Regarding the plat of Bardstown: - *by Jack Muir - Bardstown*

From the Court House looking toward Lots 8 and 9 the streets runs a little East of North - - to meet the Louisville Turnpike.

Lot No. 30 William Rowan, father of Senator John Rowan, lived here. John lived there until the fall or winter of 1801 when he moved to the country - - no doubt to Federal Hill.

Walter Beall lived across the street from Rowan. He too moved to the country in 1801 - perhaps to "Villa Lawn" where H. L. Muir now lives. Beall is remembered in Kentucky history because of his "paper town." He was a trustee of Salem Academy (where Priestly taught) and gave a lot for the school.

Nathaniel Wickliffe, brother of Hon. Charles A. Wickliffe, owned several lots. He was a lawyer, was postmaster and was County Clerk for many years, 1830-1851.

Hon. C. A. Wickliffe owned lots. He was Lieutenant Governor, Governor, Congressman, Postmaster General - held other important public offices.

Dr. Burr Harrison lived on Lot No. 92. He was called "General." Led men to join Jackson at New Orleans. The story goes that when Harrison reported to Jackson he was offended by something Jackson said. He said that he would take his men back to Kentucky. Jackson - so the story goes - apologized. Dr. Harrison is said to have been an assistant when Dr. Walter Brashear performed his famous amputation at the hip.

Dr. Walter Brashear built a brick house on Lot No. 80 - known as "The Closer Leaf Lot" - at an early date. Was the amputation performed here? Date of the operation - said to be 1806. The Post Office now (1946) stands on Lot 80.

Town Cemetery - Lots 111 and 112. John Fitch and other veterans of the Revolution were buried here.

Jacob Yoder, owner of several lots, was the father-in-law of Senator John Brown. Rowan-Chambers duel fought on a tract owned by Yoder - not far from town.

General Joseph Lewis home - lots 11 and 12. Indian fighter. See "Neighborhood Sketches" by Walter H. Kiser in Louisville Times, December 1, 1941.
