BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Ray B. Buckberry, Jr., a Bowling Green, Kentucky attorney, amassed this collection while preparing an historical marker honoring Ernest Hogan. Information about the Hogan marker can be found in Small Collection 1673. Original sheet music accompanying this material is housed in the Kentucky Library Research Collections (KLRC).

Reuben Crowds was born in Bowling Green, Kentucky on 17 April 1865. He left at an early age and began his career in show business as a plantation singer in minstrel shows. By age 24, Hogan was successfully performing on the west coast under the stage name Ernest Hogan. As minstrel led to vaudeville, Hogan began writing songs and was involved in writing/composing approximately 38 musical pieces over his career. One of his songs stated that the music was to be performed “with Negro rag accompaniment”; this is the first use of the word “rag” on a song sheet, and many therefore credit Hogan as writer of the first piece of ragtime music. As a performer, Hogan was in great demand and performed in venues around the world. Hogan died on 20 May 1909 and was interred in Bowling Green’s Mt. Moriah Cemetery.

COLLECTION NOTE

This collection documents the life and contributions of pioneer ragtime musician Ernest Hogan. Box 1, Folder 2 includes correspondence of Ray Buckberry with various individuals relating to his Hogan research. The chief correspondent is Doug Seroff, an expert on African American music tradition. Folders 3-5 contain news clippings relating to respectively: Hogan during his lifetime, Hogan after his death, and African American musicians (particularly Hogan) from the Indianapolis *Freeman*. Folder 6 includes similar material from magazines and journals. Folder 7 houses lists of music associated with Hogan compiled by Buckberry. Chronologies of Hogan’s life constructed by Buckberry can be found in Folder 8. Folders 9-12 contain

manuscript copies of articles and scripts prepared by Buckberry for publication and public presentation. Folder 13 includes a compact disc of a program about Hogan that aired on WKYU's "Old Scratchy Records" radio program (play date not provided); also includes the program's play list of Hogan music. Folder 14 contains genealogical information about the Crowdus family, and Folder 15 includes similar information about allied families. Folder 16 contains miscellaneous related to Hogan, including invitations, programs and brochures about programming related to Hogan. Folder 17 houses two cassette tapes: one includes musical performances of famed minstrel performer Bert Williams and the other includes a performance of "Mysterious Coon" by Alec Johnson.
