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

Western at a Glance

Western Kentucky University is part of the public Kentucky postsecondary education system, which includes eight four-year institutions, 13 community colleges and 15 postsecondary technical colleges. By statute, Western Kentucky University is governed by its Board of Regents. Kentucky has no state-wide governing body; however, the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education serves as a coordinating board for the system.

Western Kentucky University is located in Bowling Green, Kentucky, a city with a population of 50,000, approximately 110 miles south of Louisville and 65 miles north of Nashville, Tennessee.

Western's undergraduate division provides four-year programs leading to the bachelor of arts, the bachelor of fine arts, the bachelor of general studies, the bachelor of science, the bachelor of science in nursing, and the bachelor of music degrees. Eighty (80) academic majors and seventy (70) academic minors are available. A number of professional and pre-professional curricula provide additional options.

Seventeen (17) associate degree programs are offered leading to the associate of arts degree, associate of science degree, associate of applied science degree, and associate of general studies degree. Five certificate programs are also offered.

Graduate Studies offers the following degrees: the master of arts, master of arts in education, master of business administration, master of health administration, master of public administration, master of public health and master of science. Western also offers the specialist degree and Rank I and Rank II programs. Western offers a cooperative master's program in criminal justice with Eastern Kentucky University and cooperative-doctoral program with the University of Louisville.

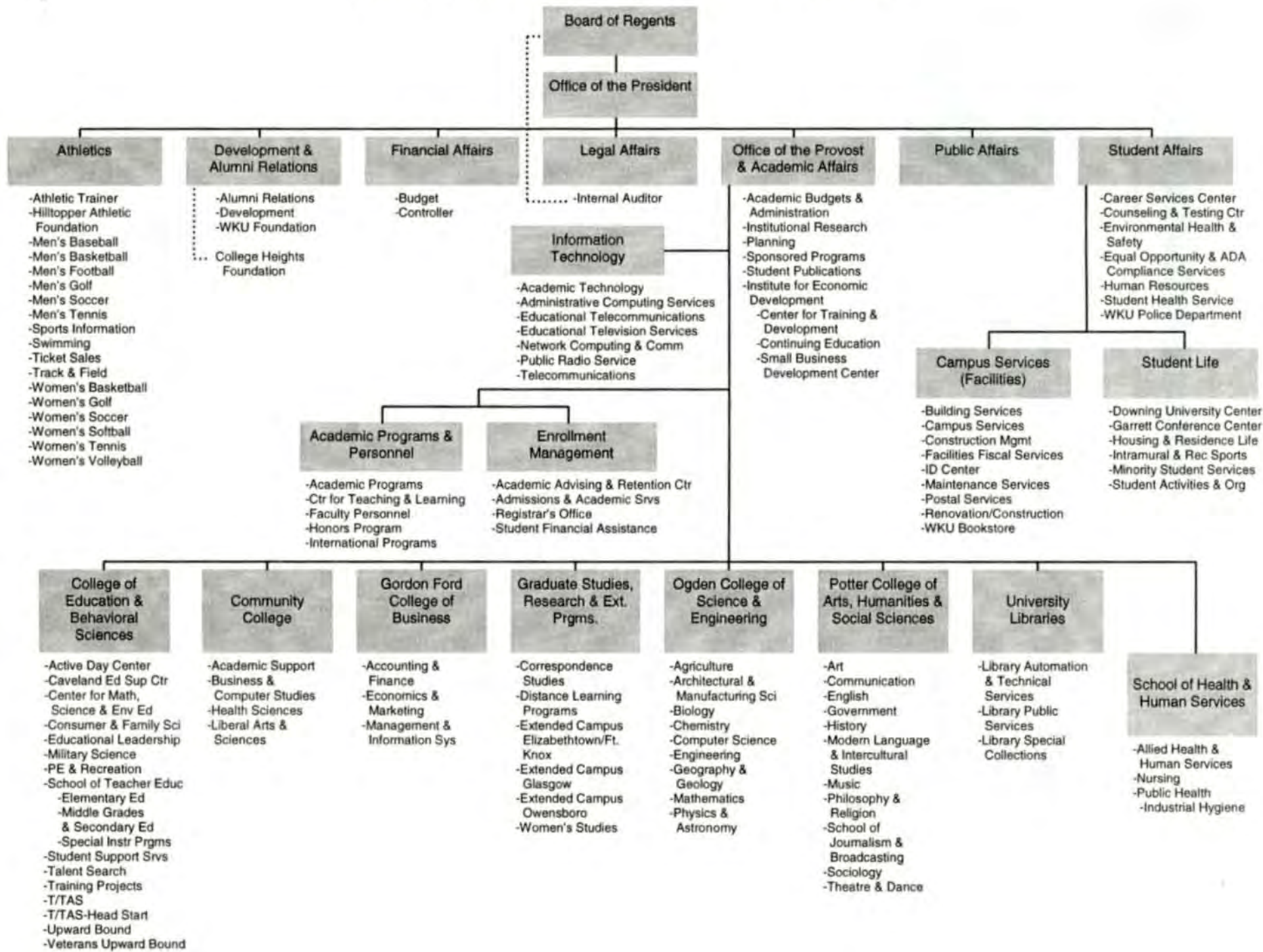

Western Kentucky University Organizational Structure



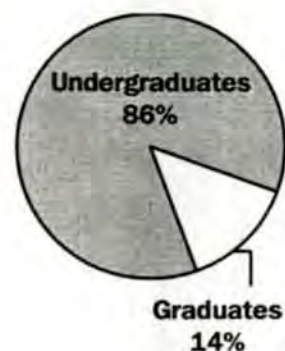

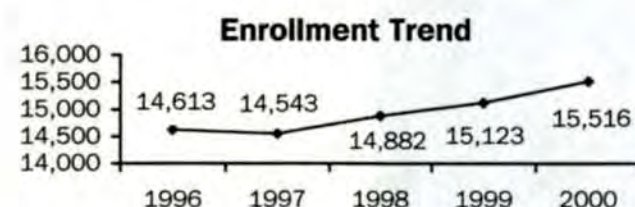


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Enrollment Snapshot Fall 2000

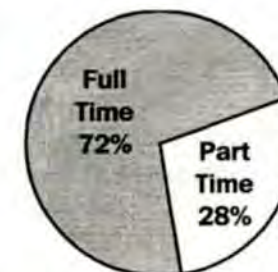

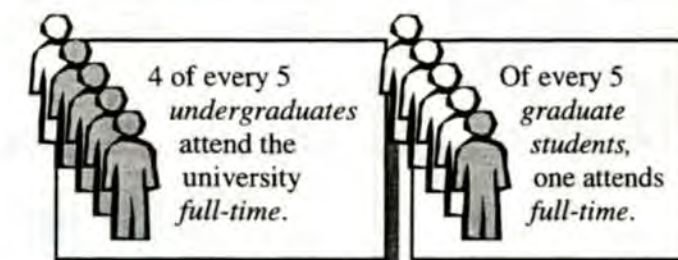

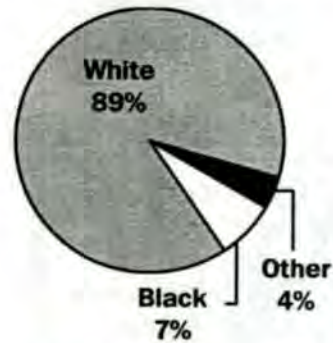

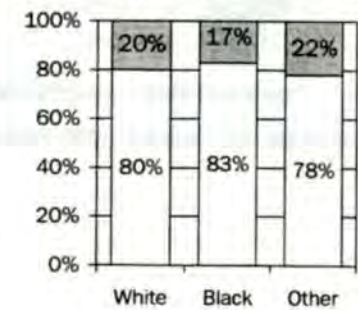
Race Snapshot Fall 2000



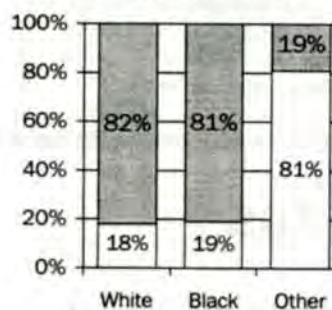

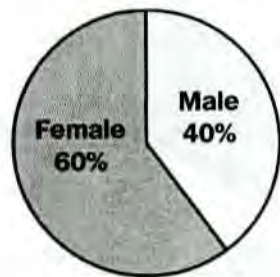

Gender Snapshot Fall 2000

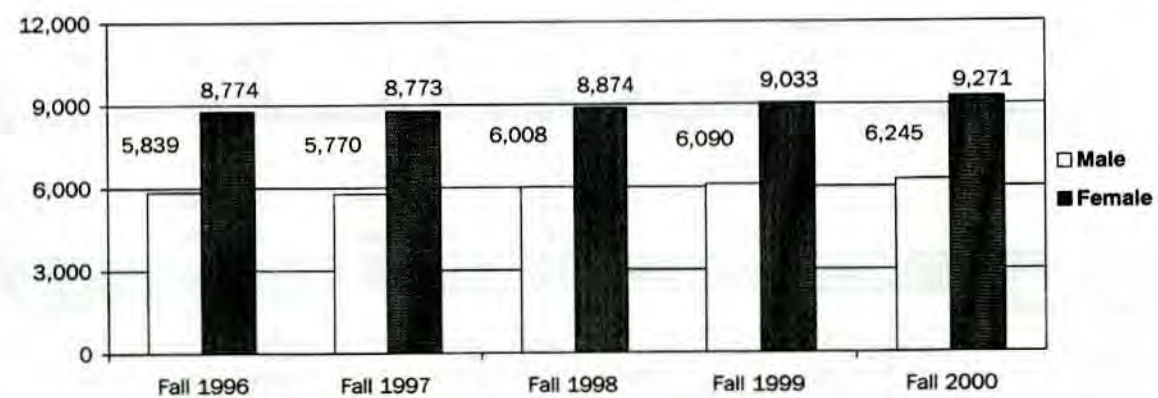


Overall, the ratio of males to females has remained constant over the past 5 years. Graduate enrollment among men has seen the largest change, with a 18% increase since 1996.



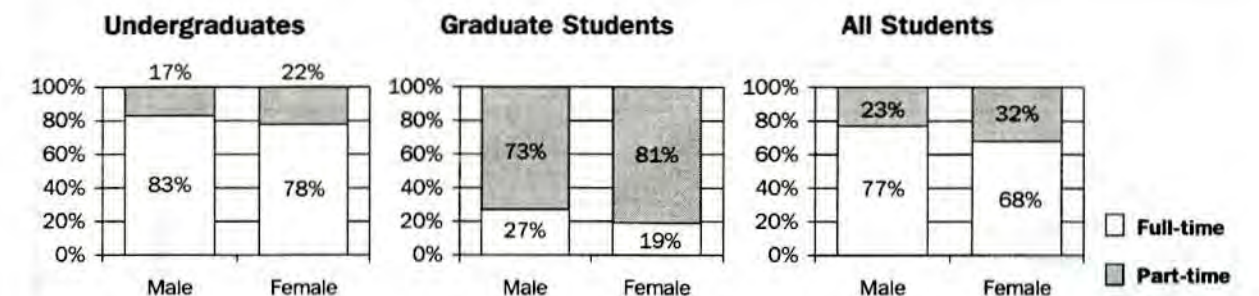

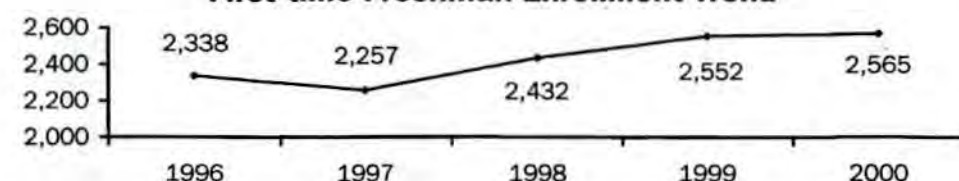

First-time Freshman Enrollment Trend

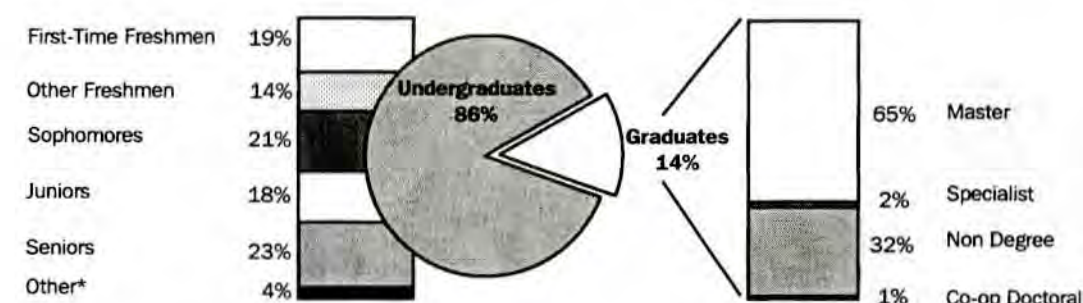

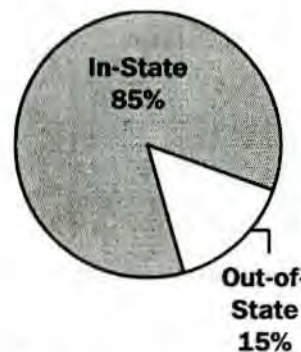

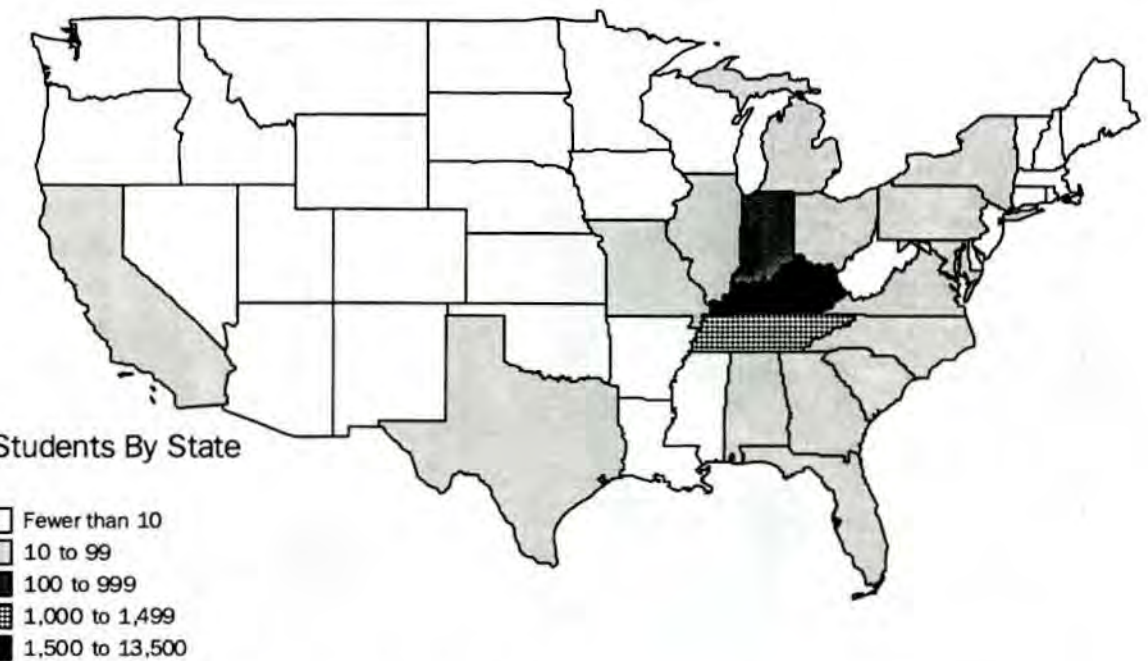

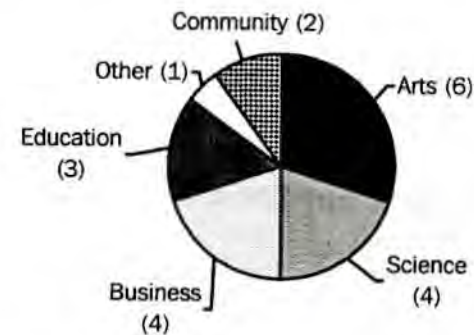

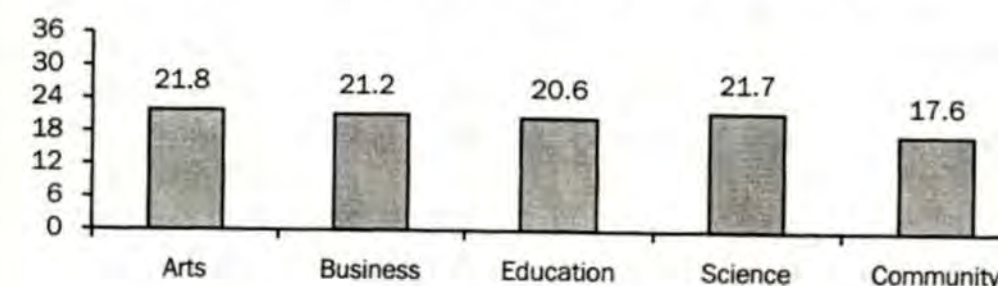

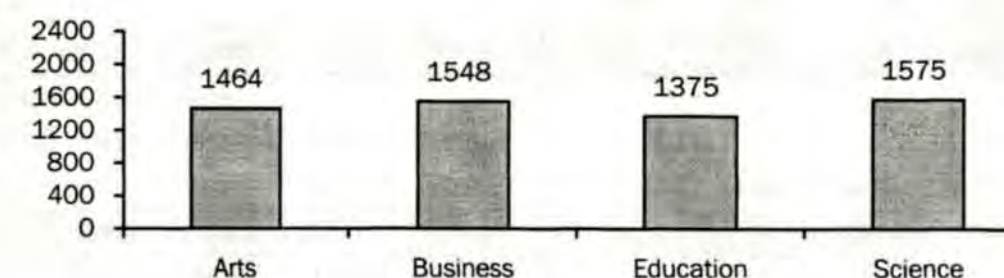

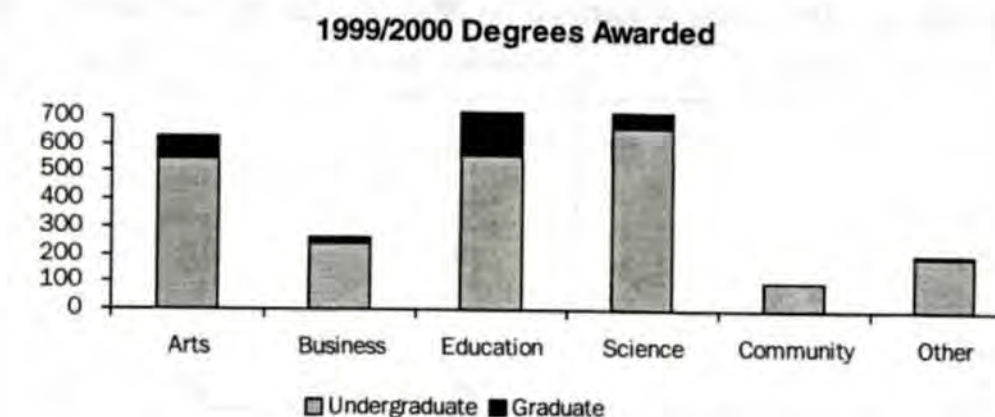

- In 1999/2000, Western awarded 2,540 degrees at the associate, baccalaureate, master's, and specialist levels.
- At the undergraduate level, the largest number of degrees were awarded in elementary education, while at the graduate level, the largest number of degrees were awarded in secondary school counseling.
- During the past five years, management saw the greatest increase in undergraduate degrees awarded, climbing from 21 in 1995/96 to 61 degrees awarded in 1999/2000.

- ▶ Additional qualities

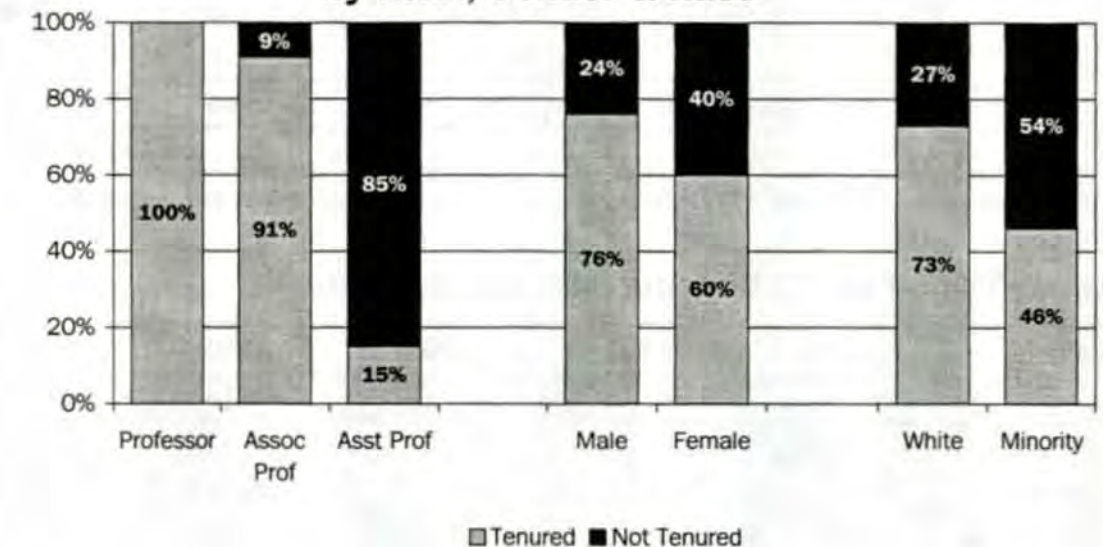

Faculty Snapshot Fall 2000

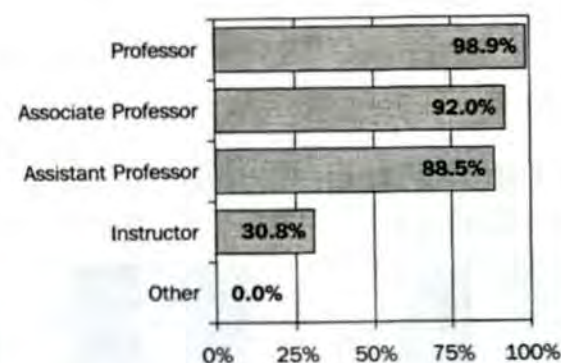
Fall 2000 Tenure Status of Tenure-Track Faculty by Rank, Gender & Race



- ▶ Western's faculty hold advanced degrees from over 280 institutions around the world. 84% of Western's faculty hold terminal degrees, while 72% hold doctorates.
- ▶ 71% of tenure-track faculty are tenured. 76% of males and 60% of females have tenure, while 73% of white faculty and 46% of minority faculty are tenured.
- ▶ The lower proportion of females and minorities having tenure is due in part to a larger percentage of these groups holding the rank of assistant professor, a rank not typically awarded tenure.

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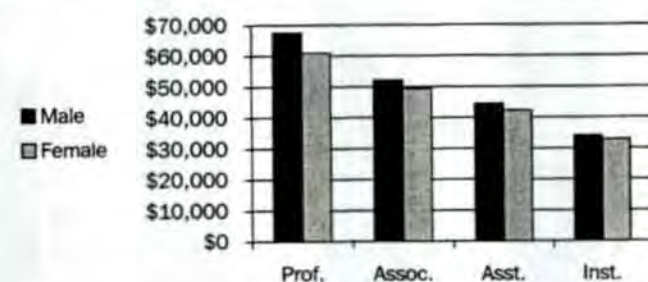

- Professors have seen the largest increase (19.8%), while instructors have seen the smallest increase (8.7%).

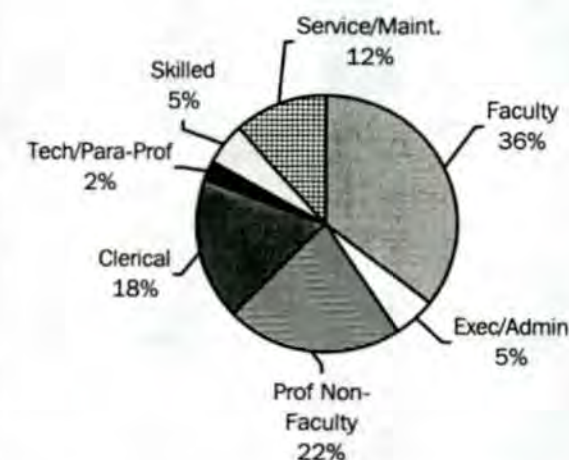

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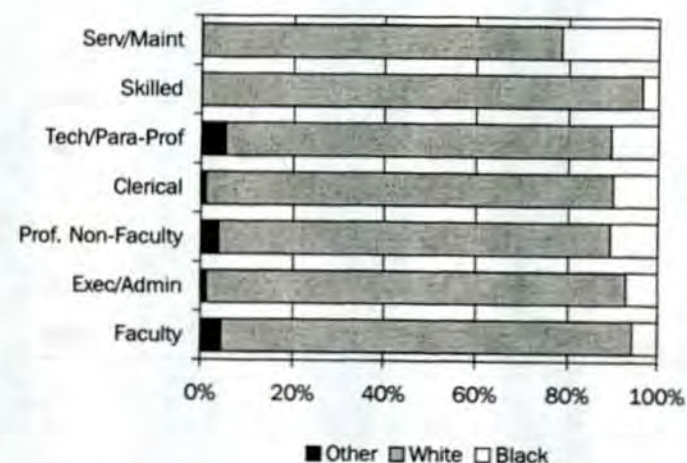

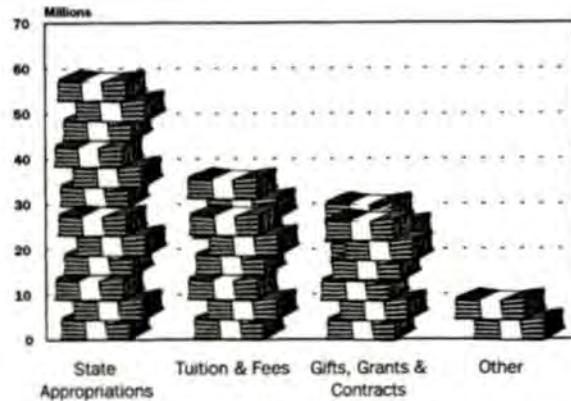

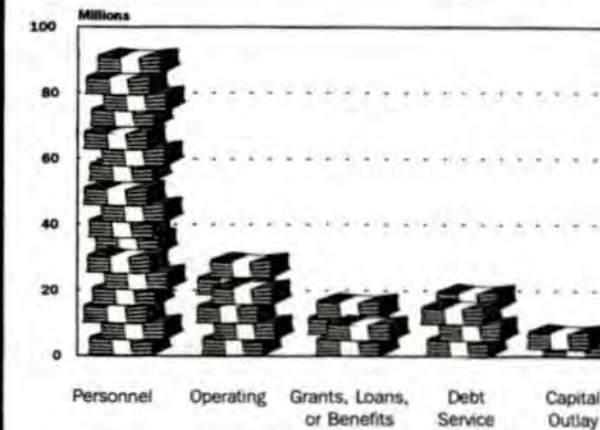

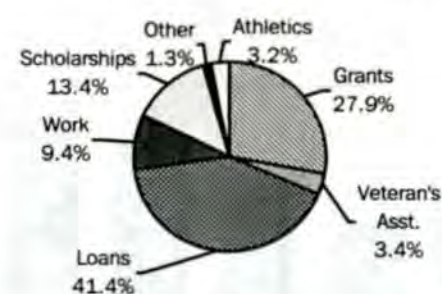

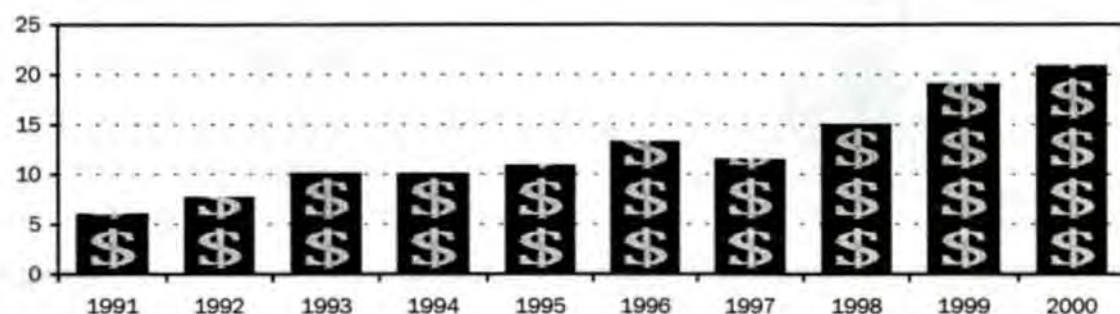

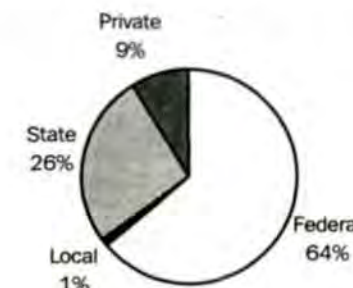

Contracts & Grants Awarded by External Agencies by Type-FY 2000

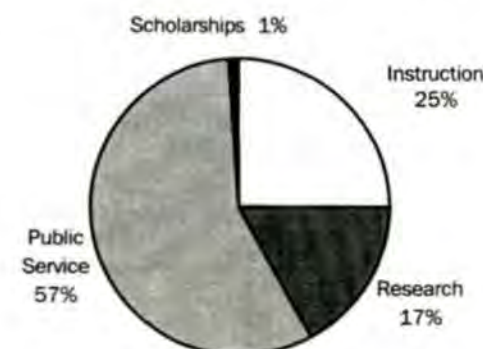

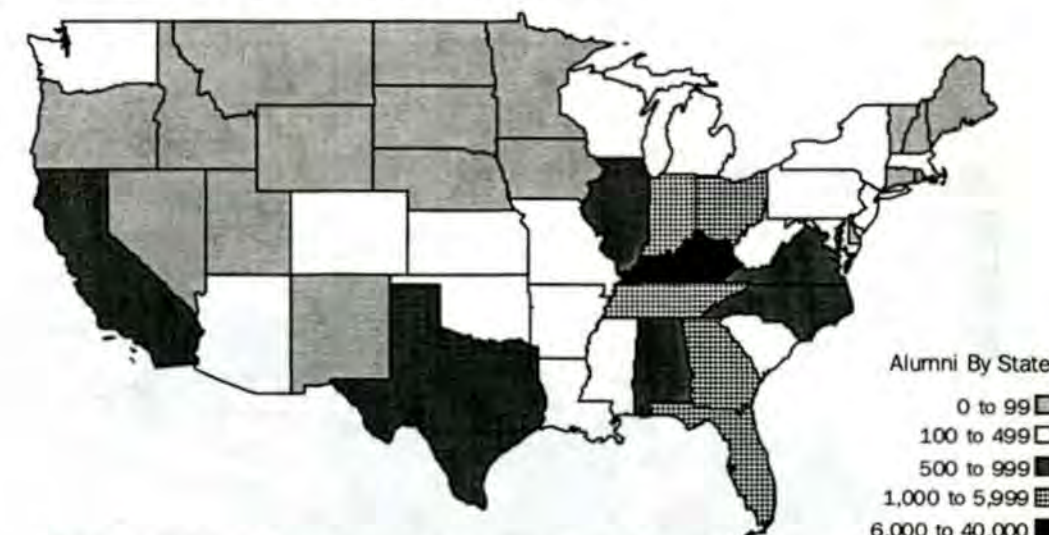

State Alumni Distribution



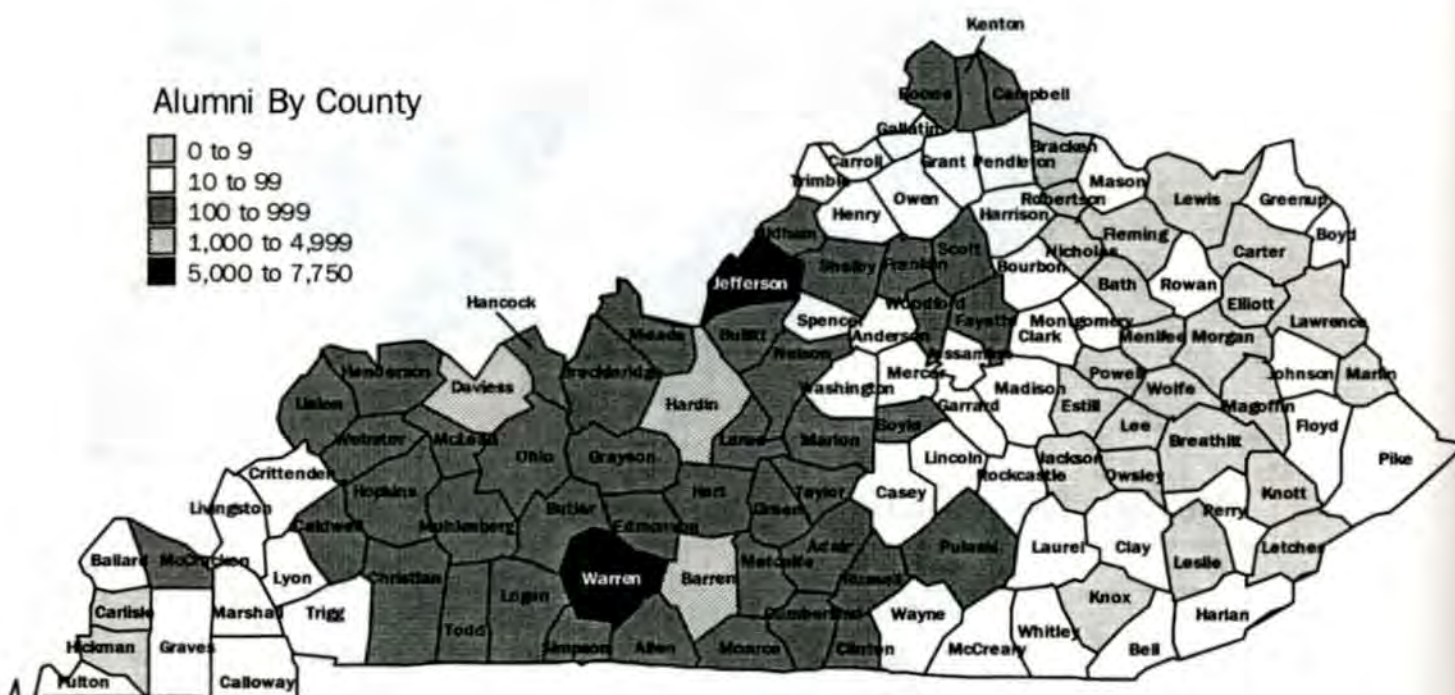
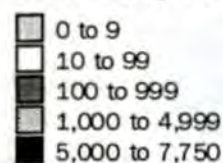

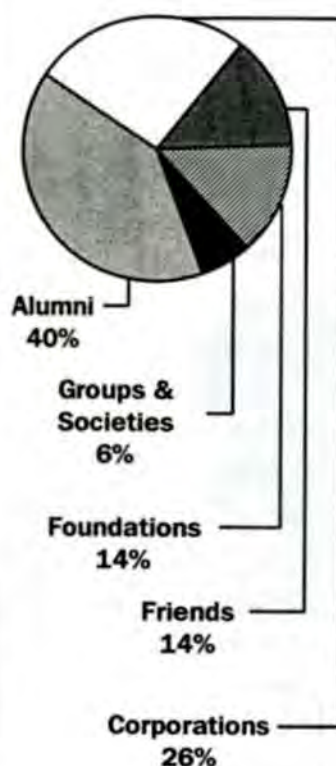

- ▶ communication with and involvement of WKU alumni and friends into the fabric of the University.

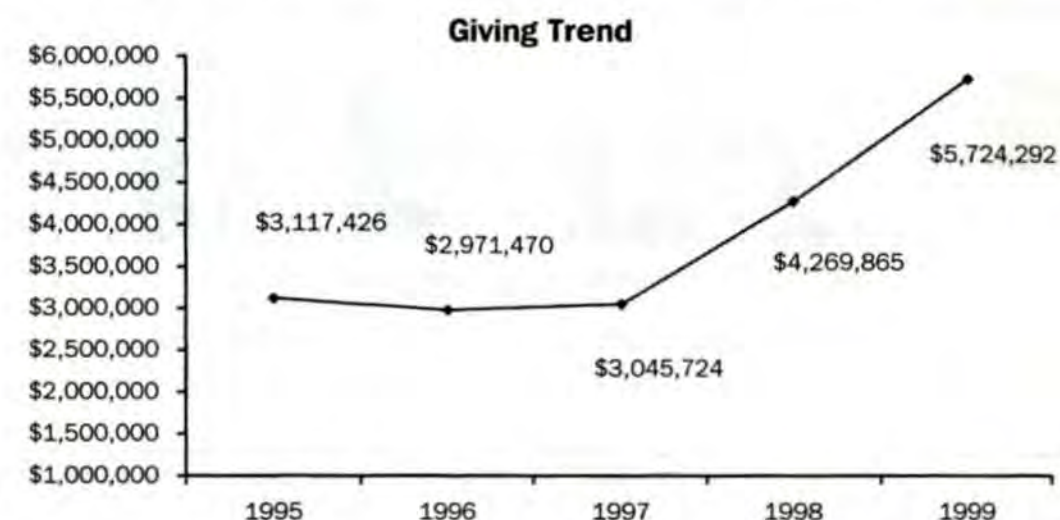
The departments in the division include Advancement Services, Alumni Relations, Annual Giving, Donor Relations, Major Gifts, Planned Giving and the WKU Foundation. These departments work in conjunction to increase the level of private support for the University and its programs.

Private support was up more than 43 percent for the 2000 fiscal year topping \$8.2 million. The combined endowment has grown to more than \$37.4 million. Our deferred gift inventory has increased to \$30 million, and four new endowed professorships have been added to the University, bringing the total number to 16.

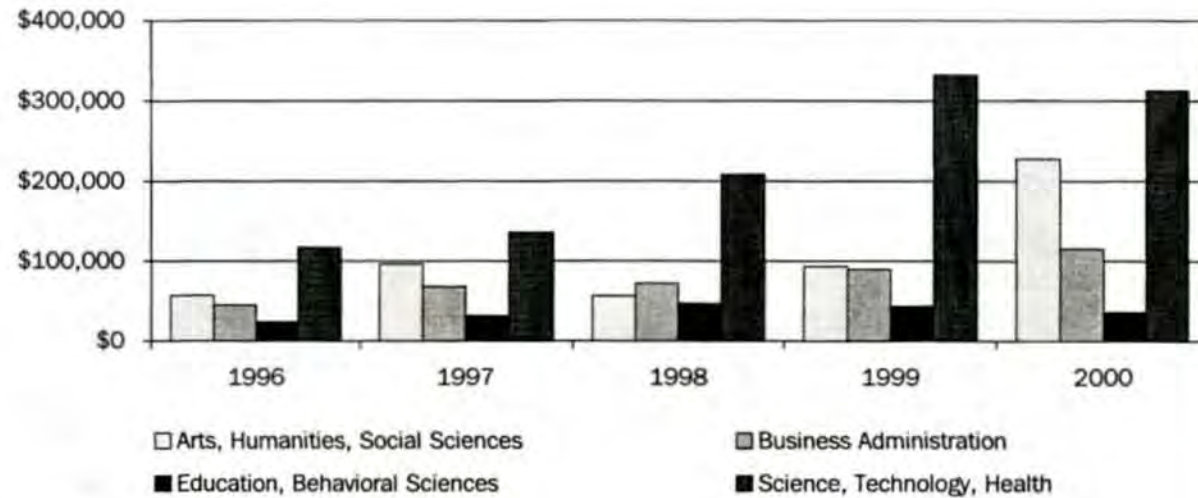

Private Giving by Designation FY 1996-2000



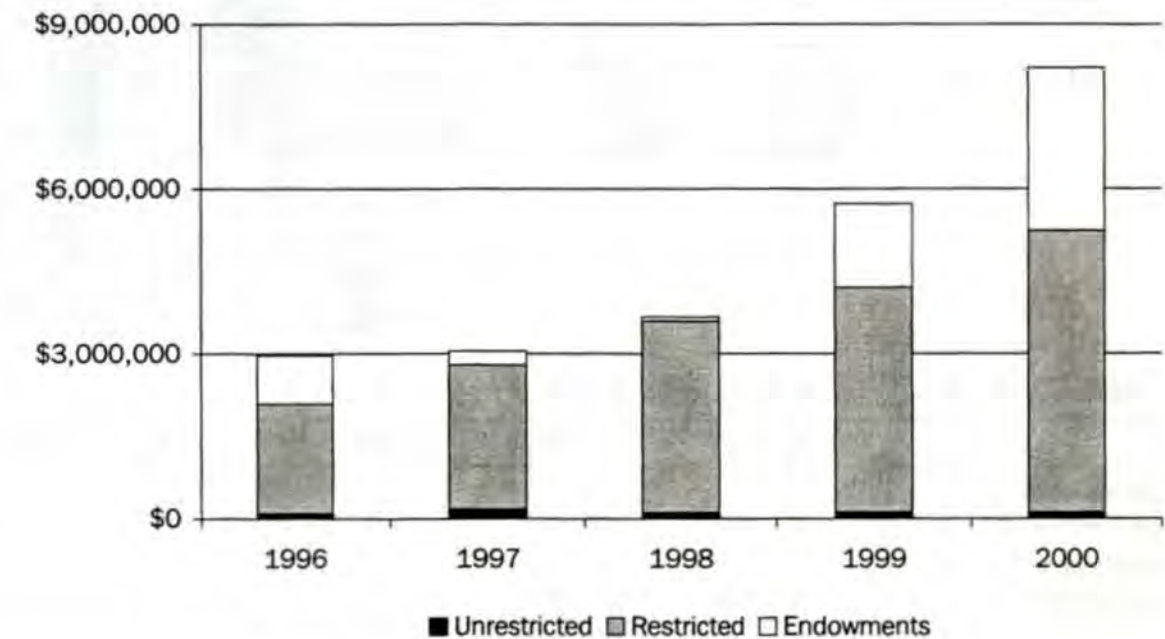

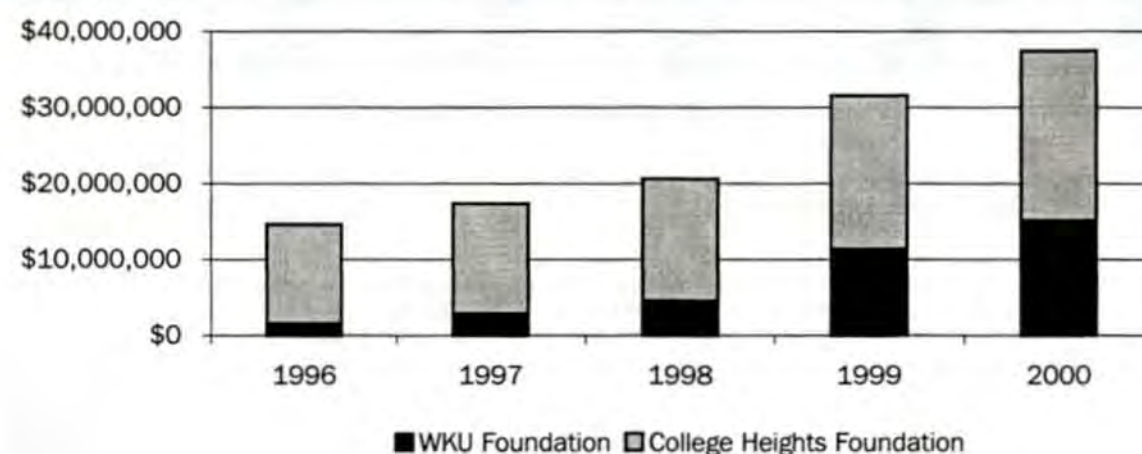

- Senior pitcher Ryan Hutchison became the third hurler in Western history to record 200 career strikeouts.
- Junior pitcher Ryan Bicondoa was named Sun Belt conference Pitcher of the Week after tossing complete-game shutout of 2000 College World Series participant Louisiana-Lafayette.

Men's Basketball

- Earned a bid to NCAA Tournament for the 17th time in school history

- 2000-2001 Sun Belt Conference Tournament champions, winning their first tourney crown since 1995

- Became 17th team in NCAA history to log 1,400 career wins with 103-60 victory over Savannah
- Center Chris Marcus was the leading rebounder in Division I basketball during the 2000-01 season, according to final statistics released by the NCAA.
- Chris Marcus was named Western's Male Athlete of the Year after leading the Hilltoppers to their best season in six years.

Women's Basketball

Coach: Steve Small

- Reached quarterfinals of Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT), making its fourth trip to the round of eight in postseason tournament play (first since 1992)
- Earned its 17th postseason bid in the last 18 seasons
- Sewed up winning record for 19th consecutive season and 24th time in 28-year modern era of Lady Topper basketball (1973-74 to present)
- Western is one of only two teams in the country to have two players ranked in top 35 in scoring (Natalie Powers--6th; ShaRae Mansfield--26th). The team is also ranked 23rd in nation in free throw percentage.
- Senior All-American forward ShaRae Mansfield became the second player in school history, and the sixth in Sun Belt annals to record 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in her career, finishing second on both WKU career charts with 1,804 points and 1,000 rebounds.
- Junior guard Natalie Powers set five single-season school records this year, including most points in one season (736) and highest scoring average (22.3 points per game).
- Sophomore guard, Kristina Covington, notched first 20-20 game in school history with 24 points and school record 20 rebounds at South Florida.
- ShaRae Mansfield drafted in third round by four-time WNBA champion Houston Comets, becoming WKU's first-ever WNBA draft pick

- ShaRae Mansfield was named the WKU Female Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive year, becoming only the second Western athlete to win the award on two occasions.

Men's Golf

- The WKU men's golf team finished out of the Top 10 in only one tournament this year and placed in the Top 5 in eight of 12 tournaments.
- Eric Mason became the first Hilltopper to win All-Sun Belt Conference laurels three times with his selection to the SBC honor squad following the 2001 Sun Belt Championship Tournament.

- Sophomore Jennifer McGill led the team to an eighth place finish at the Sun Belt conference Championships, finishing 20th with her 241 score.

Women's Soccer

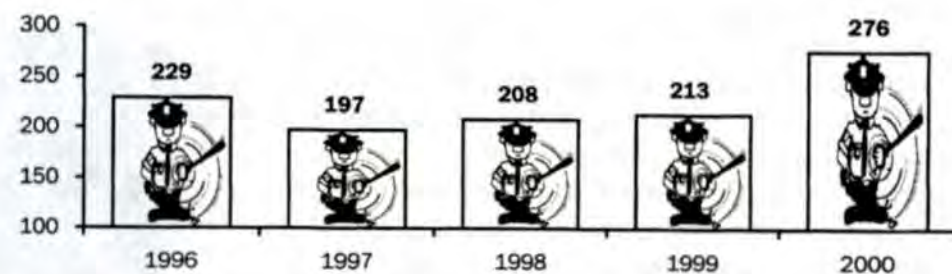

- ▶ Is responsive to the needs of the university community, sensitive to issues, in modifying and expanding services to meet the needs of the community we serve.

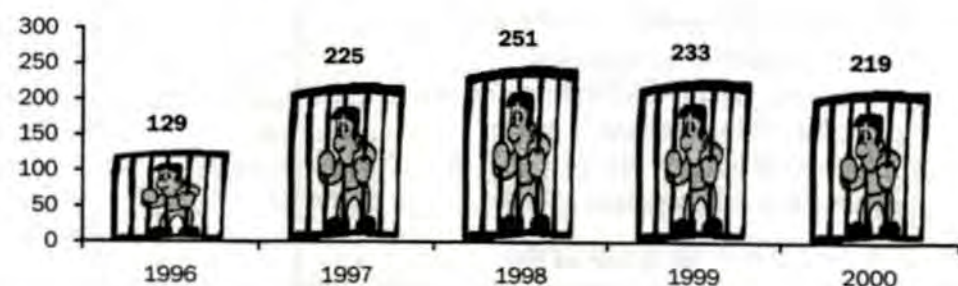

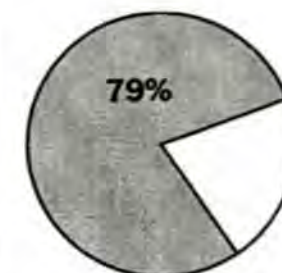

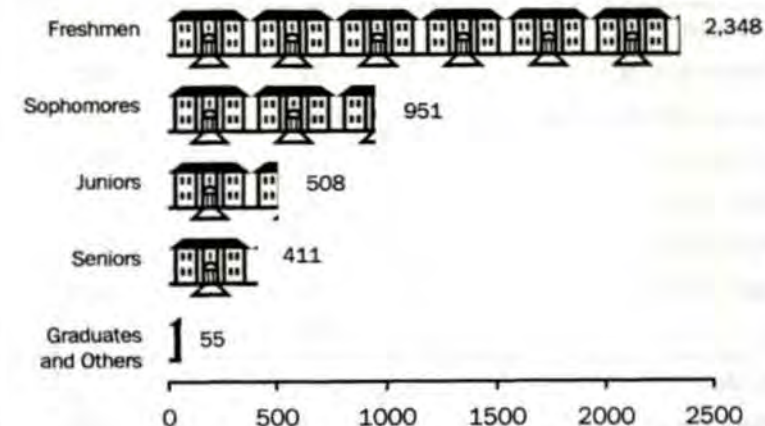
Male Room Occupancy

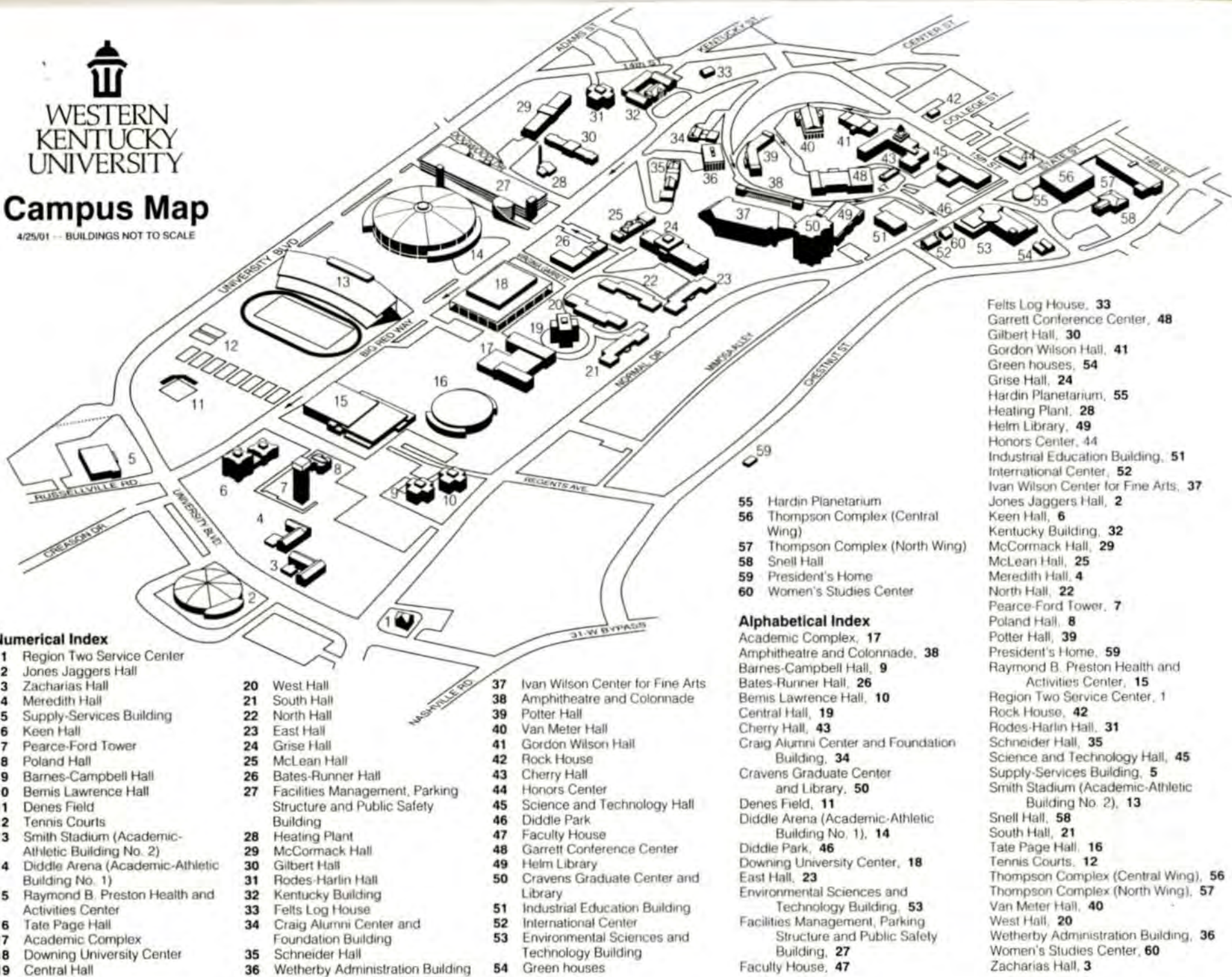
