Break isn't new idea to all international students

Western's week-long Spring Break just does not match up to those of some foreign schools.

Gilbert Halaby, a junior from Beirut, Lebanon, said at Cyprus College (Cyprus is an island in the Mediterranean), where he spent his freshman year, Spring Break was 20 days long.

"They should extend the break a bit. It's a very short period of time. Where I'm from, Spring Break is supposed to be at least 20 days to a month."

"In Cyprus, we would take ship cruises to Greece and do the tourist thing on their islands," Halaby said.

This year Halaby said he

would try to visit relatives in Boston, "but by the time you get there, it's time to head back."

Western does not offer any place for the 135 international students to stay, said Joan Lindsey, a student assistant in the International Programs and Projects Office.

"Several years ago, housing tried to keep one open, but they said it wasn't feasible," Lindsey said.

"One thing that helps is that most of our international students don't live on campus. Only 40 or so do."

Tomomi Kokado, a sophomore from Tokyo, agreed that Spring Break in the United

States is too short, and it's hard to go anywhere and enjoy it.

"Usually we would go to some place like Hawaii or southern Japan where water sports are becoming very popular now," Kokado said.

"It's just a long time to relax."

Kokado said she plans to meet some friends in New York City this year to visit museums and maybe take in a musical or two.

Not far from Japan, some students have never heard of Spring Break.

Fei Wang, a graduate student from China, and Murali Krishna Golla, a graduate student from

India, said Spring Break is all new to them.

"There was no Spring Break in China. This is the first word I have heard about it at Western," Wang said.

"In India we have many festivals and holidays in our country so we don't have any kind of Spring Break," Golla said.

"We (Golla and I) don't have money to leave and go to Florida so I guess we'll stay here," Wang said.

Wang said it gives foreign students a chance to catch up because "we have language problems. We have to study harder than other students."

The Toppers will open the break in Mobile, Ala., for a two-game set with South Alabama.

They will play seven games altogether and finish with a three-game series at home against Jacksonville.

"When we're not on the road or playing a home game, we'll be staying in town practicing," junior outfielder Paul Jackson said. "The campus will be pretty dead, though, since athletes will probably be the only ones here."

Jackson said the week is a valuable time for the team because it allows much more time to focus on baseball rather than school work.

Senior outfielder Ryan Hepworth said it would be nice

to go home or to a vacation spot, but the team knows it is expected to play a tough schedule of games and put in just as much work.

"We're expected to be here and we know it," he said. "You won't hear anyone complaining about not getting a break when there are games to be played and practice to be accomplished."

This is the attitude that most of the players have. They don't have visions of Florida's beaches in their minds. They would much rather stay and fulfill one of the main reasons they are here: to play baseball.

Maintenance on car one part of getting ready for vacation

Before students start that long journey for Spring Break, they might want to make sure their car is ready to handle the drive.

A good way to start is thumbing through the yellow pages to look for specials.

An engine tuneup can range from \$39.95 to more than \$100, depending on the car, engine and the amount of work needed.

Jerry Chafon, owner of Tech Tune, 1486 Campbell Lane, said that things such as brakes are the most critical to check.

"Breaking down on the road is not a big deal compared to having an accident because safety precautions weren't taken."

Chafon said students should realize that cars handle differently at high speeds than at slow in-town speeds. Loading a car with luggage also changes

the car's handling.

Oil changes are important, too. "The oil and filter should be changed every 3,000 (miles)," Chafon said. An oil change costs about \$19.95 for most cars.

Chafon said the week before Spring Break is the busy week for tuneup shops.

Chafon advised students to "do a little maintenance at a time. Don't put it off. Everyone should get regular tuneups."

Mark Schultz, owner of Precision Tune, 1141 Broadway, recommended that students have their cars properly checked to make sure that they are road-worthy.

"Regular maintenance needs to be done if it hasn't been done in the last year," Schultz said. "Belts and hoses also need to be checked."

"Generally students take good care of their cars because they regularly travel long distances."

Students budget for trips over break

Part-time jobs, charge cards, tax refunds and good ol' mom and dad are helping students afford a Spring Break trip this year.

Among the most popular hot spots where students are choosing to spend their time and money are Panama City, Fla., Dauphin Island, Ala., and South Padre, Texas.

Some students will spend more than \$400 for a week of rest and relaxation. Indianapolis junior Mike Scheetz will spend exactly that for his trip to South Padre. He earned some of his money for the trip cleaning cars.

"It's a fun place to go and provides a good mid-semester break," he said.

"I plan to use my charge card and pay it back with my income tax refund," Louisville junior Susan Browning said. She said she plans on spending no more than \$120 on her trip to Panama City. She will spend \$80 for her share of a beach-front condominium, and the remaining \$40 will be spent on groceries and other commodities, she said.

A trip to Dauphin Island, Ala.,

will cost Nashville junior Melanie Roberts around \$200, she said. "I plan to spend about \$30 on gas, \$60 for the room, \$45 on food and \$40 on entertainment."

Roberts said she plans to use the money she receives from her income tax refund to pay for her trip.

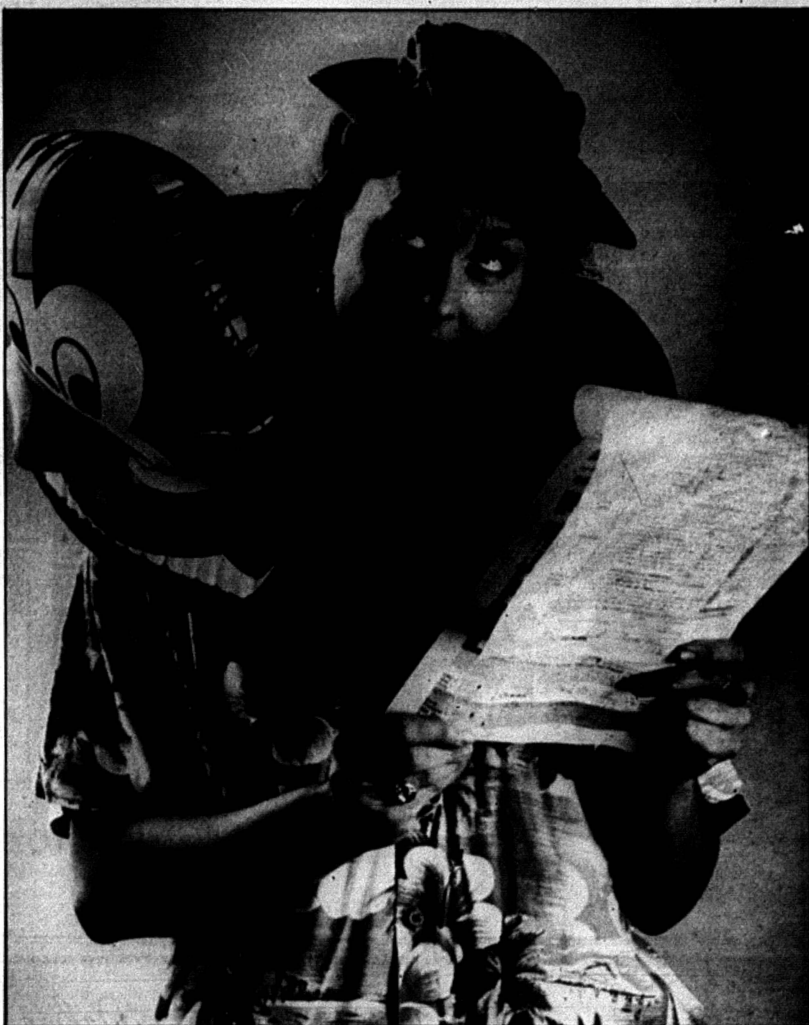
portation, will cost each person \$115.
