WESTERN KENTUCKY STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE, BOWLING GREEN, KENTUCKY

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, FRANKFORT, KENTUCKY.

Gentlemen:

The Western Teachers College has never knowingly spent one cent in soliciting students who live in other states than Kentucky; in fact, it has never authorized any out-of-state travel for this purpose. So far as I know, out-of-state travel has occurred in but one instance and this was done without my knowledge or without authority from me. The instance referred to occurred last summer in the case of one individual who crossed the Mississippi River into Missouri at the request of a former student of this institution. I am advised by the individual that while there he saw two students who had expressed an interest in attending this institution. He was a close friend of the father of the boy at whose invitation he made the trip, crossing the river in the morning and returning in the afternoon.

Strictly speaking, Western has not employed student solicitors. Ithas, however, had a few field representatives who have worked for short periods and whose work has been, in part only, student solicitations.

I am giving on the following pages the information you request with interpretations that will enable you to have in your possession the information you desire.

Student Assistants, Janitors, and Laborers Employed by the Western Kentucky Teachers College between January 1, 1930, and January 1, 1932.

The foregoing signed list of faculty and employees of the Western Kentucky
Teachers College from January 1, 1930 to January 1, 1952 and the typewritten list of
former employees between this same period does not include student assistants who perform
duties in the laboratories and library, janitors, and laborers employed by the institution between January 1, 1930 and January 1, 1932. Most of the student assistants employed
by the institution between these periods are not now in the institution. If it is desired
this institution will make an effort to locate them and secure a signed statement from them.
This would be accomplished with great difficulty however.

The janitorial staff of the institution is composed in part of persons paid by the month and in part of persons paid by the hour. Many of these are likewise not in the employ of the institution at present. Most of the laborers of the institution are employed for short periods and hence are not now in the employ of the institution.

No student assistant, janitor or laborer employed by the Western Kentucky Teachers College between January 1, 1930 and January 1, 1932 was authorized by me to incur expense in the solicitation of students either within the state of Kentucky or in the states of Tennessee, Illinois and Missouri, or any other state. No expense accounts are now on file for any student assistant, janitor or laborer for the solicitation of students in the states of Tennessee, Missouri and Illinois.

FIELD REPRESENTATIVES

Strictly speaking the institution has not employed student solicitors. The institution has, however, employed field representatives whose work has been in part only student solicitation.

It has been the duty of the official representatives of the institution employed in field service to attend teachers meetings and to hold educational conferences for the purpose of promoting educational growth and development among teachers in service. They have also held personal interviews and group conferences for the purpose of explaining the opportunities of securing credit thru extension and correspondence study. They have also held personal interviews with prospective students, many of whom catalogs and other literature of the institution did not reach. Of the various duties performed by the field representatives of the institution only a small portion of time and expense is devoted to personal interviews with prospective students which may be properly designated as solicitation.

There are listed below the names and expense accounts of all field representatives employed by the institution between January 1, 1930 and January 1, 1932, who spent any portion of the time in personal interviews with prospective students or solicitation. Itemized copies of expense accounts are on file in the State Auditors office.

Your attention is respectfully called to the fact that the major portion of the above expense accounts are paid from the extension funds. The extension fund is derived from fees paid by persons taking courses by correspondence or in extension study centers. The entire cost of extension and correspondence work is paid from funds derived from the fees paid by persons pursuing these studies. The expense accounts listed under the column marked "Extension Fund" are also paid from this account. It will be noted, therefore, that these expense accounts have not been paid from funds derived from state appropriations. A few of the above expense accounts have been paid from funds derived from state appropriations. These accounts are listed under the column marked "General Funds". Your attention is again called to the fact that only approximately one-half of the time spent by the field representatives shown above was devoted to personal interviews with prospective students or solicitation.

OUT-OF-STATESTUDENTS

We give on the following pages a list of the names and addresses of out-of-state students for 1929-30 and 1930-31, the time they have attended the institution and the tuition paid. Upon investigation we find quite a large number of those registered as students from other States are Kentuckians who had accepted positions in other states, but held their citizenship in Kentucky. We find that quite a number of native Kentuckians living near the state line of other states receive their mail at a postoffice out of Kentucky. LET ME SAY AGAIN THAT THIS INSTITUTION HAS NOT KNOWINGLY SPENT ONE CENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF SOLICITING STUDENTS IN ANY OTHER STATE THAN KENTUCKY.

OUT-OF-STATE STUDENTS ATTEND HERE LARGELY FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

Parents acquainted with professors in our institution send their children here.

Relatives of members of the faculty come here in order to be close to someone they know.

Some attend because they have a sister, uncle or friend who is a citizen of Bowling Green.

Some are here because former students who are located all over the country speak of the institution in loyal and supporting terms.

A few students in the Bowling Green Business University of this city take some academic work in Western.

Quite a number attend here because of the close proximity of the State line putting them within driving distance of Bowling Green.

Some come because they are related or acquainted with some individual connected with the institution.
