Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of Albert Hendricks, a soldier of the Revolutionary War who, you state, was a native of New Jersey, later of Rockingham County, North Carolina, where his son, John, was born February 7, 1798, died, and with other descendants, was buried there, also that he served four years in the Revolution.

The record of only one Albert Hendricks has been found in the Revolutionary War records of this office, and follows as found in the papers of the claims for pension under W. 83, based upon his service in that war.

Albert (sometimes referred to as Albert G.) Hendricks was born May 2, 1759. The place of his birth and names of his parents were not given.

While residing in the State of Maryland, Albert Hendricks enlisted at Fredericktown, that state, sometime in 1777, served two or three months as private under Colonel Baker Johnson in the Maryland troops, during which tour he was in the battles of White Horse and Germantown. A short time after this tour, he again enlisted and served as private in Captain Purvard's or Brevard's (probably meant for Burchardt's) company, Colonel Weltaer's regiment, was in the battle of Monmouth and was discharged after having served a tour of nine months. He enlisted in Rowan County, North Carolina, date not given, and served three months as private in Captain Lopp's North Carolina company. He enlisted and served three months as sergeant in the North Carolina troops during which he was in the siege of Charleston, date of enlistment and names of officers not stated. He enlisted April 23, 1781, at Salisbury, North Carolina, served as corporal and sergeant in Captain McRee's

engaged in guarding prisoners from Thompson's Fort, was in the siege of Ninety Six and was discharged April 28, 1782.

After soldier's return from service, he resided about two years at Fort Cumberland, but after marriage lived in Rockingham County, North Carolina, until 1799, when he moved into Kentucky where he lived a short distance from the Tennessee line for ten or eleven years, then in Sumner County, Tennessee. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Albert Hendricks was allowed pension on his application executed March 13, 1833, while a resident of Sumner County, Tennessee, his post office being Gallatin in that county. He died at his residence in Sumner County, September 14, 1843.

The soldier married September 9, 1791 or 1792, in Rockingham County, North Carolina, Margaret Barnett; the date and place of her birth and names of parents are not shown.

Margaret Hendricks, widow of Albert, applied for pension May 9, 1844, at which time she was aged eighty years and a resident of Sumner County, Tennessee. She was still living there in 1846. Her claim was allowed. She died November 28, 1848.

The following names of children of Albert Hendricks and his wife, Margaret, are shown in the claims: their first-born, name and age not stated, having been born dead; Rebeccah Hendricks, born October 29, 1794, who married Samuel Hinton, born June 22, 1791; Susan or Susanah Hendricks, age not stated, who in 1849 was the wife of one Moody (given name not shown), and John Hendricks, age not stated.

April 7, 1849, Rebeccah Hinton, daughter of Albert and Margaret Hendricks, made affidavit in Sumner County, Tennessee, that she, her sister, Susanah Moody, and her brother, John Hendricks, were then the only legal heirs of her mother; however, June 16, 1849, the Clerk of Sumner County Court stated that soldier's widow, Margaret Hendricks, left the following named children as only lawful heirs: Margaret Hinton, Rebecca Hinton, Susan Moody and John Hendricks. No explanation was made in Rebecca Hinton's affidavit of the omission of the name Margaret Hinton.

The name Abel Hendricks appeared in the claim but no relationship to the soldier's family was shown, nor any information given in regard to him.

In 1844, Susanah Atcheson, aged seventy years, a cousin of soldier's

wife, Margaret Hendricks, made affidavit in Sumner County, Tennessee. She was living in that county in 1846.

In 1846, John Hinton, aged forty-five years, and Jesse Hinton, aged twenty-three years, were both residents of Sumner County, Tennessee; their relationship to Samuel Hinton and his wife, Rebecca, was not stated.

State of Vermont, Chittenden County  
 On this 9th day of May 1844 I personally  
 appeared before me Charles Butler one of the  
 Justices of the Peace now and for said County  
 Samuel Weston aged fifty three years both  
 being full legal persons according to laws made  
 with that the annexed record of the age of  
 Rebecca Weston was this day lost of out of  
 two books one of which was the property of  
 Albert Westbrook and now in the possession  
 of his widow Margaret Westbrook. That he  
 is pretty certain he has seen said record about  
 thirty years ago and before the same was  
 given him and that he copied the same  
 upwards of twenty years ago into his own  
 little notebook which is now in the other piece  
 paper which is plain and well legible and  
 which is here annexed. The aforesaid married  
 the daughter of said Westbrooks. He has three children  
 above mentioned and was careful to preserve her  
 age. Her frequent husband said Albert Westbrook  
 and Margaret his wife spent of their first child  
 being now dead. Her no habitation in the town  
 the date of the marriage of said Albert and  
 Margaret to be correctly stated to wit in  
 twelve days hundred and ninety three  
 days and years above stated

## State of Tennessee Sumner County

On this 9th day of May 1844 I personally appeared before me Eliza Butler one of the acting Justices of the Peace in and for said county and also Justice of the County Court of Sumner County being a court of Record Margaret Wadkins aged eighty years who being first duly sworn according to law both on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Act of Congress April 2nd 1838 entitled "an act granting half pay and pension to certain widows, that the Dowry & Marston of the 16th August 1842 Declaration of said act that she is the widow of Albert Wadkins who was a Pensioner of the United States and for her death she is in Nashville State of Tennessee The further declares that she was married to the said Albert Wadkins on the 9th day of September 1843 and twenty two that her husband the said Albert Wadkins died on the 14th day of September 1843 that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the first day of January seven-teen hundred and ninety four to wit at the same place stated. She was married to said Wadkins by Isaac Bankell a Baptist Minister under publication of Banns three times at the Church door said Wadkins being then a member of the Baptist Church and professed being married that way she undertakes to file a record of the said being child born after the marriage as the whole 17th no record was made of this birth born that same being born dead she has no other record of her marriage other than to and substituted the date above
