By the hands of Mr. George Dillin and
took it on the Chiton in order to be ^{be} recorded
and presented it to Mr. Reeves and ^{he} said it
was not in legal form as to the way
in which it was certified and that he
did not think it would be good and valid
in law he said ~~the~~ ^{the} Governor ought
to certify that the Clerk was duly Com-
missioned and was acting Clerk and that
the Justices of the Peace was duly
Commissioned and the Clerk to certify
that the Justices was acting Justices and
then their ought to be good fith and Cred
to be placed in what they do also that
the ~~Justices~~ Justices to certify that the
Clerk was acting Clerk and of good fan
and Credit and for you both to acknow-
ge the deed with your signature in the fac
of the deed then Mr. Wm. Relinquish-
ment of Dower on the Back of it allow
he said that you had better get some other
Justice in the place of your self so
I'm now more at present but Remain
Yours &c. Enjoying a good health

and family and all of the neighbors at present
Hoping these lines may find you all well
You will be so good as to attend and give the
dead a grave to the instructing and forward it
on by mail and your compliments with

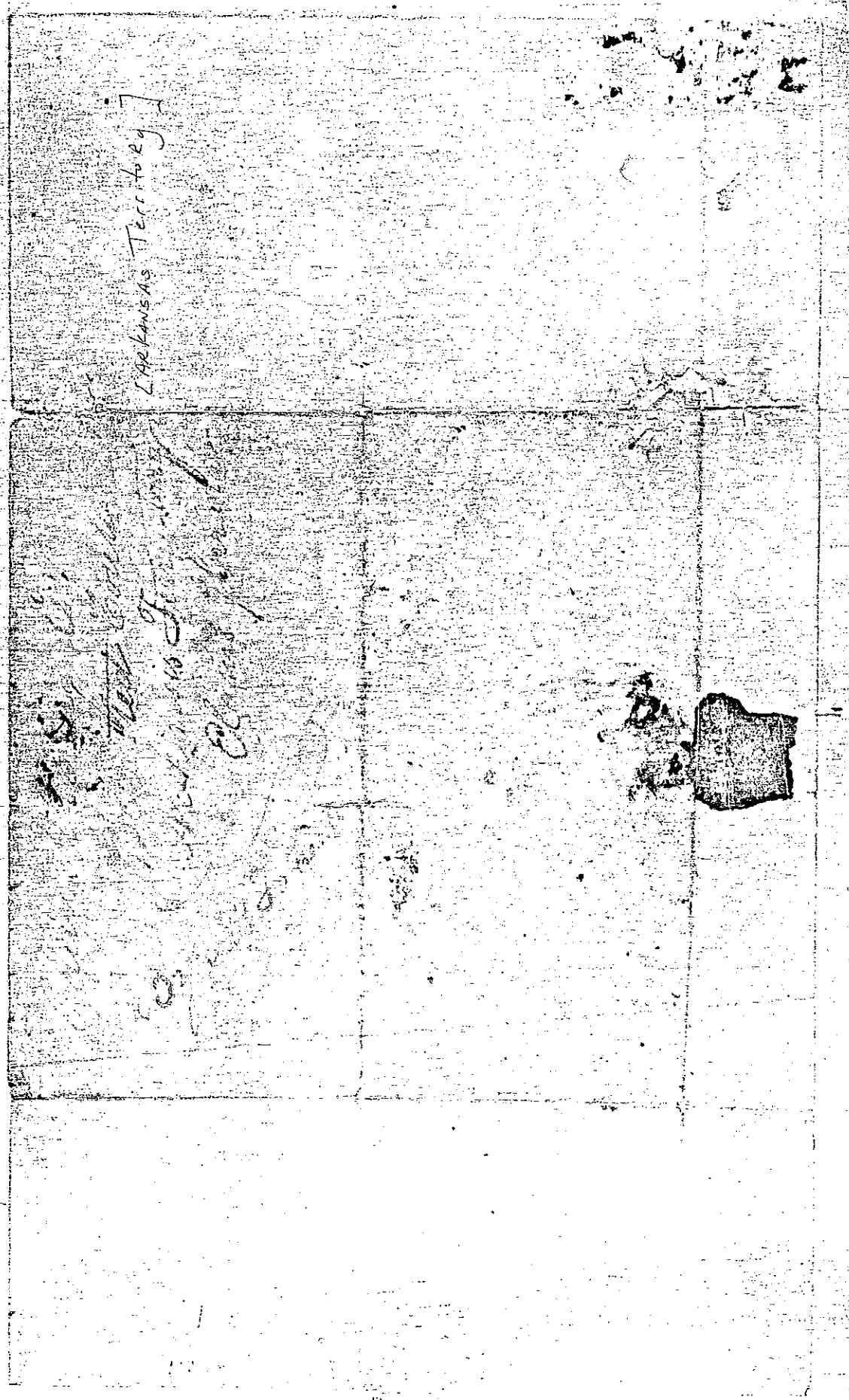

Dear Father and
 Sister through the turn of kind
 Providence we are all well and
 assembling ourselves together
 with our friends in this part of the
 world I received a letter from you
 on the 16th July which informs
 me of your enjoying good health and
 of the dear old mother and
 who I hope is well and happy
 March last and that your
 son Coffey is one of the best and
 has provided for all the property
 people the waggons and team have
 known of for which he wishes to
 pay to the State of Kentucky in what
 write to him C. Coffey not proceed
 further to [sell] until the first of
 January 1829 but has not
 any word from him since [expecting]
 to hear in short time
 he was never [heard of] since
 for the [last] time



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Lodds County Kentucky October the 5th 1834

Dear Brother and Sister we
are all well at present but my son here
who has the fever and Ague, hoping this
letter may find you all well, dear Sir I
have made you a power of Attorney to
Act for me and settle my business in your
country of my Father's Estate you will
confide a Very Sincere favour and me by
doing so ~~and~~ that it shall never be forgotten
by me as I have know one to attend to
it for me you will act and do as you
think proper under my Authority given
you pay yourself out the proceeds for your
servisses send the balance to me by Col
=man Watson if he should move hear
this fall if he doz not move her you will
send it by William Watson the widower
Watson son if I should draw need I want
him if any of the others should fall to me
and they do not want to come her you can
sell and do just as you think proper on that
I send the Vallue ation of a g^d Negro
girl that Father gave me and the vallue
ation of A mare that father left with
me last fall There is A receipt of Three
Hundred dollars that was gav to father
for Polley a Negro girl in amongst others
papers gave by John to Lemman

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Sir I wrote some time ago to Gen. Watson
which I requested him to show to you stating
-ing that there was certainly a will
of his father in the hands of Squire
White of Warren County I have been up there
to be about it and it is not there so that
I wish for a division to take place forth
-with of the property of said estate which
division I want to take place in peace
harmony and friendship throughout -
dealing Justice to all the Heirs -

I want to be remembered to Sister Betsey
and children Polly doct^r A. Dou^glass
Coleman & Lucy ^{these words} Watson & William & Bessie
Watson and ^{I am} still trying to live another
year I have a tolerable crop of corn
and tobacco &c - I come to a close
by subscribing myself your friend &c

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Todd County Kentucky January 10th 1833

Dear Brother and Sister,

I am still spared and in the Land of the Living
And all my family enjoying good health at present
Hoping those lines may find you all enjoying
good health and the good spirit of the ruler of
the universe bearing witness that ye are of God
Susan Coleman has received by the hands of
William Watson one negro named Esther at
Six hundred and fifty dollars also one horse bridle
and Saddle at one hundred dollars which was
received off that much of her Fathers Estate from
you as her Trusty Friend and attorney in fact to
Settle and transact her business as one of the heirs
of Evan Watson decided and also received by me
as acting agent for her said Susan Coleman She
wishes you to send what was the amount of her
Share stating fully what was the amount
of the Estate also what She is indebted
when she receives that negro boy that you shall
have as she wants the boy and wants to send
you the money and pay you for all trouble.
She also returns you her unfeigned Thanks for
what you have done in the business and request
to be remembered to you and family and all
inquiring friends and wants you to write as
soon as convenient. I am again in the wedlock
Bands I was married on the 14th of December
1824 to a Misses Batts of Russell Co

About 35 years of age was a widow she had
 four children was attached to the Methodist
 Church and appears to be jealous for the cause.
 She has been made to ~~ess~~ know May it
 be all of our happy lots Should we never
 meet again in this world to meet where parting
 is no more and to be so prepared as to meet
 with the welcome approbation Come ye
 blessed in herit the Kingdom prepared for
 you before the foundations of the world
 there to remain enjoying those glorious
 things that is prepared for all the
 finally faithfully through the annals of Vase
 Eternity is the desire of your affectionate
 brother though we are at so great a distance and
 so long absent from each other yet I
 am oftentimes thinking about ~~the~~ those
 pleasant hours that we have spent in
 sweet conversation and pleasant smiling
 countenances I am yours with greater
 respect

Todd County Kentucky February 8th 1895

Dear Brother and Sister I received your
of the 29th December last with pleasure and was
very happy to hear from you all and that of
your health and prosperity, but when coming to
see the distress and commotion of your Country
and the outrages of those who ~~are~~ ^{are} trying
to keep you under the yoke of bondage it
brought to mind the distress of our Fathers of '76
and my desire and prayer is that you ^{and} ~~bold~~
adventurers of the west may prove as brave
and bold and bare up under the fatigue
of war as they did and may be crowned
with the same success of being conquering
and free to govern to rule and to worship
according to the dictates of your own
conscience while there shall be none to
make you afraid there is a Volunteer
Company raising in Clarksville Tennessee
destined to our armies and a lot of some
in Kentucky - as to Hutching I cannot say
much about it I showed Susan your letter and
advised her to get you to fetch him when
you came in. I saw but she thought
of getting Coleman Watson to bring him
he was coming then think he could
ride behind him, and I saw the east end of
John Jones departed this life in
July last ^{my} youngest daughter Virginia
Pancy Agnes died the 24th of Feb. ^{my} ~~my~~
last with the congested fever it prevailed
in our Country last fall and was very fatal
in some families lost from 4 to 5 and the
Cholera in Clarksville saw some 170 or 200
but our Country is now quite healthy
