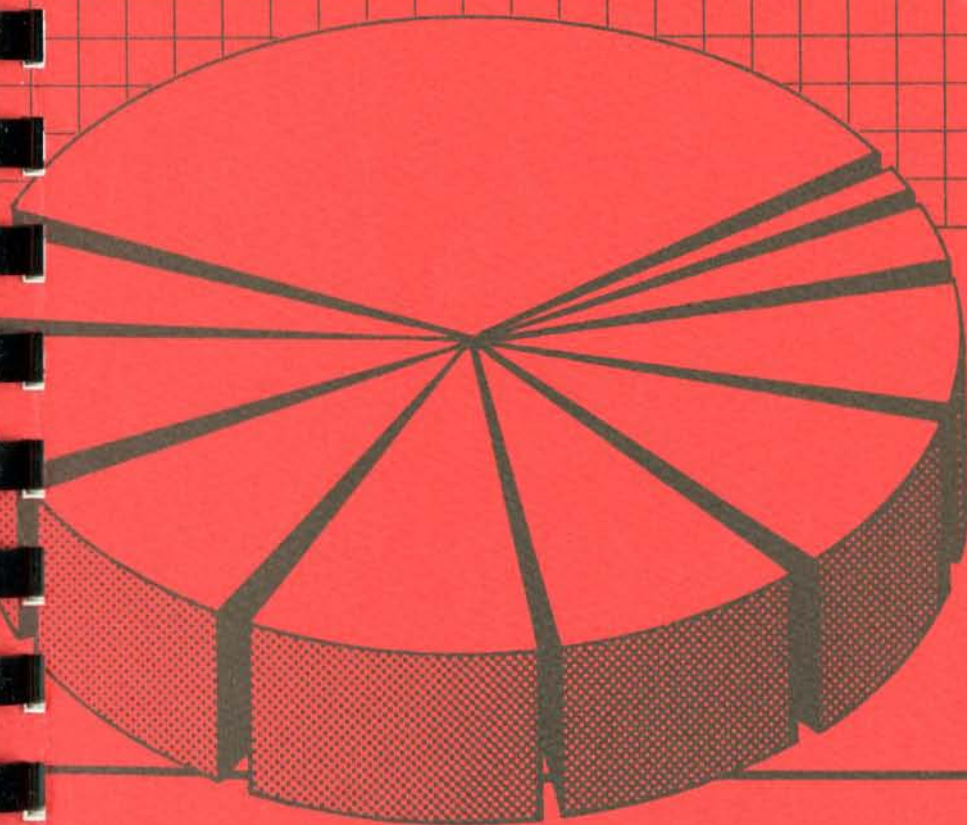

Western Kentucky University fulfills the visions of a number of education leaders. A \$50,000 bequest by Major Robert W. Ogden assured the establishment of Ogden College in Bowling Green in 1877. In 1877, Potter College for Young Ladies was founded. Prior to 1906, two additional schools were begun: Southern Normal School and Bowling Green Business University. Western Kentucky University embodies the high ideals of all these institutions and continues the traditions inherited from them.

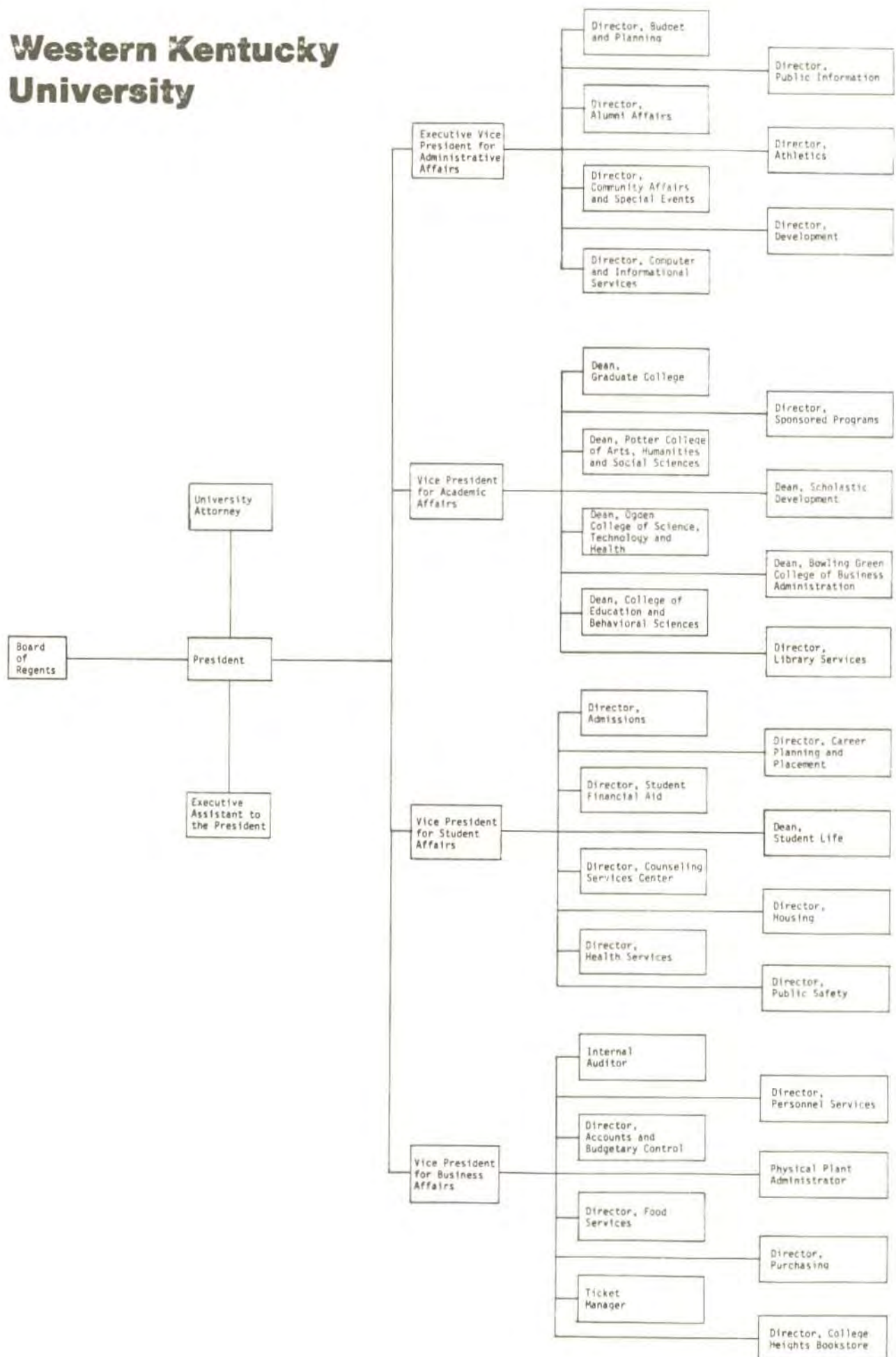
Western was established by an act of the 1906 Kentucky General Assembly. On January 1, 1907 The Southern Normal School was transferred to the state, and Dr. Henry Hardin Cherry was selected as the first president of Western Kentucky State Normal School. This institution occupied the buildings and grounds of the Southern Normal School until 1911 when it was moved to College Heights, its present location.

Potter College became a part of the State Normal School after its 1906 commencement. In 1922 the Kentucky Legislature changed the school's name to Western Kentucky State Normal School and Teacher's College and empowered the college to award degrees to its graduates. In September of the same year, the Executive Council approved a course of study four years beyond high school and authorized the conferring of the baccalaureate degree. In 1928, the original Ogden College properties were leased by Western, and by agreement with Western's Board of Regents, Ogden became the Ogden Department of Science. In 1930 the school's name was changed to Western Kentucky State Teachers College, and in 1948, to Western Kentucky State College.

The college began offering the Master of Arts degree in 1931. This program was discontinued in 1936 but was resumed in 1941 and has continued ever since. Western expanded its educational offerings in June, 1963 by absorbing the Bowling Green College of Commerce, formally known as the Bowling Green Business University. In 1964 the Bowling Green College of Commerce and the Graduate School were formed as two separate colleges within the Western structure.

In 1966, Western achieved university status and thus became Western Kentucky University. In 1987 Western registered its first students in its Community College which was created to enable the University to better serve the needs of the non-traditional student. The colleges that now constitute Western are the Potter College of Arts and Humanities; the College of Business Administration; the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences; the Ogden College of Science, Technology, and Health; the Community College; and the Graduate College.

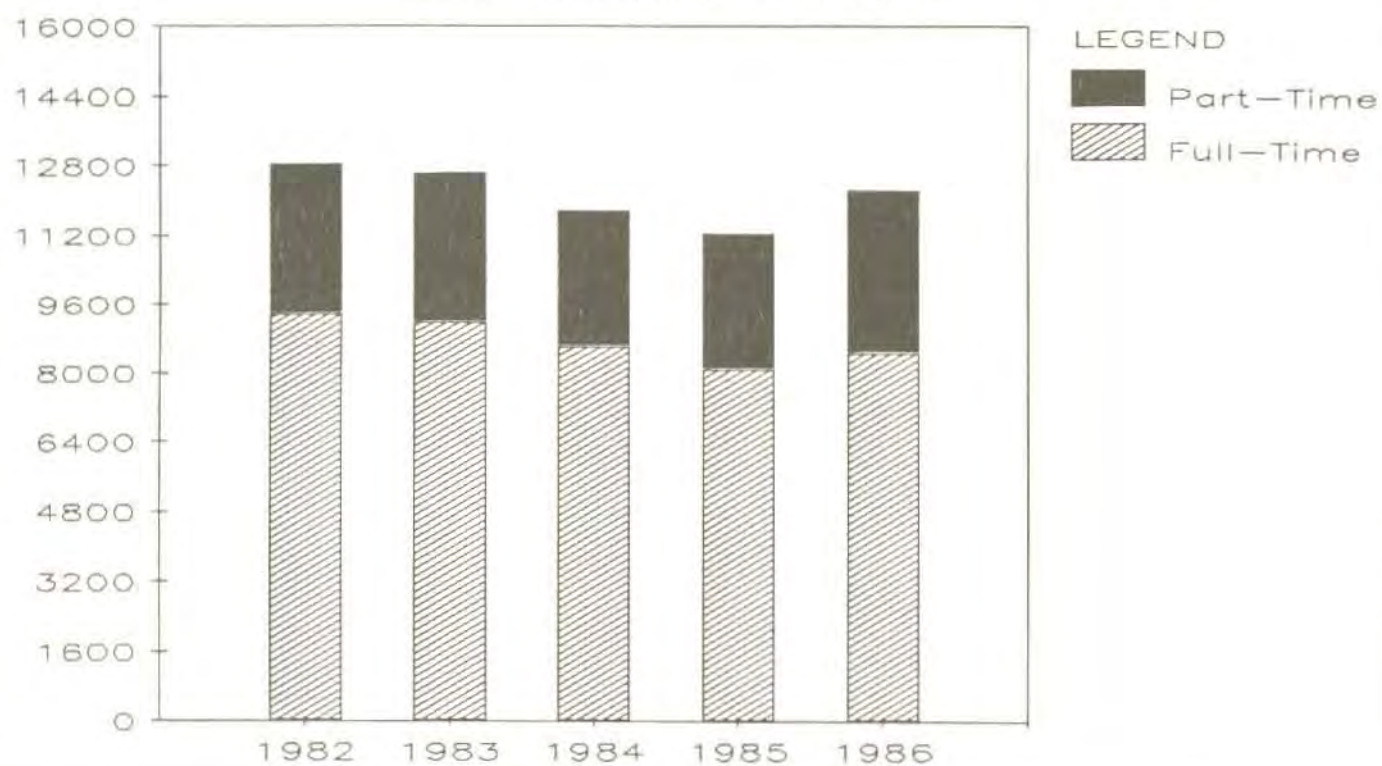

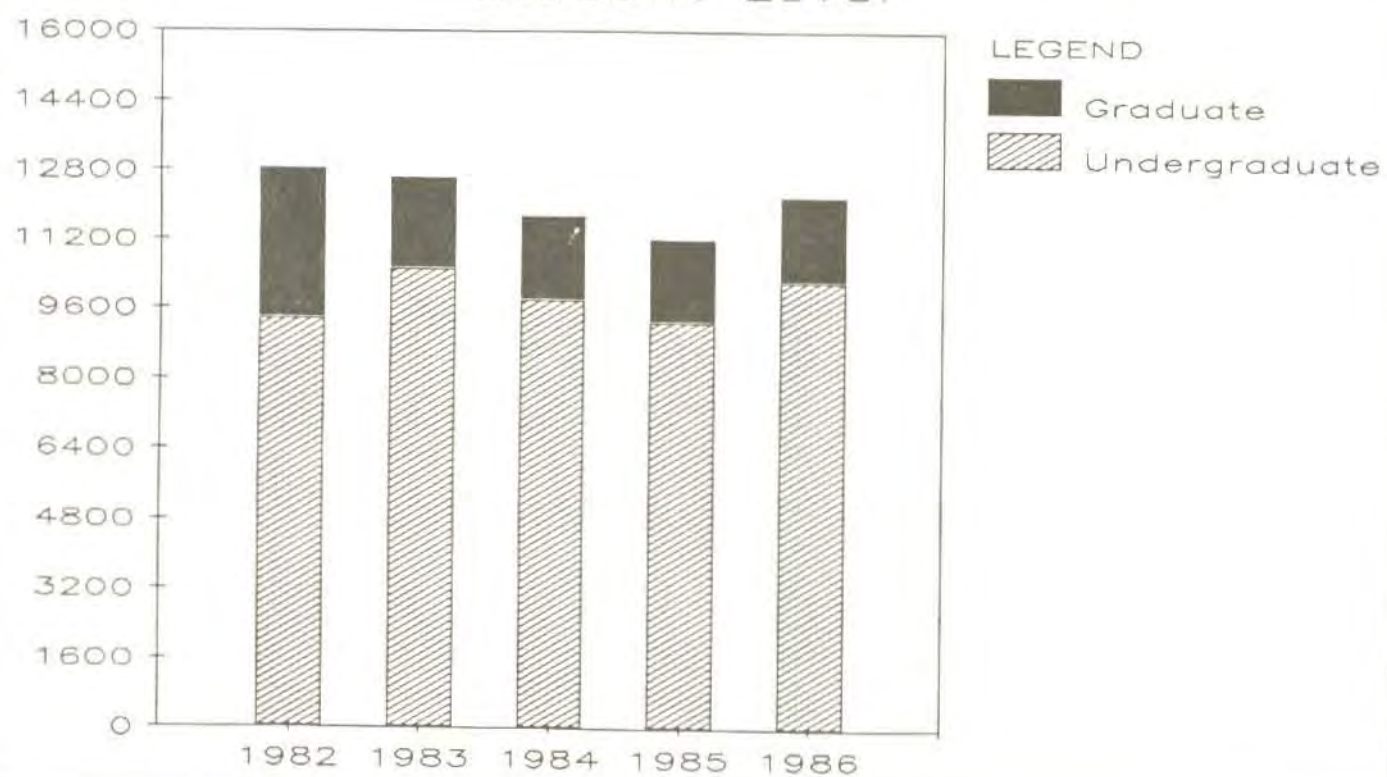

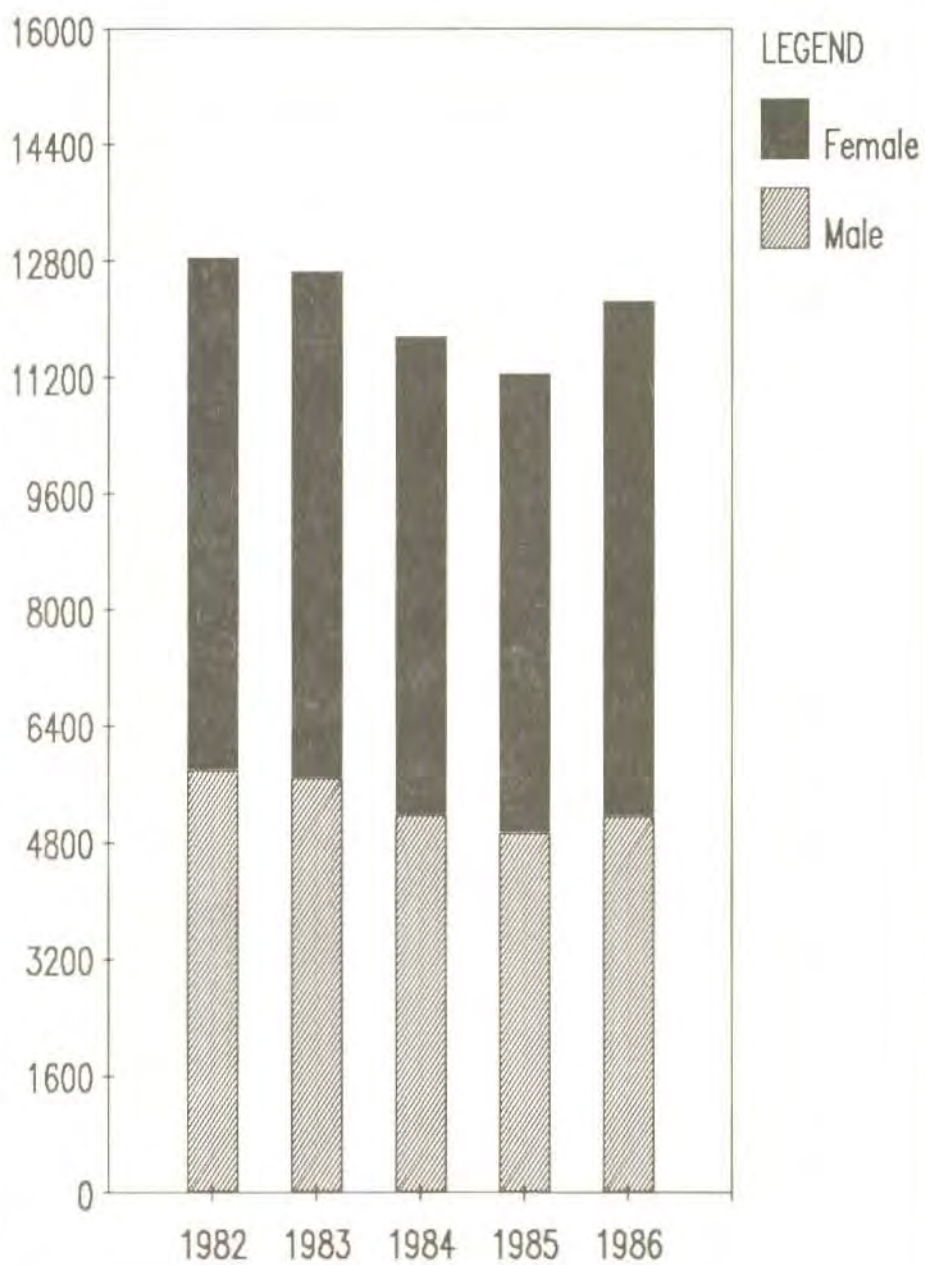
Enrollment Status

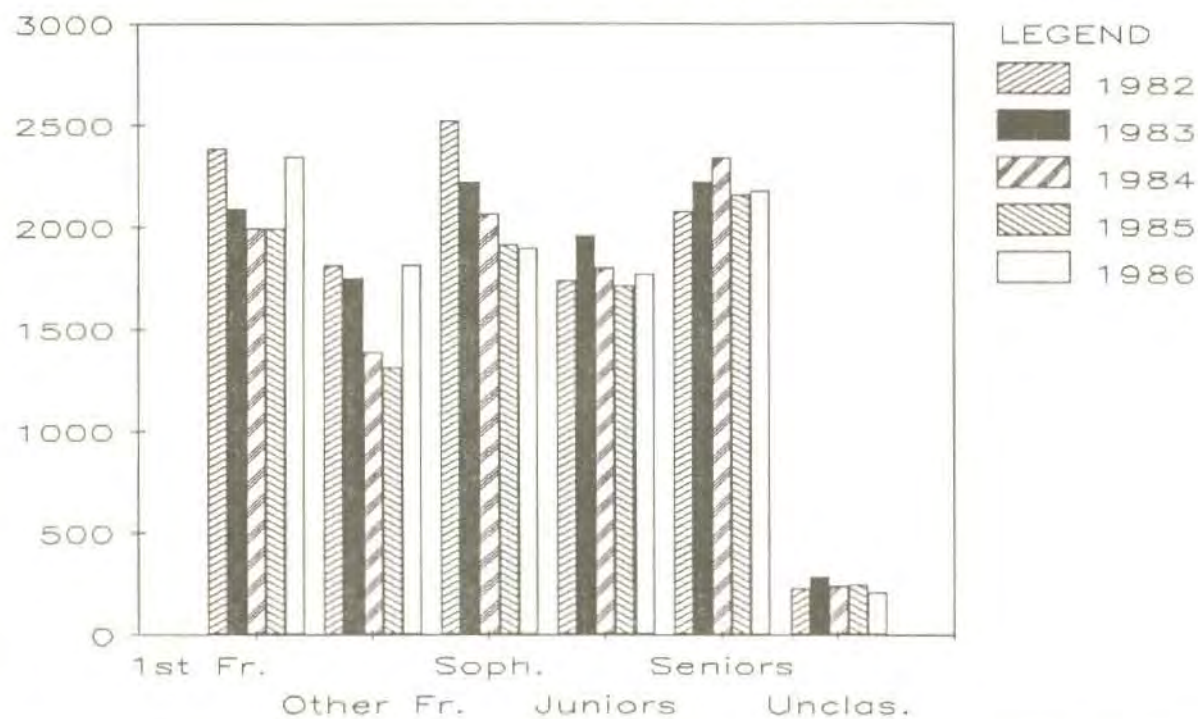

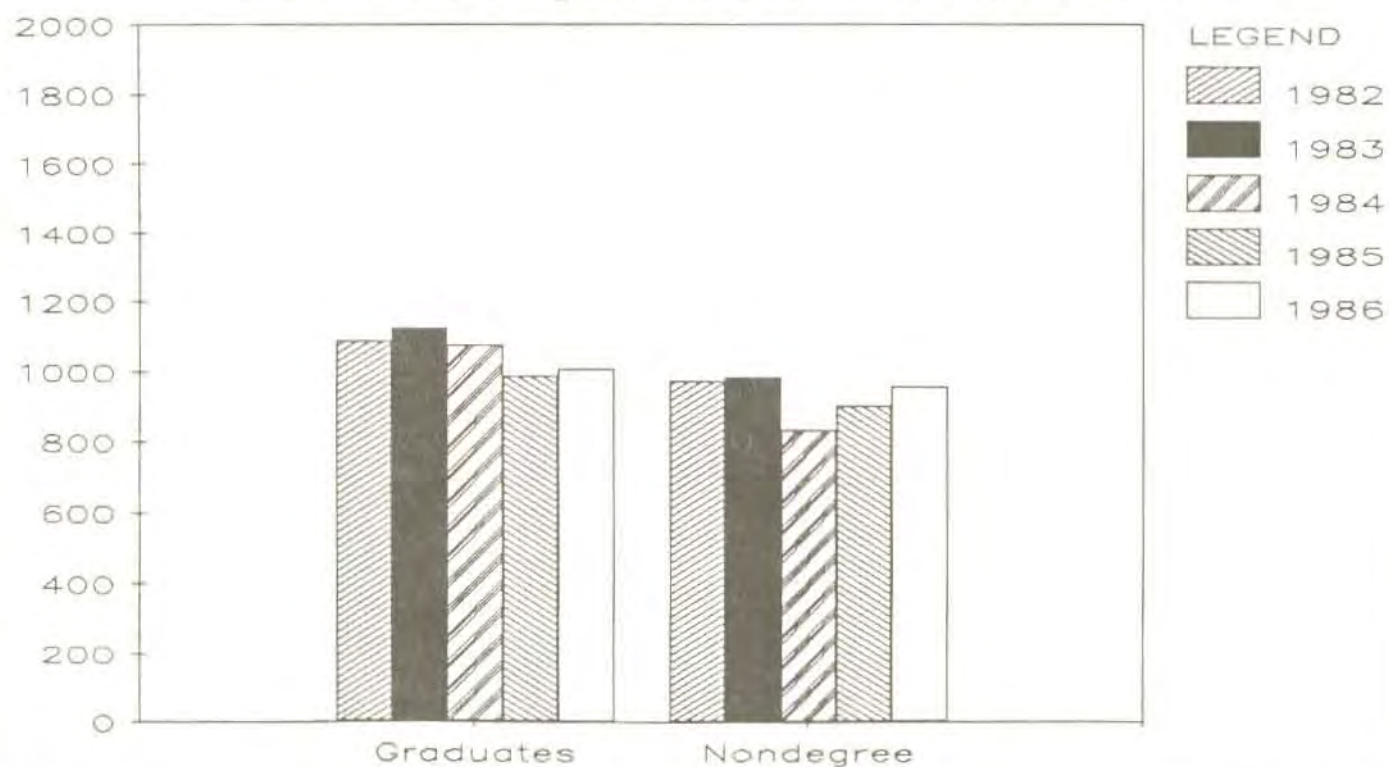

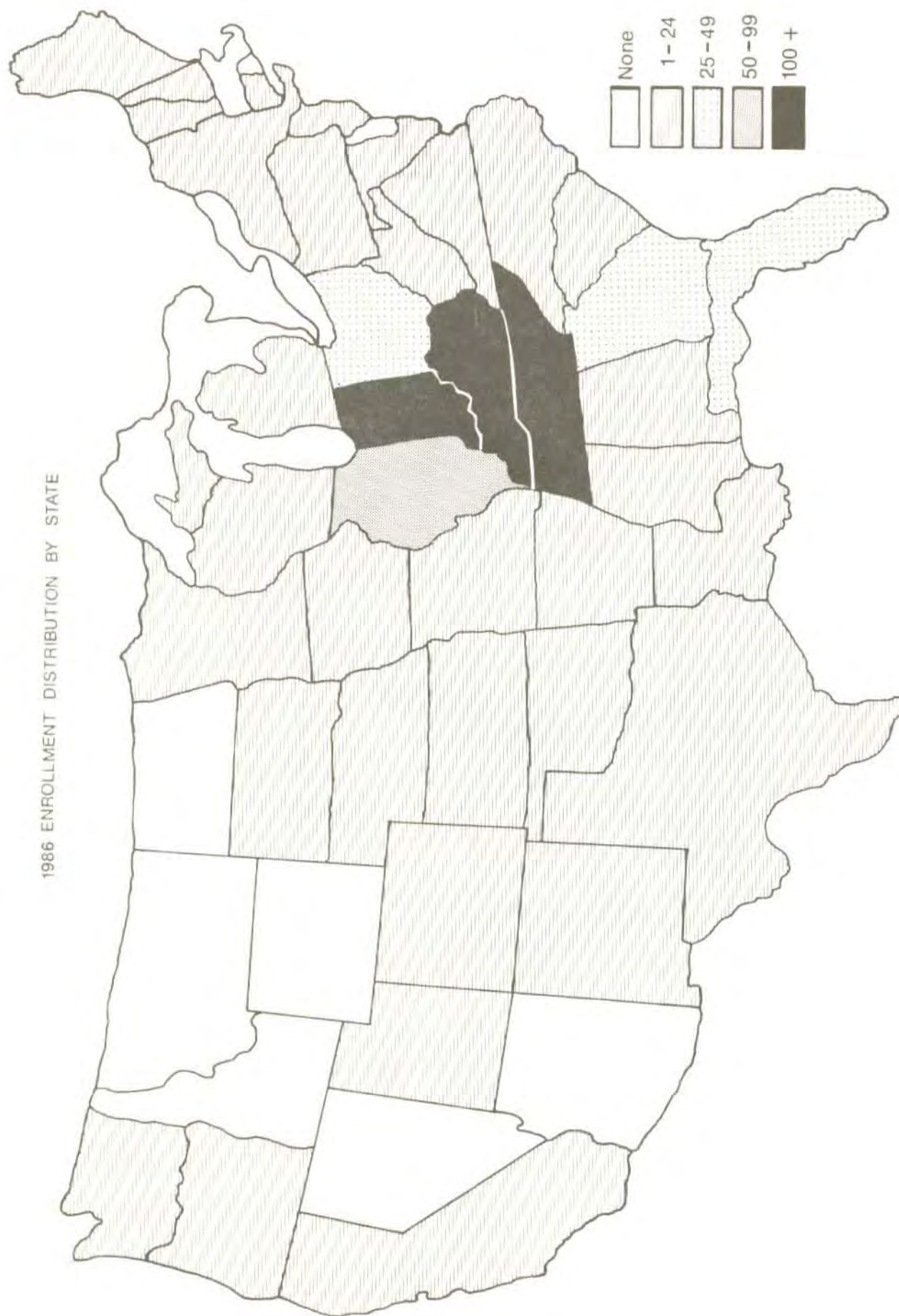
Headcount Enrollment by Class Fall Semesters



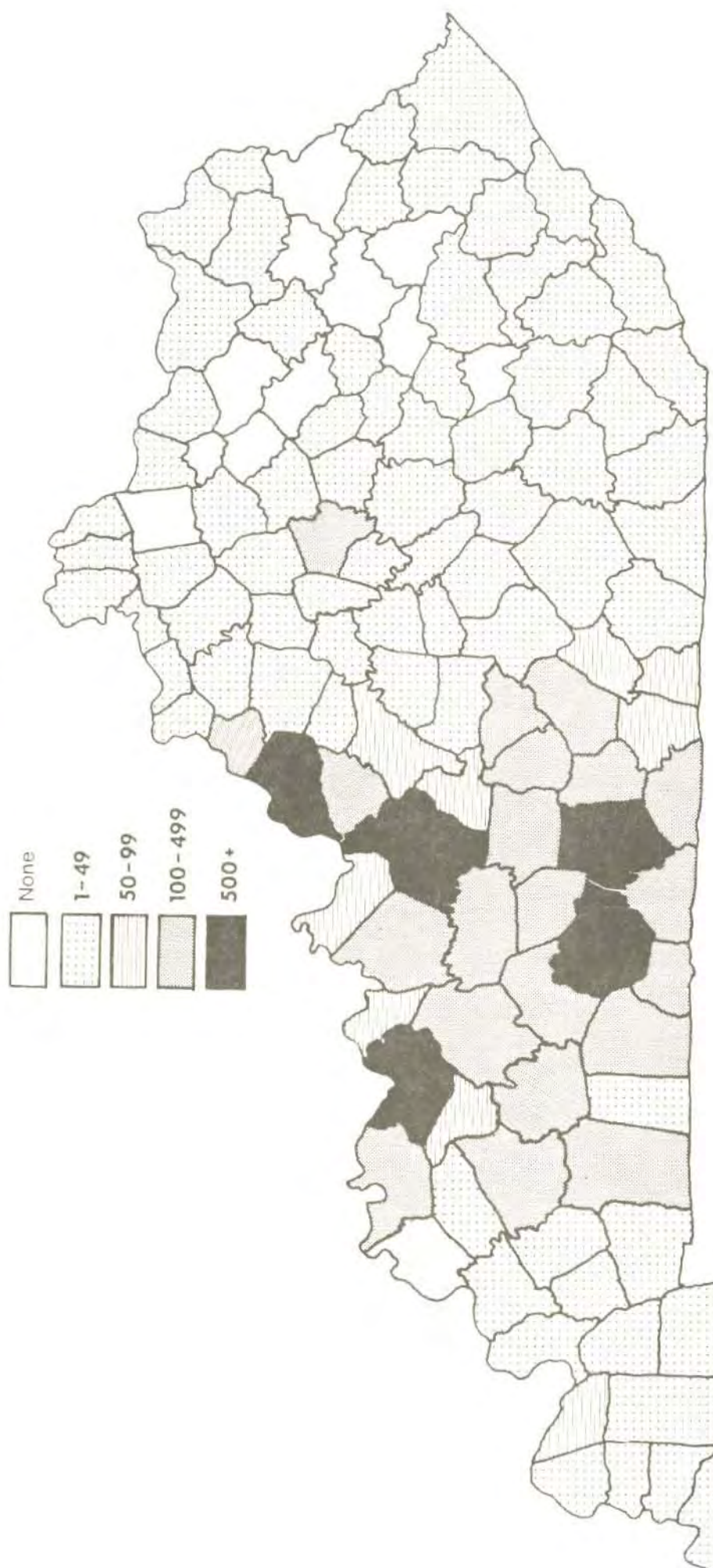
Post Undergraduate Headcount

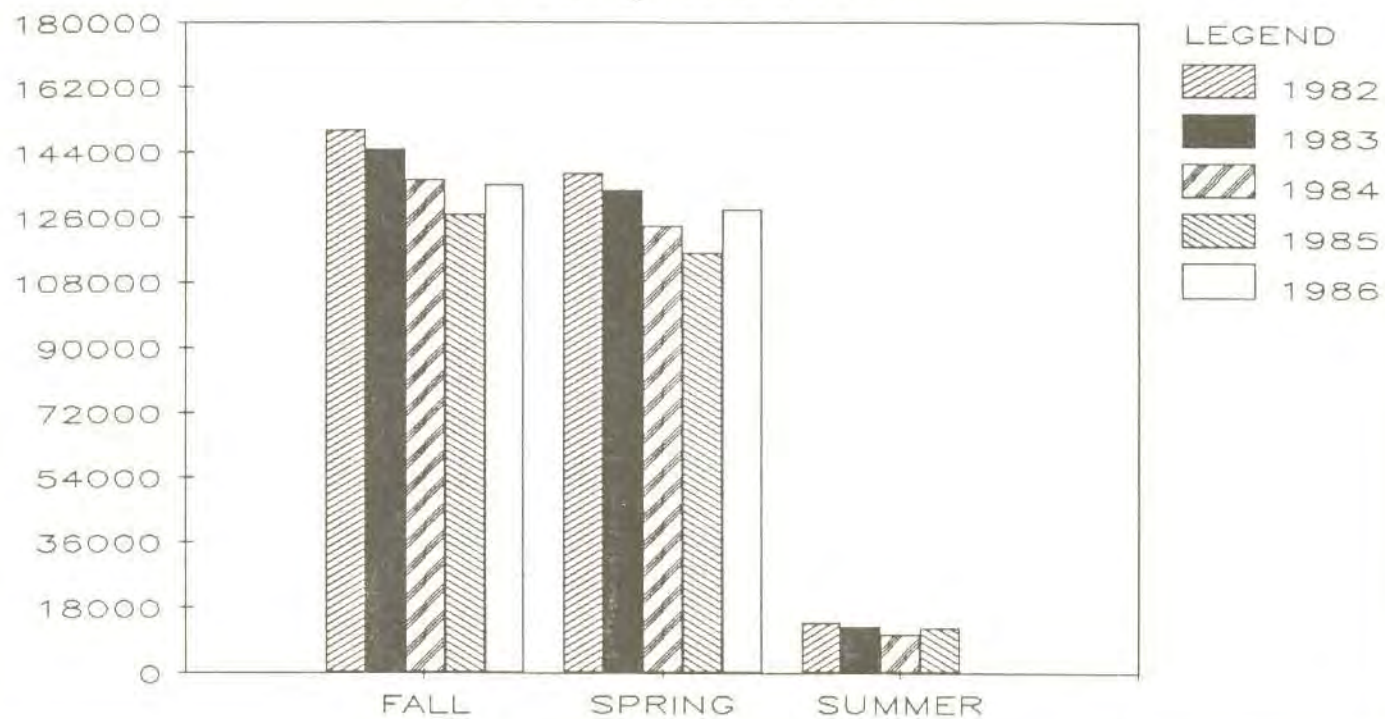

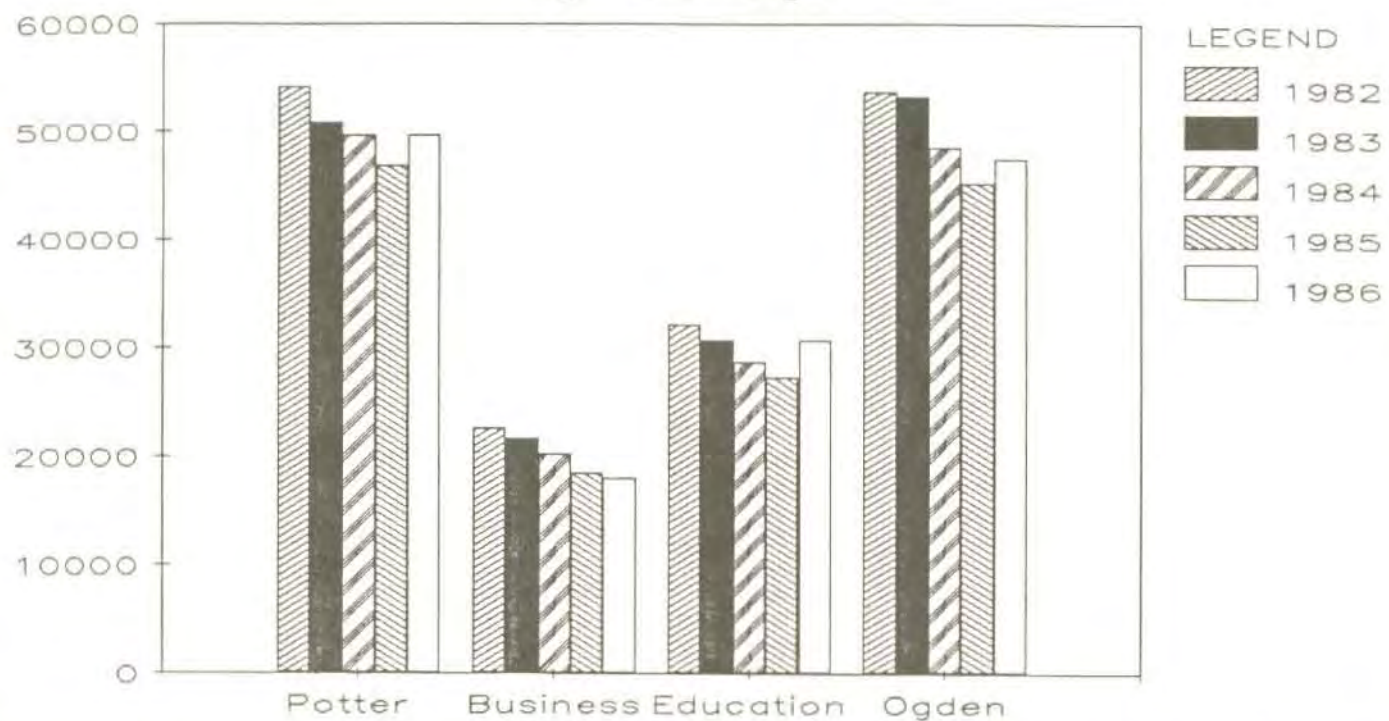

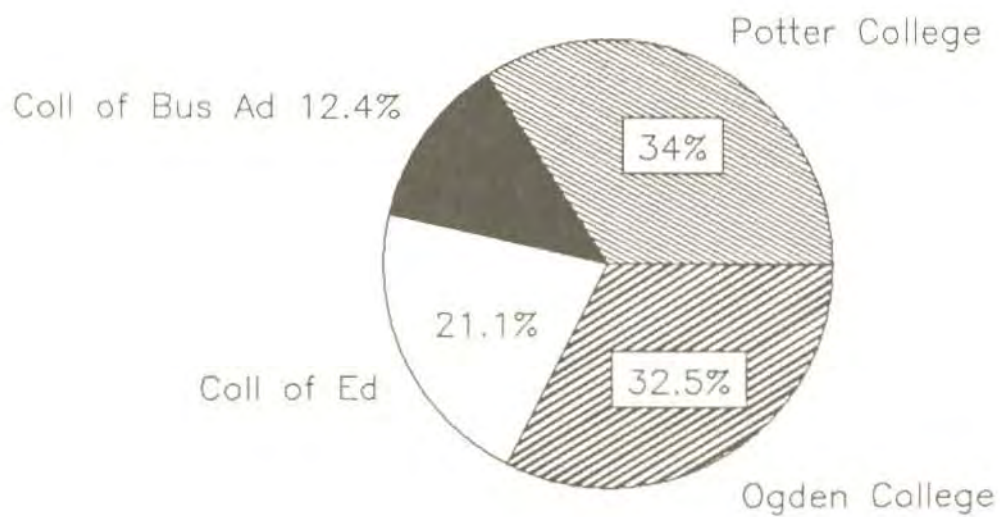

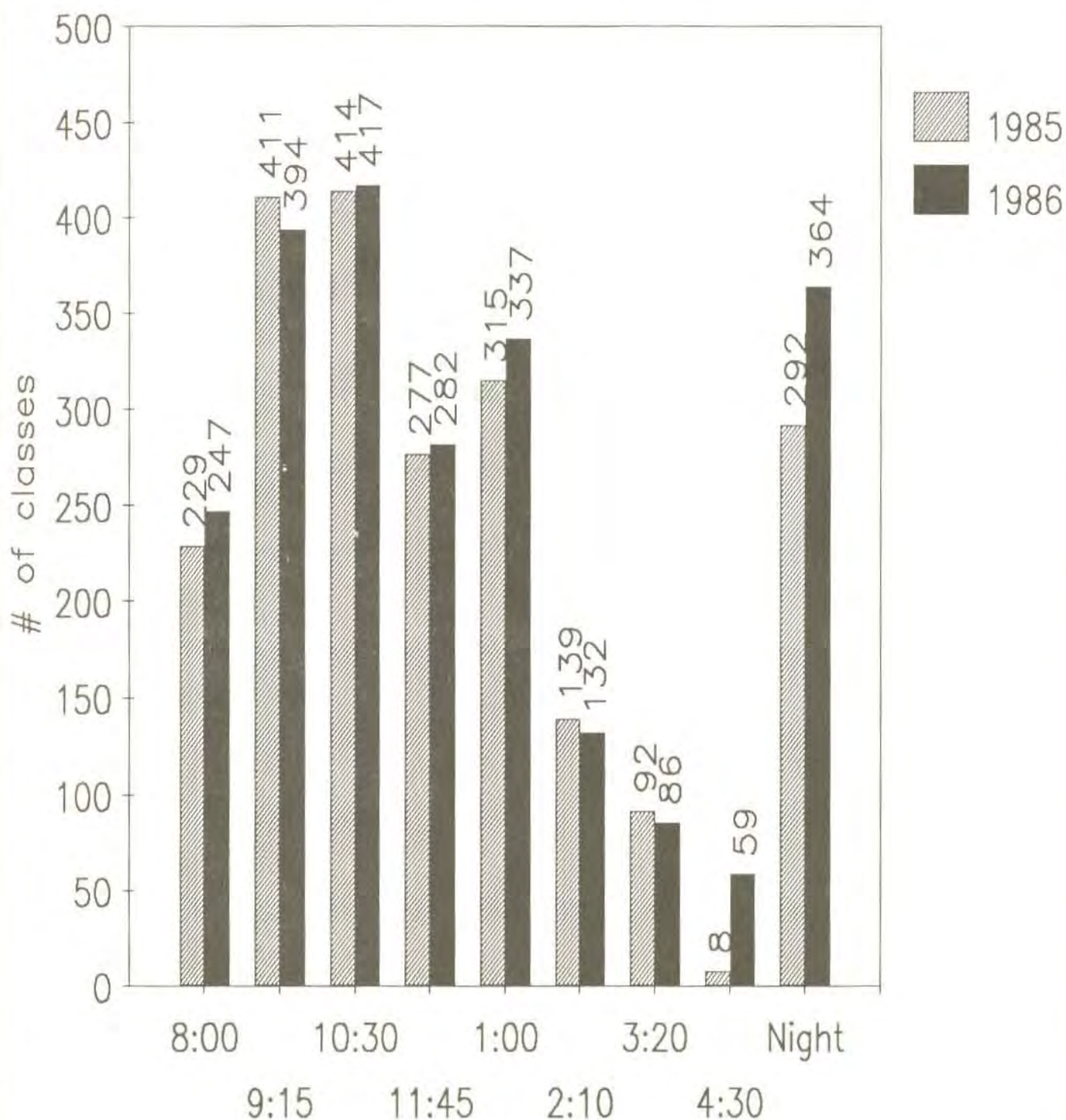

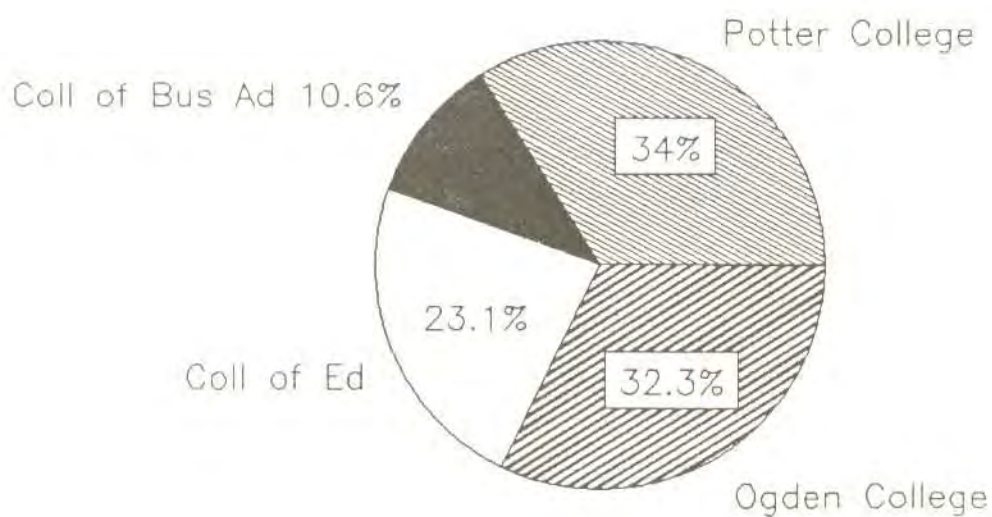

FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT FACULTY Fall, 1986



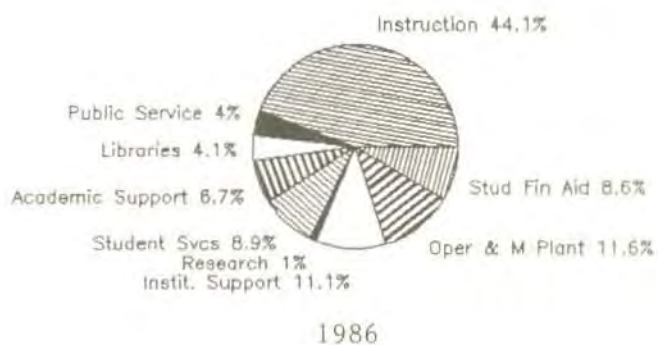
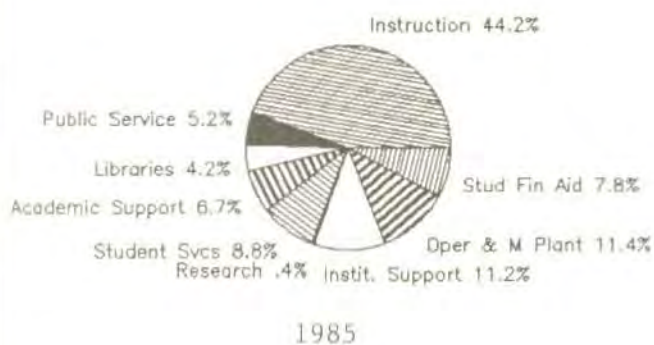
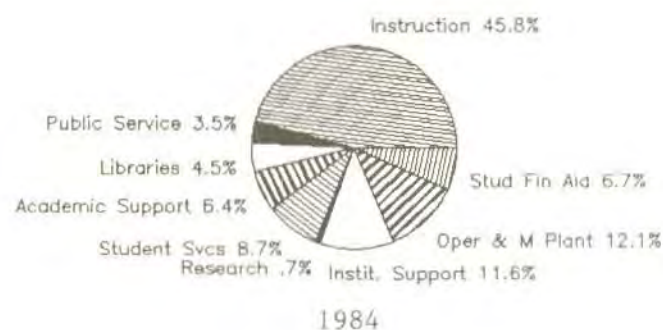
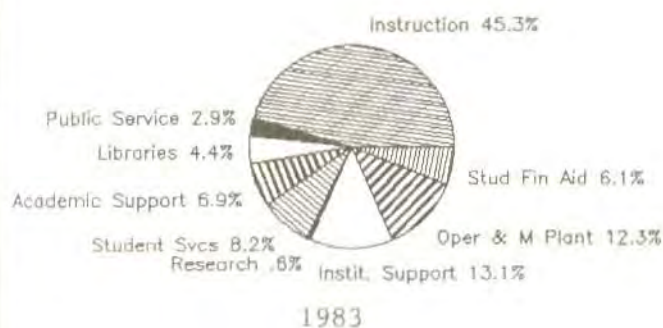

Distribution of Assignable Space Fall 1986

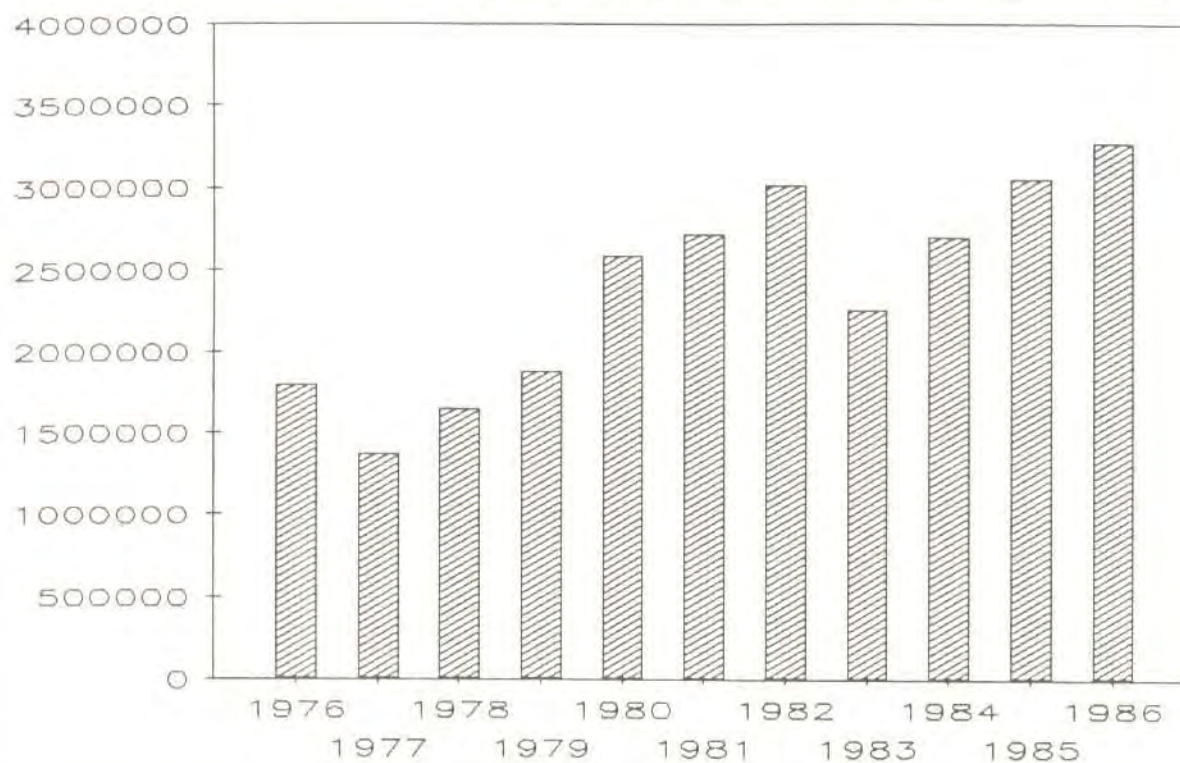
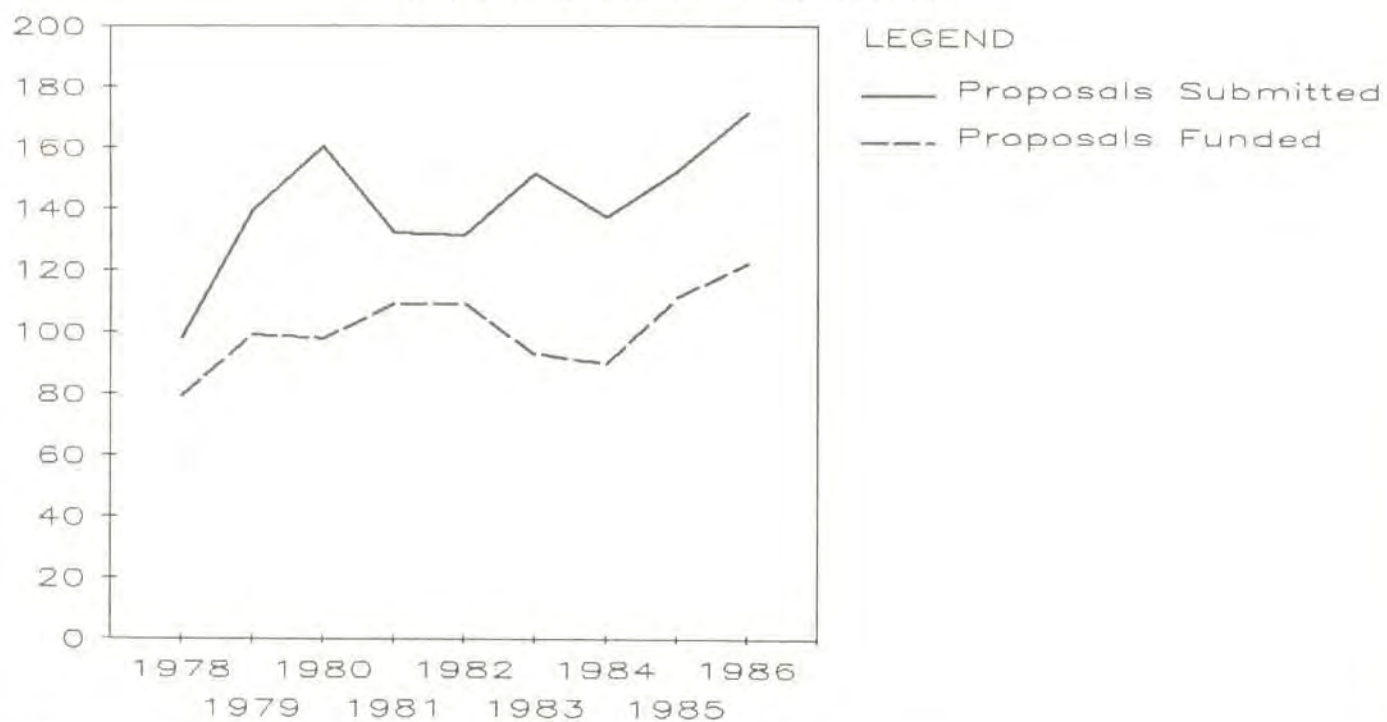
