April 3, 1916.

It was moved and unanimously agreed that the present term close after the last class on Thursday and the Spring Term open on Tuesday morning, April 11th.

The next meeting of the Kentucky Educational Association was then thoroughly discussed and everyone urged to attend--faculty and students.

May 8, 1916.

Moved and agreed that the Seniors be given holiday on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday and the following Monday and Tuesday.

A school holiday was granted on Friday, all day, because of the May Music Festival.

September 13, 1916.

Monday, Nov. 13.
1916.
