BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

James Prentis (1796-1874), son of Mr. and Mrs. William Prentis, lived in Petersburg, Virginia, until 1845. His father was a printer and one of the editors of the Virginia Gazette and Petersburg Intelligencer. James was educated at William and Mary College as a lawyer, but he never practiced. He came to Hancock County, Kentucky in 1845 and bought acreage upon which the town of Lewisport was founded. James engaged in the mercantile business with some of his children. His wife was Lucy W. Baugh (1800-1865), and they had ten children, including William T., Archibald B., Robert C., and Margaret J.

COLLECTION NOTE

The major portion of this collection is comprised of writings by James Prentis, 1861-1871, concerning political affairs. A staunch Unionist, Prentis expressed his opinions in letters and essays to friends in Virginia and to various newspaper editors. He wrote about slavery, the folly of secession, Lincoln's confiscation laws, and the aftermath of war, including the legal fate of Jefferson Davis. He also wrote a reply to his son Archibald when the latter expressed sympathy with the secessionist cause.

The incoming letters to Prentis are all business letters with one exception. In 1865, his son Archibald wrote his father a letter describing battles and conditions in and around Petersburg, Virginia. An 1846 business letter from Robert Triplett of Owensboro, Kentucky, refers to an action against the May estate.

Family letters addressed to Lucy W. (Baugh) Prentis are from her sisters Mary E. Baugh and Mrs. Rebecca E. Jones of Virginia. Letters received by daughter Margaret

Prentis concern family matters and are from a niece, Eva (Mrs. Shelton Chieves) and from a cousin, M. Jennie Jones, both of Virginia.
