has not been sold and I am willing to give
one dollar per acre and Run all Risks for the
Land and if you can find out what part would
be his you can by with safety there is five Heirs
but How the Land was to be divided I dont no
but I believe it was not to be Equally divided
if he is not willing to take one dollar per acre
Give Him more so as not to Exceed 2 But
Get it as Low as you can and oblige
your friend Joboam Beauchamp
B send on what ever

the Property sold for By the first safe hand
after Keeping a while to Buy the Land as I
shall stand in greater need of it and oblige
your Humble servant Jeroboam B. Suchan
If you can't see Pratts you can find out where he lives
and in dorse the letter to him as I don't know where
he lives
