#### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE**

James Proctor Knott was born on 29 August 1830, near Lebanon, Kentucky, in Marion County. His parents were Joseph Percy and Maria Irvine (McElroy) Knott. He received his early education in Marion and Shelby counties. In 1846 he began the study of law, which he continued to pursue after moving to Memphis (Scotland County) Missouri, in 1850. The following year Knott was admitted to the bar at Memphis, and he served in the ensuing years in the circuit and county clerk's offices. Knott married Mary E. Froman of Memphis on 17 November 1852; she died in childbirth in August of 1853. In 1857 Knott was elected Scotland County's representative to the state legislature. In 1858, Governor Robert M. Stewart then appointed him attorney general to finish the unexpired term of Ephraim B. Ewing. Knott married his first cousin Sarah "Sallie" Rosanna McElroy (1833-1915) on 14 June 1858; they had no children. Sallie was the daughter of the late Philip Edward McElroy (the brother of J. Proctor Knott's mother) and Lydia (Gibbs) McElroy; the couple had moved from Marion County to Bowling Green, Kentucky after their marriage. Lydia (Gibbs) McElroy's second husband was David Chapman of Warren County, Kentucky, supposedly the first white child born in that county.

In 1860, Proctor Knott was elected attorney general of Missouri. He had mixed feelings concerning the political camps of the time. He did not favor secession but thought that the federal government was trampling on the Constitution and was making excessive demands of the people. After Missouri came under the control of Unionists, a law was passed on 18 October 1861 requiring all state officers to take a loyalty oath to the United States. Knott contended that he had taken his official oath, and his refusal to take the loyalty oath resulted in his arrest, brief imprisonment, and disbarment from law practice in Missouri. Shortly after his prison release, he and Sallie returned to Kentucky. Late in 1862, the Knotts settled in Lebanon, Kentucky, where Knott opened a law office.

Following the Civil War, Knott was the Democratic elector of the 4<sup>th</sup> District of Kentucky to the U.S. House of Representatives for six terms, serving from 1867 to 1871 and from 1875 to 1883. He was elected governor of Kentucky in 1883, defeating

Thomas Z. Morrow. After his gubernatorial term, Knott was employed by the state to assist the attorney general with lawsuits. Later, Knott practiced law in Frankfort with T. L. Edelen. As a member of the 1890-1891 Kentucky Constitutional Convention from Marion County, Knott again proved himself to be an able statesman. Retiring from law practice in 1892, he accepted the professorship of civics and economics at Centre College in Danville, Kentucky. He also assisted in organizing Centre's law department in 1894. Poor health forced Knott to retire from Centre College in 1901, and he returned again to Lebanon. His homeplace, named "Lea Ridge", was destroyed by fire in August 1902; but he continued to live in Lebanon until his death on 18 June 1911.

#### **COLLECTION NOTE**

The collection is formed around James Proctor Knott and includes family and business correspondence, 1850(?)-1911 (100 items). Very little of it relates to his public life as a member of the U.S. Congress and as governor of Kentucky, although a few letters reveal his views about the Civil War. Holographic, typescript, and printed copies of some of Knott's speeches, 1870-1891 (14), as well as some of his holographic writings, 1877, 1879, 1891 (10), are in the collection. In addition, there are several sketches and drawings (57) by Knott, and two Knott autograph albums: one covering the period of the 44<sup>th</sup> Congress from 1875 to 1877, and one covering the 1890-1891 Kentucky Constitutional Convention. Also, there are numerous newspaper clippings concerning Knott.

The materials of Sallie Knott include correspondence, 1859-1913 (138 items). with family and friends; some of which concern life in Missouri during the turbulent years of 1861 and 1862 (9). The letters, 1853-1863 (6), and diaries, 1861-1862 (3), of Proctor Knott's mother Maria Irvine (McElroy) Knott present a good picture of events in both Missouri and Kentucky. Late in 1860, Maria, who had been living with Proctor and some of her other children in Memphis, Missouri, returned to visit her family home in Lebanon, Kentucky and remained there until her death in 1864. Her diaries, kept from January 1861-January 1863, record daily life and her experience of the Civil War: the local tensions between Unionists and secessionists; the arrival and departure of troops from Ohio, Indiana, Minnesota, Kentucky and Tennessee; and fears over the approach of Confederate raider John Hunt Morgan. She expresses compassion for the hardships of soldiers encamped in the area – in a particularly emotional reaction (Diary #1, p. 39) she wishes that "the movers in this inhuman rebellion could all be at the cannons mouth

and be blowed to atoms rather than so many innocent men should die [to] gratify their proud ambition" – but tires of the disruption caused by their appropriation of wagons, crops, livestock, water and timber, and by Confederate theft and vandalism. Maria also closely follows news of the war in Missouri and elsewhere in Kentucky.

A few items of associated families – Gibbs, 1780, n.d. (2); McElroy, 1833-post 1874 (10); and Chapman, n.d. (1) – are also in the collection, with one box being comprised of letters and a diary of the James Franklin McElroy family, 1874-1930 (115), of Bowling Green, Kentucky. Additionally, there are many photographs of the McElroy family and other individuals.
