BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

John Casey Perkins, the son of Ruby Earl Perkins and Marie Sue (McGaw) Perkins, was born in Providence (Webster County), Kentucky on 15 July 1918. He graduated from Bowling Green (Kentucky) High School and attended Western Kentucky University. He entered the U.S. Army in 1941, participated in military operations in Africa, Italy, France, Austria and Germany, and earned numerous decorations. Discharged from the Army in 1947 with the rank of lieutenant colonel, Perkins returned to Bowling Green, where he pursued a career as a realtor. A dedicated preservationist, he was a founding member of the Bowling Green-Warren County Landmark Association. He married Emily Hunter (1927-2016) in 1953, and they were parents of two children. Perkins died on 17 January 2010 and is interred in Bowling Green's Fairview Cemetery (see his obituary in Box 1, Folder 1 for a summary of his life and military career).

COLLECTION NOTE

This collection consists mostly of military records and reports collected by John C. Perkins while serving in World War II as an officer with the Signal Corps of the U.S. Army's Third Infantry Division, 30th Infantry Regiment. The most notable items in this collection are two memoranda (in German and English) dated 10 May 1945 and written by Nazi SS officer Otto Skorzeny. Called "Hitler's favorite commando," Skorzeny was the leader of several daring special operations, including the 1943 rescue of Benito Mussolini after the Italian dictator was removed from power and imprisoned in the Abruzzi Mountains.

As the war was ending, Skorzeny and his forces sought refuge in western Austria. Upon Adolf Hitler's death on 30 April 1945, Skorzeny resolved to surrender to U.S. troops. On 10 May, he traveled to the resort of Annaberg, where he announced that he would surrender in six days to the Allied command at Salzburg. His messages of surrender were passed along to Salzburg; when he arrived there, Skorzeny was placed in the custody of then-Major John C. Perkins. Skorzeny's messages, together with a narrative by his biographer Stuart Smith (*Otto Skorzeny: The Devil's Disciple*) providing background and analysis, are in Box 1, Folder 2.

The remainder of the collection consists primarily of reports of the Third Infantry's operations in Italy, Sicily, France and Germany from 1943-1946. Some of the reports are

specific to the Signal Corps, and provide detailed information about communications infrastructure, message traffic, cryptography and "lessons learned" from various campaigns. Other reports, also highly detailed, cover the Third Infantry's operations more broadly and include topics such as intelligence, supply and evacuation, personnel, special staff, ammunition expenditures, enemy actions, casualties, and prisoner of war statistics. Also included are training and instruction memoranda (Box 2, Folder 4) and instructions regarding amphibious codes for use during initial landings on hostile shores (Box 2, Folder 8). Of particular interest are detailed accounts of the challenges facing the Signal Corps as it transitioned from supplying communications in combat to an occupational force (Box 1, Folder 16), and reports of the many tasks performed by the Third Infantry in occupied Germany (Box 2, Folders 1 and 2) such as assessing conditions in various German towns and cities, ferreting out Nazis and other dangerous persons, and seizing caches of art, gold, and documents.

A few documents personal to Perkins are in Box 2, Folder 8. They consist of leave records and a photocopy of two pages from a diary, perhaps of an airman.
