Laura Ospital was born in 1967 in Lexington, Kentucky. She spent part of her childhood in Brazil and lived in California and Kansas as a military wife and mother of two. She received her undergraduate degree from Western Kentucky University and attended Kansas State University. "New Matriarchs: Louisville" was her first solo exhibition.

COLLECTION NOTE

This collection features an exhibition created in honor of "Celebrate Our International Heritage Month" during September 2004. The exhibition was a cooperative effort of the Metro Louisville Office for International Affairs, the Kentucky Foundation for Women, and the Louisville Free Public Library. It was featured, along with a number of other events, at various Louisville venues during the celebratory month.

The collection details the lives of seven women from around the globe (India, Syria, Mexico, Uganda, Russia, Argentina, and Somalia), all recent immigrants to Louisville. Included is information regarding their struggles adjusting in a new country, issues with motherhood after immigration, and how they adapted to their new lives in Louisville.
