

## M I N U T E S UNIVERSITY SENATE NOVEMBER 16, 2000 GARRETT BALLROOM

Chair Patricia Minter called the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m. The following members were absent without alternate representation: Karen Adams, Michael Binder, Marshall Gray, Carolyn Green, Thomas Green, Roy Howsen, Dan Jackson, Robert Jefferson, David Lee, Joel Philhours, Gary Ransdell, Thomas Schandling, Brian Sullivan, John White. The minutes of October 26, 2000 were approved with editorial changes.

#### REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

Chair Minter explained that due to Western's email system being down for a couple days, the agenda items were sent out manually, and also that all backup materials described in the University Curriculum Committee are on file in each of the College Dean's office. The Chair next reported that she and other Senators met with Jim Applegate of the Council on Postsecondary Education. She suggested that their action agenda seems to be nothing short of changing the entire intellectual cultural of the state. The deadline for agenda items is 2003, and is obviously an area that the Senate should watch very carefully. Next, the Chair reported that the Election Committee would begin meeting in January to develop election procedures for the coming year. She said Claus Ernst, the Vice Chair of the Senate, along with Fred Murphy and Mary Wolinski will serve on this committee.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

#### A. NOMINATIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

#### 1. UNIVERSITY ACADEMIC COMPLAINT COMMITTEE

Chair Minter said that Ruth Kinnersly has agreed to set up the University Academic Complaint Committee that was previously under the purview of the Academic Council. Ms. Kinnersly reported that the current Academic Complaint Committee, which has representatives from each of the colleges as well as a student representative, will serve as the nominating committee. They will nominate five full-time faculty members and two students. The Associate/Assistant VP for Academic Affairs will prepare a ballot with the names of the nominees. This ballot will be distributed for a vote at the December meeting of the University Senate. The two faculty members

with the highest number of votes will serve as representatives and the two faculty members with the next highest number of votes will serve as alternates. Likewise, the student with the highest number of votes will serve on the committee and the student with the next highest number of votes will serve as an alternate. A report on the final procedure will be given at the December Executive Committee meeting.

# B. REPORTS FROM THE STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE

#### 1. General Education Committee

Robert Dietle moved approval of the following items from the **Department of Modern languages** and **Intercultural Studies:** 

- a. Deletion of Anthropology 496
- b. Revision of a course title for Anthropology 120
- c. Revisions of course title and catalog description for Anthropology 399
- d. Revision of course title for Folk Studies 399
- e. Revisions of course title, prerequisites, and catalog description for German 101
- f. Consideration of German 335 for inclusion in General Education Category B. Humanities II. Electives.

The motion was seconded. The motion carried.

For information, Dr. Dietle said that it would be December before the committee would make a recommendation on the report of the Task Force on General Education. He noted that the committee was united in its support for the elimination of the non-categorical requirements. The committee also agreed that the report should state that the purpose of the reduction in the hours of General Education is to allow students greater freedom of choice and that departments should not use the reduction as an opportunity to add hours to their majors. Dr. Dietle said that the issues of assessment and the foreign language requirement were most prominent in the committee's discussion. The committee has invited Dr. Linda Pickle, Head of the modern Language and Intercultural Studies Department, to attend the next meeting of the committee to discuss the foreign language requirement.

2. University Senate Curriculum Committee

Linda Johnson presented the consent agenda and moved approval. After discussion, the Chair ruled that each of the items on the current consent agenda would be presented separately for approval. Dr. Johnson then described actions taken by the USCC to (1) categorize the various curricular items received from college curriculum committees as Information, Consent, or Action items for the USCC agenda and (2) establish a procedure for senate approval of the consent agenda received from the USCC. She noted that the Executive Committee had asked for revisions in the categorization of curricular items and that the revised procedure would be presented at the next meeting of the Senate. She also noted that on future US consent agendas, Action items would precede Consent items which would precede Information items. Finally, she stated that the USCC would not hear a proposal on its Action agenda that did not have departmental representation. Likewise, because proposals on the Consent agenda will not be considered without departmental representation. Items on the Information agenda will be considered without departmental representation.

Robert Dietle moved to remand the item back to the University Curriculum Committee for clarification. The motion was seconded. After much discussion, the Chair called for vote on the motion by show of hands. The motion failed.

After additional discussion, John Russell suggested that the item be considered under the category "Change of Title/Description/Prerequisite/Prefix of Courses." Dr. Russell moved that the existing course be deleted and that ENG 553 be approved.

# 3. Faculty Welfare and Professional Responsibilities Committee

Katrina Phelps reported that the Faculty Welfare Committee had decided to identify and focus on five issues that are of critical interest to the faculty welfare. The topics identified were the following:

- a. Post-Tenure Review establish a central point of access to all department's PTR policies; develop methods to acquire data on the impact and success of PTR
- b. Part-Time Faculty study salary schedules and the relation of WKU part-time salaries to those of our benchmark universities
- c. Communication acquire past reports of various university committees
- d. Faculty Compensation and Benefits conduct faculty salary study
- e. Professor Emeritus develop procedures for awarding emeritus status

Dr. Phelps said a written report will be presented to the University Senate at its next meeting.

### C. RESOLUTIONS

Ed Wolfe moved approval of the following University Senate Resolution:

Whereas:

- (1) Western Kentucky University is in the midst of a capital campaign *Investing in the Spirit* and
- (2) the faculty and staff are being asked to contribute to that campaign and
- (3) the Board of Regents has expressed policy guidelines regarding the naming of building on campus:

The University Senate wishes to express its strong objection to the recent naming of a dormitory on our campus, namely Meredith Hall. In particular, we are concerned that the Board of Regents did not follow its own policy guidelines in this matter, and further, did not consult in advance with the university's Division of Development and Alumni Relations. The haste with which this was done suggests that there was little or no consideration given to the ramifications of this naming and the impact it would have on the university's capital campaign.

We call upon the Board of Regents to follow in the future its own agreed upon policy guidelines in these matters, and to consult with the Division of Development and Alumni Relations in all decisions that have a potential impact upon the fund raising abilities of Western Kentucky University. The precedent set with the naming of Meredith Hall should not become a model for future actions.

The motion was seconded. The motion carried.

Next, Claus Ernst moved approval of a University Senate Resolution concerning the financial status of the athletic department. After discussion, the resolution was amended with unanimous approval to read as follows:

The athletic department will benefit from the increased athletic fee starting in January 2000. These new funds should give the athletic department some relief and flexibility to deal with its financial needs. Using these new funds the athletic department should be held accountable like any other unit on campus.

To this end the University Senate requests President Ransdell insure that:

- 1. The athletic department should not run up large deficit budget year after budget year as has happened in the past. The athletic department must budget its revenues realistically and stay within its means.
- 2. In the past the athletic department obtained a fixed percentage of the E&G budget. This dependence of the athletic department on the E&G budget should be reduced to a minimal level. Under no circumstances should the percentage of the E&G budget committed to the athletic department be increased beyond the level of 3.4%.

The motion was seconded. The motion carried.

The Chair stated that she would copy the resolutions to the President, all members of the Administrative Council, the Budget Council, Dr. Selig, and the Board of Regents.

The Chair noted that the Executive Committee would appoint a parliamentarian to University Senate.

The meeting adjourned at 5:10 PM.
