Camp Wood Jan 12th 1862

Dear Brother & Sister,

I rec a letter from

you last evening was glad to hear

that you are well to day I have

been rather down for a few days

but am all right now I had a

very severe head ache. The boys

are all quite well except Frank

Morgan and J. Swift. J. is now

in the hospital. We are haveing

very nice weather here now. We have

had some very hard rain storms

here with a little thunder and

lightning. The roads are very mud

dy. Well now for some news the

first that comes to mind is this

We have not been payed off yet

we are entitled to three months

pay the 8th of this month. Our

forces are still on this side of Green river we through four regt. every day for picket one in the rear and three in advance they are daily expecting a fight but we will not have one untill we make an advance the nearest the enemy is to us in any force is at Cave City a distance of 14 miles there they think they will have to fight a little, when we advance there force is not over 12,000 while ours is between 20 and 30,000 the other day while our regt. was out on Picket there was a flag of truce come A rebel Major and a Lieut. come with I do not know what they wanted. Charley M. saw them he said they were very smart men and asked McCook why he didnt come down and see them he said they would try and give them

a warm reception. The bridge over green river is completed the cars run over last satterday night for the first time. They are throughing up breast works acrossed the rivers to protect the bridge they have about 5000 men to work every day on it. I suppose you have heard of Hellecks forces intending to make a junction with McCook, if he does we will seround Mr. Buckner and have him sure pop. Well Orissa I would be very happy to send your best respects to Miss Flora but I do not corrospond in tha[t] direc tion. I have a good many correspondents from Oshkosh. I get a letter about every day or two or three a week Orissa today is sunday I should like to be at home so to go to church with all hands does Boughten say

congregation please arise after

they are all up he must be a gay old singer I suppose the Howletts boys have all enlisted by this time I think this war will end in a few months and then we will be at home. Tom does chopping agree with you this winter is it as good business as setting up Editori als for the Deacon. Oris said you were going back to work in the office next month. With these few lines I close. I wish to write a few lines to Pa and Ma. write soon give my best respects to all yours in haste from your true brother and friend.
