Kentucky Intercollegiate Press Association Contest 1999

THE COLLEGE HEIGHTS HER-ALD continued its domination in statewide college newspaper competition at the Kentucky Intercollegiate Press Association contest.

Western's twice weekly student paper won 14 firstplace awards, 12 seconds, 10 thirds and 14 honorable mentions in the division that includes the state's largest universities. The University of Kentucky won eight firsts and Eastern Kentucky University won seven.

CHARLIE LANTER, a Lexington junior, was elected president for 1999-2000. He also won the deadline editing competition. MATT BATCHELDOR, a Bardstown junior, will be second vice president. He placed third in the deadline writing contest.

JERRY BREWER, a Paducah junior, won three of the four sports categories and placed second in the other one. He won sports game story, sports news story and sports feature story and was runner-up in sports column. GEORGE ROBINSON, a Louisville senior, won sports column and received honorable mention in sports news story.

TRAVIS MAYO, a Lexington junior, was second in sports news story and honorable mention in sports game story, sports feature and sports column.

The HERALD'S coverage of the Kappa Alpha fire was named the best news story, with Murray's dorm fire coverage placing second. MOLLY HARPER, a Paducah junior and MATT BATCHELDOR tied for third. HARPER'S story reported Western's Internet link with a pornographic site and BATCHELOR reported on the April hailstorm on campus. HARPER was first in investigate reporting.

The HERALD'S other first-place winners were KRISTINA GOETZ, a December graduate from Owensboro, feature story; DAN HIEB, a Louisville junior, reviews; FRED LUCAS, London senior, editorials; CARRIE PRATT, a December graduate from Lexington, news photo and photo

essay; CHAD

STEVENS, a Bowling Green senior, feature photo; JASON BEHNKEN, a December graduate from Richmond, Va., sports photo; and CHRIS COVINGTON, a Mayfield senior, advertising campaign.

Other second-place winners were the staff, news analyses and special reports; SHANNON BECK, a Mt. Sterling junior, personality profile; BRIAN MAINS, an Independence senior, feature story; fall 1998 staff, overall layout; JASON HALL, a December graduate from Mt. Juliet, Tenn., feature page layout; staff, best special section; NICK FEDYK, a senior from Lawrenceville, Ga.; RICK SCIBELLI, a Bowling Green senior, photo essay; and MATT ZAVALA, an Elizabethtown junior, advertising design.

Sixteen HERALD staff members and adviser BOB ADAMS attended the convention in Paducah, hosted by the Murray State News. The Herald will be the host for the 2000 convention.

In the OMAHA TOUR-NAMENT the forensic team placed fifth in the overall team sweepstakes. Individual winners were: JOHN ALLEN, a semi-finalist in prose interpretation; ANTHONY JOHNSON, 2nd in dramatic dialogue; ALISA PONANANTA, a prose interpretation semi-finalist.

SITY TOURNAMENT winners were KERRI RICHARDSON, who placed 1st place in Lincoln/Douglas debate. At CLEMSON UNIVERsrry, the forensic team won the **DSR-TKA** National Championship in both Lincoln/Douglas Debate as well as the individual sweepstakes.
