Three of the girls are married - they all married men they met at the University, and have quite fine husbands. The younger girls are in college. It has been wonderful going to their weddings.

May 1974, I sold my home in Robinwood, where Herb and I had lived since 1951, and moved to a small house in town, on Hawthorne Road. I have a garden and flowers and many friends, so I am doing just fine. Now, in July of 1980, I have good health and am looking forward to the future.

Bill was born and reared in Henderson, and graduated from B M T H S in the Class of 1920. He then entered Centre College as a pre-med student, but abandoned it for a Naval career, entering Annapolis in June 1921, and graduating June 7, 1925.

He advanced through the various grades to the rank of Rear Admiral, effective 1 July 1954. Prior to the outset of World Two, and in May 1940, he was given command of the Destroyer U S S Goff, based in the Panama Area. Later, when war broke, he was the skipper of the Winslow, operating off the coast of South America, during which assignment he was highly successful in patrolling for submarines between Brazil and Africa, and in tightening the blockade around South America.

From June 1942 - June 1943 was Flag Secretary U S Atlantic Fleet  
June 1943 - Commander Destroyer Division 36 and Escort Commander, Atlantic Convoys  
June 1944 - Commander Destroyer Close Fire Support Group at Omaha Beach during Normandy Invasion. For this action, he was awarded the Silver Star Medal and French Croix de Guerre.

Following the Normandy Invasion, he was transferred to the Pacific as Commander Destroyer Squadron 48. Participated in the Leyte Invasion, the Okinawa Campaign, and the Morotai Action.

In June 1945, he was ordered to the Navy Department, Washington D.C. until August 1946 as Assistant Director, Navy Demobilization in the Bureau of Naval Personnel. He was commended by the Secretary of the Navy for this service.

He next reported to the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in Washington, and upon graduation in 1947 was ordered to the Munitions Board as Director of Manpower and Utilities.

December 1949 until February 1951 was the Director of Transportation and Petroleum, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. While there had additional duty as Navy Staff Member of the Advisory Council of the Military Traffic Service.

February to November 1949, commanded the Cruiser Spokane with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean. Two years later was ordered to European Area as Naval Attache and Naval Attache for Air in Rome to April 1953. Designated by Commander in Chief Allied Forces, Southern Europe as his Military Representative to the Italian Ministry of Defense.

Returned to the Navy Department in May 1953 as Executive Assistant and Senior Aide to the Chief of Naval Operations. In November 1954 was ordered as Commander Destroyer One. December 28, 1954, sailed with the Flotilla for the Far East, and on arrival assumed the additional duties Commander Destroyer Flotilla Western Pacific, and Commander Destroyers Seventh Fleet.

Bill retired as a Vice Admiral May 1, 1959.

Bill is a member of the Army Navy Country Club, Washington D.C.

Class of 1921

Early in January 1921, I left High School to go to the Werntz Preparatory School in Annapolis to prepare for entrance to the Naval Academy. After being accepted in March, I returned to Henderson to finish my credits in order to graduate with my class of 1921.

A couple of weeks after graduation, I was sworn in as a midshipman, and graduated in 1925 with the rank of ensign.

I was assigned to the U S S New York, and after a bout with tropical fever, contracted in Panama Canal Zone, I was assigned as an instructor at the Naval Academy Prep School for Enlisted Appointees at the Naval Base in Norfolk Virginia, while the New York was being converted from a coal burner to oil.

The first of October 1925, I was married secretly in La Plata Maryland to Cleone (Jerry) Kaltenbach of Buffalo New York, who was a senior at National Park Seminary in Washington, and she wanted to graduate there, and would not be allowed to were it known she was married.

I drove up from Norfolk to Washington on Thanksgiving to see her, and enroute at 3 A M, drove straight, in the rain, where the road made a right turn to cross the Occoquan River. It was waste deep in icy water when progress stopped, and pneumonia ensued, ending with a spot on my lung, and my subsequent transfer to Fitzsimons Hospital in Denver - where I was retired for physical disability in January 1927.

Jerry's family then had our marriage annulled, as we had never lived together.

With the new techniques, pneumo-thorax, crisp Colorado air, I got well, and and went through a number of career seeking employments - a Nash, then Chrysler Dealership in Denver - ending up as Treasurer and General Salesmanager of the Inland Box Company, which position I held until December 1941.

When the Air National Guard was called to active duty in 1940, I had formed the Colorado Air Reserve, and was named its Commanding Officer, and Aviation Aide to Governor Carr. The Denver Pilots Club airplanes and mine - I had accumulated the Stinson and Culver Cadet Distributorships in my spare time - formed the nucleus for the squadron. We flew mercy missions for the governor and state, and flew the governor and his staff to official functions such as the dedication of Shepherd Field in Wichita Falls Texas - inspection of National Guard Troops in Tennessee, etc.

When the Civil Air Patrol was formed in 1941, I was named the Wing Commander for Colorado, another extra curricular activity, and then called back to Washington in December 1941 to be the National Executive Officer for the Civil Air Patrol.

During the first liason session with the Army, Navy, and C A B representatives, I was there for the C A P, and Admiral Towers recognized me, and wanted to know why I was wearing that uniform instead of a Navy one. The next morning after I had explained the situation to him, I received orders recalling me to active duty in the Navy, and given the assignment as Head of the Recognition Section for the Naval Aeronautics Division. We developed the so-called "Flash" system which was adopted and utilized throughout our services and also adopted by our allies. We commissioned 265 officers to serve as instructors throughout the Naval Establishment - one of whom was Jim Armstrong of Henderson.

While living in Denver I had accumulated several thousand hours of flying time, and a commercial pilot's license. As a result of this experience, I was ordered to Pensacola for a thirty day refresher course, and received my Navy Pilot Wings.

I was then ordered to the Naval Air Station Alameda as Operations Officer, and served there for three years, then ordered to Washington to the Industrial College of the Armed Forces to study lessons learned during the War, and was then appointed as Executive Secretary to the Industry Advisory Committee for the Armed Forces, composed of the top executives of each major industry, where my duties consisted of keeping contact with each executive and arranging the agenda for the monthly meetings.

I forgot to mention that in 1928, I met and married Genevieve Connelly of Denver. We were divorced in 1936, and remarried in 1939.

In 1947, I was returned to the retired list in the Navy as a Commander, and from my contact with the executives on the Industry, Benson Ford wrote to me and offered me a volume Lincoln Mercury Dealership in Kansas City Missouri - which I sold in 1950.

Having liked the Bay Area of California, and finding no restrictions, we moved to Berkeley. I studied real estate at Golden Gate University, and took the exam for broker, and opened an office in Oakland.

While on a vacation in Honolulu in 1951, an acquaintance I had known during the war ran into us at the Moana Hotel, and told me he was vice president of operations for United States Overseas Airlines, and was short a pilot for the run to Tokyo the following day, and would I help him out by getting a rush passport and going on it. I flew all over the world with them for the rest of the fifties, then was made executive vice president of the company. In 1960 Slick Airways offered me a vice presidency to take over their military operations, which I took.

Gen and I were divorced there in 1955, and when it became final, in 1956 I married Celia in Carmel California - acquiring three step children and my permanent wife!

1958 was a banner year for me - as Celia gave birth to my first child, and that was the year of promotion to executive vice president for the airline.

In 1960 my second daughter was born.

In 1963, shortly before Slick sold out, I resigned, and went back to being a real estate broker, which I still work at occasionally - specializing in restaurants and commercial industrial properties.

After Celia and I were married, we bought a home in San Mateo, California, and lived there for fifteen years, moving to Palo Alto in 1971, where my office was - saving me a fifteen mile commute each way.

Our six bedroom,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  bath home serves us well as roots for the five children, and now three grand children, with another due this September.

Our hobbies are traveling, playing bridge, and I get in a little golf occasionally, although that has been severely curtailed since January 1979 when I had an artificial hip put in to replace an ailing right one. We both have itchy feet, and expect to travel as much as health and time permits. We took delivery last September in Stuttgart Germany of a Mercedes at the factory, and spent a month touring Europe before having the car shipped to San Francisco from Antwerp.

Hawaii is our favorite relaxation spot, and we find excuses to go there whenever possible.

## Research and Services:

My research into the "unknown" and the published information produced 163 publications (see list) from 1929 to 1971 at retirement. Two publications, numbers 135 and 158, deserve comment because of their non-conventionality. Number 135 was produced from non-research funding and published by the Government Printing Office for the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a reference book for wide distribution and repository. Number 158, originally produced as a chapter in a book for commercial publication, was published privately on Microfiche, probably an innovation in publishing because of its simplicity and economy. The other publications carry their respective value and meaning. Publications 144, 147, and 149 on a viral disease of orchids served to earn the 1968 award.

My services, alternating in academia and the Armed Forces have led to some syntheses. My military services, largely self explanatory, provided an "away from academia influence" that favored a trend toward innovative organization matters. Likewise, my academic base allowed perception into the betterment of military personnel procedures and management. In addition, experience in research institutes without the rigidity of usual university or military departmental structure and echelon procedures served to favor the genesis of innovative ideas in my services in both the Armed Forces and Academia. These experiences have encouraged adventure into my private concerns in retirement.
