Nashville Tenn Oct 19<sup>th</sup> 1892

My Dear Hattie

You did not answer my last week's letter. I was very much disappointed that I did not get it, however I will write you a few lines. I hope you are well. I am very well to day. I went to the Depo this to find out what time the different trains go out to make the connection at Guthrie. I find I can go on the evening train, and make the connection at Guthrie. I will leave here Saturday evening a week from this coming Saturday which will be the 29<sup>th</sup>. So ask Els Harriet to let some one meet

me, The Lady that I stay  
with dont want me to go she  
says she will give me ten  
dollars a month, but that is  
no inducement I must go  
so be a good Girl and I will  
see you soon I will not  
write any more, you can  
write if you will be quick  
so, I can get it before I  
leave the time seems long  
I will close. Your Mamma

HATTIE SCATES CORAINE

(Harriet Taliaferro)

- August 5, 1878 Hattie born in Missouri per 1900 census and 1905 marriage application to August Schultz.
- Jan. 1, 1888 Harriet and Lucy Taliaferro first appear on the South Union Shaker census - North family. Ages are shown as 7 and 43, respectively. Family bible and application for marriage to A. Schultz give August 5, 1878 as date of birth. Hattie was over 9 when first taken in by the Shakers.
- June 24, 1890 According to South Union 'Record D', Lucy and Hattie leave for the wide world'.
- Sept. 5, 1890 Lucy is readmitted to the Centre family at South Union. (Where is Hattie?)
- ★ [ Oct. 19, 1892 Lucy at Nashville writes Hattie at S. Union that she is coming to visit and asks Hattie to ask Els (?) Harriet to have someone meet her at the train. Note inclosed in the letter to Hattie to 'Nannie', beleived to be Annie Farmer (see THE KENTUCKY SHAKERS by Julia Neal, page 94.) Annie and Hattie remained good friends until Annie died in January, 1942.
- June 15, 1893 Lucy dies and is buried at South Union.
- June 10, 1897 Hattie marries William Coraine at Nashville. Madien name on the marriage certificate is Skates. In the family bible it is written as Scates. Coraine is Acting Station Agent for the L&N RR at S. Union. They are supposed to have met while Hattie was working at the Shaker Tavern.
- September 11, 1899 The twins, Hattie and Kathleen are born. Hattie dies on September 12, the following day.
- June 13, 1901 Margaret Coraine born at South Union.
- Aug. 30, 1903 William Coraine dies and is buried at Auburn, Ky. Is supposed to have a blacksmith business at Auburn. Soon after his death Hattie and the two girls go to Louisville.

HATTIE SCATES CORAINE

(Harriet Taliferro)

Oct. 6, 1905	Hattie marries August Schultz, a German immigrant and widower, in Jeffersonville, Ind.
May 10, 1910	Kathleen dies and is burried at Clermont, Ky.
March 3, 1946	August Schultz dies and is buried at Clermont.
May 13, 1966	Hattie dies and is buried at Clermont, Ky.
Feb. 19, 1988	Margaret Coraine Pope dies in Louisville, Ky. Cremated.
