COLLEGE OF EDUCATION GETS MORE KUDOS

WKU's College of Education will be visited later this month for a study funded by the U.S. Department of Education.

Researchers are examining "exemplary teacher preparation programs," says Mark Kutner, a research analyst assisting with the study.

In a letter to Dr. J.T. Sandefur, dean of the College of Education, Kutner says: "Western Kentucky University has been identified as having an outstanding reputation for obtaining feedback from schools which employ its graduates to identify strengths and weaknesses of its program."

Four other institutions of higher education will be summarized with WKU's study and Kutner says "the report will provide other interested institutions with information to facilitate their adoption of exemplary practices."

WKU REPRESENTED AT INTERNATIONAL MEETING

Dr. Glenn Crumb, director of the Center for Mathematics, Science and Environmental Education, is in Geneva, Switzerland, participating in a UNESCO-sponsored International Bureau of Education Conference on high technology in the schools.

Crumb was selected to attend the conference for his work with the Kentucky Schools Technology Project, a U.S. Department of Education funded program designed to demonstrate the use of advanced technology to aid instruction in the elementary classroom.

The project will be one of the subjects of two audiovisual presentations made at the conference, which is attended by 120 nations.

Mellon awards are highly competitive and are aimed at attracting "exceptionally promising students into preparation for careers of humanistic teaching and scholarship." Seniors or recent graduates are eligible, and awards for 1985 carry stipends of \$8,000, plus tuition and payment of standard fees.

DR. EMERY E. ALFORD, associate professor of music, has spent several weekends this fall adjudicating percussion sections at high school marching festivals in Green County, Trigg County, Central City, Gamaliel and Russellville.

RICHARD CANTRELL, department of economics, gave a seminar on statistical process control for members of the Plastics Institute of America in Chicago this month.

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DR. AND MRS. WILLIAM A. FLOYD, department of home economics and family living, will present a paper on "Bulimia: The Secretive Cycle of Shame/Superiority" and will appear on a panel dealing with family therapy at a conference on anorexia and bulimia, individual, family and society in Radford, Va. Earlier this month the two spoke to Phi Upsilon Omicron in Bowling Green on subjective impressions of the Soviet Union.

DR. LOWELL H. HARRISON, professor of history, spoke to the Filson Club in Louisville this month on "A Century of Progress: the Filson Club, 1884-1984."

DR. STEPHEN LILE, professor of economics, was a discussant at the tenth annual conference of the Kentucky Economic Association earlier this month in Lexington. The conference focused on Economic Issues in Kentucky, and Dr. Lile spoke on taxation.

DR. PAULINE LOWMAN, department of mathematics, presented a communications session on women in the history of mathematics at the Fifth International Congress on Mathematical Education in Adelaide, South Australia. She also participated in a tertiary action group on theoretical mathematics and in a theme group on applications and modelling.

ROBERT A. OTTO, professor of teacher education, was elected president of the Kentucky Council for Social Studies at the organization's annual meeting last month.

The council consists of Kentucky social studies teachers at the elementary, secondary, and college level. Otto will be a state delegate to the National Council for Social Studies meeting in Washington, D.C. on Nov. 15-18 and will be a presenter at the conference.

DR. RICHARD SALISBURY, professor of history, had a book, Costa Rica y el Istmo, 1900-1934, (Costa Rica and the Isthmus) published in September by the Editorial de Costa Rica.

Also, Salisbury last month chaired a session on diplomatic history at the VI Mid America Conference on History at the University of Kansas, and he presented a paper on "Spain, the United States, and Latin America" at the Conference on Iberia and Latin America hosted by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research in Washington, D.C.

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DR. DONALD R. TUCK, professor of religious studies, is a reviewer for the National Endowment for the Humanities, and has assessed two grant proposals: "Interconnection of Culture and Ceremony in the Mithlila Wedding," a \$175,171 award to study the central ceremonial event in India--the wedding, and "Sacred Biography in Asia," a \$360,415 proposal to study sacred biography in India with special reference to Caitanya and the Bengal Vaisnavas.

Tuck has been doing research on Caitanya, the 16th century revitalizer of the Bengal Vaisnava religion.
