MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS.

Gentlemen:

I have included in this statement a suggested retrenchment program, a statement of the financial condition of the institution at the end of the present fiscal year and biennial period and a tentative budget with recommendations for the fiscal year beginning July 1,1932. I have also included those items that should be considered by the Board of Regents prior to the annual commencement exercises which begin on Sunday evening, May 29,1932.

A STATEMENT OF PROGRESS. The institution is enjoying a large attendance, notwithstanding the depression. There are now in daily attendance 2580 students who are doing regular college work. This does not include the students in the Training School, the Rural Demonstration school, and the large number that are doing Extension and Correspondence work. It only includes the students actually doing college work above high school level. The interest among the students has never been better. The general morale of the institution is unusually fine and the attitude toward the difficulties the institution is experiencing is sympathetic and helpful. A spirit of perfect unity and cooperation among teachers and faculty has existed during the entire year and a finer spirit has never prevailed. Administrators, faculty members and students have worked together to make the year a success. The faculty has not only given unselfishly to the Hill, but has been generous in doing such extra work as was necessary to meet the new responsibilities the institution is experiencing at this time.

THE FISCAL YEAR. This institution has pursued the policy of recognizing the beginning of each fiscal year as the beginning of the school year and as a result it has built its annual budget on the basis of the period extending from July to July. Some of the State institutions consider the period dating from September to September as the basis upon which to estimate their budgets.

THE FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE INSTITUTION AT THE END OF THE PRESENT FISCAL YEAR. Below is given an estimated statement which shows the condition of the institution at the end of the present fiscal year. This statement does not include any cut in salaries that may be made for the months of May and June 1932. It includes an item of \$17,427.00 for which the school is indebted to the City of Bowling Green for asphalt streets. The Board will notice that in making this statement, laboratory fees, incidental fees and other similar items have been used for current expenses. It also calls for the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 from the Extension Fund. I am happy to be able to report, as shown by the following, that Western Teachers College will be able to balance its budget at the end of the present fiscal year.

A STUDY OF A RETRENCHMENT PROGRAM AND A

SUGGESTED BUDGET FOR WESTERN

1932-1933

I am submitting on the following pages a careful study of the retrenchment program and the budget for the next fiscal year. I have included in this budget of information and recommendations, the revised salary schedule, the faculty eliminations, and other items that affect the current expenses of the institution.

STATEMENT OF GENERAL POLICY. Western believes that during the economic crisis it is now experiencing its success in carrying on depends largely upon the faculty it will be able to maintain. It believes that this is true not only during a period of depression but at all times. It realizes that school systems, organizations, courses of study, buildings, grounds and equipment are dead and useless things unless they are vitalized by a faculty that has vision, character, leadership and the spirit of service. Believing this, it recommends that the maintaining of a strong faculty and a fundamental course of study be the central themes and the first objectives in its work of organizing a retrenchment program. In order to achieve these objectives it recommends the following:

- 1. That all expenditure of all kinds for permanent or capital improvement be discontinued, except in the case of emergency needs made necessary to safeguard life and avoid a permanent injury to the plant when a few dollars would correct the defect.
- 2. That the purchase of school equipment of all kinds be reduced to a minimum emergency need.
- 3. That in case it becomes necessary to revise the course of study only those courses be eliminated that would least affect the professional and academic standing of the institution.
- 4. That every form of retrenchment be practiced in the way of reducing the expense for electricity, water, fuel, telephone, insurance, janitor service and all kinds of operating expenses.
- 5. That as far as the finances of the institution will permit, the campus and grounds be maintained in a way to preserve the present beauty and attractiveness, but under no conditions additional expenditure be made for the extension of the campus or for additional permanent improvement of the grounds.

6. That all employees of the institution from the janitor to the President agree to revised salaries and to a cut on the revised salaries in order to aid the institution to carry on its work of disseminating universal education and the principles and ideals of our government. In recommending a reduction in salaries Western realizes that it is not in the interest of professional and educational advancement and that it will serve a great hardship upon many strong men and women of mature age who have given themselves the highest preparation for their chosen work and who are still heavily in debt for their education. We especially feel that this policy is unfortunate when we realize that an M.A. degree including high qualities of life and leadership is the minimum qualification for all members of the faculty and that there are twenty three members of the faculty who hold the Ph.D. degree and that the average salary of the faculty is \$2498.00 for a period of twelve scholastic months. This average is much lower than the average salary of the faculties of the Teachers Colleges of the Nation. The faculty, however, is showing an unusual spirit toward a reduction in salaries and will do everything in its power to carry on the work of the institution.

7. Western recommends that the administrative officers of the institution be authorized to continue the operation of the institution with all of its present activities and courses of study until the end of the present scholastic year including the present semester and the two summer terms of six weeks each, which open June 6 and July 18 respectively. That they be further authorized to proceed as heretofore with the work of opening the Fall Session, announcing the date of the opening and doing other things that are necessary to carry on the work during the next scholastic year.

THE BUDGET 1932-1933. The budget for 1932-1933 takes into consideration every item that permits of retrenchment. A most earnest effort has been made to reduce every item to a point that barely allows operation even upon a drastic program of retrenchment.

THE INCOME FROM THE STATE. It is difficult to estimate the amount of revenue the institution will receive from the State, due to the fact that it receives 25% of the inheritance tax and that there is no way to make an accurate estimate of the amount it will receive from this source. One-half of its income during the last fiscal year came from the inheritance tax. The institution at this time is receiving but a small amount from this source and there is nothing to indicate that there will be any improvement in the future.

In organizing the budget for next year, the institution would not be justified in counting on more than \$129,000 from this source and \$169,000 from other millage sources, making a total of \$309,000 The income from the inheritance tax shown in the budget may be larger or it may be smaller than the amount shown but it would not be safe in the organization of the budget to make it larger than the amount included in the budget.

THE COURT DECISION ON THE INHERITANCE TAX. If the Court of Appeals should decide that the incoming inheritance tax must be used to pay for the refunding debt to other states instead of paying it out of the general fund, the institution would not have one dollar from this source for operating expenses. It could not even include the \$120,000 shown in its 1932-1933 budget.

GENERAL OPERATING EXPENSES . The general operating expenses of the past biennial period have averaged about \$12,000 a month, or \$144,000 a year. There have been included in this expenditure such annual items of expense as: insurance, \$10,000; renewals and repairs, \$20,000; library \$10,000; fuel, \$8,000; water, \$2,700; electricity,\$8000,00; stationery and printing, advertising postage, school equipment and numerous other items that enter into the operation of the institution. It also included certain items that were of the nature of permanent improvement, such as the payroll for the extension of the campus, the payroll for the maintenance department and the construction of the school equipment. We may be able to reduce the amount to \$8,000 a month by eliminating every form of expense of this nature as well as every kind of school equipment. We do not believe that the minimum amount for operating expenses can be brought under \$8,000 a month and this will require a reduction in the larger items mentioned above. If the above estimates are correct. it will take \$96,000 annually to pay for the operating expenses for one year.

REDUCTION IN THE INSTRUCTIONAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE
STAFFS OF THE INSTITUTION. Every member of the present teaching
and administrative staffs is necessary if the institution is to
continue its present program. As an emergency measure, however, some
reductions in the teaching and administrative personnel may be
possible. To do this, it will be necessary to increase the size of
classes, changing in some instances the method of instruction from
the regular recitation to the lecture method, to require teachers to
carry loads beyond the standards set up by the accrediting associations,
and to eliminate some of the special work in the Training School and
college. I fully appreciate the fact that this will be most unfortunate and is to be deplored; but, as far as I have been able to
go into it myself and with those cooperating with me in a careful
study, we see no other way out of the difficulty.

ELIMINATIONS. After eliminating salaries amounting to \$69,270.00 and after holding a reserve of \$29,850.00 to take care of the faculty substitutes, unfilled positions, and positions made vacant by resignations; and for additional members of the faculty needed to take care of the increasing enrollment in February, April and the summer schools; and after a cut of an average of more than sixteen per cent in all salaries of those remaining on the faculty, the payroll will amount to \$291,491.87. In order to keep the annual payroll within this amount it has been necessary to eliminate thirty-one regular members of the faculty and a number of assistants in our laboratories, library, and administrative offices.

ROOM RENT, BOARD, EXTENSION, ETC. In submitting the estimated budget below we have included every possible revenue that might be derived from the State, including the millage and inheritance tax, room rent, board, the Extension Department, and other similar items. We have also included extra revenue that will be derived from collecting from each student an incidental fee of \$10.00 per semester, and from graduate students \$25.00 per semester.

THE BUDGET. You will observe from the following budget that on an estimated basis of \$120,000 from the inheritance tax and \$189,000 from millage sources, and all other items that the budget will balance at the end of the next fiscal period. This will happen, provided the attendance will not be decreased more than twenty-five per cent, and the other items of income produce as much as estimated. There is serious doubt, however, whether the inheritance tax will amount to as much as given in the budget I am presenting.

SYNOPSIS, WESTERN'S RETRENCHMENT PROGRAM

The Retrenchment Program submitted in this manuscript of information is based on the following:

That all kinds of building programs be discontinued.

That all permanent improvement on the grounds and campus be postponed.

That a reduction in electricity, fuel and insurance expenditures be decreased, if possible.

That no further maintenance expenditure be made except such as may be necessary to safe-guard life and avoid permanent injury to a building.

That the purchase of equipment of all kind be discontinued, except in the case of small items of an imperative nature

That no further purchase of books for the Library be made except in cases of real academic need.

That some of the classes be consolidated and the size of the classes and number of hours taught by the faculty be increased.

That at least five telephones be taken out and more if possible.

That the salaries of the President, the members of the faculty and other employees be cut beginning with July 1932.

That members of the faculty be eliminated only to the extent of meeting the economic conditions of the institution.

That the Farm be put on a self-supporting basis after making proper allowance for instructional expenses.

That the incidental fee be increased from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per semester

That the annual operating expenses be reduced from \$144,00 to \$96,000

That no further expansion of the campus be made, but that such labor be employed as will preserve its present beauty and attractiveness.

That most of the follow-up and field wor be discontinued unless it is made self-supporting.

That all expense for the extra-curricula and athletic activities be reduced.

That the binding of magazines and books for the Library be postponed for the present.

That the Swimming Pool be made self-supportin.

That the over-head expense in the Culinary Department and the two dormitories be decreased if possible.

That the expense for postage, printing school publications, advertising, mimeograph work and other similar work be reduced as low as will be consistent with effective work.

That the general expense account made on account of faculty attendance at conferences educational committee meetings and similar meetings be carefully checked and the amount held down.

That the vacation of the clerical and janitor forces be limited to two weeks.

That the fee in the Graduate School be \$20.00 per semester.

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GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

Western recommends, on account of the present financial stress that the institution is experiencing, that no member of the faculty or other employee be employed for a longer time than nine months, beginning with the opening of the fall session, September 1932.

It recommends that the out in the salaries of the faculty and others as indicated in the salary schedule begin with the month of July 1932.

It recommends that all students be charged an incidental fee of \$10.00 per student beginning with the fall semester, except those students who are pursuing work in the Graduate School and that they be charged a fee of \$20.00 per semester.

It recommends that members of the faculty and other employees nominated and elected as members of the instructional, administrative and janitorial staffs at this meeting of the Board and those that may be selected by the President in the future on the authority of the Board, accept their positions with the understanding that additional cuts in salaries will be made to carry on the work of the institution, provided this becomes necessary.

It recommends that the rate for table board, which is now \$4.00 per week, be reduced beginning with the opening of the fall term to \$3.50 per week.

It recommends that the summer school of 1933 be conducted if it is at all possible to do so under the present economic conditions.

It recommends that inter-collegiate athletics be continued but limited in its operation, and made as nearly as possible self-supporting.

It recommends that the Board at this meeting authorize the President of the institution to employ such teachers as may be necessary to take care of the demands caused by consolidation of certain classes and the elimination of certain teachers.

It recommends that the school do everything it can to have the public know that the teachers who are leaving the institution are not leaving on account of any fault of theirs, but on account of the economic conditions of the institution over which the school has no control. Possibly the Board of Regetns should pass a resolution regretting the loss of these members of the faculty and deploring the economic conditions that make this necessary.

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BUDGETING INSTITUTIONAL COST

A SPECIAL RECOMMENDATION

For a number of years the institution has budgeted all expenditures. The finances of the institution and the financial records have been inspected at regular intervals both by the state inspector and the auditor employed by the institution. The reports of these inspection agencies on the manner of handling the financial affairs of the institution and on the manner of keeping financial records have been uniformly favorable

It has been deemed desirable, however, to keep more detailed records regarding instructional cost particularly in addition to those required by the office of the State Inspector. With this end in view, the cost of instruction studies have been conducted during the past two years. Those studies are now completed for the year 1930-31 and provide the administration with information regarding the cost of each department and each class in the institution. These studies have been of great value in eliminating duplications of effort in the institution. Similar studies are being made for the current year and will be conducted for each year hereafter.

Due to the present financial stress it is deemed desirable to further extend the financial records of the institution to incorportate financial budgets by departments which will differentiate the cost of the institution into such items as administrative cost, instructional cost, maintenance, operation, fixed charges, etc. I recommend that beginning July 1, such changes be made in the financial records of the institution as will permit the administration in the future to have at the end of any month, or at any other time such information as might be desirable, the exact status of institutional cost under the separate headings named above. It is believed that the financial records of the institution already excellent, may be improved in the manner indicated and that needed information will be readily at hand in deciding on expenditures to be made by the institution.

CERTIFICATES AND DEGREES 1931 - 1932.

I submit on the following page a list of students who will be entitled to certificates and degrees at the end of the present scholastic year. All of these people have made the required standards up to the present time and will be issued such certificates and degrees as they are under the law entitled to when they successfully finish the work required. Of course, if anyone should fail to make future standards the certificate or diploma will be withheld.
