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United Way Gets Underway

The United Way Campaign kicked off its 1984 campaign at Western last month. Last year, the campaign raised over \$26,000 for 11 community, youth, and health services. "It is the only fund raising effort which has the official sanction of Western," said Mr. Dee Gibson, director of Community Affairs and Special Events at Western and chairman for the University's United Way Campaign.

This is Mr. Gibson's third year as chairman of the campaign, although he has worked with it for the past eight or nine years in such positions as co-chairman and vice-chairman. He is enthusiastic about this year's campaign and hopes the University will top last year's 24% increase over 1982.

Mr. Gibson explains that there are 55 captains and leaders appointed by Western. These people are chosen based on the support they have shown the program in the past and who realize the significance of the United Way. The captains and leaders try to encourage contributions from persons in their particular work area. This way there is lots of personal contact. This year the strategy is to encourage those employees to contribute who have not done so before, thus increasing the number of contributors. The employees have or should have received pledge cards in their pay envelopes. They are asked to return these, along with their donations, to the Business Office no later than October 1st.

"United Way has a national reputation for integrity and efficiency," Mr. Gibson stated. The organization helps such agencies as Hospice of Bowling Green, Inc., Bowling Green Girls Club, the Child Protection Committee, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, and many others who might not receive assistance from any other agencies.

It is hoped that all Western employees will contribute to this cause and help the University surpass its goal of \$30,000. If you have any questions, please contact the captains and leaders in your area.

Fenwick Honored as Officer of the Year

Western's Campus Police honored Lieutenant David Fenwick as Police Officer of the Year. According to Public Safety Director Paul Bunch, Lt. Fenwick was a natural choice for the award since "Fenwick is enthusiastic, energetic, and leads by example. His professional approach to his duty and his willingness to accept new and additional responsibilities are only a few of the qualities possessed by him which led to his selection as Western's Police Officer of the Year."

The award is given each year to the officer who best displays examples of the following qualifications: attitude, knowledge, performance, supervisory accomplishments, relationships with the community, etc. The officers are rated on these categories and the selection made through these yearly evaluations.

Lt. Fenwick came to Western in 1976 as part of the Junior Scholars Program. He enjoyed the campus so much, he returned in 1977 after graduating from high school. The Student Financial Aid Department pointed him in the direction of the campus police where he became a student patrolman. Six months later he applied for the position of communications officer and later, he applied for a regular posi-



tion as a patrolman. Lt. Fenwick thinks Western may have been rather hesitant about hiring him because of his age. At 20, he was the youngest person, at that time, the University had as a patrol officer.

As required, Lt. Fenwick went through the Police Academy Program in Richmond, Kentucky, and in August of 1981, became student patrol coordinator, which is the equivalent of a sergeant. He wanted to return to school and so he became sergeant of the third or early morning shift in 1983. He has remained there ever since and was promoted to lieutenant in January of this year.

The Distinguished Contribution Awards Committee received nominations from faculty, students, and alumni, from which they selected the three recipients. *The Personnel File* would like to recognize those faculty members as the featured employees for September.



Dr. Lane Enjoys Research

Dr. William Lane—Dr. Lane is professor of philosophy and religion. He concentrates on four major areas, Post-Biblical Judaism, the Gospel of Mark, the Mission of Paul, and Hebrews. His numerous publications in these four areas helped to earn him this year's Faculty Excellence Award for Research.

"I'm a New Testament scholar, engaged in serious research on certain areas of the New Testament," explains Dr. Lane. In 1974, he published *The New International Commentary on the Gospel According to Mark*, which has received much critical use in scholastic circles. Dr. Lane says he became interested in concentrating on the above four areas as a result of some advice a professor once gave him. The professor introduced him to the work of Henry Joseph Cadbury, who had concentrated his energies into one certain area. Says Dr. Lane, "I knew I couldn't cover the whole field. My upper division work concentrates on single units which permits me to go into depth."

Dr. Lane received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Wesleyan College in Connecticut. He continued his education at Gordon Divinity School working towards his Bachelor of Divinity degree. He then went to Westminster in Philadelphia for his master's and later Harvard for his doctorate. His post-graduate work was done in Sweden at the University in Lund. He taught 15 years at Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary and is now in his 11th year at Western.

Dr. Lane enjoys his research and is currently working on a major comprehensive commentary on Hebrews' early Christian sermons, to be published next year as volume 47 of the *Word Biblical Commentary Series*. He became interested in this work due to his studies at Harvard, where he concentrated on Semantic Backgrounds in the New Testament.

When not doing research, Dr. Lane serves on the board of H.O.T.E.L., I.N.C. (Helping Others Through Extending Love In the Name of Christ) a Christian help organization for people who have needs in Bowling Green. He also tries to remain active in two professional groups, the Society of Biblical Literature, and is a working participant at the Institute of Biblical Research.

Future plans call for Dr. Lane to work on a popular book for the lay person, *What Can We Say About Hebrews*, and he is also planning to work on a Chapter about Corinth for *33 Cities of the Bible*. He would like to start a major work on Paul and the perspectives of his mission in five years.

Dr. Lane is pleased to have received the Faculty Excellence Award and sees it as an encouragement to advance and continue his research. He appreciates the University making research possible, yet he also hopes the school will move toward a program where scholars who wish to do research and who have approved projects might be awarded a three-course program rather than a four-course program.

Dr. Lane is married and has three children. He enjoys backpacking and hiking with his two sons, Mark and David. His daughter, Debbie is a senior at Western. Dr. Lane's wife, Brenda, was formerly a secretary to the Department of Philosophy and Religion. She now serves on the board of H.O.T.E.L., I.N.C. and helps Dr. Lane with his research.



Dr. Wells Likes Working With Students

Dr. Carol Wells—Dr. Wells received the University's Faculty Excellence Award for his work in the area of teaching. He says he is very honored to have received the award out of so many at Western who deserved it. "They all want to teach and the teachers that I know enjoy it very much."

Dr. Wells explained that two people are responsible for his interest in teaching. One was a professor of mathematics and English. The other was his graduate advisor. He said that both of these people and his own work as a graduate assistant influenced his decision to go into the profession.

A native of Franklin, Kentucky, Dr. Wells received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from David Lipscomb College in Nashville. Later he traveled to the University of Tennessee in Knoxville to work on his master's. He received his doctorate from Vanderbilt University in Nashville.

Dr. Wells taught one full year at Vanderbilt, in between working on his master's and Ph.D. He is now in his 17th year at Western and likes the idea of being close to his home area. He is very involved with students at Greenwood Park Church of Christ where he serves as a deacon, is in charge of the education program there, and is co-chairman of the committee which supports the Church of Christ student center. "I enjoy the contact with students and the opportunity to know them in a way other than in the classroom."

Dr. Wells is married with two children, a son seven and a four year old daughter. His wife, Eunice, is currently the recording secretary for Western Women. The professor says he has no plans for the future except to try and do a better job in the classroom. He comments that there is always room for improvement and that the award gives pressure to do a much better job. He expressed his enthusiasm for the mathematics department having many good majors and credits his students for helping to make him a good teacher.



Librarian Enjoys Travel

Ms. Evelyn Thurman—Ms. Thurman works as a reference librarian in the Library Public Services Department. She is perhaps best known, however, for her writings and research concerning Laura Ingalls Wilder. Her current work is entitled, *The Ingalls-Wilder Homesites, A Diary of Visits, 1972-1983*. It concerns her visits to the many towns and cities in which the Ingalls and Wilders lived. Her many presentations about her travels and experiences, to schools, clubs, and other organizations throughout many states won her the University's Faculty Excellence Award for Public Service.

"I've always considered public service, free service, and I am very thrilled about receiving this award." Ms. Thurman went on to explain that she believes her publications are the results of her requests for public service. She has written many articles and books, not only about Mrs. Wilder, but other works designed to help students explore their own creativity. A couple of her creative stories have been given as plays by children and young people in schools and churches with much improvisation, which she greatly encourages.

Ms. Thurman says she is concerned that many students dislike school and comments that, "If students are happy they learn faster, and creativity helps make school a happy place."

She receives letters from students, teachers, and others thanking her for her presentations. Many of these include pictures about Laura Ingalls Wilder and information about the Ingalls-Wilder families as it pertains to her writings.

Another of her publications, *Little Houses on the Prairies Seek and Find the Word Puzzles*, with Greg White was published in 1983. Mr. White heard Ms. Thurman speak at a school and became interested in the Wilder books.

Ms. Thurman received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Asbury College in Wilmore, Kentucky, and later went on to complete her master's at Peabody College in Nashville. She also loves traveling. Ms. Thurman came to Western after she served as the high librarian at Fort Knox for three years. She also worked in Japan and Germany for two years each. She says one of the best things about teaching overseas is the travel. Ms. Thurman is very interested in people and photography.

Currently, Ms. Thurman is working on a biography and filmstrip concerning the life and writings of Kentucky author, Rebecca Caudill. "I like to share what I've found with others," she says of her research. Eventually Ms. Thurman would like to write a book about all the creative dramatics she has done in her lifetime.

The lieutenant is extremely proud to have received the honor of officer of the year and enjoys his work very much. "I enjoy law—what one can do and what one can't—and how it is all put together. I also get a personal satisfaction out of getting my job done." He says he is frustrated, however, at the attitudes some people take toward police. He explains the attitude as one which develops when people have had a bad experience with a policeman, and they sometimes don't give the police credit for being good people. They assume the situation is going to be bad even before it starts when they see a patrolman. He also believes, however, that this attitude is changing little by little and hopes his position as lieutenant can help change it even more.

"We do get our job done, but I also believe in treating people as human beings," expressed Lt. Fenwick.

Lt. Fenwick says one of his most memorable experiences with the University Police was receiving a plaque from the Bowling Green Optimist Club for Officer of the Year. He has participated in the local Operation Child Watch Program. Such sessions include fingerprinting and descriptions of children. This is to help aid the police in case something happens to the children such as a disappearance. He explains that preventative measures go a long way.

As far as plans for the future, Lt. Fenwick says he would like to return to school and complete a degree in Engineering Technology. His interests lie in electronics and music. He hopes to some day own his own recording studio, possibly here in Bowling Green. He plays amateur keyboard and guitar for relaxation when he's not riding his motorcycle.
