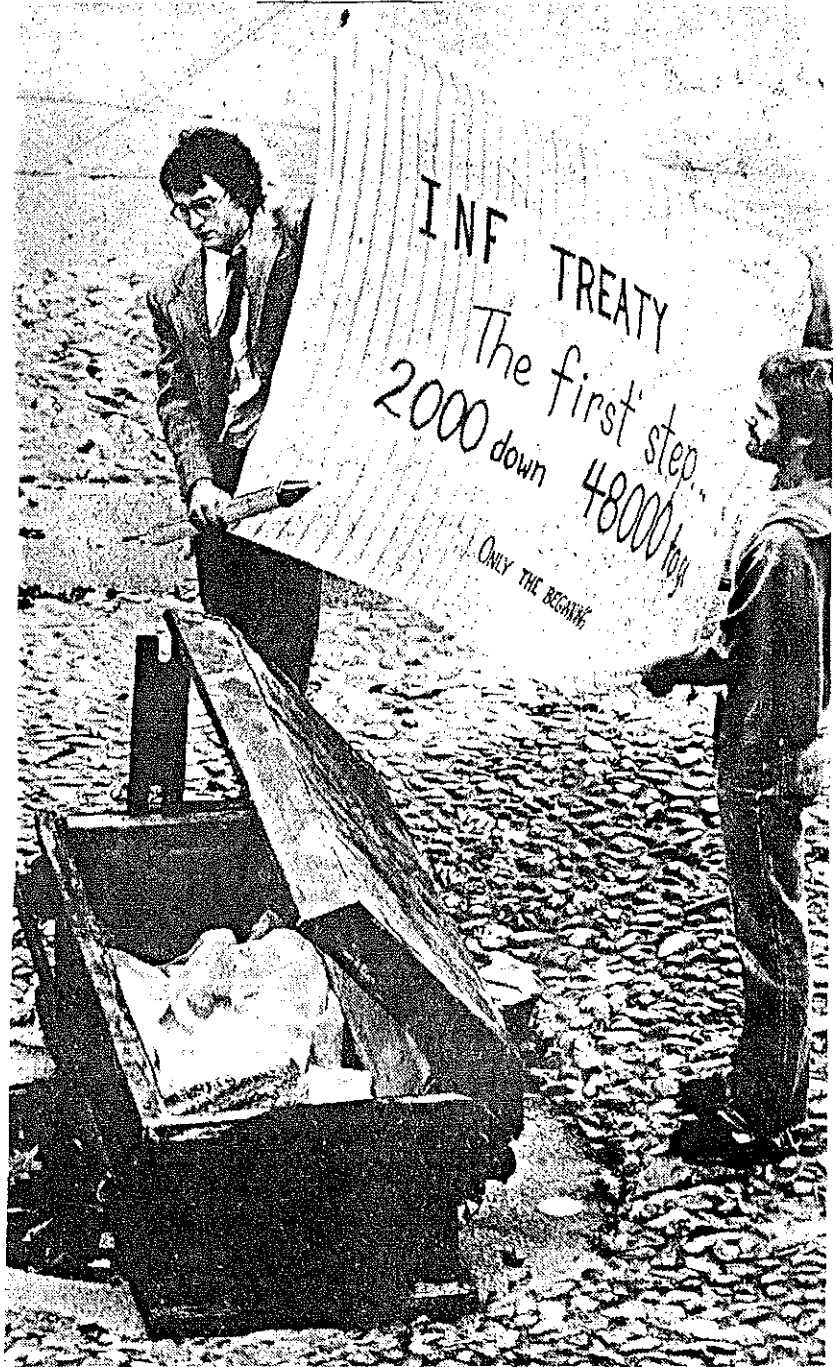

# Cyclists' 'toy run' lifts kids

The black leather and denim dress of the motorcyclists contrasted with the sweat shirts and gym shoes worn by the children.

But, as both stood inside the Western Kentucky University Child Care Center, it became apparent their hearts and their Christmas spirit shared a common bond.

Highlighted by a parade by about 40 motorcyclists through the downtown business area and on to the WKU campus, members of the southwest district of the Kentucky Bikers' Association brought their toy run to Bowling Green.

Will Spencer of Franklin, director of the district's toy run, said each biker purchased several toys and donated them to the run.

By the time the toys were distributed, there were more than 100 — not including several large stuffed animals — to be given away to the roughly 75 children who were on hand for Saturday's visit by the bikers and Santa Claus.

"It was a super success,"

Spencer said. "There were more than enough presents for the children."

The KBA's southwest district comprises nine counties, including Warren, Barren, Hart and Simpson. Throughout Kentucky, there are nine such district biker associations.

"Generally, every one of the districts in Kentucky tries to do something along these lines every year," Spencer said.

The toy run began in 1985, and Spencer said it has promise for becoming a continuing tradition.

"We try to do the toy run each year," Spencer said. "It shows our good will.

"We also do it to improve the

name of bikers in the district and to show that we're not as nasty as some people think we are," he added.

Spencer said the toy run is an on-going project during the year. In addition, KBA district members also take part in other fund-raisers from time to time.

"We try to participate in helping any needy organization with things like food or toy drives," he said.

Spencer said community reaction to the toy run has been good.

"We've been well received," he said. "Most people welcome us with open arms.

"A couple even ask how they can help us out."

# WKU eyes \$35 million in construction

Western Kentucky University could see almost \$35 million in new and renovated facilities during the next two years.

The state Council on Higher Education has recommended \$34.8 million be given to WKU during the coming biennium for use solely on capital construction, according to Harry Largen, vice president for

business affairs.

The largest project recommended for construction is a student health and activities center. Estimated to cost \$13 million, the center would meet the educational, social, physical and psychological needs of WKU students and faculty, according to Western administrators.

University administrators have said WKU could see extreme growth in student population during

coming years, possibly as high as 16,000 students by 1989. That could climb to 20,000 by the mid-1990s, say administrators.

Largen said he believes the CHE recommendation reflects an acknowledgment of Western's growth.

"We certainly feel good about the council's recommendations," he said. "We think it's a recognition on their part of Western's growth and its need."

Capital construction funds have also been asked for other projects, including one or more residence halls — an estimated 300 beds — at \$6 million; a fraternity/sorority housing development along 15th Street, at \$5.8 million; and other improvements and renovations.

Largen said improvements could

include the addition of air conditioners to some residence halls or the addition of washers and dryers in some of the dormitories.

"Beyond that, there are some projects which might go into the remodeling or renovation category," Largen said. The projects, with an estimated \$5 million price tag, could include the replacement of coal boilers, safety improvements and upgrading of Snell Hall.

Overall, CHE has recommended more than \$100 million in funding for WKU over the next two years. According to Largen, the recommendation was for \$48 million in 1988-89 and \$57.2 million in 1990-91.

Western received \$42.6 million in state support this year.

Largen said university officials are optimistic that funding will be approved at its recommended levels, but have no way to guess what course the legislature will take.

"While we certainly have a level of optimism, we do not know how to gauge whether money will be available," Largen said.

The initial recommendation for funding first must come from the governor and be approved by the General Assembly.

A decision on funding should be made in January, Largen said.

# WKU blacked out by substation fire

A fire this morning at an electrical substation at Western Kentucky University shut off electricity to the southern part of the campus and to an elementary school.

City firefighters were placed on standby at about 9 a.m., but were not required to extinguish the fire, according to Wayne Mandeville, supervisor of WKU's mechanical services. He said the fire was contained to a switch gear in the substation.

The fire was not extensive, Mandeville said. No estimate of damage was available.

Bowling Green Municipal Utilities owns the substation. BGMU

spokesman Terry Carter said the fire would not affect customers outside of the university.

The cause of the fire was not certain. Mandeville said he believes it may have been caused by an electrical short circuit.

The electricity loss did not affect university operations to any great degree, according to Mandeville. The area affected by the power outage contained mostly residence halls. An estimated 90 percent of WKU students had already left campus for Christmas break.

Classes at Jones-Jagger Elementary School, however, were released

at noon because of the power outage, according to a school spokesman.

Approximately 550 children attend the school, which is located on WKU's campus.

The switch gear was an accessory piece of electrical equipment, according to Mandeville. It served as a capacitor in the high voltage distribution system.

"It works to provide a more precise current," Mandeville said. "It stabilizes the current, similar to a spike protector on a computer system."

About a dozen university employees began work at the system shortly after the fire was put out, Mandeville said. Power was expected to be returned by 2 p.m. today.

The burned equipment will be replaced.

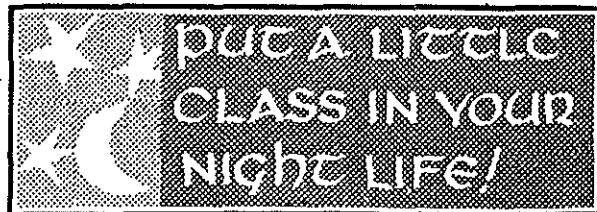
The switch gear was installed in 1981. It was the first time there was any problem with the equipment, Mandeville said.
