

### Groups find fun serving

Two campus organizations, founded upon the principle of serving school and community, are leaving a significant mark of service upon the University and the Bowling Green area.

Alpha Phi Omega and Gamma Sigma Sigma are proving that serving others can be rewarding as well as being beneficial to the communities they serve.

Serving the community, APhiO sponsors a Boy Scout Troop at Potter Orphanage and an annual Greek Carnival which raises money for the Boys Club. They also assisted in the recent "mock" disaster in Bowling Green. The fraternity promotes VISTA and the Peace Corps and sponsors the Ugly Man On Campus contest with the proceeds going to either national charities or local needs.

Only a year and a half old, Gamma Sigs at Western have already lived up to their goal of service. During the fall semester, members worked more than 1,500 hours on service projects. They raised money to buy heaters for the day-care center and acted as "mothers" collecting for the March of Dimes. In December they held a Charity Ball on campus and had parties for children at Delafield School, the Potter Orphanage and for hospital patients at Ft. Knox.

Among the service projects both groups undertake is ushering at concerts and lectures on campus.


Students should be appreciative and grateful for the many worthwhile activities of these two service organizations.

There are two conferences required with each advisor.

Service Hours. A minimum of twenty-five service hours is required during pledgeship. Service hours may be obtained by working on projects selected and voted upon by the pledges or ones the actives have set up for the pledges.

Fees. There will be a \$2.50 initiation fee and a \$6.00 national fee. Each girl should turn this amount into the pledge class treasurer before the deadline date set up by the pledge class.

Election of Officers. The pledge class shall nominate the following officers to be in charge during their pledgeship: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Historian.

Demerits. A demerit system has been set up in order for the pledges to meet certain standards during pledgeship. If a girl receives more than 15 demerits she will not be able to continue pledging. (There is a list of reasons for demerits and the number of demerits to be received listed on the following page.)

There will also be twenty signatures of Alpha Phi Omega's required. These will be due two per week along with your other conferences.

There will be a \$.50 assessment everytime you do not have a valid excuse for missing a meeting or dinner. The Executive Council has set up the following as valid excuses: death in the immediate family, having to attend a class, illness--laziness is not included.

Each active sincerely hopes that you will strive to do your part as a pledge and will continue as an active in serving your school, community, country and fellow associates.






