Western at a Glance

Western Kentucky University is part of the public Kentucky postsecondary education system, which includes eight four-year institutions, 13 community colleges and 15 postsecondary technical colleges. By statute, Western Kentucky University is governed by its Board of Regents. Kentucky has no state-wide governing body; however, the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education serves as a coordinating board for the system.

Western Kentucky University is located in Bowling Green, Kentucky, a city with a population of 50,000, approximately 110 miles south of Louisville and 65 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee.

Western's undergraduate division provides four-year programs leading to the bachelor of arts, the bachelor of fine arts, the bachelor of general studies, the bachelor of science, the bachelor of science in nursing, and the bachelor of music degrees. Eighty-five (85) academic majors and seventy-one (71) academic minors are available. A number of professional and pre-professional curricula provide additional options.

Seventeen (17) associate degree programs are offered leading to the associate of arts degree, associate of science degree, associate of applied science degree, and associate of general studies degree. Five certificate programs are also offered.

Graduate Studies offers the following degrees: the master of arts, master of arts in education, master of business administration, master of science, master of public administration, master of health administration and master of public health. Western also offers the specialist degree and Rank I and Rank II programs. Western offers a cooperative master's program in criminal justice with Eastern Kentucky University and cooperative-doctoral programs with the University of Louisville and the University of Kentucky.

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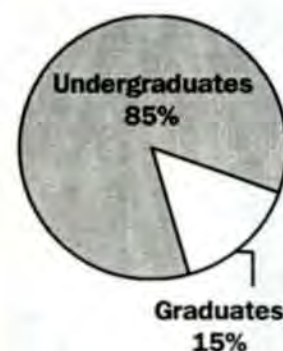

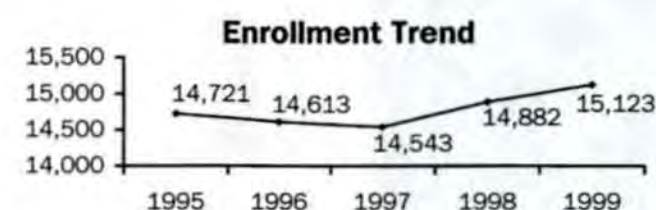


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Enrollment Snapshot 1999

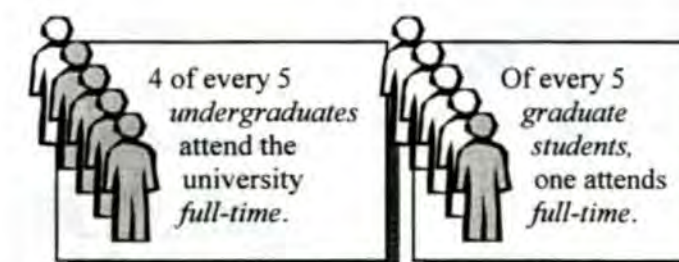

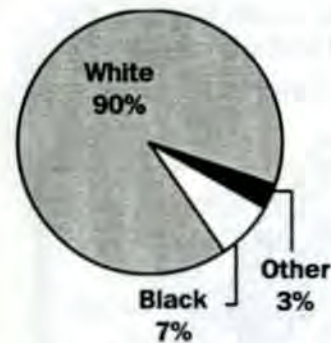

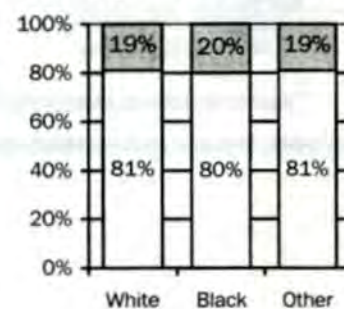
Race Snapshot 1999



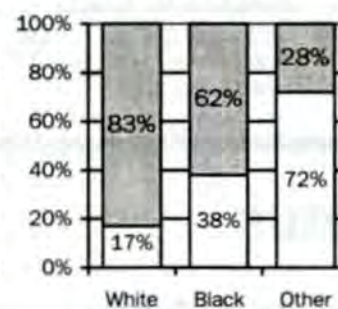
"Other" Classification denotes Asian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic, Non-Resident Alien, and American Indian/Alaskan students.

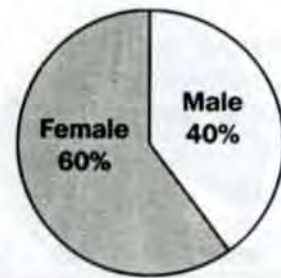

Gender Snapshot 1999

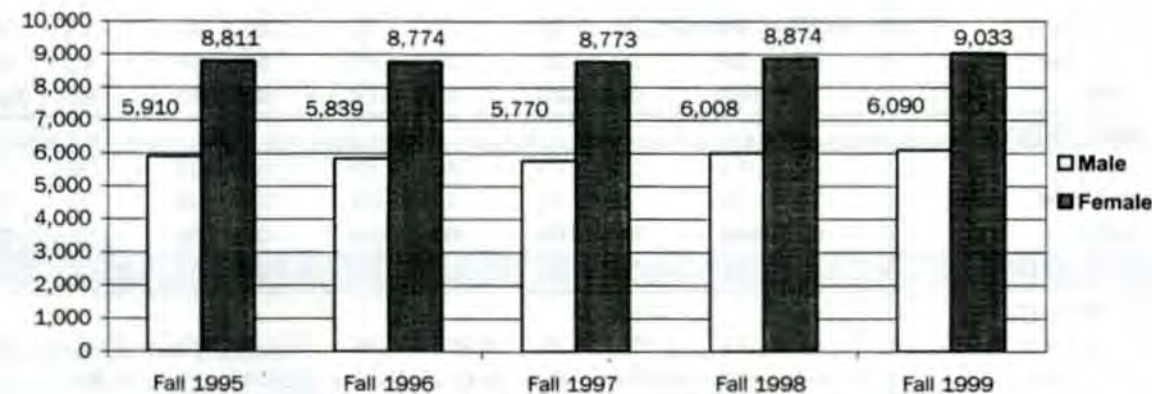


Overall, the ratio of males to females has remained constant over the past 5 years. Graduate enrollment among men has seen the largest change, with a 15% increase since 1995.



Of every five students at Western, three are female.

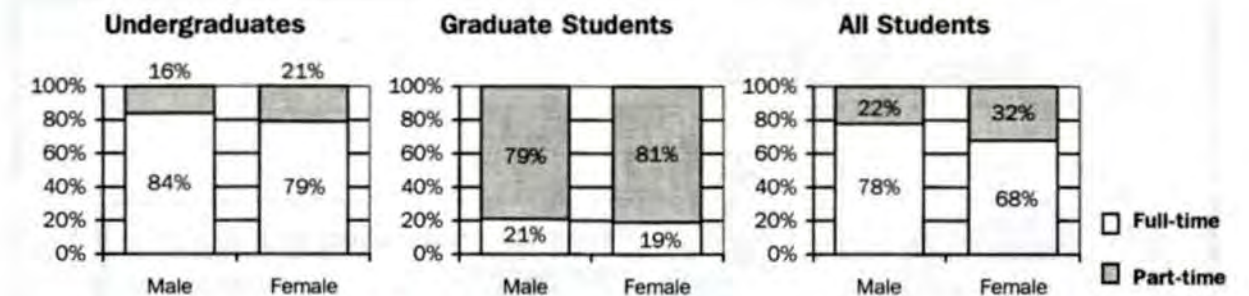

Freshman Profile



Almost one of every five entering freshman graduated in the **top ten percent** of his or her high school class.



26% of Western's Kentucky University's freshmen class had an ACT score of 24 or above. The highest comprehensive ACT score submitted by a first year freshman was 35.

- The average high school GPA among entering freshmen was 3.08.
- Almost 60% of entering freshman had a high school GPA of at least 3.0.

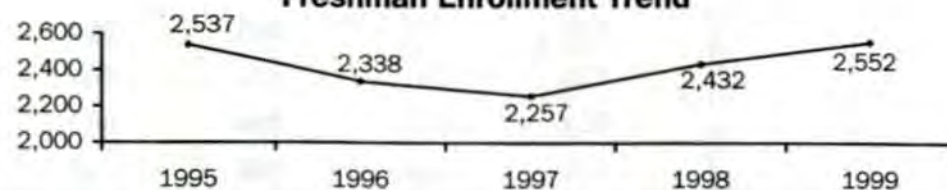

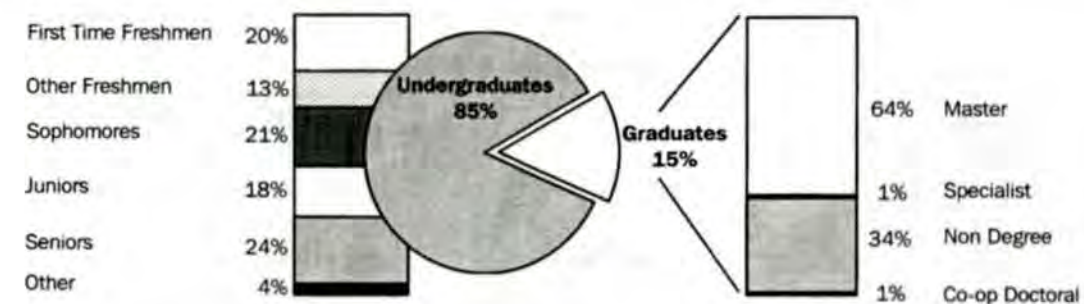

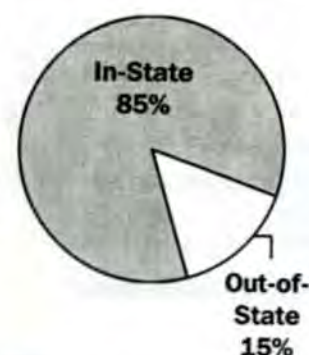

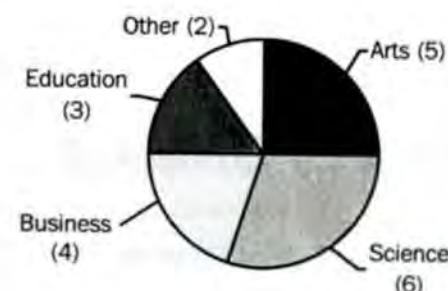

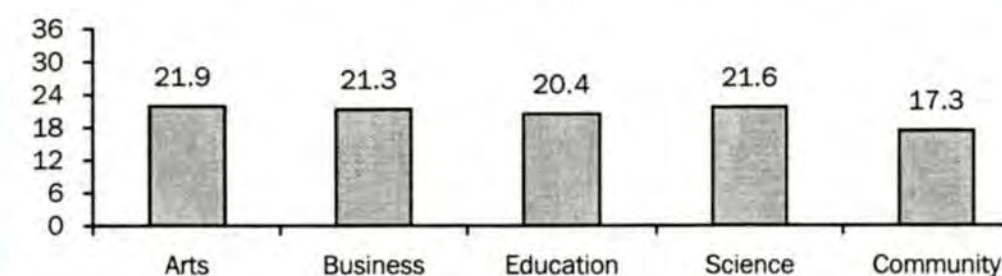

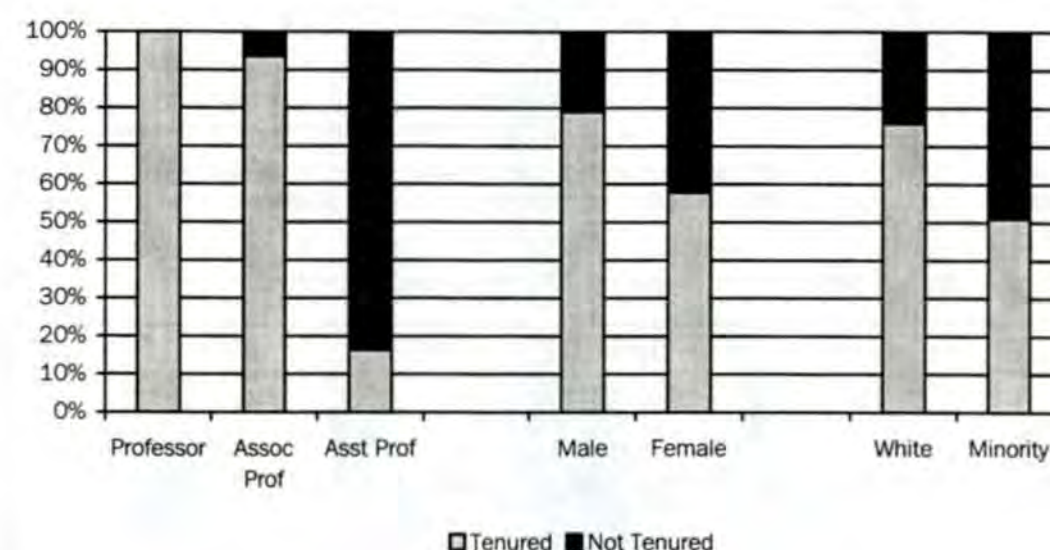

1999 Tenure Status by Rank, Gender & Race

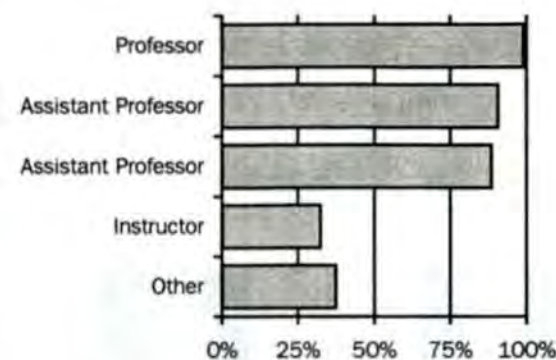


- Western's faculty hold advanced degrees from over 270 institutions around the world. 84 percent of Western's faculty hold terminal degrees, while 72 percent hold doctorates.
- 74 percent of tenure-track faculty are tenured. 79 percent of males and 63 percent of females have tenure, while 76 percent of white faculty and 51 percent of minority faculty hold tenure status.
- The lower percentage of females and minorities having tenure is due to a larger proportion of these groups holding the rank of assistant professor, a rank not typically awarded tenure.

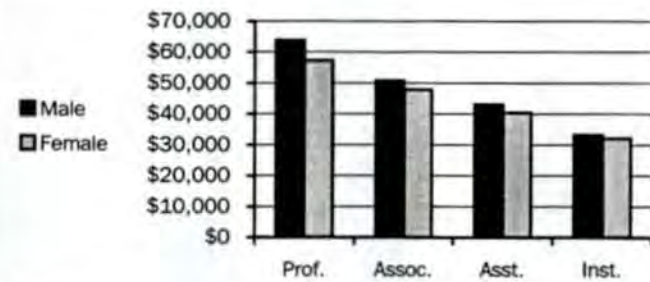

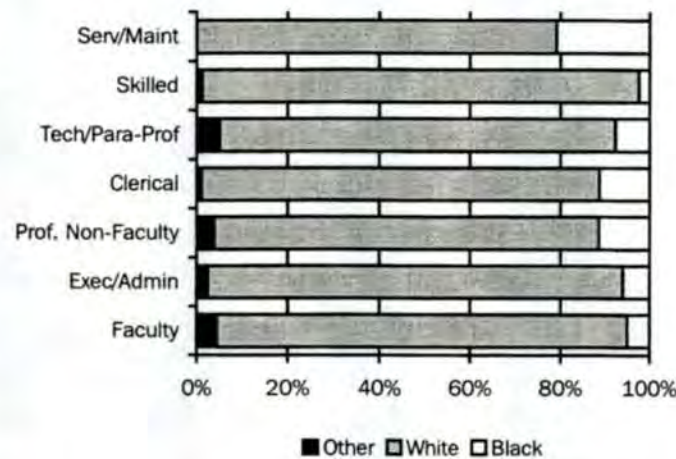

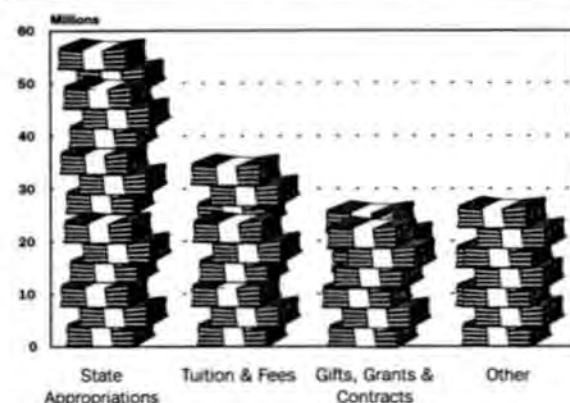

- ▶ During the same period, Western has increased the proportion of its revenues generated from gifts, grants, contracts, and other sources from 18.6 percent to 24.1 percent.

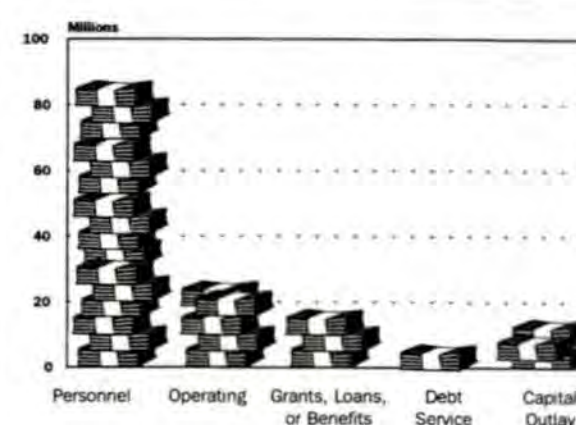

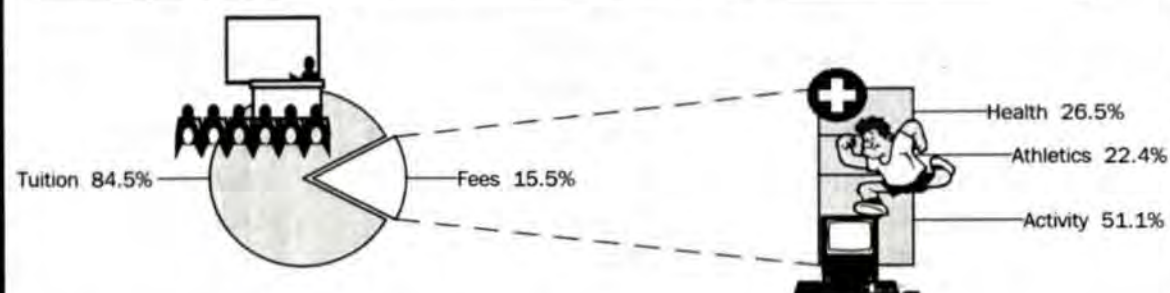

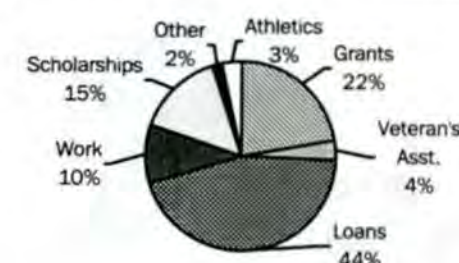
- ▶ Among public 4-year institutions in Kentucky, Western had one of the lowest tuition and fee rates for 1999/2000.

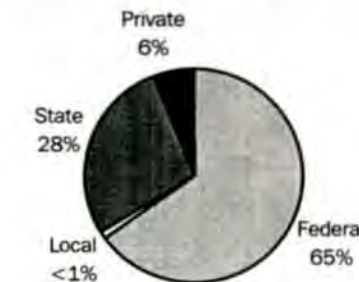

Contracts & Grants Awarded by External Agencies by Type-1998/99

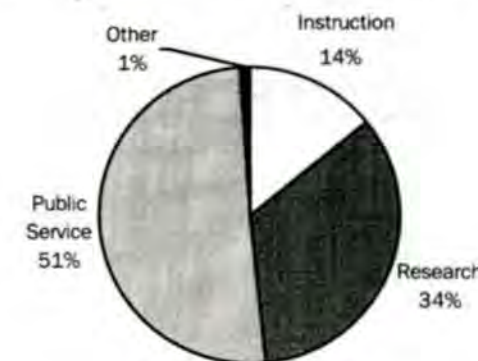

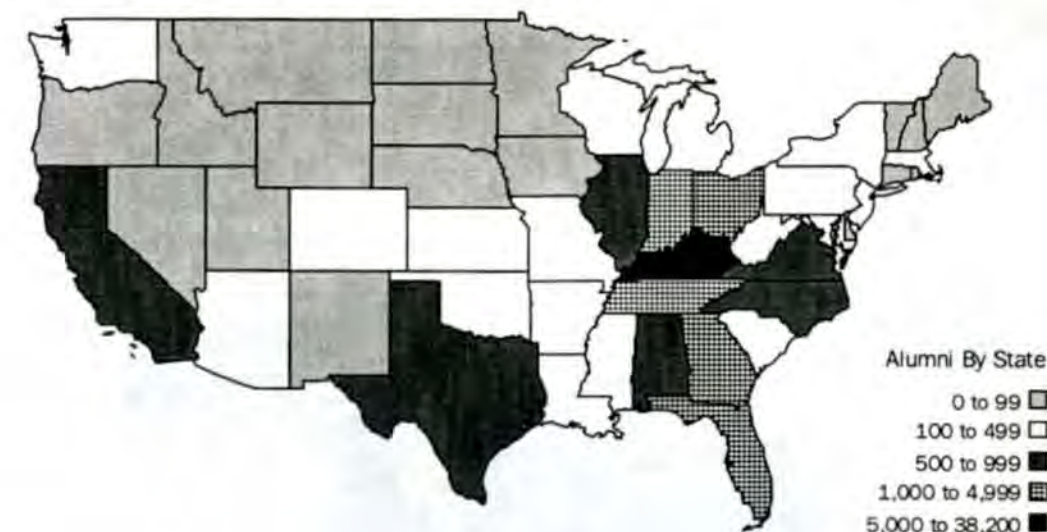

State Alumni Distribution

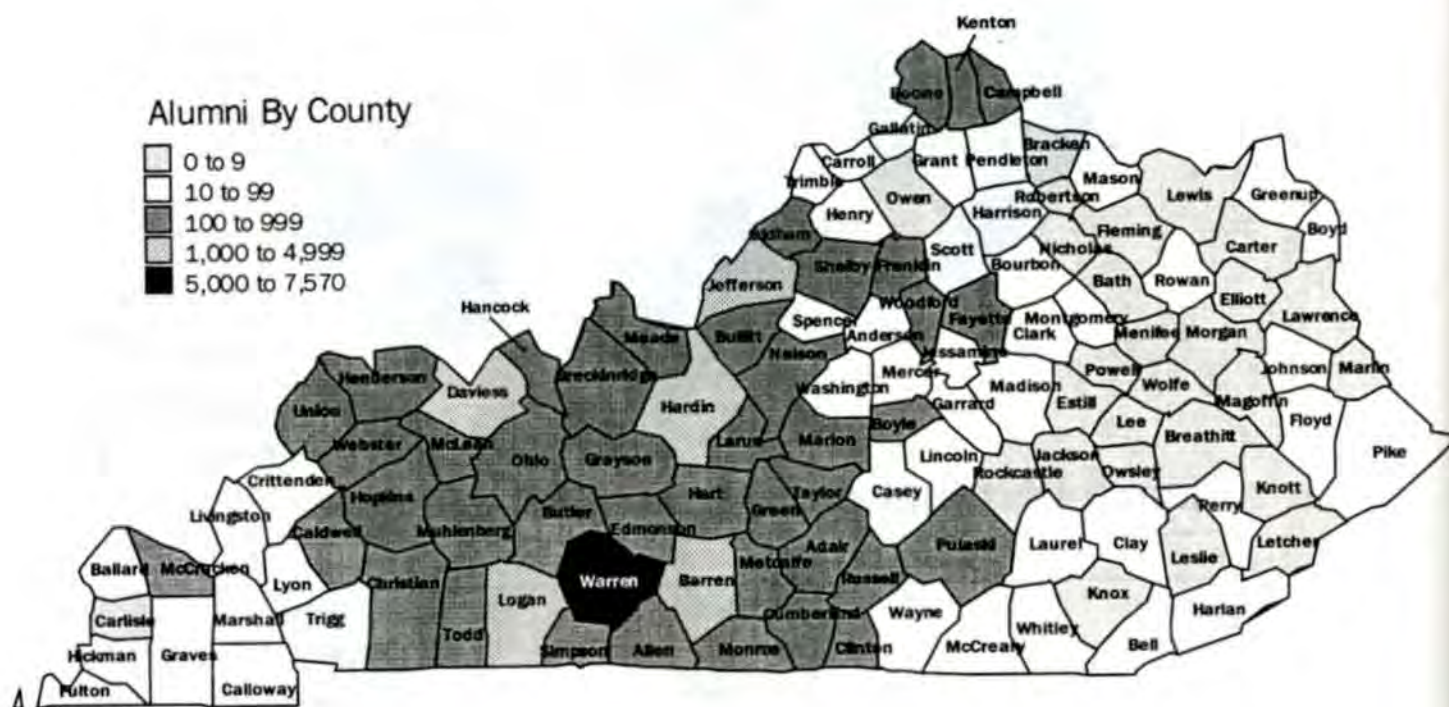

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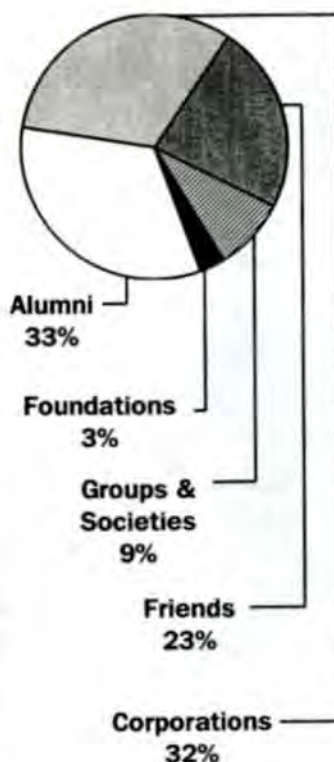

- ▶ communication with and involvement of WKU alumni and friends into the fabric of the University.

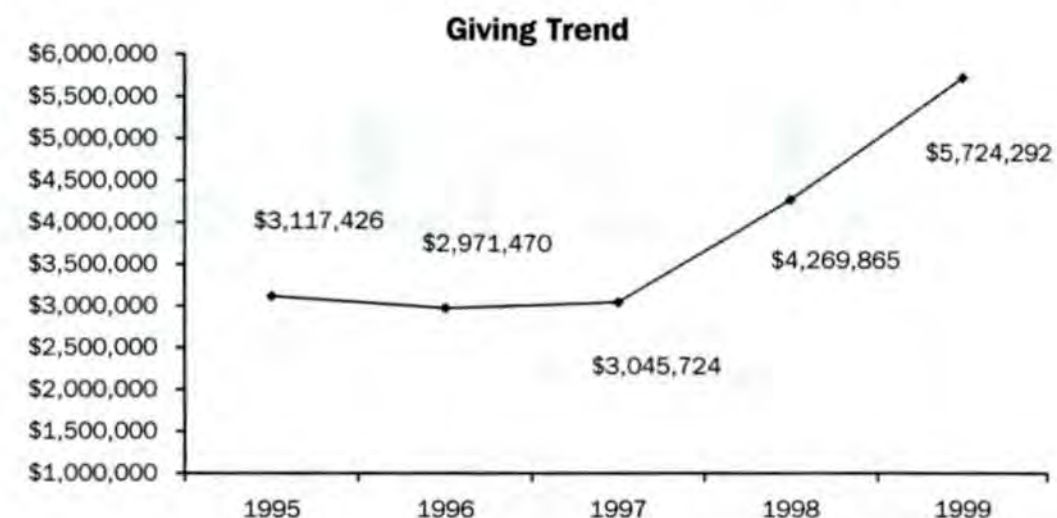
The departments in the division include Advancement Services, Alumni Relations, Annual Giving, Donor Relations, Major Gifts, Planned Giving and the WKU Foundation. These departments work in conjunction to increase the level of private support for the University and its programs.

Private support was up more than 34 percent for the 1999 fiscal year topping \$5.7 million. The combined endowment has grown to more than \$31.5 million. Our deferred gift inventory has escalated above the \$28 million mark, and seven new endowed professorships have been added to the University, bringing the total number to 12.

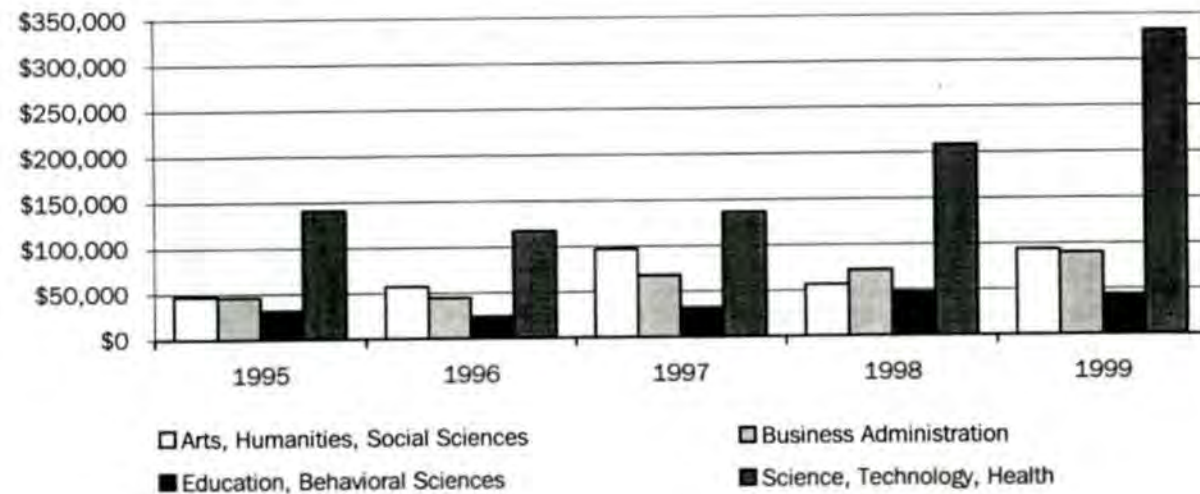

- The Hilltoppers, runners-up in the 1999 Sun Belt Conference Tournament, have a 10-11 record and are 3-2 in Sun Belt Conference play. The Hilltoppers are currently 3rd in the SBC standings.
- Junior right fielder Tim Cleland leads the 2000 Hilltoppers with .341 batting average, 11 doubles and 13 RBIs.

Softball

Coach: Leslie Phelan

- Celebrating their premiere season, the Hilltopper team has a 15-10-1 record, with winning streaks of 7 and 4 to date.

Softball

- The program celebrated their first win on February 26 by defeating Eastern Kentucky 4-2. The February 26 competition was also their first game.
- Katie Swertfager threw Western's first no hitter against Pennsylvania in the opening game of the USF/Clearwater Parks and Recreation Tournament on March 16.
- WKU pitchers Amber Garlington and Katie Swertfager were honored as Sun Belt Conference Pitcher of the Week. Garlington won the first award of the season March 13; Swertfager was honored March 20.



Men's Basketball

Coach: Dennis Felton

- The Hilltoppers rebounded from a pre-conference schedule rated seventh toughest in the nation in early January to win eight of 16 Sun Belt Conference games and finish fifth in the league.
- At 7'1" and the tallest Topper ever, sophomore center Chris Marcus made big noise for Western, ranking among the nation's leaders in rebounds with 9.5 per game and blocked shots with a school record 76 rejections. Marcus led the Conference in both categories and was named SBC Defensive Player of the Year and Newcomer of the Year while leading a spot on the All-Conference Team. His scoring average was 11.9 points per game.
- After winning only 3 of their first 14 games, the youthful Toppers bounced back to win eight of their last 15 contests. The team consisted of four veteran players and seven newcomers.
- Topper defense sparkled each night limiting opposition to 40.9% shooting from the floor, the best by a Western team since the 70-71 Hilltopper Final Four club limited its opponents to a collective 40.0% field goal percentage.
- The '99-00 Hilltoppers were the tallest team ever. Two players stood 6'11" or taller and five were 6'8" or taller. The average team height was over 6'.
- The Toppers averaged 4.1 blocked shots per game, the second highest average on record for a WKU team.
- Rookie Filip Videnov's 183 points tied for ninth among all Hilltopper freshmen in varsity play.

Women's Basketball

Coach: Steve Small

- The Lady Toppers finished the 99-00 season 22-10 overall and 13-3 in the Sun Belt Conference.
- Western made its fourteenth appearance in the NCAA Tournament.
- The Toppers finished second in the Sun Belt Conference losing a narrow 97-94 decision to third ranked Louisiana Tech in championship play.
- The Lady Toppers posted their sixteenth 20-win season in the past 18 years.
- Junior ShaRae Mansfield was a third-team All America selection by the Women's Basketball News Service and led the Sun Belt in scoring, rebounding and field goal percentage.
- Jamie Britt, Jaime Walz and Mansfield were named to the All-Sun Belt Conference Team. Walz, Mansfield and sophomore Natalie Powers were named to the All-Tournament Team.
- Walz set a school record with 94 three-pointers while Mansfield established a new WKU standard with 339 rebounds. Mansfield became only the second Lady Topper to average a double-double for an entire season with 18.5 points per game and 10.6 rebounds per game. Mansfield finished second in the nation with 22 double-doubles and 56 consecutive double figure scores.
- Next season, the Lady Toppers will return three starters and nine letter winners. WKU has signed six players including four recently named to the AP Kentucky All-State Team.



Football

Coach: Jack Harbaugh

- ▶ The Hilltoppers celebrated their fourth consecutive winning season with a 6-5 record. Coach Harbaugh's teams have a 30-15 four year record.
- ▶ Senior center Patrick Goodman was honored as an All-American or Academic All-American by six organizations.
- ▶ Senior defensive end Ben Wittman was a Third Team All-America selection by Don Hansen's Gazette. Senior running back Rod Smart was an honorable mention All-America selection by the publication.
- ▶ WKU was one of three schools to have five players named First Team All Ohio Valley Conference: Goodman, Smart, Wittman, senior line backer Melvin Wisham and freshman strong safety Bobby Sippio. Sophomore corner back Mel Mitchell was a Second Team selection. Senior offensive tackle Todd Sorrell and sophomore line backer Sherrod Coates were honorable mention picks.
- ▶ Seven players were honored as OVC Players of the Week: Sherrod Coates, Newcomer, September 6; Bobby Sippio, Newcomer, September 12, November 14; Melvin Wisham, Defensive, September 26; Mel Mitchell, Defensive, October 3; Rod Smart, Offensive, October 31; Junior Alan Ogletree, Special Teams, November 21.
- ▶ Harbaugh and staff signed 22 players in the 2000 recruiting class.

Men's Golf

Coach: Brian Tirpak

- ▶ The Hilltoppers began the fall season with the best start in school history 41-1. They finished the fall season with a 62-27-1 record surpassing the school record of 109 wins in a season.
- ▶ They won back-to-back tournaments at the Detroit Titans Invitational and ECU Colonel Classic. Western also recorded three second place finishes to-date.
- ▶ The Toppers recorded two individual championships: sophomore Eric Mason at the Louisville Intercollegiate and senior Charlie Cornette at the Kauai Collegiate Cup at Princeville hosted by WKU. Western's current record is a sparkling 71-28-1 as of March 20.

Women's Golf

Coach: Chuck Eison

- ▶ The Lady Toppers ended the fall season with a third place finish of 20 teams at the Western Carolina Lady Catmount Intercollegiate. Their record heading into the spring season is 24-22.

Soccer

Coach: David Holmes

- ▶ The Toppers had an impressive 14-5 record, completing the season in third place in the Missouri Valley Conference for the second consecutive year.
- ▶ Bryan Robbins and Tawanda Chitapa were named to the All-MVC Team.
- ▶ The Hilltoppers were ranked as high as fourth in the Great Lakes Region during the 99 season.



Swimming

Coach: Bill Powell

- ▶ The Toppers finished 12-0, their sixth undefeated season in school history.
- ▶ Captain Kicker Vencill was named WKU Male Athlete of the Year, the second consecutive year a swimmer claimed the honor. Vencill also qualified for the NCAA meet, the first Hilltopper to do so since 1988.
- ▶ The Lady Toppers completed their first undefeated season in the short three year history of women's swimming on the Hill going 13-0.
- ▶ Brandi Beckwith, a GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-District pick, was named the Female Swimmer of the Year for the second year at the National Independent Conference Championships. Beckwith also qualified for the NCAA meet.
- ▶ Swim coach Bill Powell posted his 282 career victories during the 99-00 season. Powell ranks third in wins among all collegiate coaches and was named the NIC Coach of the Year.

Men's Tennis

Coach: Jeff True

- ▶ True's squad returns five players from last year's record setting 27-3 season.
- ▶ The fall season Toppers saw action in two tournaments, posting a combined 21-16 record in singles action. Senior Andrei Makarevitch led the way with a 5-2 record in top singles flights. Makarevitch teamed with Junior Michael Lindskog to lead the squad with a 3-1 mark in doubles play.

Men's Tennis

- ▶ Lindskog, with a 4.0 GPA, was honored in the off season by the College Sports Information Directors of America as GTE All-American Second Team.
- ▶ The Toppers opened Spring 2000 play with a 7-6 record after enjoying a five match winning streak.
- ▶ Makarevitch continues to lead the team with 10 wins and only three losses in singles play. Lindskog follows at a 9-4 record.

Women's Tennis

Coach: Laura Hudspeth

- ▶ Western participated in four fall season matches compiling an 18-23 overall record in singles play.
- ▶ Sophomore Therse Johannsen leads the spring season team with a 5-3 singles mark. Freshman Liene Rozenthale paces the way with a 5-3 record in doubles

Track, Cross Country

Coach: Curtiss Long

- ▶ The Women's Cross Country Team, led by individual champion senior Valerie Lynch, won the Sun Belt Conference title. Five runners finished in the top 10 each earning All-Conference Honors.
- ▶ WKU's Men's Cross Country Team finished second in the Sun Belt with four individuals earning All-Conference honors with their top 10 finishes. Senior Duncan Shangase was fourteenth at the NCAA Southeast Regional to help lead the Hilltoppers to an eleventh place finish in the field of 25 teams.

Athletics and Student Services

Track, Cross Country

- ▶ At the February 12 indoor Valentine Invitational, the Lady Toppers led by Lisa Cronin, Holly Wilder and Amber Marshall recorded a third place team finish.
- ▶ The Hilltoppers finished the indoor season with a sixth place team finish at the Sun Belt Conference Championships in Jonesboro, Arkansas beating New Orleans and Arkansas Little Rock.
- ▶ 12 Lady Toppers and 12 Hilltoppers placed in the top 10 finals of their events at the Sun Belt Conference Championship in Jonesboro. Valerie Lynch took home victories in the 3000 and 5000 meter runs earning honors as the meet's Outstanding Track Performer. Rod Smart won the 55 meter dash and placed second in the 200 meter dash.
- ▶ Lynch was an NCAA provisional qualifier in the 5000 meter run with a Sun Belt best time of 16:45.34. The Ireland native was named the Sun Belt Conference Performer of the Week twice during the indoor season. Lynch also earned a berth on the GTE-CoSIDA Academic All District Team.
- ▶ 1999-2000 team members set four new Western records: women's distance medley relay, women's pole vault, men's 60 meter dash and the men's 200 meter dash.
- ▶ Christy Green set a Sun Belt Conference record in the pole vault with her 9-6 launch January 14 in Lexington, Kentucky. Green tied that mark at Murfreesboro February 12.

Volleyball

Coach: Travis Hudson

- ▶ The Lady Toppers ended their season with an 18-14 record marking the first time in four years the Toppers enjoyed back-to-back winning seasons. Natalie Furry, Jenni Miller and 1998 Sun Belt Player of the Year Kim Carpenter each earned a place on the All-Sun Belt Conference Team. Furry was selected to the All-Sun Belt Tournament Team. Carpenter, the preseason pick as SBC Player of the Year, was selected All-Conference despite suffering a rash of injuries.
- ▶ Senior Jenni Miller became the first Lady Topper and the fourth Sun Belt athlete to record over 4,000 assists. She completed her career with 4,521.
- ▶ Coach Hudson signed four prep stars for the 2000 season. Next year, WKU will return eight letter winners and four starters from a squad that reached the SBC tournament semifinals. The 2000 Lady Toppers will seek their third straight winning season which would be a first in the 10 year history of WKU volleyball.
- ▶ Academically, the Volley Toppers turned in a stellar performance with a combined grade point average for the 1999 fall semester of 3.57. One athlete had a perfect 4.0 average. No player under Hudson's 11 player squad posted a fall GPA lower than 3.2. WKU earned the 1998-99 SBC sport academic award for volleyball recording a 3.46 GPA. The Western ladies picked up the 98-99 WKU Team Academic Award for the highest combined GPA of any women's sports team.

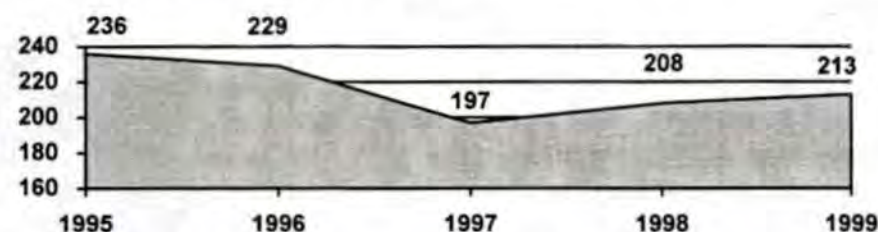
To this end, the WKU Police:

- ▶ Is responsive to the needs of the university community, sensitive to issues, in modifying and expanding services to meet the needs of the community we serve.



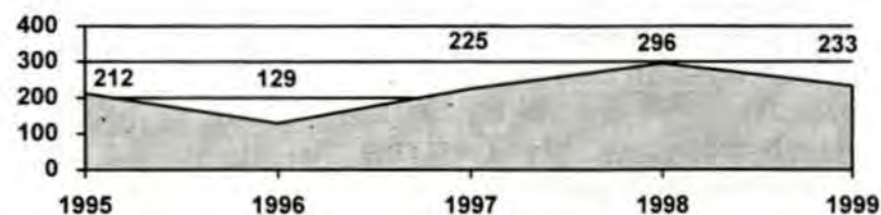

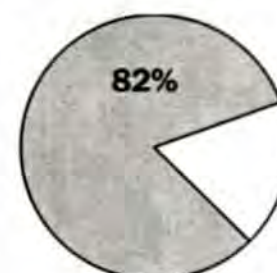

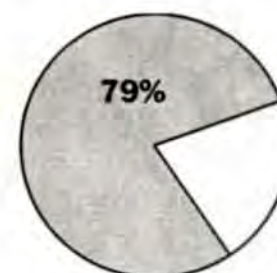

Male Room Occupancy

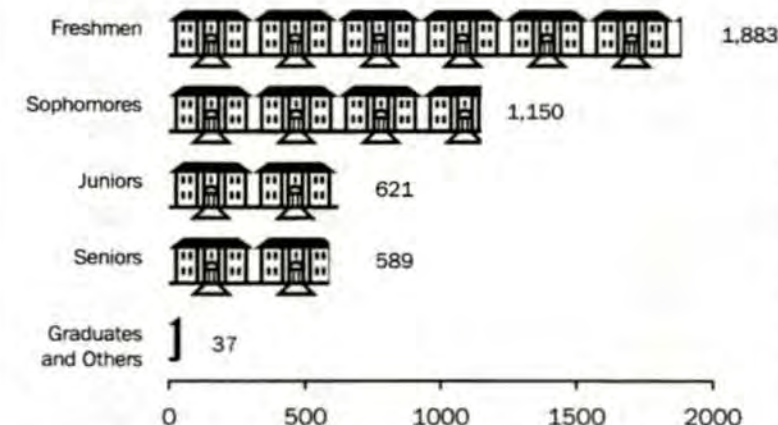


Female Room Occupancy
