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David Mefford: Totally Dedicated to Aiding Students



David Mefford holds two degrees from Western Kentucky University and a Master of Divinity Degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Prior to coming to Western, Mr. Mefford was a pastor for 17 years. Ten of those years were spent at two churches in Virginia. They were First Baptist Church in Bristol with 1,600 members and Harrisonburg Baptist Church in Bristol with 1,600 members and Harrisonburg Baptist Church with 1,000 members and Harrisonburg Baptist Church with 1,000 members.

In the Fall of 1966, Mr. Mefford was hired as a graduate assistant in the Talent Search Program at Western. Shortly thereafter, he was promoted to Assistant Director where he was to spend the next two years. The following year he worked on his doctorate degree while supervising student teachers. During the fall of 1970, the University opened the University School-Relations Office. Mr Mefford worked here representing Western in all the high schools west of Interstate #65 the next four vears. The Fall of 1974 culminated in the appointment of Mr. Mefford to the position of Director of the University School-Relations Office. Over the next six years, Mr. Mefford and his staff developed and implemented Western's student recruitment program, including

campus tours. College Awareness Days, Parent Orientation during OAR days, and the organization of current departmental, student, and alumni recruitment activities. The University School-Relations Office was merged with the Office of Admissions in the summer of 1980. at which time Mr. Mefford was made Associate Director of Admissions At that time, he assumed the responsibility of processing admission applications, counseling, and coordinating the academic scholarship program. Since February of 1988, his sole responsibility has been coordinating the academic scholarship program.

During his stay at Western, Mr. Mefford speaks fondly of two things that stand out to him. He refers to the increased enrollment during the days of the University School-Relations Office, in which a record enrollment of 13,532 was reached in 1979. A second highlight was his receiving the Tate C. Page/Charles Clark Service Award. This award is given by the University to a person who has made a significant contribution to the public schools of the region. He states, "The nomination for this award must come from the public schools; therefore, that makes it a little more special to me." He was the recipient of the award this past July.

The individuals that play a major role in the personal life of Mr. Mefford reflect the fact that education has truly influenced their lives. His wife, Mae, has three degrees from Western and was a teacher at McNeill Elementary School for 16 years. She has been the principal at Potter Gray Elementary School for the past six years. Their three sons, Jim, Jeff, and Doug are also graduates of Western, Jim is a 1981 graduate who currently lives in Fort Worth, Texas. In addition to working in the computer science field, he has obtained a Master of Divinity Degree from Southwestern Baptist

As Mr. Mefford looks beyond his working days, he envisions leaving the scholarship program in such a condition that it will run smoothly and efficiently. He comments, "The scholarship program has grown tremendously in the last ten years, probably 1,000%. This year alone, approximately \$1.6 million of local money was given in over 1,800 academic scholarships. I would like for this program to continue growing and playing a vital role in the future success of the University."After retiring, Mr. Mefford also plans to engage in some writing, painting and perhaps building a new home.

In summing up his career at Western, Mr. Mefford feels that WKU has been an extremely pleasant place to work, is truly interested in people, and has maintained that image over the years. He continues by saving that public schools over the state are aware of the personal touch provided here at WKU-"For that reason. I have always found public school doors open and the people most receptive." In closing, Mr. Mefford comments on his fellow employees at WKU by stating, "All of the people that I have encountered at WKU have been professional and most helpful.
