

Louisville March 21<sup>st</sup> 1844-

To Mr. J. Jacob,

Dear Sir,

I write to inform you that you need not put yourself to any inconvenience to pay at present the Note which I hold of yours, I would prefer if it suits you, that you keep it on the same terms for another year, commencing 1<sup>st</sup> of April, as I can do without it I hope, unless I should unfortunately be burnt out or some other misfortune occur, in which case will give you timely Notice; the Interest however I should be glad to have when due, & will thank you to send by some safe opportunity, or in what ever way you think best to transmit it to me.

We have been looking for Mary Ann some Feb., learning from Dan's Wife, that she intended visiting the South on account of her health, but have almost given her out, as it is now late in March & this is the Month she ought to have avoided in your Climate; it has been exceedingly unfavourable to health here, a great number of persons sick with colds, & Pleurisy; I hope Mary Ann has not been detained by increased indisposition; Brod. is still in N. Orleans, afraid to return to this changeable Climate yet which is very prudent; he considers himself improved in health by passing the winter there, but I doubt whether

it is permanent, & consider his situation very  
critical. We are all in tolerably good health, Pappa  
has been with us since last Sep. almost altogether, he  
is very feeble & nearly blind, but will go out in all  
kinds of weather, forgetting that he is no longer young  
& able to bear it, & in consequence of imprudence in Sep.  
last was very near dying. I saw Dan. Kryer yester-  
day, they are well with the exception of their son, who he  
said was very sick indeed. Give my love to M. A. &  
tell her that I shall still look out for <sup>her</sup> as long as  
we have winter weather, Rose desires to be remembered  
affectionately to you all. I remain yours &c
