### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE**

Joseph M. "Joe" Whittle, the son of Lillian Maude Skaggs and Charles Edward Whittle, Sr., was born on 7 February 1933 in Brownsville (Edmonson County), Kentucky. After graduation from Brownsville High School in 1948, he began undergraduate studies at Transylvania University, then attended Western Kentucky University and Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri. He earned his J.D. degree from the University of Louisville in 1955.

Whittle served in the U.S. Navy (1956) and, after attending Judge Advocate General's School at the University of Virginia, served as German Claims Commissioner in the U.S. Army (1957-1959). From 1960-1963, he was an attorney advisor for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Whittle opened a private law practice in 1963 in Leitchfield (Grayson County), Kentucky, where he was City Attorney (1964-1966) and County Attorney (1965-1973). In 1975, he ran unsuccessfully for Attorney General of Kentucky on the Republican ticket headed by gubernatorial candidate Robert "Bob" Gable.

A delegate to the 1980 Republican National Convention, Whittle served in various local political posts and was elected State Republican Party Chairman in May 1984. He resigned the position in March 1985 after becoming interested in succeeding Ron Meredith, a U.S. Attorney who had been nominated for a federal judgeship. With the endorsement of U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell, Whittle was nominated by President Ronald Reagan in December 1985 and confirmed as U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky in February 1986; he was then reappointed under the George H. W. Bush administration.

In March 1993, after the inauguration of Democrat Bill Clinton as president, Attorney General Janet Reno made a controversial decision to ask for the resignations of all U.S. Attorneys under the Bush administration. Consequently, Whittle left his position on 31 July 1993.

During his tenure as U.S. Attorney, Whittle gained the respect of earlier critics who had questioned his qualifications and lack of federal court experience. He enlarged and modernized the office and was active in cases involving civil rights, environmental issues, collection of debts owed to the government, and public corruption. One of his high-profile cases was an investigation, commenced in secret, into bribery and corruption among members of the Kentucky General Assembly. Known as "Operation BOPTROT" or simply "BOPTROT," the

investigation and resulting prosecutions continued after Whittle left the U.S. Attorney's Office and led to the conviction of more than twenty people, including state government officials, from 1992 to 1995. From 1988-1992, Whittle also served on the Attorney General's Advisory Committee, a group of U.S. Attorneys who worked on policy with the U.S. Attorney General; he was chairman of the Financial Litigation Subcommittee, and was Committee chairman from 1990-1991. Whittle's other accomplishments and honors included service on Murray State University's Board of Regents (1968-1972), the U.S. Attorney General's Award for Leadership in Financial Litigation (1988), and a Kentucky Bar Association Outstanding Lawyer for 1995.

After leaving the U.S. Attorney's Office, Whittle was encouraged to run for Congress, and considered running for governor of Kentucky, but instead returned to private law practice. He also acted as a mediator, helping to form the Federal Alternative Dispute Resolution Council, Inc. and serving as its first president.

In 1997, Whittle and his wife, Mary Leura Armstrong (a past president of the Kentucky Federation of Republican Women), began spending winters in Florida, with Whittle occasionally commuting to Louisville, Kentucky for his law practice. Whittle largely retired from the practice of law in the early 2000s.

#### **COLLECTION NOTE**

This collection consists of correspondence and papers relating to the political and legal career of Joseph M. Whittle, particularly as U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky. Included is biographical data, clippings, and speeches; also photographs (some inscribed), mostly of Whittle with various national political figures from the 1980s and 1990s. Whittle collected numerous clippings relating to legal cases and law enforcement in Kentucky and to Operation BOPTROT, but given the availability of these online, particularly from the *Louisville Courier-Journal*, only a representative sampling has been retained.

#### Items of interest include:

- 1. Biographical articles outlining Whittle's career, Operation BOPTROT and the controversy surrounding the replacement of U.S. Attorneys by the Clinton administration while the investigation was ongoing; and articles reviewing Whittle's achievements and the state of the U.S. Attorney's office at the time of his departure (Box 1, Folder 2);
- 2. Correspondence relating to Whittle's 1975 campaign for Kentucky Attorney General, including a letter asking for his support in rescinding Kentucky's ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, and a lengthy letter from the widow of former Kentucky Governor Simeon Willis with comments and advice on how to improve the Republican campaign to retake the governorship of the state (Box 1, Folder 4);
- 3. Correspondence regarding Whittle's nomination by President Reagan for U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky, including recommendation letters and Whittle's summary of his political activities in support of a position in the administration (Box 1, Folder 4);

- 4. A detailed schedule of Vice President George H. W. Bush's visit to Bowling Green Kentucky, in October 1984, and a letter of Whittle's placed in the cornerstone of the Leitchfield Deposit Bank in July 1985 containing some prescient predictions (Box 1, Folder 4);
- 5. Materials relating to Whittle's work as U.S. Attorney, including letters of congratulation on his appointment; materials relating to his involvement in financial litigation, drug law enforcement, and various legal cases; and Senator Mitch McConnell's 1990 recommendation that he be reappointed as U.S. Attorney by the Bush administration (Box 1, Folder 5). Also included is correspondence regarding an invitation to speak in Japan on the forfeiture of assets derived from crime as a weapon of prosecutors (see also Box 1, Folder 10);
- 6. A representative sampling of newspaper reporting on Operation BOPTROT (Box 1, Folder 6);
- 7. Letters from other U.S. Attorneys asked to resign in 1993, praising their offices and advising of future plans; letters of praise to Whittle from law enforcement officers; and a DVD of a "roast" for the departing Whittle in August 1993 (Box 1, Folder 7);
- 8. A 1993 appeal by Whittle and U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky Karen Caldwell to FBI Director Louis Freeh urging more federal resources for ensuring election integrity in Kentucky (Box 1, Folder 8);
- 9. Clippings regarding "Street Heat," a rock band formed at Whittle's suggestion and composed of law enforcement professionals in Louisville and Jefferson County who performed with an anti-drug message (Box 1, Folder 9);
- 10. Statements and speeches by Whittle made mostly during and after his tenure as U.S. Attorney, several of which include a historical survey of the U.S. Attorney's Office in Kentucky and a review of Operation BOPTROT; included is a speech of Mary Whittle to a group of Republican women (Box 1, Folders 10 & 11); and
- 11. Miscellaneous personal papers, including Whittle's military separation papers, bar admission papers, and visa applications for his and his wife's travel to Japan (Box 1, Folder 12).
