Burlington Sept the 27th 1846

Being impressed with the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death I feel disposed to say in what way I wish my property disposed of at my death viz. after paying all my just debts I will and bequeath that it be disposed in the manner following. I give to Eliza M. Seal five hundred dollars to be placed in the hands of one of her brothers as trustee for her benefit and to be used as he may think advisable. To Mariah Moore I give five hundred dollars.

Having contributed to the raising of a part of the children of Ann S. Powell and am still continuing to do so, I leave them nothing further than they have already received and may receive in the raising thereafter out of my means, and as to Jas. J. Moore, considering him as already well off, I leave him nothing.

James M. Moore having lived with me for a long time, and having been attentive to business intrusted to his care, I give to him one half and to brother Robert Moore the other half of my estate after the above mentioned bequests and not only what I now own but all which I may hereafter acquire, but in the event of any misfortune befalling mother, then in that event, Robt. and James are out of what they receive of my property to give to her a gentle support during her lifetime. After mature reflection I make the above bequests and wish them to be considered as my last will and bequest and in testimony of which I hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this day and date before written.

dollars Conditioned according to Law.

This Indenture, made and entered into this day of copy?  
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and  
between Robert Moore, and his wife of the County of Warren,  
and State of Kentucky of the one part, and David A. Porter, of the  
County of Allen and State aforesaid of the other part.

Witnesseth, That the said Robert Moore, and his wife, for and  
in consideration of the sum of One dollar, to them in hand  
paid the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted,  
bargained, and sold, and by these presents do grant, bargain,  
sell, and, convey unto the said David A. Porter, his heirs and  
assigns, One Certain Tract or parcel of Land, lying and being  
in the aforesaid County of Allen and State aforesaid on the  
Water of the Middle fork of Traker Creek, and bounded  
as follows (to wit) Beginning at a Sycamore, on Ellis  
Branch, thence S. 18° W 28 poles to two White Oaks, thence S 66°  
E. 64 poles to a Spanish Oak, thence N. 76° E 56 poles to a White Oak,  
thence S. 70° E 30 poles to a White Oak, thence S 52° E 46 poles to  
a White Oak & Ash, thence N. 83½° E 142 poles to a Stake, thence  
N. 22° West 148 poles to a dogwood & Chestnut, thence N. 64° W. 52 poles  
to a Black Oak and Chestnut, thence N. 52° W 23 poles to a Chestnut,  
thence S 64° W 101 poles to a White Oak and two black Oaks, thence  
S 57° W 102 poles to two White Oaks, thence S. 87° W 18 poles to the place  
of Beginning, Containing by Survey Two hundred Acres, more  
or less, as appears by patent to said Moore bearing date  
30 June 1823. To have and To Hold, The said Tract or



parcel of land above described, unto the said David A.  
Porter, his heirs and assigns forever, And the said Robert  
More and his wife, doth agree forever to defend  
the right, title, and claim of said land unto the said  
Porter, his heirs &c free from the claims of themselves their  
heirs, or the claims of all persons claiming in any manner
