Seymour Hersh, Journalist, Opens Lecture Series

The university's 1983-84 Lecture Series opens this Wednesday at 8 p.m. featuring Seymour Hersh, the 1970 pulitzer-prize winning investigative reporter who won the award for uncovering the My Lai massacre in Vietnam.

Hersh will speak on his recently published book, <u>The Price of Power</u>, which chronicles foreign policy during the Kissinger era and profiles Kissinger himself.

The lecture will be held in Van Meter Auditorium and is free.

Hersh has won numerous awards and has written several books including: "Chemical and Biological Warfare: America's Hidden Arsenal," "My Lai 4: A Report on the Massacre and Its Aftermath" and "Cover Up: The Army's Secret Investigation of the Massacre of My Lai." His articles have appeared in The New Yorker, Saturday Review, the New York Review of Books and the New Republic.

Two WKU Colleges Form Science Education Advisory Council

The university has a new 14-member Science Education Advisory Council that met for the first time earlier this month to address the issue of providing quality education to secondary and elementary math and science teachers.

"The Council hopes to find ways to better serve the needs of math and science teachers and the new professionals coming along," says Dr. William G. Lloyd, dean of the Ogden College of Science, Technology and Health, who collaborated with WKU's Dean of the College of Education, Dr. J.T. Sandefur, on the council's membership and purpose.

"It is a joint effort of both of our colleges to recognize the need to help teachers in the years to come," says Lloyd.

The Council is made up of faculty members from both of the university's colleges, plus members from area high schools, and is chaired by Douglas Jenkins, a physics teacher at Warren Central.

The first meeting established goals of the Council, and for starters they include helping science and math teachers be better prepared, imbued with the concept of math and science going "hand-in-hand," training in use of computers, fund-raising, and improving in-service programs.

Concurrently, a story in The Chronicle of Higher Education Sept. 21, ran a front page story on the need for greater emphasis on training qualified secondary school teachers to provide by 1995, "a level of mathematics, science, and technology education that is the finest in the world," the National Science Board's Commission on Pre-College Education in Mathematics, Science and Technology said.

This blue ribbon panel has recommended several steps to upgrade science and mathematics education programs nationwide.

At WKU's first advisory group meeting, President Zacharias supported our campus efforts. "We want to take advantage of the national attention focused on science and education as a whole and see what Western can do about it," the President said.
