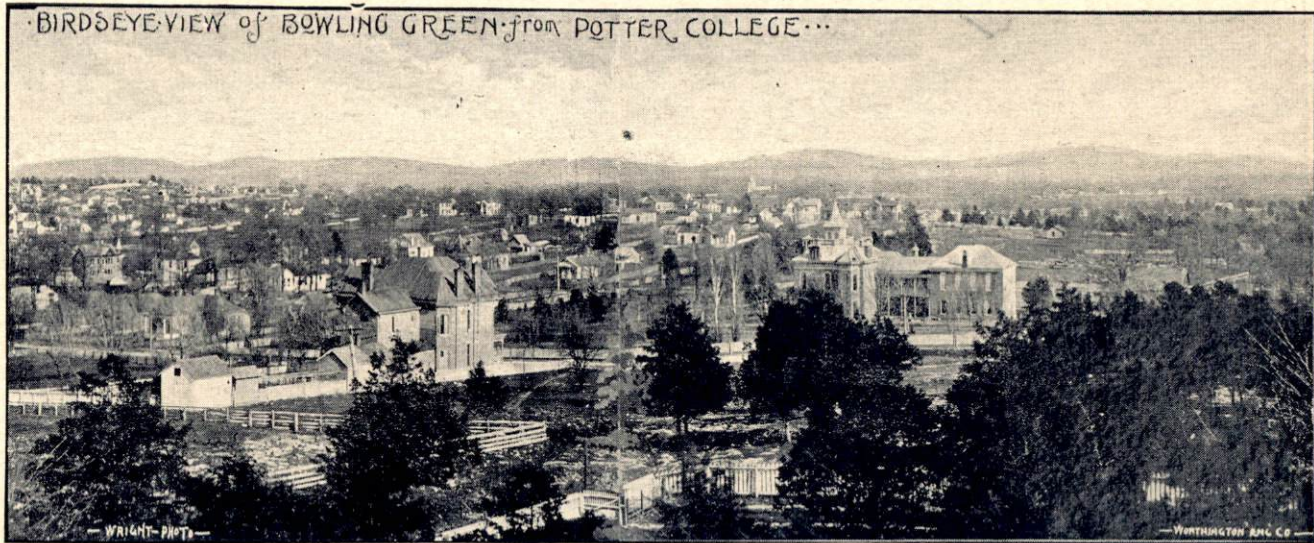
Some of the finest building stone in the world, oolitic limestone, is found here in inexhaustible supplies. Only five quarries are in operation. Within 15 miles of Bowling Green we find coal and iron and limestone in immeasurable quantities in close proximity, as if nature had destined this to be another Birmingham or Pittsburg. Professor Shaler says, "the hard-wood timber of this section is a more immediate and satisfactory source of wealth than its coal or iron." There are in Warren county between 150,000 and 200,000 acres of timber land containing some of the finest woods known.

In which of these "natural resources" lies the germ of Bowling Green's future greatness? Or does this future greatest rest only on the "baseless fabric of a vision?" Will capital ever come this way, bringing magical development in its train, or will Bowling Green always remain the pleasant, hospitable, steady-growing little city it now is? Who can say?

When Silas Lapham indignantly inquires the essential difference between himself and the aristocratic Corey, Mrs. Lapham shrewdly replies: "If you don't know, there's no use telling you." So to any prospective investor I would say: "If the foregoing facts do not show you what your opportunities are, there's no use telling you."

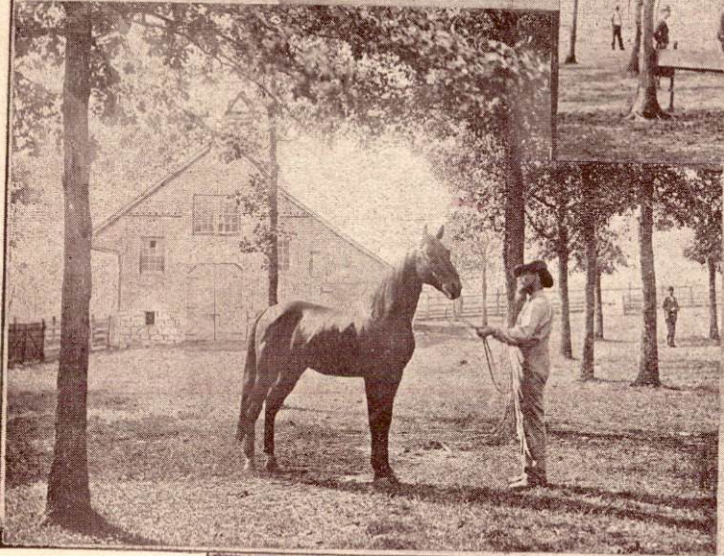
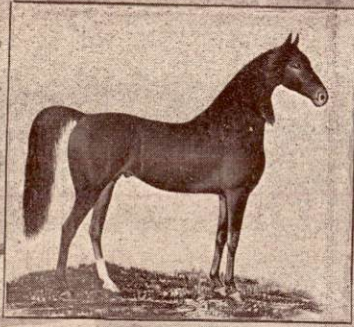
BIRDSEYE-VIEW OF BOWLING GREEN FROM POTTER COLLEGE...
