My dear Miss Boone:

I am just back in the office and going through a large number of letters with a view of answering them. I have been unable to answer correspondence of a personal nature and it is my plan to answer all of these delayed letters within the next few days. I appreciate your communication and valve deeply what you say. I note what you say about coming back and I am thoroughly interested in the same. I will not be able to make you a proposition for the coming year. At any rate, not before February. I want to assure you that, if possible, we want you with us in the future. We greatly value your work. I congratulate you upon having gone ahead through the University of California. We have made the Western Normal a Teachers College.

Under separate cover we are sending you a copy of the Summer School bulletin and also a copy of the last issue of Normal Heights which will give you some recent information concerning the school. We emrolled 2619 different student-teachers. We have 1000 in the Correspondence Department and in addition to the above we have between four and five hundred in the Training School and Junior High School. We enrolled 750 more students last year than ever before in the history of the institution. We have really had a wonderful year's work. The only trouble we are having is a matter of finances. This is a very serious problem. School is much larger than our appropriation. It is like running a \$500,000 business on a \$10,000 capital. We are hoping to get a remedy through some future General Assembly. The last General Assembly made an appropriation but the Governor vetoed it. He did this not only in the cast of the Western Normal, but all other instituitions.

Miss Boone, I think I should tell you about the \$100.00 which has bee working continuously since you were here. A girl from Russell County had it year before last. Miss Luter had it last year and has paid it back. It is now loaned to Mrs. Warner one of the most worthy cases that can be found anywhere. Mrs. Warner has two children and has had reverses in life and is now trying to get ready tockeach. She is a woman of splendid personality and will make a real

teacher. If you could be here and understand her hardships and at the same time her high purposes you would find a real pleasure in the contribution you havemade.

We have just launched a student fund movement and hope to raise \$10,000 before many months. We believe we can do this. There is no other one thing that means more to the institution than to have a student fund. We are wondering if you would be willing for this hundred dollars to be put permanently into the student fund. Of course, we are not asking this. I am not sure that you did not have this in mind at the time you made the contribution. At any rate, it has been used as a separate fund and has worked in a most earnest way for the advancement of other students who needed help. I have had in mind returning the hundred dollars whenever you may call for it. I have never known exactly whether you meant for it to be permanent or temporary. At any rate this matter is entirely in your hands. I wish you could come to see us. School opens next Tuesday.
