***BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE***

Joseph Dudley Downing was born on 15 November 1925 in Tompkinsville, Kentucky, to Aldridge Clifton and Katie Burton Goodman Downing. He spent his childhood in Horse Cave, Kentucky, where he received his education and graduated valedictorian in 1943. After high school, Downing became an artillery observer in the U.S. Army receiving a Bronze Star for his service in France during World War II. In 1945 Downing enrolled at Western Kentucky University, where art professor Ivan Wilson encouraged his artistic endeavors. However, respecting his parents' wishes, Downing pursued a degree in optometry by attending Northern Illinois College of Optometry in Chicago. He continued his art training by enrolling in classes at the Chicago Art Institute. Upon graduating in 1950, Downing decided to take a three-month trip to Paris, France, a place he had briefly seen during his military service. He fell in love with the city during his visit and became increasingly interested in pursuing art as a career. Downing decided to stay in Paris, and he continued to live in France for the remainder of his life.

Downing gave credit to the unique coloring and shapes of his abstract works to his childhood spent playing in the caves of his hometown and the ubiquitous barns found on the southcentral Kentucky landscape. The Kentucky countryside inspired Downing's works that were displayed museums and galleries around the world from the Louvre in Paris to the Kentucky Museum in Bowling Green. He was known for his unique use of color and the unusual material on which he painted which included old barn doors, stretched leather, chicken bones, and rescued provincial court documents. Throughout his career, Downing maintained his ties to Kentucky, keeping in close contact with his family and bringing his works back for galleries in his hometown and in local museums.

Downing passed away on 29 December 2007 in Menerbes, France, where he lived for 40 years. Memorial services and art showings were given in his honor in Kentucky and Meberbes. As was requested by Downing, his ashes were distributed in the two places he loved, Menerbes, France, and Horse Cave, Kentucky.

## **COLLECTION NOTE**

This material documents the life and work of Kentucky native and artist Joseph Dudley “Joe” Downing. Folders 2 and 3 include correspondence chiefly related to exhibitions of Downing’s work at the Kentucky Museum at Western Kentucky University in 1988, 1992, and 2000. Most of this material was generated by the Kentucky Museum’s staff, but there are a few photocopies and originals of letters written by Downing. Also heavily represented is Dero Downing, Joe’s brother and former president of Western Kentucky University. Folder 3 also includes information related to Riley Handy’s (Department Head for Library Special Collections t WKU) nomination of Joe Downing for one of the Governor’s Awards in the Arts in 1999. Folder 4 holds photocopies and typescripts of newspaper clippings about Downing. Folder 5 includes material related to exhibitions of Downing’s work; it also contains some biographical information gleaned from magazines and other print sources.
