**THE OPENING OF THE FALL SESSION**

The Fall Session of the Western Normal opens September 8, 1914. Already the correspondence indicates that there will be a decided increase in attendance over the previous year. The annual attendance of the institution has grown year by year,—a steady, healthy growth due not only to the merits of

the school, but to the energetic efforts of the former students throughout the State. Without the interest and co-operation of those who have been with us formerly, we realize that we could accomplish but little. The President of the institution and the entire faculty, Board of Regents, and others appreciate this great good-will and energy.

**REASONABLE BOARD.**

There has never been more or better board at reasonable rates offered in the city of Bowling Green than at this time. Rooms offering the best accommodations can be had in private homes for one dollar and twenty-five cents per week. This includes electric lights, steam heat or hot air and hot and cold baths at reasonable hours. Good meals can be had all the way from \$1.75 per week at the School Boarding Home, to \$2.50 and \$3.00 per week at private homes. For the small cost of \$2.50 per week, it is really astonishing how one can offer three excellent meals per day. This is done, however, and students and citizens both take advantage of the opportunity.





**FRISBIE HALL.**

For young girls who may enter school this fall and be away from home for the first time, we recommend Frisbie Hall as their home. Unless there is some special reason for choosing private board, we would suggest that parents place their daughters at Frisbie Hall at least for the first year of their stay in the city. This Hall is under the direction and personal care of Prof. A. C. Burton and his cultured wife, and both of these splendid people take a deep interest in doing everything in their power for the girls. The building is a three-story brick, has hot and cold water on each floor, is heated by steam, lighted by electricity, and is fitted with other modern conveniences. Those who desire to do so can get rooms in the Hall and good meals for \$2.75, \$3.00 and \$3.50 per week, everything furnished. The rooms are comfortably and attractively furnished and it is necessary for students to bring with them only their individual toilet articles or, perhaps, an extra pair of blankets or a comfortable for sudden changes in the weather. As a rule the rooms are provided with all the cover needed.

**OPENING OF THE SECOND TERM.**

The Second Term of the Western Normal will open November 17, 1914. Many young people who have completed their fall work by this time will enter the Normal on that date to begin their course of study. The MID-WINTER TERM begins January 25, 1914.

**LAST SUMMER SCHOOL.**

The Summer School of 1914 has gone into history as the best we ever had. Not only was the attendance much larger than at any previous year, but the work was more attractive, more extensive, and more thoroughly enjoyed by the many teachers enrolled. The annual enrollment was more than seventeen hundred,—quite a substantial increase over the year previous—and this does not include the attendance of the Training School. The latter was about three hundred.

The good wishes of all follow Miss Frazee, who will long live in the hearts of thousands of young lives that have come under her influence since her connection with the Western Normal.

**MISS HATCHER ACCEPTS THE PLACE.**

After careful and extensive survey of the field, it was unanimously agreed that Miss Mattie L. Hatcher, a native and former teacher of Bowling Green, a graduate of Chicago University, Supervisor of the Training School of the great Normal at Cedar Falls for a number of years, and instructor in the Summer School of Chicago University this last year, should be offered the position made vacant by the resignation of Miss Frazee. She has accepted and

will be with us for the opening of the Fall Term on September 8th. The school management feels peculiarly fortunate in securing the talented services of Miss Hatcher, who has so distinguished herself since leaving Bowling Green and who, without question, will make as eminent a success of her work here as she has elsewhere.
