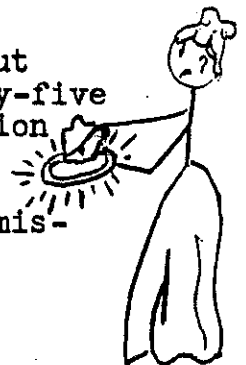


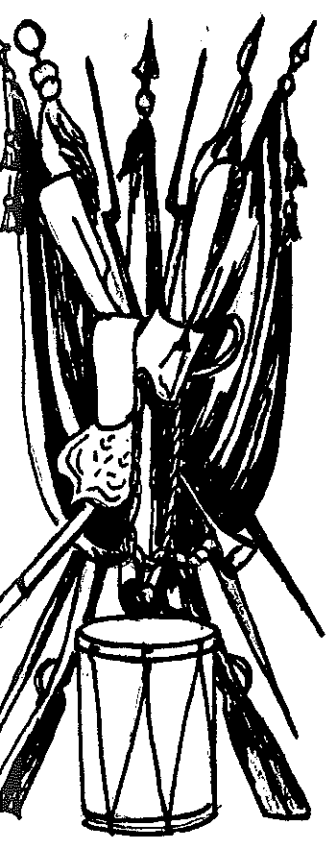
A BIT OF HUMOR

1878 Rules For Teachers

1. Teachers are expected to keep the schoolroom clean and neat by: sweeping the floor at least once each day, starting the fire at 7 a.m. so that the school room will be warm by 8 a.m.
2. Teachers will not dress in bright colors.
3. Dresses must not be more than two inches above the ankle.
4. At least two petticoats must be worn and they will be dried on pillowcases.
5. A teacher will not marry, or keep company with men during the term of her employment.
6. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
7. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
8. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
9. Every teacher should lay aside from each payday a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
10. Teachers are expected to be at home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., unless in attendance at a school function.
11. It is understood that the teacher will attend church each Sunday and either teach a class in Sunday school or sing in the choir.
12. A teacher will not get into a carriage with any man except her brother or father.
13. Teachers will not loiter at ice cream stores.
14. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, integrity, intention and honesty.
15. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay providing the Board of Education approves.
16. The teacher will not leave town at any time without permission of the Chairman of the School Board.





## KENTUCKY MILITARY RECORDS

### IN REGARD TO MILITARY RECORDS OF KENTUCKY:

1. Can be found at local, state & federal level.
2. Military records are 2nd largest volume of records we have (court records are larger).
3. Some military records can be found at local level. In order to obtain a pension for service in the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, or Civil War, one had to go before a court and make application. These applications will be found in Order Books in County or Circuit Clerk offices in local court-houses. Even though many people who served in these wars did not accept a pension, most of them did go before a Court to establish a record of service and/or to obtain a land grant.

This is the main center for Kentucky military records. The National Guard was previously known as the State Guard. The State Guard was previously known as the State Militia.

The Center is not set up for research by a large number of people. Therefore, they prefer you write for information. The Center has employees who will do a thorough search for you.

**REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORDS:** The Center does not have any Revolutionary War records. These will be found in Richmond, VA, since Kentucky was part of the state of Virginia at that time.

The Center does, however, have a Volume of Revolutionary Soldiers in KY (by Quisenberry) which gives bounty recipients & pensioners.

Also, the Kentucky Library in Bowling Green, KY, has in book form (by Annie Walker Burns)--by County, most all Kentucky men who applied for a Revolutionary War pension.

Also, the Kentucky Archives in Frankfort, KY, has records for Kentucky Revolutionary War Veterans (from National Archives) on micro-film.

Records of Revolutionary War service can be obtained from Washington, DC. The fee, upon application, is \$5.00. It takes approximately two months to receive reply. To obtain free leaflets and the proper application forms, send SASE & request to REFERENCES SERVICE BRANCH (NNIT), Washington, DC 20408.

WAR OF 1812: In this war, a majority of the soldiers were from Kentucky. Of the 1876 men killed in this war, 1200 were Kentuckians. The Boone Center has a Roster of "Known Military Dead" for this war, also the Muster Rolls. The Muster Record will list wife, children and home post office.

INDIAN WARS: The Boone Center has some records for these wars. Will tell wife, next of kin, etc. (depends on time).

WAR WITH MEXICO--1846-47: The Boone Center has a Volume of "Officers & Soldiers from KY" in this war. It is indexed.

CIVIL WAR: The Boone Center has Muster Rolls for both Union and Confederate. Has records for Black troops. Has discharges upgraded in the late 1800's. If your ancestor was recorded as having deserted, this may simply mean he was separated from his Unit for a brief period of time or that he had gone home to see about a sick relative, etc. Be sure to ask the clerk to check the Discharge Records to see if a change was recorded, as many "desertions" were later corrected.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR--1898: The Boone Center has Muster Rolls for this war in microfilmed and laminated forms. Many Kentucky men enlisted for this war at Glasgow, Louisville and Lexington.

RECENT AMERICAN WARS: The Boone Center has records for all recent American Wars, including Vietnam. However, a military record must be 75 years old before it is open to researchers. Otherwise, you must be an immediate member of the soldier's family and have a very good reason for viewing the record. The Center will not release any detrimental material on a soldier.

OTHER RECORDS: The Boone Center has many other records such as the Roster of Commissioned Officers in the Corn Stalk Militia, 1792-1811 (by G. Glenn Clift); Grave Registration records for Kentucky Veterans--filed in alphabetical order; History of individual Units of the Kentucky National Guard from 1865 to present; Adjutant General reports, with index, from 1821 to present, etc.

Most records at the Center are on film. The original records are preserved at the Kentucky Archives and cannot be viewed by the public.

TO OBTAIN A RECORD: Write to the Boone National Guard Center at the address on preceding page, giving person's name and as near correct dates and information as possible (war, regiment, place of enlistment, etc.). Be sure to include a large, stamped, self-addressed envelope.
