On any steamer riverboat trip a large portion of the traveler's time was spent in the passenger cabin. This large main room served as a combination lounge, ballroom, dining room and place of entertainment. An orchestra played during the meals and for dancing in the evenings. The cabin was lined on each side with many passenger 'staterooms'. Often each stateroom was named for a State and sometimes they were numbered.

Normally there were as many as 24 cabin boys, cooks, pantrymen and a steward who served the 100 to 200 paying passengers, not only at mealtime but at midnight lunch. The midnight lunch was really a full meal. Excellent hot coffee was available at any hour day or night.

Probably, the most exciting adventure of a trip on the old packets was the food. This cuisine of the culinary department was delectable, plentiful and unique. The food was cooked in a small galley and brought up steps to the pantry where it was put in steam tables and then served in small dishes to the hungry traveler.
